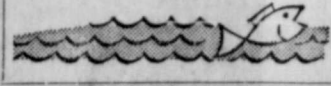
Highway Patrol Investigates 10 January Accidents

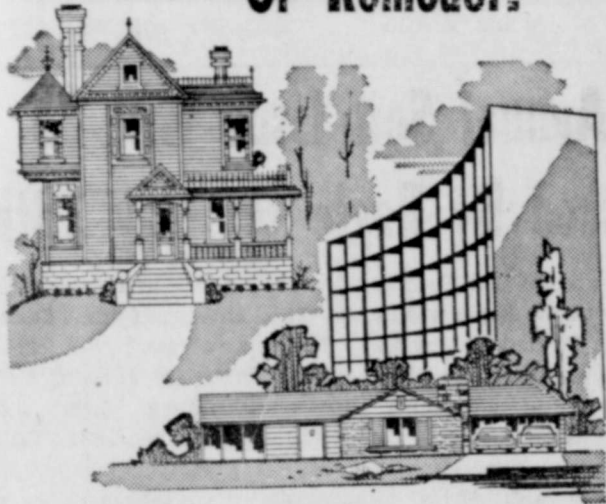

THE WAY, THE TRUTH,
AND THE LIFE

Center City Baptist Church

There is a childlike simplicity in the gospel of Christ. In this complex world, it is refreshing indeed to be told a simple truth. A childlike faith and a childlike humility are essential to a Christlike spirit.

Consider with me the simplicity of the way. No great theological jargon needed here. The way is clear; the path is sure. We put our faith in Jesus, believe His name, and we are saved from our sin. The keeper of the prison asked a question of the apostle Paul in Acts, the sixteenth chapter, "What must I do to be saved?" Now a question of this type one would think must require at least a sermon of explanation. The simplicity of Paul's answer is both remarkable and wonderful, "Believe on the Lord Jesus Christ and thou shalt be saved". The jailer had been shown the way in one brief sentence. Jesus Christ is the way.

Consider the simplicity of the truth. Now men would tell us that truth is an elusive thing. Great minds seek a lifetime for truth and die in confusion and fear. Pilate's question in John 18: 38 is asked again and again, "What is truth?". Is truth to be found in history books? Perhaps, but historians interpret history to please their own philosophical views. Often we find in history books, and all other writings of men, contradiction, confusion, hypocrisy, and lies. In comparison, consider the simplicity of Biblical truth. Jesus is the truth. No contradiction, no confusion, no hypocrisy, and no lying found here. The truth men seek is the person of the Son of God. To know Him is to know the truth. Jesus says in John 8:32, "Ye shall know the truth, and the truth shall make you free". We have His promise in John 16:13, "How be it when He, the Spirit of truth is come, He will guide you into all truth".

Consider the simplicity of the life. To know Christ is to know life; Life as God meant it to be. Life that is full of peace, joy, and faith. Abundant life as Christ Himself promised in John 10:10, "I am come that they might have it more abundantly." Childlike faith gives a peace in knowing that we are safe in the arms of Jesus. Does the simplicity of the gospel offend

you? Jesus said, "Whosoever shall not receive the kingdom of God as a little child shall in no wise enter therein". I John 5:10-13 tells us, "He that believeth on the Son of God hath the witness in himself: he that believeth not God hath made him a liar: because he believeth not the record that God gave of his Son. And this is the record, that God hath given to us eternal life, and this life is in his Son. He that hath the Son hath life: and he that hath not the Son of God hath not life. These things have I written unto you that believe on the name of the Son of God: that ye may know that ye have eternal life, and that ye may believe on the name of the Son of God."

USE OF MAN-MADE
MATERIALS IN FURNITURE
ON THE INCREASE

Furniture manufacturers are stepping up the use of plastics, acrylics and other man made materials in the production of furniture. Although some designs take full advantage of the inherent beauty of the man made materials, many are made to resemble wood, marble, and other natural products used in making furniture.

The increasing scarcity of fine furniture woods is prompting expanded uses of plastics and acrylics for shelves, drawers and decorative details or even furniture pieces made entirely of plastic. The man made materials provide lighter weight and lower cost of furniture than when fine hardwoods are used.

Since it is often difficult to detect the use of man made materials in some furniture pieces, consumers should always read labels and ask questions

to determine materials used in construction. Although acrylics and plastics are generally durable and tough, they too require special care to maintain their original appearance.

Nine homemakers interested in learning more about how to choose furniture are currently enrolled in a home study series in home furnishings. They are learning helpful information on the selection and use of furniture, window treatments, floor coverings and decorative accessories.

