The accident occurred at approximately 7:30 p.m. Tuesday March 14.

Sheriff Horace Brooks said that Fallon apparently did not see the man before the incident occurred. Baldwin was rushed to the hospital by Wilkins Ambulance.

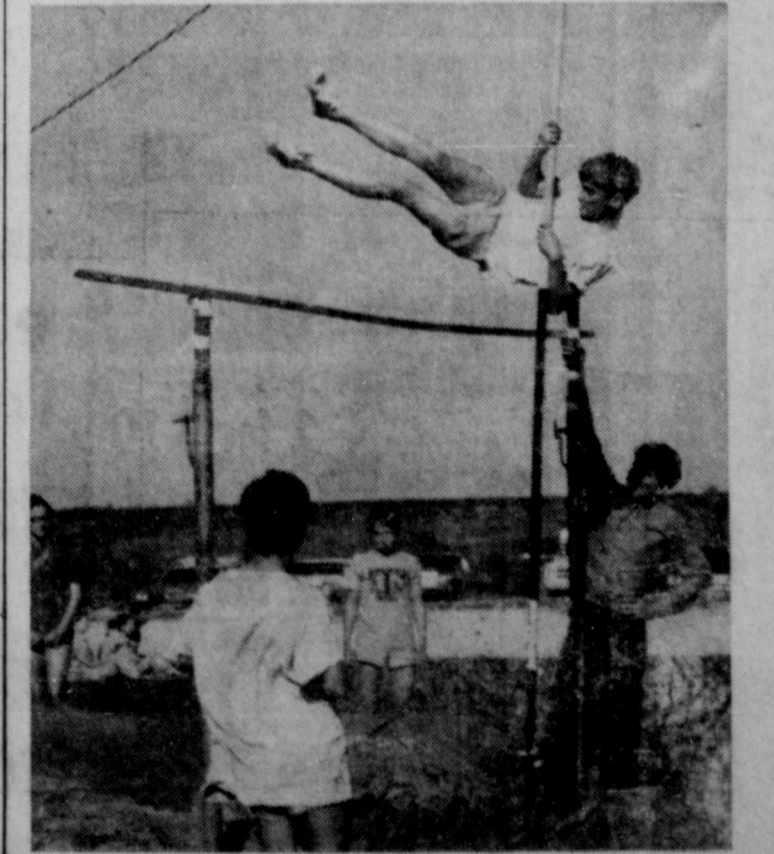

Schwartz Food Store Initiates Computer Grocery Order System

If you see Milton Schwartz in his store with a gadget around his neck that makes him look like a photographer, it is far from that. For the past two months Schwartz Food Store has been using a portable recorder to make weekly orders.

The machine comes in a table model and the portable model. All items in the store are tagged with its warehouse IBM number. Items needed are punched into the order machine and recorded on magnetic tape. The order machine is plugged into a coupler that is tied into the telephone system. At the designated time the Dallas based warehouse calls the store which immediately activates the machine and transmits the order message. Over 600 items can be transmitted in about 2 minutes and a produce order given one day at 10:00 p. m. is at the store the next morning at 7 a. m.

The message is received and goes to the computer at the warehouse immediately which cuts the invoices, eliminating the costly key punching process necessary on manual orders. Schwartz said the system has many possibilities for the future with the use of the computer to figure inventory, keep the store's books, transmit price changes, and many others which can be attained on this machine.

He also mentioned that everything that "glitters is not always gold"—if you punch the wrong item you get the wrong item. Also if you fail to plug in the unit you get a call at midnight, telling you to go to the store and plug in the order.

 **THE MILLS MINISTER**

When we became a part of a Christian congregation we made a commitment to God as well as to the group of people with whom we became affiliated. Sometimes we are more true to the group of people than we are to God. Our commitment to God must be such that we are willing to let the grace of God change us as completely as was the case with the Apostle Paul.

I knew such a man. He was just a boy of 14 or 15 when I first met him in New Guinea. His parents became Christians when he was a small child. They taught him what they had learned. One night there was a cannibal raid on their village and the boy's mother and father were killed. When I met him, he had already determined to destroy cannibalism. He learned to read and write. He studied diligently and then enrolled in an Evangelist school.

After completion of his studies he returned to his people and volunteered to go to the people who had killed his parents and teach them what he knew of his Savior. He went to a people whose language he had to learn. They were suspicious of him, he had to get their trust. He had to live in unbelievable conditions which caused him to contract tuberculosis. It was necessary for the Mission doctor to remove a portion of one lung. When he was dismissed from the hospital the doctor told him not to return to his former work. This young man Uram, got married and went back to complete what he had started.

