## Financing Of May And June Primary Elections Heading For Final Test

The complex question of financing May and June primary elections is heading for a final test.

Comptroller Robert S. Calvert asked Atty. Gen. Crawford for an official opinion on the Secretary of State Bob Bullock's plan to pay for the primaries with state bonds.

Calvert forced the issue to a final test last week by handing the question to the Central Texas Council of Gov. for a grant.

The \$2,000 grant to Central Texas Council of Governments, to hire a radio engineer to supervise planning and implementation of a regionwide enforcement radio communications system was among those recommended today by the Criminal Justice Council on the Committee. Funding subject to final approval of Governor Preston Smith.

The engineer would inventory existing radio equipment, prepare a detailed system design, specifications, assist in receiving bids and supervise implementation of the regional system.

Central Texas system will be part of statewide law enforcement radio communication network. Counties to be included are Bell, Coryell, Hamilton, Lampasas, Milam, Mills and Tarrant.

COG is expected to provide a kind of match of \$4,668. CTOCG grant was among applications totaling \$3,060, considered by the CJC Executive Committee.

Criminal Justice Council on the statewide law enforcement planning and administrators from the U. S. Department of Justice for crime projects in Texas.

Calvert balked and took the matter to Martin for advice. "I will not pay anything out of the treasury for this unless I have a written opinion from the attorney general or an order of the court," said Calvert. He added he does not think Martin will advise him to pay bills submitted by Bullock.

"If the vouchers are, for some reason, not approved, I intend to place this question before the Texas Supreme Court at the earliest possible moment so that the entire matter of primary financing can be adequately, equitably and finally resolved," Bullock stated.

He moved with court authority to formulate rules for the primaries after a three-judge federal court January 20 struck down the filing fee law relied on to finance the spring elections. Gov. Preston Smith proposes to transfer to him more than \$1 million for paying primary bills if the plan is finally cleared by legal authorities.

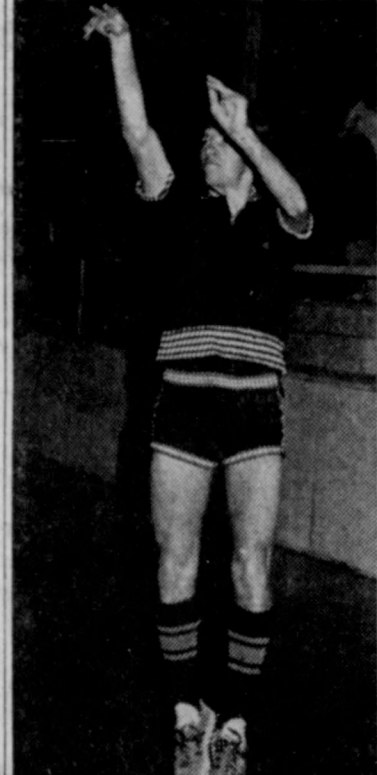
Rep. Rayford Price of Palestine accused Smith and Bullock of pre-empting prerogatives of the legislature, and said the governor should call an immediate special session to give lawmakers another whack at resolving the problem. Reps. Price Daniel Jr. of Liberty and Jim Nugent of Kerrville defended Smith and Bullock and charged Price was trying to further his House Speakership campaign. Daniel and Nugent are also seeking the Speakership.

The new director is a dentist in partnership with his father in Goldthwaite. He is a 1960 graduate of Goldthwaite High School. He attended the University of Texas and graduated from Baylor Dentistry College in Dallas in 1967. Following his graduation he was in the Navy for three years.

President, W. P. Duren said that the 82 annual report shows deposits, loans, and discounts and total resources at a new all time high for the bank which was started in 1888. At the time the bank was started it had deposits of a little more than \$4 thousand and with a stock account of \$11 thousand. During the past year, 83 years later, the bank reached total resources of over \$15 million.

## G'waite FFA Members Enter Houston Show

Nine members of the Goldthwaite FFA Chapter will show entries in the Junior Division of the Houston Livestock Show and Rodeo. Participating members will include Ricky Stacy and Steve Gist showing three commercial steers each. Andy Cook, Robin Reid, Danny Sutherland, Dale Page, and Mark Lindsay will all show Junior Breeding sheep, and Roy Walters will show breeding sheep and Angora goats.

A record number of entries and premium money will make this year's Houston show the largest livestock show in the world. Classes are provided for 10 beef breeds, 4 dairy breeds, 6 swine breeds, 11 sheep breeds, 6 horse breeds, 5 rabbit breeds, 22 poultry breeds and Angora goats.

Fifty students are currently attending college on scholarships provided by the Houston Livestock Show and Rodeo. Twenty-four scholarships of \$1,000 each will be awarded to winners in each of 24 counties participating in the show's GO-TEXAN program.

Dates for the 1972 Houston Show are February 23 through March 5, with the first two days set aside solely for livestock judging and sales.

A spectacular rodeo is planned this year to celebrate the 40th anniversary of this great civic event. Every day will bring different stars to the Astrodome.

## Fifty-Five Candidates Entered Democratic Primary Before Deadline

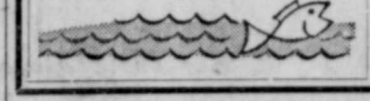
A total of 55 candidates for statewide office entered the Democratic primary before the February 7 filing deadline. There are contests for every office on the statewide ballot except four judicial places.

The 40-year Humble Pipe Line career of Clell W. Reed, senior clerk, Odessa District, ended January 1 when he e-

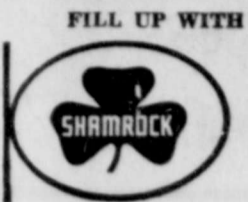

## Comanche Trail Council Now Part Of Larger Region

Local Scout leaders learned today that the Comanche Trail Council, Boy Scouts of America, will be served through a new organizational structure adopted by the BSA's Executive Board.

Yarborough explained that the new 6-region plan will offer more effective direction and assistance to the Comanche Trail Council and should result in financial savings to the national organization.

"After several years of study, five volunteer task forces were appointed last year to recommend a more effective regional volunteer and professional structure that would provide national service in an area closer to the local council," he said. "The new plan which resulted from the work of the task forces has as its principal objective to serve the increasing number of BSA members with a program of quality."

Workshops on health of Dairy, Poultry, Cow-calf, Feedlot, Horses, and Swine will be available. This conference is sponsored by Veterinary Medical Association and Texas A&M. Many tree diseases can be controlled simply by pruning. This is the most effective means of controlling many trees and shrub diseases. Some of the diseases controlled by winter pruning include fire blight and cytospora canker. Fire blight is a bacterial disease which is at times found in pear, apple, and pyracantha. Cytospora canker is a fungus disease common to peach and apple.

When pruning, dip knives and saws in a disinfectant after each cut on a diseased tree. This kills disease organisms that often cling to equipment after cuts are made through diseased wood. A 10% household bleach solution is a satisfactory

disinfectant and can be prepared by mixing 1 part bleach to nine parts of water.

Treating pruning wounds with a wound dressing is another important part of disease control. Pruning cuts are open invitations to several disease-causing organisms. Commercial preparations containing asphalt are recommended to be used as wound dressings.