Star — three trustees for a regular three year term each

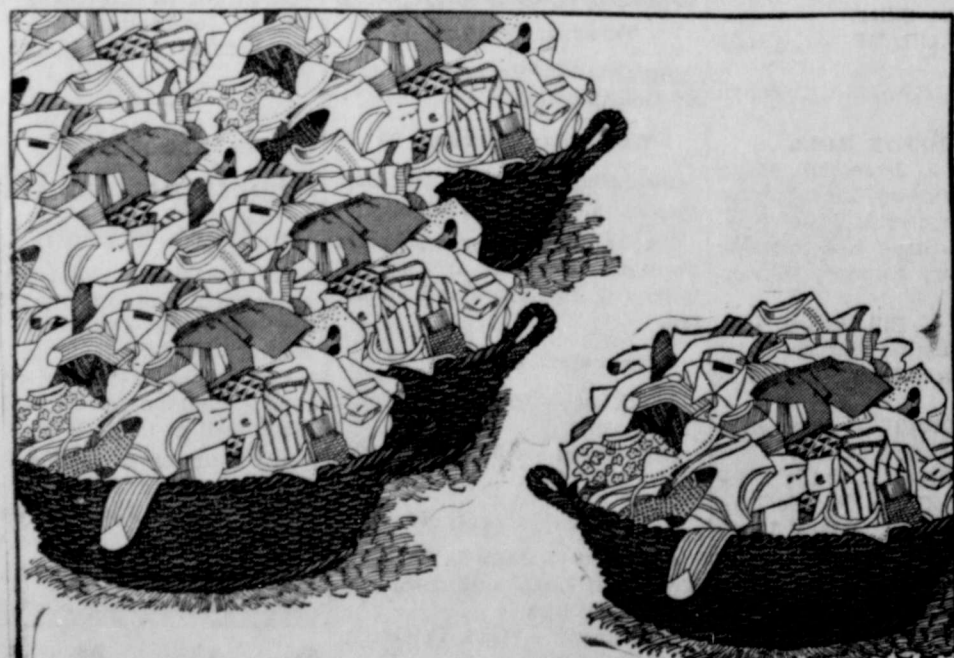

Texas Sheep And Goat Raisers To Face Great Challenge March 27-31

Texas Sheep and goat producers will be faced with one of the greatest challenges in the history of their industry when they vote March 27-31 in a mail referendum being held to finance more effective predator control measures in Texas.

The referendum, sponsored by the Texas Sheep and Goat Raisers' Association, will be conducted in 73 counties of Texas which contain 97 per cent of the state's sheep and goat population and 81 per cent of the producers. Permission for conducting the referendum was granted by the Texas Department of Agriculture at a hearing held in Austin January 7. Ballots will be mailed 15 days prior to March 27.

The state's sheep and goat producers say they are in serious trouble due to the unchecked invasion of predatory animals. Although control measures have been in effect for many years, most livestockmen do not believe the present program is adequate. If approved, the referendum will allow a deduction to be made on sheep and goats marketed to provide additional funds for financing a stronger and more effective predator control program in the state of Texas.

Ranchmen contend that if predators are not controlled more effectively, their multi-million-dollar industry will be virtually wiped out. Documented economic losses suffered by sheep and goat producers in Texas in recent years is staggering. According to the Texas Crop Reporting Service, sheep and goat losses to predators totaled more than 305,000 head in 1967. Value of these animals, excluding the loss of wool and mohair production, was more than \$3,000,000.

The fiber loss is even more damaging to the state's economy since the average value of these raw products which would normally be produced by these animals had they survived would be in excess of \$50 million. Wool and mohair has provided a healthy input to the Texas economy for more than 100 years, but this industry is in danger of being destroyed because ranchmen are finding it increasingly difficult to maintain production because of predator losses.

In wool production alone, major producing counties have shown a tremendous decrease from 1960 to 1970. For example, Pecos County has had a 41 per cent decrease in wool production during that time. The county produced 2,069,000 lbs. of wool in 1960, as compared to 1,212,000 lbs. in 1970. Some other wool and mohair producing counties have had decreases up to 90 per cent.

In a questionnaire sent to a representative number of sheep and goat producers in 77 Texas counties, the Texas Sheep and Goat Raisers' Association learned that coyotes and bobcats are considered the most damaging predators in two-thirds of the counties polled, with dogs being considered a primary problem in 30 counties. Other predators listed as being particularly troublesome were red fox, raccoons, skunks, Russian hogs, wolves and lions. It also was learned in the survey that the majority of predator losses occur in the spring, with the winter months being considered the second most destructive time. The fewest losses occur during the summer and fall, the survey indicated.

Most comments indicated the red fox was primarily a problem during lambing and kidding periods. It was also noted in

the survey returns that three of the predators listed are animals which were introduced into the sheep and goat producing areas and are not native — the dog, red fox and Russian hog.

