## Sewer Bond Issue, 1¢ City Sales Tax Elections Will Be Decided Saturday

City of Goldthwaite citizens will go to the polls Saturday to cast ballots on two propositions.

The propositions, to be voted

on separately, are a \$150,000.00 sewer bond issue and the 1% City Sales Tax.

The polling place will be City Hall and the polls will be open from 8 a. m. to 6 p. m.

The sewer bond issue is to finance the City's share of a proposed \$275,000 new sewer and sewer line extensions. 55% of the cost, or about \$155,000, will be federal grant and the balance to be financed through local means.

"We predict that the bonds will cost the city about \$12,000 annually," City Manager W. C. Barnett said. "The 1% sales tax is needed to replace these monies. Goldthwaite should collect this much in the sales tax structure," Barnett added.

"The sales tax is needed to keep any added burden from being placed on property tax payers," Barnett said. "It has been proven, over the state of Texas, to be one of the fairest methods of taxation," he added.

About 95% of Texas cities have implemented the 1% city sales tax since its inception several years ago.

The Goldthwaite City Council recognizes the urgent need for more sewer facilities for Goldthwaite, and voted to hold the sales tax election to offset its (the sewer upgrading) cost of construction.

## Major Elliott Completes Army Staff College

FT. LEAVENWORTH, Kansas (AHTNC) June 16 — Army Major James R. Elliott, son of Mr. and Mrs. John I. Elliott, Goldthwaite, recently completed the regular course at the U. S. Army Command and General Staff College, Ft. Leavenworth, Kansas.

General William B. Rosson, Commander in Chief of the U. S. Army, Pacific, was the graduation speaker for the class of 1,268 U. S. Army, Navy, Marine Corps and Air Force officers and 95 allied officers.

The 10-month course at the Army Senior Tactical School prepares the students for duty as Commanders and as Principal General Staff Officers with the Army in the field from division through Army group, and at field, Army support and theater Army support commands.

The college's primary objective is to prepare selected officers for duty in the field during wartime. Emphasis is on the art of command. The college also prepares students to perform equally well in such varied duties as operational research and formulation of military doctrine.

He entered the Army in December 1960 and was last stationed in Viet Nam. He holds the Distinguished Flying Cross, the Bronze Star Medal, three awards of the Army Commendation Medal, twenty-one awards of the Air Medal, the Purple Heart and the Vietnamese Gallantry Cross.

Major Elliott was graduated in 1955 from Goldthwaite High School and attended the University of Texas.

The Major's wife, Nelda, lived in Leavenworth, Kansas, while he attended college at the Fort.

## Most Goldthwaite Mail Is Now Processed At Brownwood P. O.

The newest innovation of the United States Postal Service — Area Mail processing — was installed at the Brownwood, Texas Post Office, Saturday July 1.

This announcement was made by Carl C. Ulsaker, Regional Postmaster General, Southern Postal Region, which covers the Southern United States from Texas to Florida.

"The program is intended to speed the ultimate delivery of the mail and to gain maximum efficiency and economy through full utilization of Brownwood's modern post office," Ulsaker said.

One electric cancelling machine is available at the Brownwood Post Office to move the increased mail volume from the associate offices.

"The Brownwood Post Office is a Sectional Center Facility, and the new system will revolve entirely around that capacity and that function," he said.

Area Mail processing is a plan whereby virtually all mail originating within a Sectional Center Area, including any or all of the associate offices of the Sectional Center Facility, will be consolidated at the SCF for complete preparation and processing for outgoing dispatch.

All mail deposited in street letter boxes or the out-of-town letter drops at the associate offices will be transferred to the SCF for processing and will bear the postmark designated for the SCF area.

The Brownwood SCF postmark will read, "U. S. Postal Service, TX 768," along with the date and AMIPM designation. The city postmark of Brownwood and each individual associate office will not be changed.

Mail deposited in a designated drop unit at a post office or a letter box labeled "For Local Cancellation Only" will be postmarked at the local office of origin with the name of that office. Each postmaster will have deposit boxes and letter drop

units designated for this purpose. All metered mail will bear the postmark of the office of origin.

