Bovina Elects Two To City, Two To City, Two To City, ISD Boards

Two members each were elected to the City of Bovina and Bovina ISD in the annual spring elections last Saturday, May 4.

Jessie Stone, an incumbent, was returned to the city council with 72 votes, and Stan Miller was elected with 69 votes. Incumbent Kenneth Waters ran third with 31 votes.

Mike McCallum was unopposed to fill a one-year term vacated by Linda Marshall, and Galen Hromas was unopposed for the mayor's seat.

City voters also approved the sales tax referendums. The one-half cent economic development tax was approved, 67-45. The one-fourth cent property tax reduction was approved, 93-21, and the one-fourth cent street maintenance tax was okayed, 79-32.

In the school election, incumbent Susan Kerby was re-elected with 163 votes, and Izzy Carrasco was elected with 97 votes. Other totals were Josefina Alonzo-Coffey with 87 and Vince Terrones with 57 votes.

Groundbreaking Held For \$5 Million Grain Facility

A groundbreaking was held Tuesday for the construction of a \$5 million shuttle train receiving facility adjacent to West Friona Grain southwest of Friona.

Grading work has already begun. The two elevators planned for the site will be 140 feet tall and 42 feet in diameter. Tracks will be built to accommodate 110-car shuttle trains. Officials said when the operation is complete, 150 trucks per day will haul grain from the plant.

The project is a feed grain partnership between Commodity Specialists Company (CSC) and the Harvest States division of CHS Cooperatives, both headquartered in Minnesota.

CSC, which owns West Friona Grain, is an international agri-products trading and marketing business and has been a leader in domestic feed ingredients for more than 50 years. The company specializes in soybean, cottonseed, feedgrain, wheat and brewer's products.

Harvest States represents the grain and foods business of CHS Cooperatives, a producer-to-consumer cooperative system owned by farmers, ranchers and their local co-ops from the Great Lakes to the Pacific Northwest and from the Canadian border to Texas. This fully integrated agricultural foods cooperative provides a wide variety of products and services ranging from grain marketing to food processing.

The Friona facility, situated on a 131-acre site, is designed to primarily handle yellow corn, but its six bins and two interstices will be hoppers to accommodate other

commodities if needed. The building project should be completed by year-end 2002.

With a storage capacity of 880,000 bushels--about two shuttle trains worth of grain--annual volume is estimated at 25 million bushels. The Burlington Northern Santa Fe railroad will service the facility.

Rick Browne, Grain Suppliers Board Chairman and Harvest States Grain Group Senior Vice President said, "In today's increasingly competitive agricultural climate it is critical to move grain from the producer to the consumer in the most efficient way possible. Facilities like this

one are just one way to integrate the farm-to-table system for maximum benefit to both buyers and sellers."

Todd & Sargent, headquartered in Ames, Iowa, will serve as design/build general contractor for the project. They have served as general contractor for Harvest States flour mills in Pennsylvania and Wisconsin and currently are constructing a soybean crushing facility in Minnesota.

Subcontractors and additional suppliers for the Friona project are now under review. A West Friona Grain official said the new operation will employ about six people.

Postal authorities instructed all post offices in the area not to deliver mail to mailboxes that had the doors closed. Bovina postmaster Lenore Falcon said they had expected the rule to last for 3-5 days but it was canceled after the suspect was apprehended in Nevada.

Bovina carriers delivered all mail during the period but advised customers they would not be picking up packages on the routes. Falcon said during the "door open" period, only 7 customers actually left them open.

