Goldthwaite's Eagles pushed their 1971 football record to 6-2-1 and 3-0-1 as they soared by the Dublin Lions 38-0 here Friday night in a 10-A District contest.

Neither team could muster a score in the first period.

Johnny Johnson, quarterback for the Eagles, picked up the only first half score by keeping yards for the touchdown. Try on an option and racing 48 for extra point failed.

At halftime the Eagles were leading the Lions by a score of 6-0.

In the third quarter Johnny Miller got the Eagles in gear by powering in from the one. A gain the PAT failed.

Later in the same period Johnson scrambled through the Lion defense for a 75 yard TD. He followed the touchdown with a good kick, making the score 19-6.

In the last period the Eagles got three more scores, as Reggie Robbins powered in from the four for the first, Johnson hit

Bennie Humphries on a 45 yard scoring strike, and to round out the scoring Johnny Miller raced 25 yards for a TD, with Robbins adding the PAT.

Johnson carried the ball nine times for a total of 141 yards; Miller, 6 for 40; Bill Bishop, 16 for 101; Robbins, 22 for 88; and Joe Hudson 1 for 6.

Bennie Humphries caught 1 pass for 45 yards and Hudson 1 for 19.

Other advance preparations include taking in a truck-load of groceries for the two-day hunt, and putting another layer of plywood on the deer stand to cover the holes you kicked in it last year when you were excited when you spotted that first buck.

I could say more about the fine sport of deer hunting, and particularly about the feminine participation of late, but I'll spare it so I can have something to say next year when the season rolls around again.

Incidentally, I hope every hunter has extra good luck in 1971 and returns home safely.

**Report On Sales
Of U. S. Savings
Bonds For Sept.**

According to a report received from County Bond Chairman W. P. Duren, sales of Series E and H United States Savings Bonds in Mills County during September totaled \$24,405. Nine-month sales were \$74,415 for 124 per cent of the 1971 goal of \$60,000.

Sales in Texas during the month were \$15,465,128 compared to \$15,033,393 during Sept-

ember 1970. The January-September sales totaled \$152,382,599 with 84 per cent of the 1971 goal of \$181.9 million achieved.

Nationwide, purchases of Series E and H Savings Bonds totaled \$415 million—18 per cent above 1970 sales. The January-September sales were the best since 1952 totaling \$4,174 million—19.2 per cent above a year earlier. Exchanges of Series E for Series H Bonds amounting to \$197 million were reported for the first nine months of 1971—8 per cent above those exchanged in 1970.

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Texas Department Of Public Safety Helps Bring Crime Trend To End

The broad objective of the Texas Department of Public Safety is to secure and maintain social order in the State of Texas. The Department recognizes that government exists for the benefit of the governed - the people. Enforcement and regulatory actions against persons are carried out for the benefit of society as a whole. To advance the objective of the Department in preserving order and protecting the lives, rights and privileges and property of the people in the State of Texas the following information has been obtained from the Federal Bureau of Investigation in order that citizens will be more aware of the rising wave of crime in this nation - of which Texas is a part.

Of the 16,332 offender released to the community in 1965, 63 per cent had been rearrested by the end of the fourth calendar year after release. Of those persons who were acquitted or had their cases dismissed in 1965, 25 per cent were rearrested for new offenses. Of those

released on probation 56 per cent repeated parole 61 per cent, and mandatory release after serving prison time 75 per cent. Offenders receiving a sentence of fine and probation in 1965 had the lowest repeating portion with 37 per cent rearrest. This type of sentence is generally found in connection with violations such as income tax, fraud and embezzlement.

Between 1960 and 1970 crimes of violence were up 165%. Crimes of violence are limited to murder, forcible rape, robbery and aggravated assault.

It is believed that people throughout the state are becoming more concerned over crime and lawlessness therefore it is hoped that this information will be of benefit in bringing this trend to an end.

FOREST MANAGEMENT

Forests are renewable natural resources that require efficient management for optimum production and returns on investment as well as recreational and aesthetic values. Proper harvest methods are often essential to give young, vigorous trees a chance to grow. Unharvested timber often brings on decay and disease.

FEEDLOT FILM

Whooping Cranes Arrive At Winter Home In Aransas

The first wild whooping cranes have arrived on their winter home in the Aransas National Wildlife Refuge on the Texas Gulf Coast, it was announced late Friday by Regional Director W. O. Nelson, Jr. of the Bureau of Sport Fisheries and Wildlife.

Refuge personnel spotted four birds... all adults... on the nineteenth of October which happens to be average arrival date over the last ten years for the whoopers, America's rarest bird.

Ten more birds, all adults, arrived on the refuge during the week and the aerial survey conducted by the Bureau of Sport Fisheries and Wildlife on Friday morning totalled 14. Refuge personnel stated that they were not too disappointed by the absence of the juvenile whoopers, pointing out that the family groups usually make slower time traveling from the summer nesting grounds in Canada's Wood Provincial Park.

As of the Friday aerial survey, six whoopers were on nearby Matagorda Island and eight on the refuge itself. The Aransas National Wildlife Refuge is the traditional wintering ground for the six foot tall white birds.

Later arrivals will be watched with great interest, according to Regional Director Nelson. Fifty seven birds went north on the 2,500 mile flight to the nesting areas, he said, and it will be more than a month before the Bureau can say that the entire population has made the southbound trip. Coming from a low of 14 birds in 1915, the whooping crane wild flock has slowly built up to last spring's level of 57, Nelson added.