Ulsaker emphasized that no office will lose its local postmark.

Ulsaker, along with Norman Duren, Goldthwaite Postmaster, asked specifically that customers no longer use the word "City" as an address in place of the name of the city of destination. "Obviously," they said, "in this new system, a letter with just 'City' could lose its identity."

Post offices affected by this program in the Brownwood area are: Goldthwaite, Ballinger, Eden, Menard, Bangs, San Saba, Brady, Junction, Santa Anna, Coleman, and Mason.

Here Are Some Answers To Some Of The Most Often Asked Questions:

- Q. What items are subject to the 1% municipal sales tax?
- A. The 1% city sales tax is applicable only to those sales now taxed under the State Sales & Use Tax Act.
- Q. There is a 2% State tax on automobiles. Would the city sales tax also apply to automobile sales?
- A. No. The 2% State tax on automobiles is an excise tax; the municipal sales tax would not apply to automobile sales.
- Q. Does the city sales tax apply to sales at wholesale?
- A. No, only to retail sales. Goods sold for resale are not taxable.
- Q. What the “Use Tax” mean?
- A. It means tax on any article leased or rented from a retail establishment is taxed.
- Q. Does a person residing outside of the city limits pay the 1% municipal sales tax?
- A. Yes, when he makes a purchase of personal property subject to the tax in the city which has adopted the local sales tax. In return, he enjoys the city's street facilities, and other advantages of the city for which city residents pay the major share.
- Q. Is the local sales tax regressive — that is, will it cause a particular hardship for lower-income families?
- A. A sales tax has more elements of equity than any other type of tax, and this is particularly true in Texas, since so many essential items are exempt from the sales tax.
- Q. Why would a city dweller, who rents his residence, favor the local sales tax?
- A. For one matter, the person who rents enjoys the same services available to the property owner. For another, if it is necessary for the city to raise property taxes, the increased cost of this tax will be passed along in the form of higher rent charges.
- Q. Are city tax payments deductible from our Federal income tax reports?
- A. Yes.
- Q. Who can vote on the 1% local sales tax?
- A. Any registered voter in the city. A simple majority is required to put the sales tax into effect.

## STATE CAPITAL Highlights AND Sidelights

Wide variance in election costs over the state have been pointed up by Secretary of State Bob Bullock in a recent report.

Bullock said primary expenses ranged from 36 cents per voter (Democrats) in Travis County to \$4.83 (for Republicans) in El Paso County.

Some county chairmen managed a "thrifter, better-organized election," while others spent the maximum amount authorized, said the chief election officer.

"These figures have reaffirmed our belief that single polling places for both parties, with primaries financed through the county clerk's office, would be a positive step toward reducing our primary election costs," said Bullock.

Bullock noted this breakdown for major counties:

Travis, Democratic cost per voter, 36 cents; GOP cost \$2.50.  
Harris, Democratic, 61 cents; GOP cost \$2.44.  
Tarrant, Dem., 61¢; GOP \$1.83.  
Dallas, Dem., 57¢; GOP, \$1.94.  
Bexar, Dem., 59¢; GOP, \$2.65.  
El Paso, Dem., 50¢; GOP, \$4.83.  
Nueces, Dem. 52¢; GOP, \$4.48.  
Higher unit cost for Republicans is not surprising, due to

the small size of the GOP primary, Bullock said.

In some counties, the Secretary of State complained, 400 voting machines were allowed where "half as many" probably would have done the job.

### COURTS SPEAK

A. U. S. Supreme Court decision holding the death penalty unconstitutional left uncertain the fate of 41 Texas prisoners on death row.

A federal court at Brownsville held five Texas laws used in labor disputes are unconstitutional and scored the role of Texas Rangers in a 1966-67 Starr County farm workers' strike.

The State Supreme Court next fall will hear arguments concerning the extent of a health insurance policyholder's rights in suits based on alleged misrepresentation in policy sales.

The High Court ruled Sun Oil Company has rights to use 100,000 gallons of water daily for injection of oil-bearing sands beneath a Hockley County tract to increase production.

