

"Animals that were vaccinated during last year's massive vaccination program need not be vaccinated this year since immunity from the VEE vaccine appears to last at least 2 years. However, if there is any doubt about whether or not the animal was vaccinated last year, by all means vaccinate again,"

In high risk areas as Texas, quitoes which killed so many under two weeks of age during the mesquito season. Studies are presently under way to determine whether there is any danger to mares or unborn foals if vaccinated during pregnancy.

Also, contrary to some earlier reports, tests in several states does not cause brain or spinal damage in horses.

"If you have animals that require VEE vaccination, contact an accredited veterinarian as soon as possible and have him administer the vaccine," urges Armstrong. This year there is a charge for both the vaccine and the veterinarian's services.

Armstrong reminds horse owners to also vaccinate their animals against western and eastern strains of the sleeping sickness. This should be an annual vaccination. All vaccinations can be given during the veterinarian's single visit.

"Texas is still under federal quarantine for VEE," adds the veterinarian. "Thus horses must have been vaccinated for VEE at least 14 days before being allowed to move across the state line. A vaccination certificate must accompany the animal.

Armstrong suggests that horse owners check their animals regularly for any signs of illness that might be an indication of VEE. At the onset of the disease, the animal loses its apetite, is depressed and has a fever. If any of these signs appear, a veterinarian should be contacted at once so that an accurate diagnosis can be made.

The veterinarian also recommends that horse owners spray their animals, especially those in stables or in confinement, for mosquitoes and other biting in-







There are various degrees of fluctuations from year to year and from decade to decade today just as there were fluctuations in our grandfather's day. Our forefathers had to put up with drouth, insects, hail, fires, prices, etc., just as we do today.

Early travelers that moved through portions of the State of Texas said that the grass was "belly high to a horse" on the hills as well as the valleys.

Why are we not getting as much production from the range-lands today as they did then when we receive as much rainfall? We have more advanced seeds, methods, and labor saving materials than they.

Below are some of the reasons which I feel are important in explaining why the potential of our rangelands are not being realized.

We are not realizing as much soil moisture as we used to, due to a lack of cover (grass) on our rangelands. It takes grass to make grass. Grass makes its food in the leaves, therefore, sufficient leaves and stems are required at all times for the plant to grow.



Soil survey reports published by the Soil Conservation Service provide valuable information for all landowners. When a soil survey for an area is complete, a report is published that includes the soil maps, names and on the maps, and statements about the suitability of the soils for various purposes. Most of the more recent reports have a special section for engineers.

The soil survey provides basic information to the landowner that enables him to make the right decision on how he is going to use each of his fields, and what combination of conservation practices each one of them needs. The result is a conservation farm plan. Some soils are adeptable to several different uses, while others have a rather limited use, not only from an economical view, but for the protection of the soil from erosion. From the broad land use classification of the soils, the landowner can readily see whether a particular piece of land is best suited for cultization, improved pastures, forestery, rangeland, etc. Many individual soils occur in each of the broader land use classes. This more detailed information helps the landowner to decide which particular crops, grasses, and trees to grow, and what combination of mechanical vegetative, and management practices are needed to increase his production and protect his soil from erosion.

Land appraisers have found that soil surveys provide excellent information as an aid in arriving at land values.

Residential developers can use soil survey information to select the most suitable soils for homes, low cost roads and streets, topsoil and septic tank absorption fields.

Engineers use soil surveys in judging sites for buildings, high ways, airports, dams, and conservation structures. Quite frequently, the kind of soil determines the engineering design



To help coordinate the search for better plants, SCS operates the United States. One is located in Texas at Knox City. Scientists at these centers grow and evaluate plants from all over the world to help find strains that will solve specific problems.

The most recent grass selected and put into use by SCS plant materials work in Texas is Selection 75 Kleingrass. Released in 1968, the plant is a leafy, highly palatable grass that is now being grown widely in Central Texas. It is used mostly in tame pastures where high rates of fertilizer are used.

Work unit personnel are constantly on the look-out, when working with landowners and operators in the area, for native climax grass species and wildlife forbs that could collect some seed and send into the plant materials center to be grown and evaluated before releasing to the public. Also, a constant search for plants that exhibit unusual characteristics, such as extra growth, more leaves, or survived a severe drouth, and etc., is in progress by SCS personnel.

