Ralph E. Duren, of Mullin, Texas has terminated over six years service as County Committeeman with Mills County ASCS. This action was brought about by his announcement for candidacy in the County Governing body.

Mr. Duren has served on the former elected County ASCS Committee for 2 three year terms.

His tenure was culminated concurrent with his announcement for public office December 2. He expressed his determined interest in the future progress of such items as REAP—cost share programs, production adjustment programs such as wheat, feed grain, cotton and peanuts, and the wool-mohair incentive payment program.

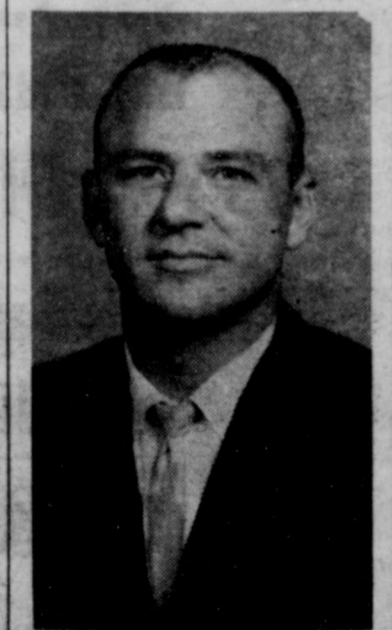

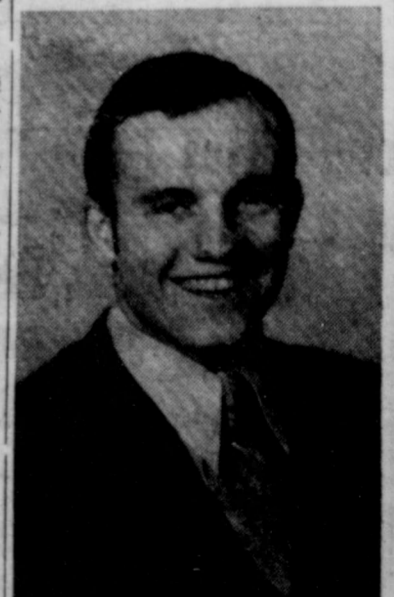

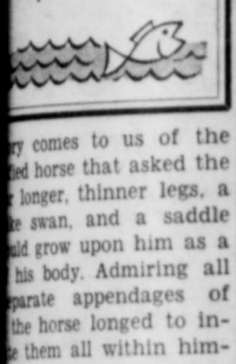

GRAZING CROP STUBBLE

Proper grazing of grain sorghum and corn stubble could boost agricultural income on the Texas High Plains by more than \$160 million, according to a recent study in Castro County. The practice could also pay dividends in other areas. In the study 421 steers weighing an average of 405 pounds were placed on 230 acres of grain sorghum and corn stubble for a 114-day grazing period. The steers had been backgrounded in drylot for 40 days prior to being placed on the stubble. After the grazing period, the steers were finished out at a feedlot. The study showed an average net return of about \$48 per head.

Reduce Your Taxes With Good Records

Good records can save tax dollars at income tax filing time for North Texas taxpayers. Ellis Campbell Jr., District Director of Internal Revenue in North Texas, said good records help you get all the deductions and credits you are entitled to.

A good system for keeping records is to label envelopes or folders according to the types of income and deductions you have, Mr. Campbell said. Bills and receipts should be put in the appropriate folder as they are paid.

Taxpayers who itemize their deductions on Form 1040 must have available cancelled checks, receipts, statements, and other material to support the claimed deductions.

Mr. Campbell said that, in addition to saving tax dollars, good recordkeeping makes preparation of the tax return a much easier task.

Attention: Entry deadline for the Mills County Stock Show is December 15, 1971. All 4-Her's, PFA, and FHA members should check with their extension agent or teacher about entry blanks. The December 15 deadline pertains to cattle, sheep, steers, goats, and hogs.

December 15th is deadline for entering the Forth Worth and San Antonio Livestock Shows. Entry blanks can be obtained from county agents office.

Sheep and goat producers in Mills County are encouraged to attend one of the upcoming meetings regarding a referendum on predator control proposed by the Texas Sheep and Goat Raisers Association.

The meeting schedule is as follows: December 13, Community Room of the First National Bank, Uvalde; December 14, Rainbow Room of the Stephenville Savings and Loan Association, Stephenville; December 15, District Court Room, Fort Stockton; December 16, University Room of the First National Bank, San Angelo State University, San Angelo; and December 17, County Court Rm. Fredericksburg. All meetings will begin at 2 p.m.

The meetings will be a joint venture by the Texas Agricultural Extension Service and the TSGRA.