Part of the value of medical and legal practices of divorced husbands can be held as com-

munity property for distribution to wives, the Supreme Court held.

The Court of Criminal Appeals ordered new trials for two men who had earlier received death sentences which had been overturned by the U. S. Supreme Court, and upheld Gov. Preston Smith's commutation of sentences for two others under similar circumstances. The Court affirmed a fifth death penalty.

The Third Court of Civil Appeals affirmed a trial court finding that a Travis County couple did not have sufficient mental capacity to understand the effects of deeding their homestead to a niece.

### FILIBUSTER MARK SET

Sen. Mike McKool of Dallas cracked the world's filibuster record during the special legislative session, arguing 42 hours and 33 minutes for more funds to improve mental health-mental retardation services.

McKool's feat, which immobilized both houses of the legislature for nearly two days, may have thrown the session timetable out of kilter.

Indications are there is little hope of winding up work on the \$4.1 billion appropriations bill before Friday. Additional federal funds totalling nearly \$128 million apparently will be assured for welfare.

Senators scheduled a mid-week clash over adoption of new rules which include a controversial provision to authorize consideration of appointments by the governor in open session. Senators traditionally have done this work behind closed doors,

and showed reluctance last week to depart from the old practice.

### HIGHWAY FUND IN JEOPARDY

The entire Texas highway program is in jeopardy, Texas Highway Commissioner member Charles Simons told Texas Press Association at its summer meeting in Corpus Christi.

Simons warned the highway program is threatened by proposed environmental controls, raids on the federal highway trust fund, government reorganization, federal revenue sharing and bureaucratic red

He said the federal government should finish the interstate system as pledged, then release to the states responsibility for collection of the special highway user taxes invoked in 1956 to establish the highway trust fund.

Simons expressed concern over schemes to divert trust fund revenues to build rail mass transit systems in the East and Midwest. He charged a proposal for governmental reorganization is a move to dominate the highway program and to divert highway user tax revenues to wild-eyed welfare and other socialistic schemes.

#### How Do I Make An Appointment?

You may call for an appointment yourself, or have another interested party call for you. The number is 646-1549, twenty-four hours a day, seven days a week.

#### What Happens On The First Visit?

On the first visit, which there is no charge, a plan of treatment will be decided by the staff at the Center. The problem of the client is treated with utmost confidentiality.

#### How Do I Pay For The Services?

Payment of services is on a sliding fee scale, according to income and number of dependents. Monthly statements are mailed to the client.

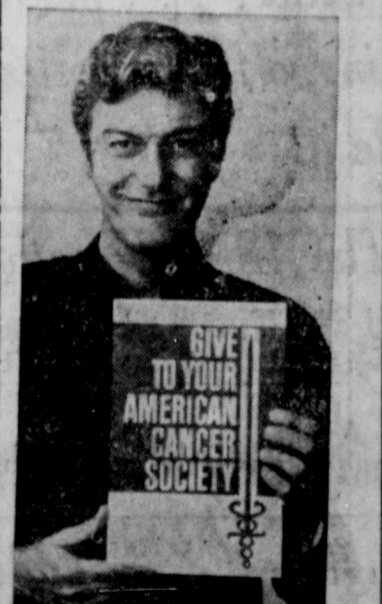

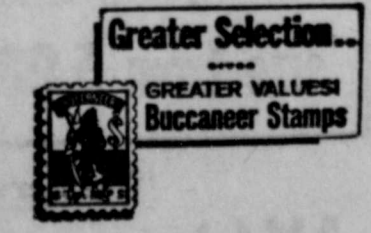

## New, Expanded Medicare Leaflet Available At Social Security Office

Copies of a new expanded edition of the Medicare leaflet, "How to Claim Medical Insurance Benefits", are available from the Social Security Office, Glen McNatt, manager of the Brownwood office, said today.

The new edition includes information on how Medicare determines amounts paid toward charges for doctors' services. The law provides Medicare payment for 80 per cent of the "reasonable charges", over and above an annual deductible of \$50. If a doctor's charge for services for a Medicare beneficiary is higher than his customary charge, or higher than the charge made by most other doctors in the locality for similar service, the Medicare payment is not based on the full amount of the bill but on an amount determined to be "reasonable charge."

