## Eagles Start First Workout For New Grid Season With 30 Reporting

Thirty GHS Eagles reported Monday morning on Eagle Field for the first workout for the new 1971 grid season, according to announcement by Coach Les Johnson. Johnson stated further that he expects two or three more to report and begin play when school opens.

Thirteen lettermen will be back this year to head the roster for the Eagles. Of the 30 reporting Monday morning seven are seniors, 13 juniors, four sophomores and six freshmen. They are working hard to get in shape.

The Eagles will go through two a day workout sessions this week in getting ready for the opening of the new season. Regular practice sessions are being held from 7:00-9:00 in the morning and the same at night. Starting with the opening of school and regular classes next Monday football practice will go into the regular afternoon schedule.

Johnson, head coach for the Eagles, has two assistant coaches working with him. Eddie Lang will be working with Johnson on the varsity string while Randy Baker will handle the B-team. Coach Lang will concentrate on the line while Johnson will work with the backs and defensive line.

The Eagles will field a good team with the major problem being the need for more depth in the line.

The biggest need for both the varsity and the B-team is more boys, according to Johnson and Coach Baker.

The B-team definitely needs more boys to have a good team to compete in a good schedule for this year.

Twenty boys took their physicals for the Junior High team, Coach Lang announced. Three or four more are expected for this group.

Coach Johnson reports that they had a good workout Monday and prospects are good for the year, if they can keep healthy. "We've got quality players, there is no question about that," Johnson said.

"It's going to be a tough race in district this year," Johnson said in commenting on prospects. He stated that Dublin, De Leon and Ranger as well as Early will be in there doing battle.

District 10-A will be one of the toughest Class A districts in the state according to predictions. Coaches of the district feel that the district winner will come up with a one game loss only.

The Eagles will open their season this year on Friday, September 10, with their traditional battle against the AA San Saba Armadillos. The game will be played in San Saba at 8 p. m.

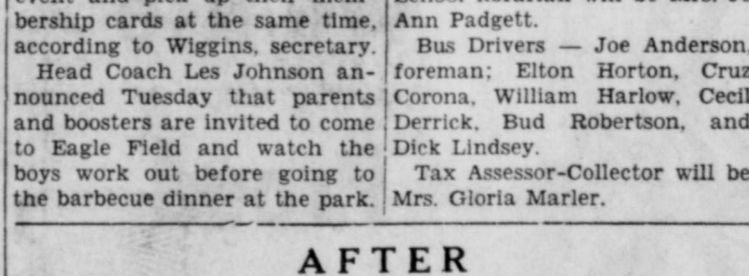

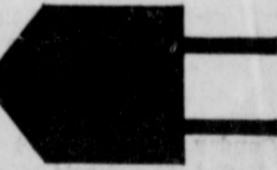

## COUNTY AGRICULTURAL AGENT

TEXAS A. & M. COLLEGE EXTENSION SERVICE

VEE: It's still in the news. The vaccination of horses for Venezuelan Equine Encephalomyelitis (VEE) has become mandatory. Until now, vaccination for horses against VEE was optional and the horse owner had the right to say yes or no to the vaccination. Now, every horse in the State of Texas must be vaccinated. The Texas Animal Health Commission has issued a statement which says, quote: "Owners should be advised that it will be necessary to have their horses vaccinated or a complaint will be filed — fine \$25 to \$100."

There are very few horses in Mills County that have not been vaccinated. However, every effort should be made by the owner to have this done. No charge for vaccination is made upon the horse owner for the vaccination. Mike Hoover, local veterinarian, has set up Wednesday, August 25, as the day for horse owners which have not been vaccinated to bring their horses in to the clinic. If horses can not be brought in, please contact me or the veterinarian and some type of arrangements will be made.

Small grain planting time is just around the corner and soil moisture to begin with seems to be excellent. Seedbed preparation is a known fact to most producers to be a key to producing small grain for grazing and harvesting. By having land broke and free of weeds starts small grain off on the right foot. Also, by putting on an application of fertilizer at the rate of 80-80-0 (N, P, & K) before or at time of planting insures a fast and healthy growth. Grazing from small grain can be obtained much faster. Additional applications in November and in March of 50-0-0 will keep small grain growing and producing more grazing and will insure a good harvest. (If it will rain).