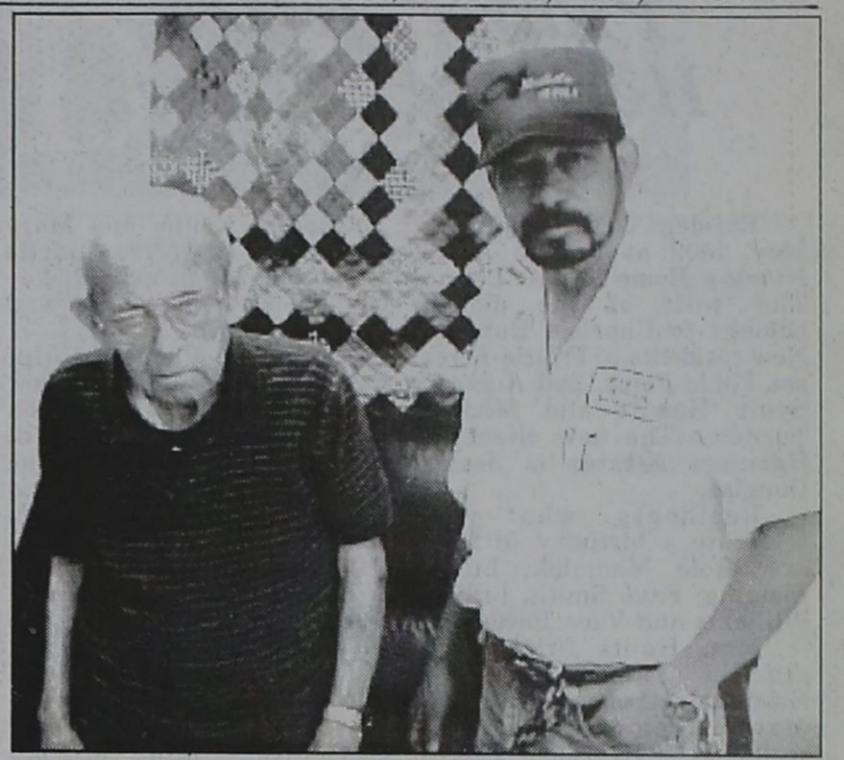

Ruth Drager Writes Story For Publication

Every month a resident of Prairie Acres Nursing Home submits a story about his/her life's history to be submitted in the home's newsletter, "The Prairie Times," and for printing in this issue. This month we feature Ruth Durrenberger Drager.

I was born Ruth Irene Durrenberger on August 31, 1916 at Serbin, Texas in Lee County. My parents were Edwin Durrenberger, Sr. and Clara Rothman.

I am the second oldest of eight children with four sisters and three brothers. At a young age, I moved from Serbin to Warda, Texas. I helped my father farm. We raised peanuts, cotton and sugar cane for making molasses. Sometimes, I would go with my dad when he sold Watkins products. I went to Holy Cross Lutheran Church and Parochial School at Warda, Texas.

At age sixteen, I went to work as a maid. I worked with my older sister, Josephine, at Port Arthur, Beaumont and Houston, Texas. About 1940, I moved with a family I was working for, to Hollywood, California.

I got to tour Warner Brothers Studios. I got to see how they made movies. One of the stars I got to see was James Arness. I also got to visit my Uncle Sam who lived there, and my brother, Edwin, Jr., who was in the Navy at the time.

In the mid 1940s I moved to Austin, Texas where I worked as a telephone switchboard operator at the University of Texas.

I met Christian Drager while he was visiting in Austin for a wedding. We were married on June 8, 1947 at Holy Cross Lutheran Church in Warda, Texas. We

moved to Rhea, Texas where Chris farmed. Besides raising wheat, grain sorghum and cane, we also had many beef cattle, milk cows, hogs and chickens.

We have two children, Raymond, who lives north of Dallas, and Curtis, who farms the homestead at Rhea.

I was a member of Immanuel Lutheran Church of Rhea where I taught Sunday School. I also was a member of the Lutheran Women's Missionary League, The Rhea Home Demonstration Club, Friona Senior Citizens and Rhea Braille workers, where we made books of the Bible for the blind. I am currently a member of St. John Lutheran Church of Lariat, Texas.

Some of my hobbies were fishing, camping, traveling, quilting, gardening, canning and visiting with others.

I lost most of my vision because of diabetes and cataracts. I was able to stay at my house with help from my family until I fell and broke my hip. I came to live at Prairie Acres in May of 2000.

A record group of 648 delegates was in attendance with the 935 registered retirees. Business included the revision of some of the by-laws and the election of new officers for the 2002-2003 year.

The Executive Director Mike Lehr reviewed the legislation concerning retired teachers and school personnel and active teachers and school personnel that had been enacted in the last three Texas Legislative sessions. The result has been an increase in disbursement of retirement funds that has equalized the annuities for all retired teachers and school

employees regardless of how long ago the retirement had occurred.

Charles Dunlap, the Executive Director of the Teacher Retirement System of Texas, gave a report on the status of the retirement funds. Currently the fund is about the 8th in size of its kind in the nation. It was learned that the system has become a model that other states are wanting to imitate for their retirement systems.

Teacher retirees have always been encouraged to volunteer in their communities in various ways, and this past year its 55,000 members have reported over 60 million volunteer hours.

The District XVI Texas Retired Teachers met for their annual Spring Conference in Amarillo at the Service Center on May 1. Representative David Swinford and TRTA Treasurer Bob Enos spoke