He and his wife endured starvation, rejection and finally the threat of death when their twin boys were born. The local natives believed that only a woman with an evil spirit would give birth to more than one child at a time. They maintained that she and the children had to be destroyed. By the grace of God Uram convinced them that they were wrong. Having passed this crisis he went on to teach by word and example what the Christian faith really is. After 8 years of hard work among these cannibals he began to see his ambition begin to be realized. I received a letter from him one day telling me that the first group of 105 were to be baptized. This was the day that he was giving his life for.

This, to me, is real Christian commitment. To let God use us as an instrument for the up-building of His Kingdom is the greatest privilege that any of us can have. Too often we look for the easy way—buck-passing, or worse yet, complete silence when the good news should be shouted from the housetops. Brother or sister, husband or wife, son or daughter may have gone astray and we do little or nothing to bring them into the saving relationship to the Lord who gave His life for the ransom of us all. If every one who claims allegiance to Christ were

truly committed, as Uram is, this world certainly would be a more pleasant place to live in. Above all, eternity will be much more pleasant too.

Attention! Fishermen, Boat Owners

Local game management officer Bennie Schriver has released some important boating and fishing regulations that are current and of interest to boaters and fishermen of this area.

(1) All trotlines (including, sail lines or rubber band lines of non-metallic material) with not more than 50 hooks per line placed 36 horizontal inches apart placed in the fresh water of the state must be identified by a legible tag. It must be constructed of a material as durable as the trotline, bearing the name and address of the fisherman and the date it was set out. Not more than two (2) trotlines per person are allowed.

(2) ALL boats powered by any type of machinery must be registered with the Parks and Wildlife Department when operated on the public waters of the state regardless of length of boat or horsepower of motor. Numbers of registration may be obtained immediately from the district office of Parks and Wildlife at 214 N. Main, Brownwood, or application obtained from GMO Bennie Schriver, to be mailed in for registration.

(3) Limit on catfish is 25 per day or 50 possession limit.

(4) One Coast Guard approved life preserver in good and serviceable condition is required for each person aboard.

(5) The operator of all motor powered boat and row boats while under way on the public waters of the state shall require every passenger under 12 years of age to wear a life preserver of the type approved by the Coast Guard.

(6) Lights required: 16 ft. and less whether motor powered or not, Red and Green light in front and a white light in the rear.

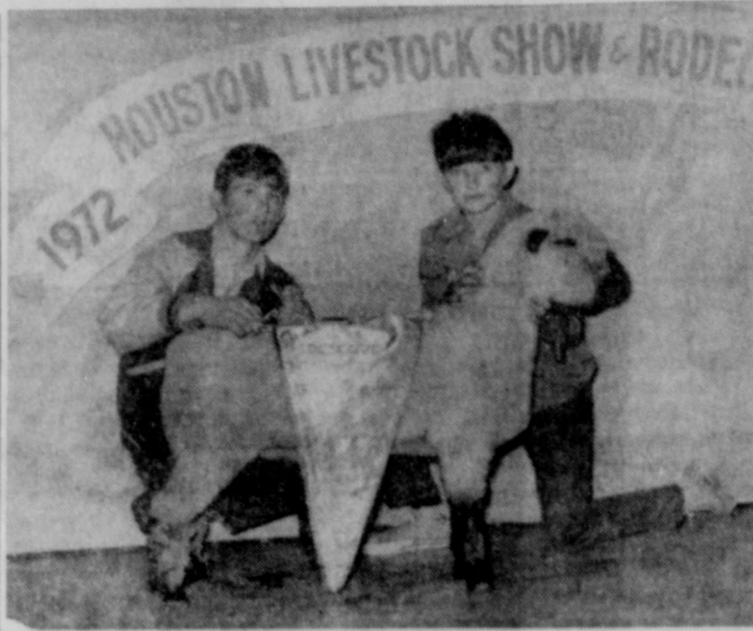

The 21st Annual Swine Short Course will be held at Texas A&M University on March 27-28. This short course is sponsored by the Texas Agricultural Extension Service, Texas A&M Department of Animal Science, and the Texas Pork Producers Association.

Some very informative topics will be discussed by outstanding speakers. All hog producers are urged to attend this short course. Additional information can be obtained from my office.

Many insects are damaging our peaches and plums but one stands out as the worst nuisance, this is the plum curculio—the worm which is present inside the peach when it is ripe. The plum curculio can be controlled if a spray schedule is followed.

