## Census Shows Average Family Income \$5,457 In Mills County

Average family income was \$5,457 in Mills County, Texas in 1970, compared with \$8,490 for the State, according to a report on the 1970 census by the Bureau of the Census, U. S. Department of Commerce. Per

capita income for the county amounted to \$2,178, the report shows. The 1970 census counted 4,212 residents in the county; 0.5 percent were foreign born and 2.9 percent native born with one or

both parents of foreign birth. Among the county's 3,988 inhabitants age 5 and over in 1970, 602 were living in a different county within the State in 1965, and 41 percent in a different State.

In the population age 16 and over, 64.1 percent of the men and 28.1 percent of the women were in the labor force. Among the employed, 26.3 percent were holding white collar jobs, and 7.0 percent were government workers.

About 30.2 percent of the married women with husband present were in the labor force, and 20.6 percent of these wives had children under six.

There were 764 persons 3 to 34 years old enrolled in school. In the 25-and-older population, 33.7 percent of the men and 40.2 percent of the women were high school graduates.

During the week the more than 2300 teachers who are expected to attend the conference will participate in group work sessions in different fields of Homemaking.

## Employed Taxpayers May Get Bigger Tax Break On Child Care Expense

(Dallas, Texas) — Employed taxpayers with child care expenses may get a bigger tax break in 1972, according to W. T. Coppinger, District Director of Internal Revenue for northern Texas.

The Revenue Act of 1971 has greatly liberalized the deduction for the care of children, disabled dependents and disabled spouses. Beginning in 1972, taxpayers with adjusted gross incomes of \$18,000 or less may be able to deduct up to \$400 per month for household and dependent care expenses. The deduction is reduced 50 cents for each dollar of income over \$18,000. For example, a taxpayer with an adjusted gross income of \$20,000 would be limited to \$3,800 (the maximum annual deduction of \$4,800 less one-half of \$2,000).

To qualify, a taxpayer must be employed and provide over one-half the cost of maintaining a household for a dependent child under 15, a disabled dependent of any age, or a disabled spouse.

For the first time house hold expenses incurred to permit the taxpayer to be gainfully employed may also be deducted. For example, amounts paid for the services of a maid, cook or other domestic help can qualify.

Expenses incurred outside the home for the care of a child under 15 (as, for example, in a day care center) may also qualify. However, expenses outside the home are limited to \$200 per month for one child, \$300 for two children or \$400 for three or more children. However, these expenses shall not include educational expenses incurred for a child in the first or higher grade.

If a deduction is claimed for the care of a disabled dependent, the deduction must be reduced by the amount by which the total of the dependent's adjusted gross income and any non-taxable disability payments he receives exceeds \$750. ## State Senator Chet Brooks To Serve As Governor Of Texas August 12

State Senator Chet Brooks of Pasadena, formerly of Mills County, son of Mrs. Julia Bidle of Goldthwaite, will serve as the next Governor of Texas on Saturday, August 12, while Governor Preston Smith and Lt. Gov. Ben Barnes are out of the state.

Senator Brooks, an advertising executive and former newspaperman, was elected President Pro Tempore of the Texas Senate during the recently-completed Third Called Special Session of the 62nd Legislature. The President Pro Tempore is third in line of succession to the governorship. He presides

over the Senate in the absence of the Lieutenant Governor and serves as Governor when both the Governor and Lieutenant Governor are absent from the State or unable to perform their duties of office.

Traditionally a day is set aside when the Governor and Lieutenant Governor leave the state, and the President Pro Tempore become the Acting Governor in a special program marking the occasion.

Constituents and friends from across the state will gather in Austin on August 12 to honor Senator Brooks.

The senator has served the 7th Senatorial District in the Senate since his election in 1966, and he was a member of the Texas House of Representatives from 1962-66.

He is the Democratic nominee for re-election to the Senate from the newly revised 11th Senatorial District in Harris County, and has no opposition in the November general election.

The themes being stressed in Senator Brooks' Governor for a Day activities include education, human relations, the Texas labor movement, and the needs and accomplishments of elderly Texans—all top priorities in his service in the Legislature.

Screwworms in Mills County has reached such proportions that the Mission Screwworm Control Division has put the county under what is called the "grid area". In other words, sterile flies will be dropped several times a week throughout the entire county for an undetermined period.

