## Eight Screwworm Cases Confirmed; Precautions Urged For Ranchers

Eight screwworm cases have been confirmed in Mills County in the past week and several more cases are under investigation.

Mills County is being listed as one of the "hot spots" in Texas concerning the screwworm problem. Sterile flies have been dropped and some cattle sprayed in the area.

Ranchers are urged to take utmost precautions with their livestock.

County agent of Mills County, Larry Daniel, listed eight items that ranchers and livestock handlers should do to help eradicate the screwworm.

1. Inspect animals regularly for cuts, scratches and wounds.
2. Manage livestock to reduce injuries. Avoid surgery in warm weather.
3. Collect larvae and egg masses. Search deep in wounds for screwworms. Take samples to the county agent. He will see to it that the samples are identified.
4. Treat wounds with EQ-335 or coumaphos preparations labeled for this purpose. Reinspect wounds until healed.
5. Spray or dip herds with approved pesticides such as Co-Ral. Follow directions on the label.
6. Be extra careful when moving livestock to selling points.
7. Know for sure that purchased animals are screwworm-free at point of origin.
8. Tell your neighbors about the screwworm threat. Encourage them to follow the above-mentioned precautions.

Daniel said that if the screwworm population is not brought under control this fall and winter, then the problem will be greatly worsened for next summer.

A list of eligible voters for each of the three communities is available for reference at the County ASCS Office — call or contact the county ASCS Office for details or information related to the election.

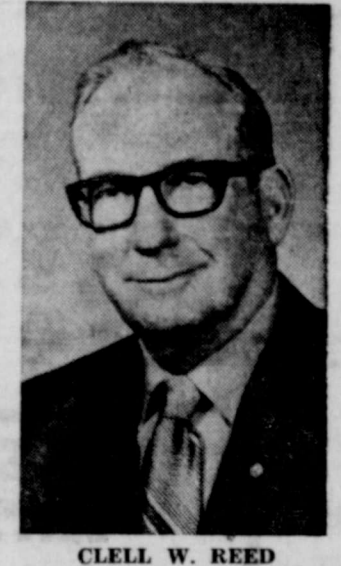

## G'waite To Take Part In A&M's Firemen Training

COLLEGE STATION — Texas A&M University's Firemen Training Division will conduct a five-week short course on basic fire-fighting techniques in Comanche, Gorman, Bangs, Goldthwaite and Cross Plains during October and November.

Instructor W. B. Dorman of the Engineering Extension Service at Texas A&M reported classes began Monday.

Fire departments from the 5 cities and surrounding areas will participate in the training programs, Dorman noted.

Training includes equipment operation and maintenance, basic fire attacks, placement of lines, manpower use and equipment utilization.

Texas A&M's eight-man fire training staff operates under the Engineering Extension Service and offers on-campus and extension courses throughout the state.

## August Bond Sales Report In Mills Co.

Purchases of Series E and H United States Savings Bonds in Mills County during the month of August totaled \$18,611.00 according to County Bond Chairman W. P. Duren. Total sales for the eight-month period were \$50,010.00 for 83 per cent of the 1971 sales goal of \$60,000.00.

Texans purchased \$18,190,740 in Series E and H Bonds during August for a 20.7 per cent increase over the same month of 1970 and believed to be the highest sales during any August since World War II. Total sales for the eight-month period of both series in Texas were \$136,917,471, over \$15½ million above the same period last year, a 12.9 per cent increase.

Nationally, E and H Bond sales totaled \$516 million for 33 per cent above the same period in 1970, a record for any August since 1952. Year-to-date sales amounted to \$3,759 million — 19.4 per cent above a year earlier.

Worms are now a part of county. Two confirmed were reported last week — the Molline area and one Democrat area. Sterile have been dropped in both and plans have been made by the livestock of ad- producers. Mills County

should use strict precaution when dehorning, castrating, etc. their livestock and should keep a watchful eye for any other open wounds. Livestock should be sprayed to prevent fly popu- lation. Several sprays are good with Co-Ral as an example.

Sample kits are available from the county agent's office for col- lecting worm samples to be examined for confirmation of screwworms. It is very impor- tant to collect a sample of all worm cases.

A test conducted this past July on the control of prickly- pear in Sherman County area with the preliminary results showing that a possibility of ef- fectively controlling of this troublesome plant.

The test was composed of the use of two chemicals - 2, 4, 5-T and Silvex. The 2, 4, 5-T chemi- cal proved more effective but the time of day application was the most important factor. 2, 4, 5-T was applied at 4:00 p.m. and at 11:00 p.m. The results were very much in contrast. The 4:00 p.m. application resulted in 0 per cent dead pads, but the 11:00 p.m. application resulted in 80 per cent dead pads. This test does give a possible solution to the eradication of prickly- pear.
