The deadline for employers to complete their 1971 W-2 forms is Monday, January 31, reports Ellis Campbell, Jr., District Director of Internal Revenue for North Texas, said today.

Forms should show earnings, income tax withheld and Social Security information.

W-2 from each employer should be filed with his income tax return. Therefore, it is important that employers furnish copies to their employees by the required date to permit timely filing of employees' tax returns.

A penalty may be charged on an employer for each late W-2 he files.

Eagles On Top Of 10-A Basketball Race; Girls Hold 3-3 Dist. Record

The Mighty Goldthwaite Eagle boys basketball team is undefeated in the district race so far this season. Although the Eagles have had some close games in the tough district race, they finished 5-0 for the first round and downed Early in their first game of the second round.

The Eagles opened district play against Early and defeated them by a score of 59-39. Scoring in double figures in the contest were Johnny Johnson, 21; Joe Hudson, 12; and Clinton Wesson, 10.

The Eagles played De Leon in the second district game and came home the winner of an over-time game. The final score 51-49. The Eagles had a well balanced attack in this game with Johnson scoring 18 points; Benny Humphries, 8; Wesson, 11; and Bill Fisher, 9.

The third district contest was with Cross Plains and the Eagle team won by a score of 67-51. High point men were Johnson, 14; Humphries, 18; and Wesson, 23.

In the fourth district game the Eagles played Ranger, who was picked to win district at the start of the season. Despite the fact that Ranger had greater height, the Eagles won by a 48-41 score. High point honors went to Johnson, 29; Humphries 8; and Wesson, 6.

In the final game of the first round, it became a battle of the undefeated, as Dublin brought a 4-0 record with them to Gold-

thwaite. The Eagles broke the tie however, with a 37-35 victory over the Lions. Again the Eagles were at a disadvantage because of the height, but they were able to finish the first round with a perfect record. Humphries was high scorer as he racked up 19 points. He also pulled down 15 rebounds in the game.

The Eagles started their first game of the second round last Thursday night against Early, defeating them 79-50. It was one of the better games of the season as the Eagles hit 50 per cent from the floor and 68 per cent from the foul line. Johnson led the attack against Early with 29 points, Humphries, 18; and Reggie Robbins, 12.

Friday, January 28, Last Day To Sign-Up For Coastal Bermuda C-S

Tomorrow, Friday, January 28th, is the last day to make application for Cost-Share assistance in establishing permanent grass under the 1972 Rural Environmental Assistance program — REAP. This program, administered by Mills County ASCS office, offers cost-share payments up to \$9.00 per acre in assisting eligible farmers and ranchers prepare their land and sprig Coastal Bermuda grass.

Cost-Shares of up to 6:50 per acre, based upon 50% of the cost of seeding other grass varieties including Sideoats Grama, Buffalograss, Bluestem, Lovegrass, Indiangrass, Switchgrass, and NK-37 Bermuda Grass, can be earned.

Application must be made before the practice is started, and by January 28th, to be considered for approval. Funds for more than \$25,000 have been set up for this, the first of four scheduled sign-up periods to be held during 1972.

Priority has been given, during this sign-up period, to practices which establish permanent grass.

Later sign-up periods will give priority to brush control, building stockwater tanks and wells, and seeding fall cover crops. Other practices which will be considered on the basis of availability of funds are: Cross-Fences, Pipelines, Terraces, Waterways, Animal Waste Management Structures, and critical area shaping.

REAP handbooks, listing these practices and specifications, are available upon request at the Mills County ASCS office.

Robert Franklin Gholson Rites Held Wednesday, January 19

The last survivor of his pioneer parents of nine children, Albert Franklin Gholson was born December 9, 1881 at the Gholson Ranch South of Evant in Garza County. His parents were Frank and Adeline Lang-Gholson, whose families settled the valley called Ford Cove. He was born in a rock home built soon after the Civil War. There were children in the family and he was the last of them. He grew up in this area, attending the local schools and engaged in the livestock business for a number of years. Following in the footsteps of his father, who had served in the Texas Rangers in his early years, Albert too became a Texas Ranger for a number of years and later he entered the U. S. Customs Service and spent more than 35 years along the U. S. - Mexican border, much of it in the Big Bend Area. He always returned

to Evant for yearly visits and upon his retirement in 1946 he and his wife returned to Evant to live.

He married Miss Orline Wynne of Huntsville, Texas in 1905 and they had three children, a daughter, Evelyn, and two sons, Edwin and James. Local School District To Reapply Maintenance, Bond Allocations

In 1963 the Goldthwaite school rated to go under S. B. 116. This law states that a school district can charge a rate of school tax for bonds that is necessary to pay bonds voted by the district. The school may also charge for maintenance a rate of \$1.50 if percentage of bond indebtedness is not over 7 per cent — \$1.40 if not over 8 per cent — \$1.30 if not over 9 per cent — and \$1.20 if not over 10 per cent. The Goldthwaite bond indebtedness is less than 3 per cent. The schools can charge up to these amounts. They could also charge less if not needed. The Goldthwaite school did vote S. B. 116, but they also put a restriction of \$1.25 where it could have been \$1.50. This limitation is not used many times in Texas. The Texas Education Agency tells us that about one in every one hundred has this limitation and not the full \$1.50 for maintenance.