The collection of all worm samples by producers and sending them in to the Mission Laboratory is very important. Mills County needs your help! Vials for worm samples are available from my office or from Ronnie Davis, Animal Health Inspector.

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**1970 Census Shows 1,241 Homes  
In Mills County Have Television**

The 1970 Census of Housing counted 1,982 housing units in Mills County, and 1,241 households had at least one television set (347 UHF-equipped), the Bureau of the Census, U. S. Department of Commerce, announced today. The figures are from the first report for Texas which presents detailed statistics on housing for each county.

The report shows that in the county:

There were 1,167 housing units with air conditioning (905 with room units and 262 with a central system), 1,000 units with a clothes washing machine, 166 with a clothes dryer, and 35 with a dishwasher.

The 1970 population was 4,212, with an average of 2.5 persons per housing unit.

A total of 1,293 housing units were built before 1949, 405 during the 1950's, 122 during 1960-64, and 152 within the five years preceding the April 1970 census. Utility gas was used to cook the meals in 406 households, electricity in another 203, and bottled, tank, or LP gas in yet another 696.

There were 1,792 housing units with complete kitchen facilities and 1,766 with complete bathrooms, both for the exclusive use of the households. The number of bedrooms in all housing units ranged from none (in 11 units) and one (in 203 units) to four or more (in 50 units).

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## Baird Participant In National Citizenship Tour

Cheryl Baird of Route 1, Mulberry, returned July 19 from Washington, D. C., where she participated in a National Heritage and Citizenship Short Course at the National 4-H Center.

Cheryl Baird participated in the National Citizenship Short Course at the National 4-H Center in Washington, D. C. She was one of fifty-three participants from Texas attending the week-long tour. They are among the more than 6,000 4-H members throughout the United States selected to take part in the leadership training course.

The course also included field trips to historic sites in Washington, D. C. The ones that meant the most to Cheryl were Arlington National Cemetery, Washington Monument, a boat ride down the Potomac River to Mount Vernon, the Smithsonian Institution, the Lincoln Memorial, and Iwo Jima Monument.

According to Cheryl the most interesting part of the course was working with 4-H members from other states and getting new ideas about projects that reflect concern and interest in their fellow men. Each 4-H'er attending the Citizenship Short Course is expected to either start or build up the Citizenship Project in their county and district. Cheryl plans to write newspaper articles on citizenship, talk to groups on citizenship and show color prints and slides she took while in Washington.

4-H members stayed at the newly expanded National 4-H Center which they, together with business and industrial leaders throughout the nation, helped to build. The 4-H Center was opened in 1959 by President Eisenhower. In 1970, Tricia Nixon broke ground for the new dorms. A new educational building is being planned which will be dedicated to the late J. C. Penny, chief donor for the center expansion.

Mr. Lanny Bullard, Texas 4-H Youth Specialist, accompanied the group from College Station. The young people traveled by chartered bus and also visited several sites en route to and from Washington. The group found time to pause at the Mississippi River before reaching Memphis, Tennessee. At Memphis, they stopped by Elvis Presley's home. There was ample time in Nashville for the group to do several things. Among these were visiting the Country Music Hall of Fame and Museum, L & C Observation Deck, the Hermitage and Grand

Ole Opry. The group toured the American Museum of Atomic Energy at Oakridge, Tennessee. At Shenandoah Valley, Virginia, the 4-H members visited the World's Largest Natural Bridge. From there, the group continued on their pilgrimage tour to Washington, D. C. through the scenic Blue Ridge Mountains. At Charlottesville, Virginia, the youth toured Monticello and roamed over its beautiful grounds.

On the return trip, the group toured the Southern States. First stop was Colonial Williamsburg, Virginia, the scene of Patrick Henry's Stamp Act Speech. The 4-H'ers spent an afternoon exploring the historic sights of this restored town.

The next historic sight was Jamestown, Virginia, the first permanent English settlement, on the James River. The group crossed Chesapeake Bay on a ferry and continued their tour. Two more historic sights the 4-H'ers enjoyed were Stone Mountain at Atlanta, Georgia, site of the world's largest carving and Vicksburg Military Park and Museum in Mississippi.

The revival our generation needs is a genuine revival of Bible reading. To read the Bible is to enter a world that is strange to the modern mind. Some one has said that it is the best seller but the least read. The Bible is a complex book spanning many centuries and having many authors. Some of the writings date back to the 13th century and parts of the New Testament as late as 150 A.D. The Old Testament is the record of God's mighty acts in the history of Israel and the New Testament is the record of a great religious movement in which the central figure is Christ. No book has so widely influenced mankind.