1972 Easter Seal Appeal To Open Monday, Feb. 28

The 1972 Easter Seal Appeal will open in Mills County on Monday, February 28, 1972, according to Mr. Glynn Collier, who serves as Easter Seal Representative for the county.

He said that Easter Seal Appeal letters would begin arriving at homes in the county about February 28.

As Easter Seal Representative, Mr. Collier is the person to contact to request rehabilitation services from the Easter Seal Society for Crippled Children and Adults of Texas. These services include physical and occupational therapy, speech and hearing programs and special information services to help solve the many problems faced by the families of handicapped children and adults.

Funds help support 19 centers in Texas, where crippled children and adults are treated, regardless of their ability to pay. Walkers, wheelchairs, and related services are provided to those who cannot provide for themselves.

Horseowners In Texas Urged To "Get The Jump" On VEE

Horseowners throughout Texas are urged to "get the jump" on VEE, Venezuelan equine encephalomyelitis, that deadly sleeping sickness of horses. All horses that were not vaccinated last year should be vaccinated as soon as possible.

It was less than a year ago that the disease swept into the state from Mexico, killing hundreds of horses in its path.

The 1972 campaign against VEE calls for vaccination of all equidae (horses, mules and donkeys) not vaccinated last year, points out Dr. James Armstrong, veterinarian with the Texas Agricultural Extension Service. In addition to Texas, the vaccination campaign will include the Gulf Coast states and states adjoining Mexico. All these states have been designated "high risk" states by the U. S. Department of Agriculture.

Armstrong lists four categories of horses that should be vaccinated now — (1) unvaccinated horses that have recently moved into the state; (2) foals born since last year's vaccination drive; (3) foals vaccinated under six months of age; (4) horses that were overlooked and never vaccinated.

Officials of the USDA's Animal and Plant Health Service believe that VEE will break out again even though the disease was confined to 25 Texas counties in 1971. So, it's important to vaccinate now before mosquitoes which transmit the disease emerge in the warm months ahead, Armstrong said.

This year the vaccination program will be conducted at the horse owner's expense. Commercial vaccine is available and must be administered by a veterinarian.

Vaccination will provide immunity for more than a year and possibly longer, notes Armstrong. If there is some doubt as to whether horses were vaccinated last year, it is best to vaccinate again, he adds.

Texas is still under federal quarantine for VEE. Thus horses must have been vaccinated for VEE at least 14 days before being allowed to leave the state for other areas, explains the veterinarian. Horses for interstate shipment must be accompanied by a vaccination certificate with individual animals identified by tag, tattoo or other means.

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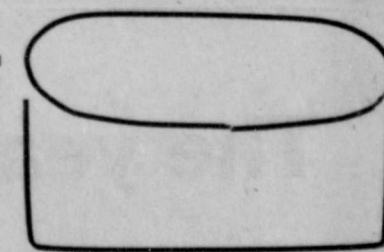

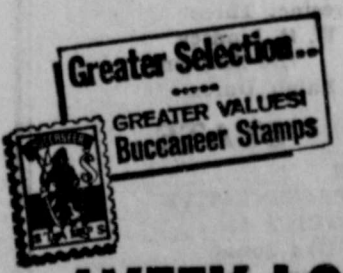

Insurance In Spotlight At State Capitol

Insurance again made headline news on three fronts in Austin last week.

President Nixon's Phase 2 inflation controls, the State Insurance Board said, will mean lower premium rates for hundreds of thousands of Texas homeowners.

Lawmakers threatened to "put the state in the insurance business" unless rates are reduced for a new catastrophe pool designed to protect hurricane and other disaster-prone areas.

An American Insurance Association executive offered to "guarantee" that no-fault auto insurance in Texas would bring a minimum cut of 25 per cent in bodily injury and property damage coverage rates.

New homeowners' insurance rates are expected to be issued May 1, effective June 1. A federal price commission order of a 37.5 per cent cut in the Board's "trend factor" (aimed at keeping rates up with normal inflation) may mean a reduction of 21.1 per cent in the Central Inland Territory. Usual rating formulas would have meant an increase of 5.9 per cent there.

While most fire and extended coverage rates will go up, the rise will be lower than expected due to new federal limits.

The State Insurance Board proposes to cut catastrophe pool rates for non-beach property about a third. Insurance companies strongly resisted. Legislators at a rate hearing retorted that the state may have to get into the insurance business.

Under the pool, authorized last year by the legislature, insurance companies are required to join in providing coverage for areas of the coast which cannot buy policies in the regular market.

The State Board of Insurance is studying effects of various no-fault insurance plans which provide compensation from a driver's own policy regardless of whether he was at fault in an accident.
