A SIMULATED RESCUE was made from enemy territory during the U. S. Army's operation "Gallant Hand" last week. The rescue took place on the Robert Burdette ranch about three miles south of Goldthwaite. A downed pilot, Maj. Ralph Wilson of the 67th Tactical Reconnaissance Wing at Bergstrom AFB, Austin, Tex., immediately started calling for the CH-53 "Super Jolly Green Giant" helicopter rescue team on his emergency radio. Within minutes the aircraft lifted off to search for the downed pilot. The pilot in the meantime, kept transmitting on the radio's emergency frequencies to make contact. He was spotted within minutes by the chopper and the crew started rescue operations. A contingent of Goldthwaite persons was on hand to witness the exciting procedures of the rescue, which took place just north of San Saba Peak. **Registering With
Selective Service
Still Required**
Colonel Melvin N. Glantz, State Director of Selective Service for Texas, has reminded young men of their requirement under Federal Law to register with Selective Service.

Some young men may believe that because future military manpower requirements may be met by volunteers that the requirement to register is past; however, the Law does require registration by all native born young men and all resident-allies within 30 days of their 18th birthday. Legal registration may be completed 30 days before, or 30 days after the young man reaches age 18.

If a young man fails to register with Selective Service, he is subject to a fine or imprisonment, or both, under provisions of the Military Selective Service Act.

In most Texas counties, young men may register at the office of their local draft board, or with voluntary registrars located in many high schools and in other similarly convenient locations.

If a young man has allowed more than 30 days to pass following his 18th birthday and has not yet registered, he should register immediately to avoid the penalty of the Law.

Complete registration information is available at each local draft board.

Out-of-Board Registrar for Mills County is Cecil Ira Egger, County Judge's Office, Goldthwaite, Texas or Mrs. Nettie Scott, 105 North Cherokee, San Saba, Texas.

Eighteen year olds are now eligible to vote. Check with the tax assessor-collector's office.

Agricultural Producers Should Not Be Blamed For Current Food Prices

Agricultural producers should be praised — not blamed — in the current national controversy over food prices, DeWayne McCasland of Rt. 1, Indian Gap, President of the Mills County Farm Bureau, said.

"Productivity in agriculture has been increasing about twice as fast as in industry," the local farm leader said. "This amazing efficiency is basic to our high standard of living."

McCasland said that if consumers paid the same proportion of their take-home pay for food today as was the case 20 years ago, the food bill for American consumers would be about \$50 billion more per year than is actually the case.

"The farmers and ranchers are proud of the fact that, partly as a result of their record performance, the American consumer today has to spend only 16 per cent of his after-tax dollars for food — the smallest proportion of income ever achieved here or anywhere in the world," the local Farm Bureau president said.

McCasland said that cattle prices are now about what they were 20 years ago, and that farm prices in general have risen only about seven per cent in that period. He pointed out that money paid to wage earners has increased 340 per cent and that business and professional income is up 200 per cent over that same period.

"The American farmer has been the best hedge against inflation the American consumer has," McCasland said. He pointed out that only by increasing both his investment and his efficiency has the farmer been able to stay in business.

News From Your COUNTY HOME DEMONSTRATION AGENT

Dinnerware Sparks Table Decor

Newer materials for dishes and serving pieces are right in step with dishwasher cleaning processes, being designed and made for out-of-the-kitchen-quick cleanups. However, due to advanced firing and other manufacturing techniques, recent tableware made of materials used for centuries keep pace, retaining all the lovely qualities but often less fragile than in the past. Combined with dishwashing aids, var-cycled dishwashers and proper cleaning agents, sparkling and sanitary dishes are an easy matter provided the dishwasher knows what she is washing.

Just as there is variety in fabrics for clothing and home fashions, so dinnerware differs, not only in pattern and shape, but in basic materials and in range of quality. The smart lady of the house should know what type and quality tableware she is buying or using in order to follow the best and easiest care routines for long and pleasurable service.

Because shopping for tableware is done occasionally, it is important to shop carefully, to determine taste preferences. Collect and compare manufacturers' descriptive leaflets and shop different stores for greater selection. It's a good idea to keep a notebook for details on patterns and shapes of interest.

Usually, less expensive tableware is sold in sets, high price in open stock and middle range either way. Open stock means the purchase of tableware by the piece. This is a good way to acquire high-priced dinnerware. But it is important to keep in touch with the store because there is no guarantee that the pattern chosen will be in production for a long time.

Price is determined by the quality and grades within each type of tableware. However, the shape, handwork required in making, finishing and decorating also play a part. Less expensive ware may have more daring styles while higher priced patterns excel in subtle shapes and detailed decoration.

Know Which Is Which
POTTERY, man's earliest dishmaking material, is today a heavy, opaque, informal, gaily decorative type of tableware. It is easily chipped and broken and the glaze may eventually scratch and craze leaving the porous substance underneath unprotected.

EARTHENWARE, developed in the 18th century, is made with finer clays and fired at a higher temperature than pottery, making it more durable and somewhat less porous. It is also thick and opaque, though stronger & lighter than pottery. Earthenware should not be washed in boiling water or put in the oven to warm. These may cause it to craze. When crazed, chipped or cracked, the porous body will absorb liquids and darken. This type of tableware is available in a wide range of price and quality.