The Goldthwaite school will not be able to operate next year at the same rate of \$1.25 and the evaluation we are using now. One of the two must be changed for next year. If this rate passes to raise the maintenance tax to what S. B. 116 states without any limitation we could still operate on the \$1.65 total as it is this year. If not then we must use the \$1.25 for maintenance and raise evaluation.

There is not much the board can change on expense of the school. Most of the expense is set, the teacher salaries are set by the State. If we have lights, heat and water this amount is about the same each year. If we carry insurance on buildings, this amount is set. The local bond assignment is set by state. The only item the board has much freedom with is the number of teachers we have and upkeep of buildings. If we let this go we have trouble with accreditation of Texas Education Agency.

The board and administration is very much aware in trying to keep all cost down as low as possible in our school district. We do believe in giving the students a good education. We do know that schools throughout the State are having to have more money to operate. We also know that it cost more for everything now.

We are not trying to start any confusion in our community. There is too much hard feeling in communities around us concerning taxes. We want the pie of this community to be formed as well as we know situations of our school then let you decide. We had rather vote to repeal \$1.25 limit on maintenance than to have another evaluation change, especially since it is felt that this rate would change the total tax of \$1.65 present, but only change from .40 to .25 and maintenance from \$1.25 to \$1.40.

If the Supreme Court would uphold the unconstitutional thing of property tax as it has then we would change with other districts. This action would have no effect on this ruling or this outcome way or the other. They said there would be two for Texas legislature to write a plan. Until that time the law we have in effect now is in effect also next year they uphold the ruling we change thereafter. All taxes paid this year before January 31, will be delinquent and penalty and interest on this. This is still a debt against property.

Please let each voter find the information possible on S. B. 116 maintenance tax to decide what you feel best for you, the school, and community. Then vote that way. Any member of the School Board administration will be glad to discuss this with any individual group.

We want a good school, we want what you desire, only wish it did not take so much money to operate a school and the expense is so great. Contact anyone for information on this and then vote you think best. We will be the same school even though may vote different.

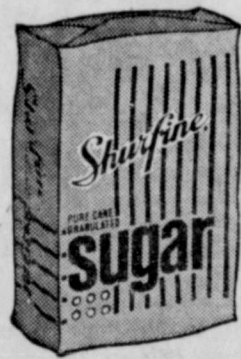

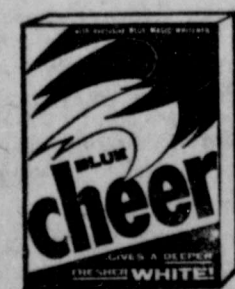

District two - Callahan, Coleman, Nolan, Coke, Taylor, Runnels, Tom Green, Concho, Sterling, Irion, Scurry, Mitchell. District three - Val Verde, Edwards, Kinney. Real. District four - Blanco, Travis, Kerr, Kendall, Comal, Hayes, Caldwell, Bandera, Bexar, Llano, Williamson, Gillespie, Mason, Guadalupe, Medina, Uvalde. District five - Schleicher, Menard, Sutton, Kimble, McCulloch. District six - Stephens, Young, Clay, Jack, Palo Pinto, Burnet, Parker, Hood, Somervell, Eastland, Erath, Comanche, Hamilton, Bosque, Brown, Mills, Coryell, McLennan, San Saba, Lampasas, and Bell.

The referendum and election will be held by mail ballot which will be provided to all eligible voters not later than 15 days prior to the election. Ballots must be mailed to the polling place at Box 1486, San Angelo, Texas 76901 before midnight on the date of the election.

Any person within this area engaged in the business of producing or causing to be produced sheep or goats for commercial purposes is eligible to vote, including owners of ranches, and their tenants and sharecroppers, if such person would be required to pay the assessment proposed.

Any person qualified to vote at the referendum may place his name in nomination for membership on the proposed commodity producers board as a representative of the district in which he resides or as a director at large by application to the above organization signed by himself and at least ten other persons eligible to vote in the referendum. Such applications must be filed at least 30 days prior to the election date.

Any person qualified to vote who does not receive a ballot prior to March 13, 1971, may obtain one at his local County Agent's office.

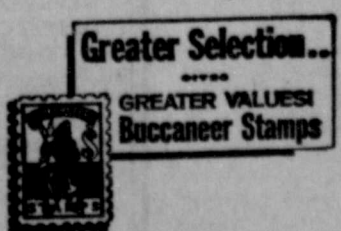

Cleaner Water Results Of Planting Grasses

Cleaner water from less silt is one of the benefits expected from shaping and planting grass for the protection of parallel terrace system outlets, a conservation spokesman said today.

Charles Studer of the Goldthwaite Work Unit of the Soil Conservation Service said 17 acres of grassed waterways have been shaped and sodded in the local conservation district this year.

Grassed waterways are being prepared by shaping and sodding on the A. E. Gromatzky farm.

Grassed waterways replace the county road ditches and old ditches along the fence in the district.

Natural drains are used for waterways if possible. Natural drains usually require less shaping unless they are gullied. Grade is usually more uniform and the runoff water leaves the farm at its natural location.

Trial terrace lines can be laid out by SCS technicians to help plan the waterway system for the parallel terraces. Technicians also design the waterways to carry the expected storm runoff.

The shaping of the waterways should be done in the fall and the land prepared for sodding. The sprigging should be done in January or February for best results. The Agriculture Stabilization and Conservation Service through their REAP program provides cost share assistance in the establishment of the waterways.