#### CONSIDER DRAINAGE IN MAKING GRASSES PAY

Not all grasses and legumes react to moisture in the same manner. Alfalfa, for example, starts better in dry soil, while red top and alsike clovers do better under wet conditions.



SCENES LIKE THIS were pretty common throughout the district during the early part of the year. Due to dry conditions, sprigging of Coastal Bermuda grass stopped about the first of March. At this date (March 23) cooperators of the Brown-Mills Soil and Water Conservation District were waiting for a rain so they could continue their sprigging operations. I've never seen the interest in improved grasses such as coastal Klein and wintergreen Harding as has been expressed this year, states Charles Studer, District Conservationist, SCS, Goldthwaite. If we have a seasonable year, many hundreds of acres will be sprigged or seeded. Due to the price-cost squeeze, many fields and needlegrass pastures are being put in improved grasses. With proper applications of fertilizer, excellent amounts of high quality forage will be produced.



The best time to fertilize is the microscopic algae, or plankton. This period is from early spring well into the fall. A mineral fertilizer is best to use. Organic fertilizers, such as cottonseed meal, blood meal, manure, and hay or leaves encourage pond scum. A satisfactory analysis is 8 pounds of nitrogen, 8 pounds of phosphorus, and 2 pounds of potash per hundred pounds of fertilizer. This is known in the trade as 8-8-2.

The average pond requires from 800 to 1200 pounds of 8-8-2 fertilizer per acre each year. One that requires as little as 200-400 pounds is exceptional. There is no way to predict exactly how much fertilizer will be required. Less is needed in dry years and more when rain dilutes the water.

Anyone can fertilize a pond correctly with a simple gadget that is easily made. Nail a 6inch white disk on the end of a stick. Mark the stick at 12 and 18 inches above the disk. The pond is fertile enough when the disk goes out of sight about

## Let Residue Work For You!

Some of the benefits of keeping litter on top are:

1. Protection from wind wind velocity is cut to nearly zero at the soil surface. This cuts erosion from wind to practically nothing and evaporation is cut considerably.

2. Protection from rain drop splash erosion — due to raindrops falling on the cover instead of directly on the soil. Reduces crusting.

3. Rainfall runoff is slowed down by the cover - increases infiltration and reduces ero-

The surface cover is highly effective in preventing erosion. It breaks up the erosive effect of falling raindrops, letting them fall harmlessly onto the surface. The residues also protect the soil from windstorms.

Ward pointed out that windblown dust is our state's largest source of air pollution. He also stressed that erosion-produced sediment is our biggest water pollutant, muddying streams and filling natural channels and lakes. Reducing water and air pollution from erosion has vast environmental benefits, he

"And thing what scattered seed and residues left on the surface do for wildlife," Ward said. "In some farming areas, wildlife are almost entirely dependent upon crop residues for food and cover needed for survival during the winter months. Pheasant, dove, quail, geese, songbirds, deer, turkey, antelope and other wildlife benefit from such practices.

## The Battle Of The Brush

Mesquite and its side-kicks, no grass, water erosion, gullies, invading brush and no production, annually rob ranchers in the Brown-Mills Soil and Water Conservation District of more money than Jesse James, Sam Bass, Billy the Kid, and Cole Younger ever robbed in their

To put mesquite in jail under control, ranchers had to call upon their old reliable sheriffs and deputies whose names are brush control, range seeding,

One of the major conservation problems in the district is the increase of undesirable brush on our rangelands which cuts down on grass production. The success of the cattle industry may well depend on the control of these undesirable plants.

The mechanical control of mesquite and other brush is going strong presently in Mills

I use the word control rather than eradicate because, if given the opportunity, the brush will take over again.

What about you? Are you controlling your brush? Are you sick of the money you have spent on brush control or has the control paid you dividends? There are records of brush being controlled back in the early '30's.

The control of mesquite really picked up following World War II. Where are these areas that have been so-called controlled? Occasionally we find areas that the brush has been controlled and follow-up control carried out over a period of years until the pastures are all void of brush. These are the only ranges that we could say have been controlled.