Some oat varieties recommended for this area are Florida 500, Suregrain, Coronado, Ora, Moregrain, New Nortex, Cortex, and Alamo-X. A good seeding rate for oats and rule of thumb is 100 lbs. per acre. Wheat varieties include Cad-do, Sturdy, Cage, Agent, Riley 67, Knox 62, and Arthur. A seeding rate for wheat of 80 lbs. per acre is very satisfactory.

The common cattle grub is one of the most costly pests of the beef cattle producer. The cattle grub is the larval stage of the heel fly and does approximately \$300 million of damage per year in the U. S. to the livestock industry. The heel fly can emerge as early as November or December and lay eggs on the hair of the legs, udder, belly, or side. These eggs hatch and the larvae crawl down the hair and penetrate the skin. The larvae spend about 8 months migrating through connective tissues and spend most of the time in the esophagus (gullet) but can be found in other places. Upon reaching the back, they pupate through several stages before emerging through the skin and dropping to the ground. Grubs

normally appear in animals' backs from October to February but may appear as early as July or early August in this area.

Treatment for effective grub control consists of administering cattle with systemic insecticides — chemicals absorbed into the animal's body where they control grubs by contact action. Animals should be treated from May 1 to July 15. Systemic insecticides and methods which can be used are: Sprays — Co-Ral (25% wettable powder), Ruelene 25 E, or Neguvon (80% soluble powder); Backline Pour-ons — Co-Ral (4%), Ruelene (9.4%), Warbex, or Neguvon. Another systemic which is recommended is good for show calves and small herds are feed additives. These include Rid-Ezy or Steer-Kleer granules which can be incorporated into the feed lot rations at specified rates and fed for 14 days.

Some 22,000 farmers in Texas are receiving a crop acreage questionnaire from Gary D. Parmer, Agricultural Statistician. This questionnaire is of vital importance because this information will be the basis for determining harvested acreage and production of early harvested crops for the State of Texas and for each county. Accurate estimates are of great importance to farmers in planning production and marketings and in providing an unbiased picture of Texas agriculture. All information is kept confidential.

Check your fish in your stock tanks, if you have fish in your tanks and want to keep them. You may lose them due to lack of oxygen in the water if you don't act quick. On very still hot days, the water is not agitated enough to supply the fish with oxygen that they need. Sam Owens has lost many of his fish because of oxygen deficiency even though he has aerated his tank water with a pump. The water needs to be pumped several feet into the air before dropping back into the tank or agitated in some other manner so as to put oxygen into the water.

A pamphlet covering the different programs offered to farmers and ranchers in drought stricken areas is available from my office. The government has published this pamphlet for the benefit of the public to further understand the different program available.

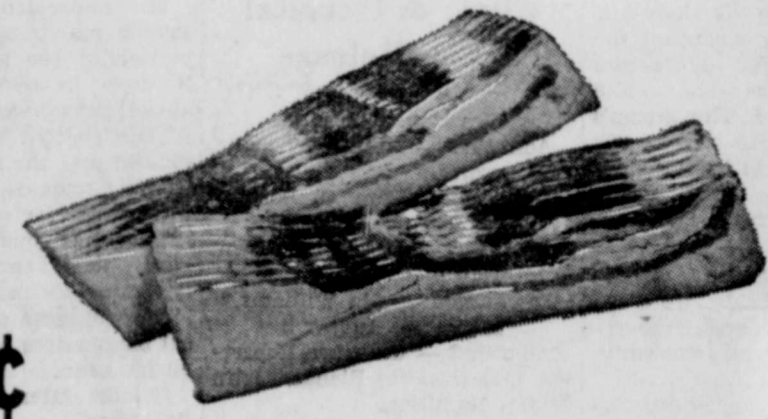