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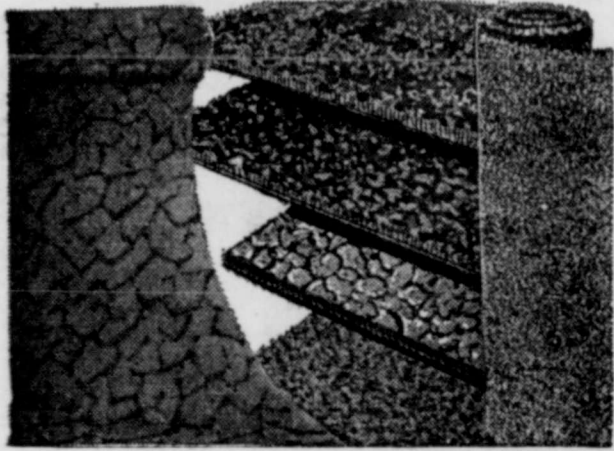

Agriculture in all its phases-called agribusiness-adds almost \$10 billion annually to the Texas economy. This is one reason for the recognition of Texas Food and Fiber Abundance Week, November 15-21, 1971. Agribusiness provides employment for 35-40 per cent of the Texas labor force.

In 1970, Texas ranked third in total crop and livestock cash receipts after California and Iowa. Texas is the leading producer of cotton, grain sorghums, and some other crops. In livestock, Texas leads in all cattle, sheep and wool, and goats and mohair.

Agriculture has been the backbone of our country from the beginning. With the ever increasing population, the amount of land available for agriculture production is becoming less and less and is forcing the agriculture industry to become more diversified and higher skilled. It is easy to see that without agriculture a county such as ours could not prosper and continue to be productive nation.

During Texas Food and Fiber Abundance Week of November 15-21, it would seem appropriate to stop a minute and give a special recognition to the agriculture industry. Without agriculture, there would be no economy or affluent society in which we live today.

Texas Food and Fiber Abundance Week facts:

Texas agriculture consists of 188,000 farms and ranches which contain 140 million acres. To this in 1970, 282,000 farm workers applied 500-million man-hours of labor.

To operate the agricultural plant, Texas farmers and ranchers spent \$517 million for feed and seed, 387 million for machinery and other capital items, \$352 million for repairs, petroleum, etc., \$294 million for livestock, \$250 million for hired labor, \$127 million for interest on farm mortgage debt, \$115 million for fertilizer and lime, \$119 million for real estate taxes, \$460 million for interest on operating loans, and a wide variety of other operating inputs.

From the agricultural plant, farmers sold \$1,383 million of cattle and calves, \$221 million of poultry and eggs, \$205 million of dairy products, \$68 million of hogs, \$69 million of other livestock and livestock products, \$395 million of feed crops, \$355 million of cotton, \$149 million of food grains, \$185 million of vegetables, fruits and nuts, \$107 million of other crops.

About 40 million tons of products are hauled from Texas farms and ranches each year. Nearly all of it requires further

handling by the food and fiber marketing system before being consumed.

The marketing system in the Lone Star State has the equivalent of one million fulltime workers who added \$5.5 billion in value to the agricultural foods and fibers.

Frost on the pumpkin is just around the corner and with it comes a situation harmful to livestock prussic - acid poisoning.

Johnson grass, sudan, milo, forage sorghums and all hybrids sometimes develop a high prussic content and a hazard of grazing livestock when their growth is stopped by a frost. Chemical changes occur in the frost-wilted plants and are responsible for the prussic acid development.

Death to animals which have eaten these plants can come very quickly. An animal can be saved if treatment is administered very soon afterward. The above variety of plants should not be grazed for at least a week after a frost. Hay which is ready to be cut should not be baled until it has cured out for a length of time. Young plants and suckers will have a higher incidence of prussic - acid poisoning than matured and old plants. All producers should keep an eye out for this situation after a frost.

Deer Bring Good Profit As Well As Being Enjoyable Sport

One of the largest businesses in Texas opens its doors in November.

Its 510,000 customers will spend \$88 million in about two months.

The business will utilize 37 million acres of leased land, and the processed product will be worth more than \$6 million.

It's the annual fall deer season in Texas, an event anxiously awaited by hunters as well as hardware store owners, ranchers and packing house operators.

The economic impact of the deer harvest in the state is becoming well known to most Texans. But oddly enough, the impact could be greater yet if all the areas populated by deer were properly used, according to the Texas Parks and Wildlife Department.

A total of 290,706 deer was legally taken during the 1970 season. That's a lot of deer, but the total represents only about nine percent of the herd.

Biologists say under most conditions an annual harvest of 15 percent to 25 percent of the herd is appropriate. In fact, studies have shown that a higher harvest rate results in a healthier deer herd from year to year.

The acreage of lease land is expected to increase about 11 percent this fall, indicating an awareness on the part of many landowners of the value of deer as a marketable resource. But department biologists note that many owners of large tracts of land fail to put enough gun pressure on their deer herds, resulting in stunted deer and over-grazed land.

The state's overall deer population is remaining fairly stable at around 3.2 million animals, but civilization's constant inroads on deer habitat are