The leaflet explains further that although a doctor's charge may at times be more than Medicare's determination, this does not mean necessarily that his charge for the particular service is not "reasonable". It could mean, for example, that the doctor recently increased his charges and that the new rates have not been in effect long enough for Medicare records to show the new higher charge is being made for all his patients including non-Medicare patients. Medicare, like many other health insurance programs, does not recognize a higher charge until it has been in effect long enough to be considered "customary." Also, since wage and price controls went into effect last fall, it has been necessary for Medicare to be governed by limits set by the

Price Commission regarding doctor's charges.

There are two methods for claiming Medicare payments.

Under the assignment method, the doctor agrees to send in the bill and have the payment sent directly to him. He agrees to accept the reasonable charge as his full charge and to bill the patient for no more than 20 percent over the Medicare reimbursement.

The second method is when a doctor does not accept assignment but prefers to let the patient collect the Medicare payment. The doctor is then under no obligation to reduce his total charge to the amount determined by Medicare to be the reasonable charge. Medicare will pay the patient 80 percent of the reasonable charge minus any part of the \$50 deductible not yet met. The patient is then responsible for paying the full amount of the doctor's charge as billed regardless of whether it may be higher than the "reasonable charge."

Single copies of the leaflet can be obtained without cost from the Brownwood Social Security Office.

## News From Your COUNTY HOME DEMONSTRATION AGENT

Tuesday, July 11, the annual 4-County Home Demonstration meeting will be held at the Mills County Youth Center. Homemakers attending will be from Comanche, Brown, Eastland, and Mills Counties.

Registration will begin at 9:30 and there will be activities all during the day until 3:30 p.m. The speaker for the morning will be Miss Leona Allman. Her topic will be, "Are We Faced With a Medicine Show Revival." All counties will give a craft demonstration during the day and there will be an exhibit of handicrafts.

Any homemaker in Mills County who is interested in attending may do so. Please bring a sack lunch for the noon meal.

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House plants not only add interest and color to our living area, but they can also contribute to our continued well being by aiding in the battle to clean up the air we breathe. Admittedly, a few house plants cannot do a great deal in this regard but the sum total of the effect of all plants has a great deal to do with man's continued existence on this planet.

If you hesitate to grow plants indoors because you cannot locate a source of good soil, you are afraid the container will leak or overflow on to furniture or carpet, or you feel you do not have the time to spare for growing potted plants, maybe you should consider bottle gardening. All you need is an empty bottle, some cut branches of your favorite shrub, tree or herbaceous plant and tap water. Actually any waterproof container will suffice for a bottle garden—beverage bottles, vases, antique canning jars, old fish bowls, aquariums or anything else your imagination can come up with.

Wash the containers with a detergent and hot water as they must be clean. After rinsing and draining fill with ordinary tap water.

Select branches from plants such as myrtle, geraniums, oleander, wax begonia, coleus, or hibiscus for cutting. In fact almost any plant having a fairly sturdy stem will do provided you find it attractive to you. When cutting the stem make sure to use a good sharp shears so it will make a cut without bruising or crushing the stems. Remove the lower leaves so no leaves are below the water line when you place the stem in the container. Arrange the branches to create a natural appearance. No need to spend too much time in arranging as the leaves will usually turn to the light and fit together to create a pleasing composition.

These bottle arrangements can be used in almost any area of the house and will last for long periods. When no longer attractive, they can be easily

replaced with fresh branches making sure first to thoroughly clean out the container. Add fresh tap water at frequent intervals to replace that lost by evaporation or used by the plant. Turn the arrangements at least weekly to keep them developing from all sides.

About once a month, empty the bottles and wash them with hot water and detergent to kill algae and bacteria that may accumulate. Scrub the stems with a soft brush to remove any algae and make a fresh cut to facilitate the uptake of water.

Frequently these branches will develop roots while in the water. These can be planted in soil, giving you new plants if you need them. By replacing branches that may have deteriorated you can always maintain an attractive arrangement in your favorite container.