Several years ago if someone told you Texas would be free of the screwworm fly, you would have thought he was a nut. Some will still think so even though the fly is on his way out. We don't intend to try to tell you we could get rid of all undesirable brush in Texas, but we feel we could do a better job than is being done now.

An initial application of chemical or mechanical control does not mean you are free of the brush forever. This was recognized with the screwworm fly. Workers knew they would have to continue to fight the fly until they had done away with the last one. The mesquite in one respect is like the fly in that you will have to continue to fight it.

The mesquite goes one step further in that a tree can originate from a bean long after the mother plant has ceased to exist. The offsprings will have to be controlled the same as the mother plant.

Regardless of what initial control you use, the job is just beginning. Are you prepared to rest the pasture following the control? Also, are you prepared to graze only half of your grasses and leave the other half for protection and re-growth.

The practice will produce you more beef because the grass is capable of producing more tons for forage per acre.

If you are NOT prepared to maintain a turf of desirable grasses on your pasture then it would be questionable if brush control would be beneficial to





By means of a soil conservation district farmers and ranchers have authority to exercise -cooperatively-their own initiative and responsibilities in achieving soil conservation benefits. The soil conservation district is governed by a board of five supervisors or ranchers in the district and who are elected by the other landowners.

In accomplishing their purpose, soil conservation districts may cooperate with other soil conservation districts and may cooperate with and obtain aid from federal, state and local

conservation plan.



More than \$100,000 has been obligated to thirteen Mills County farmers and ranchers under the Great Plains Conservation Program (GPCP). The program became effective in Mills County in July 1970.

Participants enter a contract with the Secretary of Agriculture to receive cost-share for carrying out of conservation practices.

The practices are planned with technical help from the Soil Conservation Service provided through the Brown-Mills Soil and Water Conservation District.

Practices are cost-share at the rate of 50% for brush control, farm ponds, fences, pipelines and water facilities, at the rate of 60% for terraces, and at the rate of 80% for pasture plantings, range seedings and grassed waterways.

Contracts vary in length from three to ten years. Practices are scheduled to be done at a rate that will fit the participants' financial ability and in a sequence that will result in good management. Contracts can be modified to correspond with changes in operation or financial ability but failure to comply with the contract constitutes a violation.

Violations, depending upon their severity, can result in all cost-share payments being refunded.

About \$20,000 in cost-share funds has been paid thus far in the program. It is broken down as follows:

# Mulch Tillage - Better, Faster And Reduces Erosion Up To 95 Per Cent

The system does not, of course, eliminate the need for other good farming practices, such as disease or insect control."

> Here's how mulch tillage differs from conventional farming: In one trip across a field, a farmer, simultaneously prepares a seedbed, plants his seed, applies fertilizer, and adds herbicides for weed control while disturbing only a small portion of the soil surface. In conventional methods, 6 to 10 trips are often required to do the same job, and almost all surface soil is disturbed on each trip. And each soil disturbance destroys residue that might have been ltft on the surface for soil protection.

"Since it costs at least \$1.00 s mile to pull a plow, it pays to hold trips across a field to a minimum," Studer points out. With mulch tillage, chemicals are used to control unwanted vegetation instead of cultiva-

But the big factor in Texas is erosion control, Studer emphasized. On sandy or loamy soils in the western half of the state. mulch tillage is especially effective in stopping wind erosion. In fact, it is one of the most critically needed cropland conservation measures in Texas. And it is just as effective in preventing water erosion on all kinds of soil.

USDA researchers report that in one field test, switching to mulch tillage from conventional methods reduced soil losses by a whopping 95 per cent-from 7.8 tons per acre to .03 tons ped

Soil Conservation Service personnel in Texas made a concentrated effort to get mulch tillage trials started across the state during 1969 and 1970. Cooperators with soil and water conservation districts have used the system on several kinds of crops on varying conditions. Results generally have been excellent and the service is expected to spread rapidly.

Studer said special farm equipment now on the market and new techniques for putting fertilizer in the ground have helped make the measure practical. He also credits the perfection of new herbicides which take the place of cultivation in controlling and preventing weeds with speeding up acceptance of