The proposed referendum will involve sheep and goat producers in 73 counties in the far west and west central areas of the state. These counties have 16,704 producers and 5,578,000 head of sheep and goats. According to the TSGRA, this is 81 per cent of the producers and 97 per cent of all the sheep and goats in the state.

If the State Commissioner of Agriculture certifies that the referendum be conducted, an election will be conducted by mail ballot next spring. A board of directors will also be elected at that time. If the referendum passes, maximum deductions will be 20 cents a head for sheep and 10 cents a head for goats. The assessment will be made on all animals coming off of pas-

ture or producer-owned lambs going into feedlots.

Before Jan. 1, Mills County farmers and ranchers should check with their tax consultants on complex tax problems. Latest information from Washington indicates that a new 7 per cent Investment Credit Act will likely be passed by Congress. And it may be retroactive to April 1. Thus, you should bring your records up to date so you can make some investment decisions if necessary.

First, determine the income from sale of crops, livestock and livestock products to date. Then estimate the income for the rest of the year. Determine expenses to date and estimate the probable expense for the remainder of the year. A quick way to estimate depreciation is to use last year's figure plus depreciation on new items bought this year. From these figures, you can determine the probable adjusted gross income.

If the preliminary check indicates an unusually high income, you may take steps to reduce the taxable income for 1971. You might buy needed machinery or equipment if the Investment Credit Act is passed. Also, consider buying certain supplies for next year. Income averaging and advance payment of interest on loans will also reduce this year's taxable income. If the indicated taxable income is low, you might delay buying expensive machinery or equipment until next year.

It will cost you about 17 cents for each dollar of expense you fail to record if your taxable income is between \$3,000 and \$4,000 after deductions and exemptions. The exact amount depends on whether you file a joint or a separate return. The tax rates gradually increase. For example, on a joint return, it reaches the 25 per cent bracket at \$12,000.

Living Drunks Can Wreck Your Holiday, Says Texas Safety Ass'n.

Christmas and New Year's are going to drive; but because of the various studies that have been made, it knows many Texans do drink and drive.

"The Texas Safety Association," Parker commented, "believes that it is in the best interest of these people to make available charts to show how much alcohol the average, healthy adult can consume before reaching a blood alcohol concentration of 0.05 per cent. While Texas law sets 0.10 per cent as evidence of intoxication, experts have found that many drivers lose their ability to safely handle a vehicle in traffic when they have a 0.05 per cent blood alcohol level."

The safety association president cautioned that in using these charts Texans should realize that inexperienced drinkers, young drinkers, those using other drugs, and those who are ill may not be able to consume as much alcohol as indicated on the charts and still be able to drive safely.

"The Texas Safety Association hated to issue a release of this type because Christmas and New Year's are, and should be, times of joy, friendship, and family love. But we know, just as certainly as Christmas comes on December 25, and New Year's Eve on December 31, that driving drunks will rob Texans of the joy, friendship, and love that is rightfully ours," Parker concluded.

Eulogy Read At Mr. Saylor's Funeral

"My father was a man whose life span was from 11 years after the Civil War to men on the moon. He saw the earliest models of almost every invention of note that came into being. He often commented what an era of wonderment he lived through, from the ox cart to the satellite."

"He had a peculiar outlook by today's standards; that a man must work for what he gets out of life. He was raised in a tin roof house with a dirt floor. He helped take care of his younger brothers and sisters until almost 50 years of age. Hard work was a virtue with him."
"He had a mechanical mind which could mentally create a workable object and then proceed to literally manufacture his creations without any drafted plans."
"He was a fantastically well read man and could talk with you on any subject."
"While some other men spent their leisure hours in frivolous ways he would spend his watching a bug at work or a wild animal or bird go about their business. His knowledge on local nature would have been called expert. He never with any malice hurt any living thing."
"His philosophy was that dying is just a part of living for if nothing died life as we know it would soon cease. He believed that he, like everything else, had to replenish the earth."
"As Socrates stated on the transmigration of the soul, 'We know not where we go from here but if what is said is true no evil can happen to a good man before or after death.'"
"If a better place awaits us and the earning of this reward is by living a virtuous life then my father has arrived."

Select Christmas Toys According To Child's Interest And His Age

The key to shopping for toys for Christmas is to choose them wisely and to select them according to age and interest of the child.

For children under three years old, avoid toys with sharp or rough edges that might cut or scratch. Don't choose toys with small attachments that could become loose and be put in ears, nose or mouth, such as glass or button eyes or small wheels. Also check for poisonous paints on objects and toxic, heavy breakable toys.

Brightly colored objects that can be hung out of reach but in view are excellent gifts for children under one year old. Look for squeak toys; sturdy, nonflammable rattles, washable stuffed dolls with embroidered eyes; colored balls; or cups and other smooth non-breakable objects that can be chewed.