A search for meaning and purpose in life engages this generation. This is not new. The history of mankind shows that man has always been engaged in this as does the history of Christianity. The Bible is the one book that throws light on all man's questions... Who am I? What is life all about? What lies beyond? These are all dealt with in the sacred scriptures. It is an incomplete drama as evidenced by the Wailing Wall. They still pray for the expected Messiah. In the New Testament Israel's pilgrimage leads to Jesus Christ who came not to destroy but to fulfill.

The Book of sacred writings is a library in which we read: history, poetry, supreme law, love stories, the greatest short stories, the greatest drama (Job) but most of all the story of God's love. Whatever legends may have attached themselves to the Bible is must be remembered that Jesus Christ is an historical person in whom God revealed Himself. This book has survived ignorance, superstitions, persecutions and wars. It will stand all the light we can train upon it. The question often comes to us: "Can it survive

not being read?" The printing press and the Protestant Reformation made it every man's book. It has endured and will stand throughout the ages because of: the majesty of its doctrines, simplicity of its teachings, its antiquity, prophecy and miracles, the failures of its enemies to destroy it, its martyrs and the character of its witnesses.

The amazing story in the New Testament of the Incarnation in Nazareth, the stable in Bethlehem, the helpless and adorable child, the intellectually curious boy of 12 closely followed by a young man dedicated to do God's work, his temptation, teachings, rejection and sacrifice and his resurrection... all this and much more is past our understanding. Read it and read it again and keep on reading it. In this BOOK God has manifested Himself in His Son.

"Heaven and earth shall pass away but my words shall not pass away" was the way Jesus put it. ## Emphasize Outdoor Education

By CHARLES STUDER  
District Conservationist

Learning was first realized in the out-of-doors by our pioneers as they wrested with the needs of providing food and shelter from the land. Most of what people learn that is really important, is learned outside the classroom. Yet strange as it seems, outdoor education is realized very little in our present school systems and where it is done, it is looked upon as an innovation - as something that's just been discovered.

It is indoor education that is new. Historically, emphasis on learning from books, in laboratories, and through other indoor experience is relatively recent.

The classroom has been good as students are able to share the experiences of people recorded in history. But the law of payment (by doing all our instruction in classrooms) is not subject to change. For every gain there is a loss. The loss in doing all work in classrooms can be measured by the loss of vitality in the instructional program - a loss due in part to less personal experiences with the vital forces of nature and of community life.

Outdoor education strengthens and supplements indoor education by making hills and valleys, creeks and springs, forests and grasslands, institutions and organizations a great library from which vital information and experience can be gathered.

In outdoor education there is learning by doing, learning that goes a bit beyond the gathering and collection of facts. You learn what guides our social, spiritual and moral values.

Actual seeing and doing thru first hand experiences are the processes which stay with a student.

It is not enough to say, "Children here is the information - learn these things." The good teacher skillfully leads her pupils along pathways where they learn what she would have them know. I believe some of this learning can best be done outdoors where the subject matter really is.

Outdoor education does not pertain to the science curriculum or to conservation alone, nor is it just nature study. Outdoor education is far more inclusive and has its place in such fields as English, social studies, mathematics, science, art, music, health, physical education and recreation, home economics and industrial arts.

Outdoor education is simply a learning climate. It offers opportunity for experiences in meeting real life problems, for acquiring skills with which to enjoy creative living and for attaining an insight into how humans and nature can work together for the good of all.

Common sense indicates that learning through firsthand experience takes place more rapidly, is retained longer and leads to greater understanding.

What you learn is most likely to be available for use if it is learned in a situation much like that in which it is to be used and immediately preceding the time when it is needed.

The wonder, excitement and thrill a youngster has over a discovery of his own, and the value he attaches to his findings leave lasting impressions and awaken desire to probe further into something else.

I urge you to encourage your local school board and superintendent to start outdoor classrooms.

care expenses. As with expenses must be reduced by non-taxable disability payments.

As under the old law, a deduction may not be taken for payments to anyone who could be your dependent.

Taxpayers must itemize deductions in order to claim child care expenses. As with itemized deductions, good must be kept and expensed.