SEMI-VITREOUS WARE, called fine earthenware in England, is fired at high enough temperatures to become partially fused or vitrified and less-absorbent. Made from partially refined clays, it is opaque, thinner than earthenware but thicker than china.

IRONSTONE & STONEWARE are similar and harder than any of the above types of tableware. Very good strength, chip resistance and interesting forms make it a popular choice particularly for family meals. Hard, close-grained clays are used in the manufacture and fired at temperatures high enough to fuse and clay particles to present an opaque, non-porous surface. Developed during the 19th century, early examples enjoy popularity in the antique market as collectors' items.

CHINA or CHINAWARE is porcelain. It is called china after the country of its origin. For a long time its manufacture was a well-kept Oriental secret. The effort to duplicate the Chinese product led to the discovery of "bone china" in England about 1789. Grades in China vary widely depending on thickness, cost of ingredients and quality of workmanship. Toy quality in a "jesser" tableware may be better and more serviceable for

family use.

Though there are differences in casual china, fine china and bone china, all use choice refined clays as a basic ingredient and are fired at such high temperatures that the clay particles melt and fuse to form a hard, non-porous, translucent body. All are thin, highly glazed, delicate in appearance, light and very strong in proportion to size. All have high resonance, giving off a bell-like sound when tapped.

CASUAL CHINA is informal, heavier and very durable. It is

often ovenproof and highly resistant to chipping and staining.

FINE CHINA made from a variety of super-refined clays and powdered minerals, is fired at intense heats for long periods of time at each firing. It is less costly dinnerware. It is strong, thin and very translucent. In making fine china, hard glaze is actually fused to the body making a complete and permanent glaze, usually by hand added after the glaze and fired.

Ponds have a "moss" problem that causes fishermen to lose fish, lures and tempers. Moss problem in many ponds can be controlled by good management reports N. S. Ward, Soil Conservation Service. Good management will result in better fishing. To get good management the fish food cycle must be complete - large fish eat smaller fish, smaller fish eat insects, insects feed tiny plants called plankton. Plankton grows in the upper layers of the pond, it is suspended in the water and causes "moss" condition called "algal bloom". The "bloom" condition if you can not see it, it is there. When the arm is just above the el- plankton bloom" keeps from reaching the bot- the pond where the

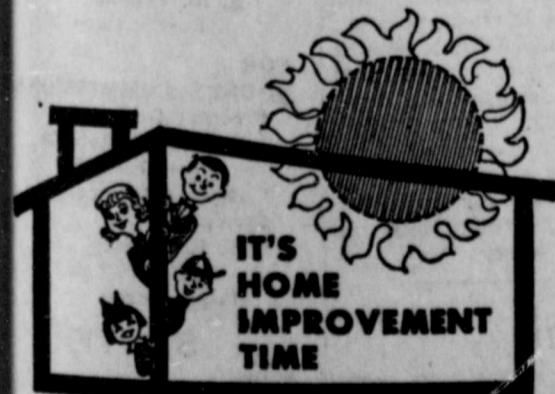

Farm tanks or lakes are very important as a source of water for livestock which is common knowledge. However, many of these tanks serve as another important type of resource — fishing.

Some of our tanks would be excellent fishing if not for the undesirable aquatic plants which grow in them. There are many different types of aquatic plants, most of which require a different type of chemical for control.

There are four groups of undesirable aquatic plants which may be present in our stock tanks. First, algae, which includes the pond scum or chora or muskgrass which resembles flowering plants. Second, submerged plants other than algae which grow mainly beneath the surface. Third, floating plants, which grow and float freely on the surface. Fourth, emergent plants, including all shoreline, marginal and shallow water plants which have several leaves or parts extending above the surface.

For algae, treatment of one pound of Karmex per surface acre of water. For submerged plants other than algae, treatment of one gallon of Aquathol Plus (endothan and silvex) per acre foot of water. For floating plants treatment of one gallon of 2,4-D L.U. ester; 8 oz. of de-

tergent to 50 gallons of water. For emergent plants, treatment of 7½ pounds of dalapon, 8 oz. detergent to 50 gallons of water, OR 2,4-D in the same proportions as mentioned.

Remember: Many chemicals can kill fish. Labels should be followed.

Screwworms are close! A positive case of screwworms has been reported in Hamilton Co. according to Ronnie Davis, Animal Health Inspector.

This is the first case this year reported this close to Mills Co. All conditions look favorable to a possible outbreak of screwworms in the county this year. All livestock producers should keep a watchful eye on all animals especially after castration, docking or dehorning operations.

A sample of all worm cases found should be collected and sent in for identification. Sample vials are available from my office or from Ronnie Davis. It is very important to send in samples in order to identify screwworms and if so, sterile flies will be dropped in that area.

The Mills County 4-H Council will meet Saturday, April 15, at the show barns in Goldthwaite, at 9:00 a.m. All members are urged to attend. Several topics of discussion are necessary for the meeting.