Children one-to two-years-old are safe with squeak toys and soft stuffed dolls or animals. Also consider blocks with rounded corners, push-and-pull toys with strings or rounded handles and nests of blocks.

For the two-to three-year-old child, specialists suggest buying wooden animals, push toys, tip-proof kiddie cars and tricycles. Don't forget large crayons; low rocking horses; sand box with buckets, shovels and spoons; large peg boards; small chair & table; or simple musical instruments.

If shopping for the three-to six-year-old, avoid gifts too heavy for the child's strength. These include electrical toys; poorly-made objects that may come apart, break or splinter;

and sharp or cutting toys. Also omit from your gift list highly flammable costumes, ill-balanced mobile toys and shooting or target toys that could endanger eyes.

Some gift ideas for three-and four-year-olds are small brooms and carpet sweepers, toy telephones and dolls with simple wrap-around clothing. Doll bugles and furniture, dishes, tractors, and trucks, non-electrical trains, drums and building blocks are also safe gift ideas.

The child four-to six-years of age is safe with simple construction sets, paints and paint books, modeling clay or a doll house and furniture. Other safe toys for this age group include skip ropes, small sports equipment, paper doll sets with blunt scissors, blackboard and dustless chalk, and flame-retardant costumes.

For the six-to eight-year-old, avoid non-approved electrical toys, anything too large or complicated for the child's strength and ability, sharp-edged toys, poorly made skates and shooting toys. Instead choose well-constructed, light weight usable tools, sleds, construction sets, roller skates or approved, electrical toys. Also check for kites, playground equipment, puzzles and games, sewing material and dolls and doll equipment.

If shopping for the youngster eight to twelve, don't choose air rifles, chemistry sets, bows and arrows, dart games, dangerous tools and electrical toys unless they will be used under parental supervision. Instead, look for hobby materials, arts and crafts or photography or coin and stamp collections. Children this age also enjoy puppet shows, musical instruments, bicycles, gym and sports equipment, model and construction building sets, and electrical trains that have the Underwriters Laboratories' approval.

Remember, a child's safety is your responsibility.

News From Your **COUNTY HOME DEMONSTRATION AGENT**

The live green tree is a symbol of the beauty and joy of Christmas. But a dry tree is recognized as a fire hazard. Most Christmas trees must be cut well in advance of use. Often they are stored under conditions that make them dry out before they are sold. A Christmas tree with its base immersed in water will remain safe from ignition from a point source (such as a match flame) for at least three weeks if installed reasonably fresh. So far, no immersion additives have been found that increase the effectiveness of plain water in reducing flammability.

To assure a fire-safe Christmas in your home buy your tree early in order to get the freshest one possible. Store the tree outdoors in the shade until ready to use. When it is brought indoors, immediately make a diagonal cut removing 1 to 2 inches of the base. Stand the tree in water and keep it in water until you discard it. Keep the tree away from all sources of heat, such as fireplace or heating unit. Use a firescreen to contain flying sparks. Check the water daily. You may need to add as much as a pint of water daily. Keep your lighting system in good order. Inspect and dis-

card wires with frayed insulation, broken sockets and loose connections.

Many of us receive poinsettias, the favorite Christmas plant. Poinsettias will remain colorful and attractive throughout the holiday season with proper care. Poinsettias do best when placed in a sunny location and protected from sudden temperature changes due to drafts, heat vents or opening doors. And night temperatures should not drop below 60 degrees. Such sudden drops can cause complete loss of leaves. Proper watering techniques will also do much to prolong the life of the poinsettia. Water requirements for the flower are relatively high because of low humidity in homes and offices and because of the large leaf surface on the plant. The soil

ball should not be allowed to become so dry that the leaves start to wilt. The soil, however, should not be saturated with water. Frequently, poinsettia pots come covered with attractive foil to enhance their appearance. Check if the drainage hole in the bottom of the pot is closed by the foil. If it is closed, excess moisture will not be able to drain out and the soil will remain waterlogged. About three weeks after the plant has been received, fertilize it with a complete fertilizer, such as those recommended for African violets. Dissolve the fertilizer in water as recommended on the container, then water the plant thoroughly. Applications may be repeated at three-week intervals until the colored bracts fade and drop.

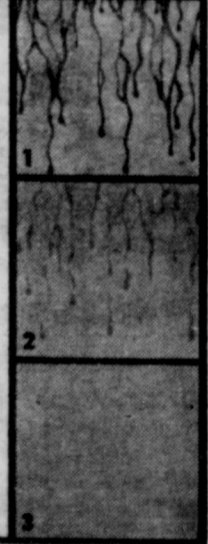