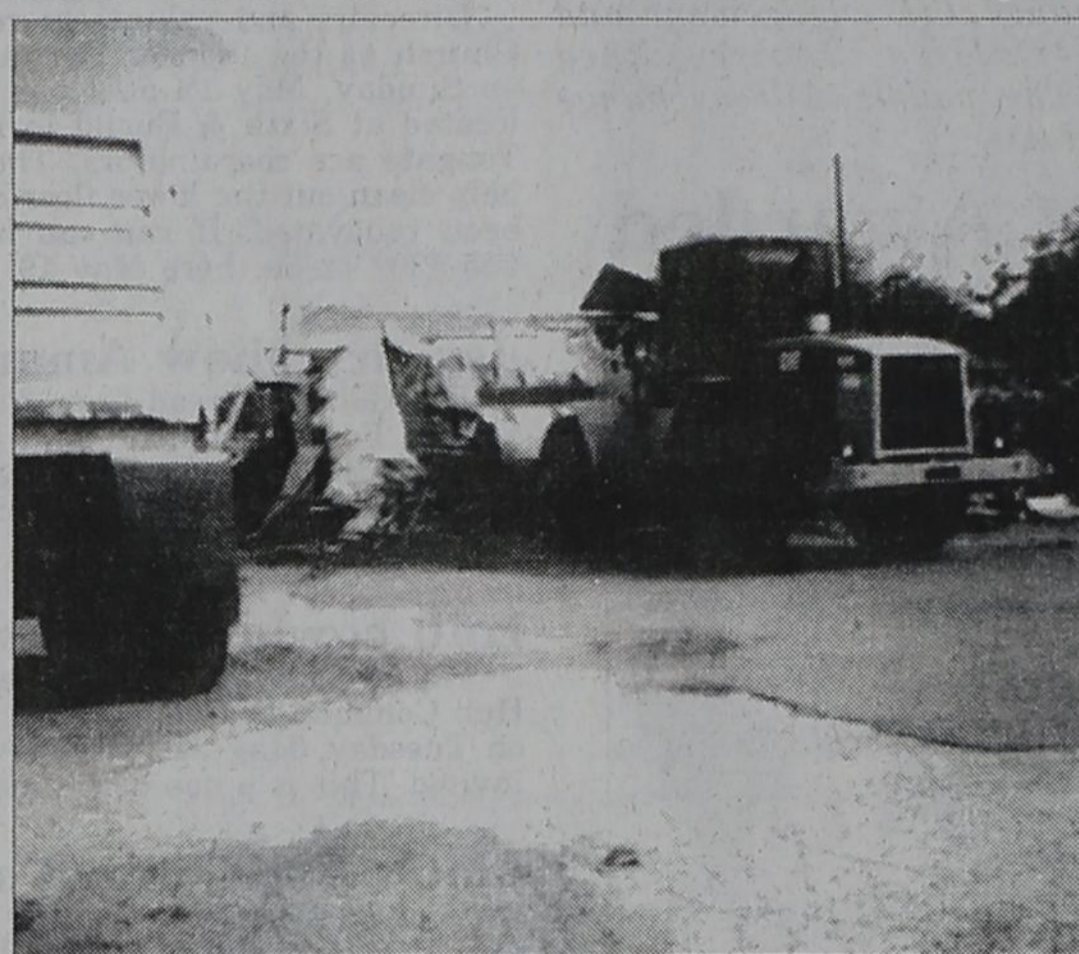
Parmer County residents may remember French and Nellie Crook built the store and filling station in the late 1940's and lived next door in the home that is still there today.

Combest Applauds Farm Bill's Passage

Representative Larry Combest saluted the U.S. Senate for passing the Farm Bill on Wednesday. At our press time this week the bill was awaiting the president's signature to become law.

"I applaud the Senate for following the House's lead by giving its strong, bi-partisan support to the Farm Bill today," Combest said. The Senate voted 64-35 on Wednesday to pass the bill. The House had passed the bill on May 2, 280-141.

"This bill will bring much-needed assistance to our farmers who are enduring one of the most severe agricultural depressions in our nation's history. I know that those in West Texas are

anxious for it to become law. I urge the President to sign the Farm Bill soon to allow for its expedient implementation."

The bill was drafted by a House and Senate conference committee, of which Combest was chairman, that reconciled the two bodies of Congress' versions.

The bill sets farm policy for the next six years, and allocates over the next decade the amount President Bush endorses, which is \$73.5 billion more than current levels.

The new farm bill provides a safety net when commodity prices are low, which the old bill did not contain.

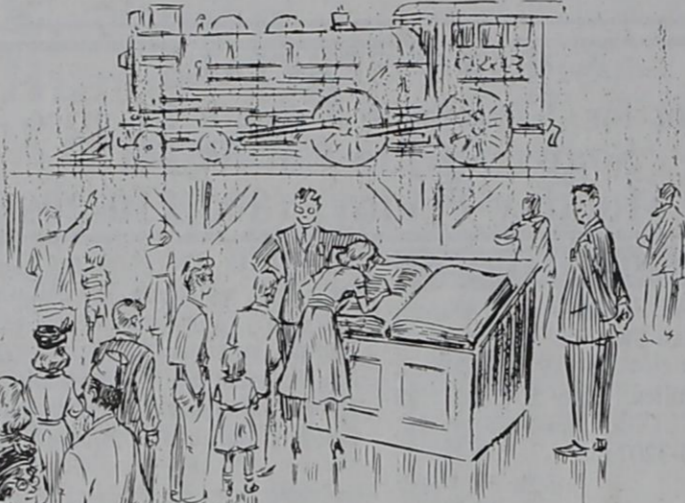