The spray program consists of five different sprayings as outlined: 1st spray when 75% of the petals have fallen use Dieldrin plus sulphur; 2nd spray 10 days later use Dieldrin plus sulphur; 3rd spray 14 days after 2nd, use Dieldrin plus sulphur; 4th spray 14 days after 3rd use Sevin plus sulphur; and 5th spray 21 days after 4th, Sevin plus sulphur.

Formulations for these mixtures are as follows:

Dieldrin (50% WP) — 1 tablespoon to 3 gallons water;

Sevin (50% WP) — 2 tablespoons to 3 gallons water; and Sulphur (Wettable) — 9 tablespoons in 3 gallons water.

Many producers have completed sprigging coastal Bermudagrass in the county. Newly sprigged coastal requires good fertilization, and weed control to get established good. Weeds, grassburs, and annual weeds and grasses can cause coastal to be late in becoming fully established.

Spraying coastal immediately after sprigging with Simazine will do a satisfactory job of eliminating crabgrass, barnyard grass, foxtail, goatweed, grassburs, and other annuals. A rate per acre broadcast of 1/3-lb. active ingredient per 25-40 gallons of water is the mixture of Simazine required to use. Additional information available from my office.

Remember: The Mills County Program Building Committee needs the aid of all landowners and/or operators with the Pred-

atory animal control project. The goal set has reached the half-way mark. If one lamb or kid can be saved, it is worth the cost of a trapper.

IRS Audits Smaller Percentage Of Income Tax Returns Each Year

As the years go by, the Internal Revenue Service audits a smaller percentage of income tax returns.

"The IRS examined only one out of every 56 individual income tax returns in the fiscal year 1971, compared with one in 46 during 1970," noted Mrs. Doris Myers, home management specialist at Texas A&M University. "A few years ago one in 25 was audited."

"Don't think this will necessarily make for easier tax evasion," the specialist warned. Although 350,000 fewer returns were audited in 1971 than 1970, the total tax payments from audits rose by \$300 million to a total of \$3.4 billion.

Two-thirds of all taxpayers have more tax withheld than they owe, according to Mrs. Myers. In 1971 the government refunded \$19.9 billion to nearly 56 million taxpayers.

"Also," Mrs. Myers said, "fewer income tax returns were filed last year for the first time since 1959. The Tax Reform Act of 1971 excused millions of lower income taxpayers from filing."

About 130,000 corporate returns were audited, or 30,000 fewer than in 1970. But the IRS claimed \$1.9 billion of added tax, compared with \$1.6 billion in 1970.

One taxpayer out of every 16 made errors in arithmetic or used the wrong tax table.

"That was better than 1970 when one in 12 taxpayers made such errors," Mrs. Myers said.

"Some 2.9 million taxpayers made errors in their own favor, and the government took an additional \$313 million from them," the specialist said. "Only 1.7 million made errors in the government's favor. The government returned \$140 million to them."

NOTICE AFFORDING OPPORTUNITY FOR PUBLIC HEARING

The Texas Highway Department is planning the improvement of U. S. Highway 84 from North Bennett Creek, west of Center City, east to 0.3 miles east of Mills-Hamilton County Line (a distance of 6.5 miles). The proposed highway project will pass through the towns of Center City and Star.

The contemplated location is along the present U. S. Highway 84. The proposed center line is variable from along the present highway center line to twenty-two feet from the present center line. Additional right of way will be required on either one or both sides. The minimum right of way width involving new right of way will be 120 ft., and the maximum will be 260 ft. All of the present right of way is being utilized. The maximum horizontal curvature will be 10 15'. The proposed road will have two 13 ft. traffic lanes and 9 ft. paved shoulders. The horizontal and vertical alignment will be designed for 70 MPH. Climbing lanes will be provided where necessary. This project will provide a completed highway to the standards and safety features for the expected traffic volume in accordance with current design requirements. Following the existing alignment, it will be necessary to relocate the Masonic Lodge building in Center City. There will be no homes or businesses displaced by this project.

Maps and other drawings showing the proposed location and geometric design, information on environmental studies, and any other information about the proposed project are on file and available for inspection and copying at the Resident Engineer's Office at Goldthwaite, Texas. Also, the drawings showing the proposed geometric design have been placed on file with Mills County.

Information about the State's Relocation Assistance Program, the benefits and services for displacees and the relocation assistance office as well as information about the tentative schedules for acquisition of right of way and construction can be obtained at the Resident Engineer's Office.

Any interested citizen may request that a public hearing be held covering the social, economic and environmental effects of the proposed location and design for this highway project by delivering a written request to the Resident Engineer's Office on or before March 31, 1972.

In the event such a request is received, a public hearing will be scheduled and adequate notice will be publicized about the date and location of the hearing.
