## Student Apprehended After Attempted Rape

A five county man hunt resulted Tuesday night in the capture of John Scott Wesley, 19, of Breckenridge, following an alleged attempted rape of a Goldthwaite housewife Monday morning.

He now resides in the Brown County jail in Brownwood and has been charged by justice of the peace Ernest Thorne in Mills County with attempted rape.

He was picked up at his home town of Breckenridge, after a car answering the description wanted by the law, was spotted there. He lives in Breckenridge with his parents and attends Cisco Junior College.

He approached the house near Goldthwaite brandishing a revolver and forced entry into the house. The housewife managed

to escape through a bathroom window and returned after Wesley had gone and called the local sheriff officers. The arrest was made by Mills County Sheriff Horace Brooks; Deputy Randal Ratliff; Texas Ranger Bob Favor; and Danny Neal, Brown

County Sheriff, on a street at 11 p.m. Tuesday night in Breckenridge.

Approximately 100 law men, two airplanes (one airplane piloted by Floyd Spradley of here) and numerous civilians searched for the man.

## Eagles 'Float' To 14-0 Win Over Hamilton

Overcoming almost every kind of adversity in the books, Coach Leslie Johnson's screaming, scratching Goldthwaite Eagles staved off one threat after another by the Bulldogs in Hamilton Friday night, then came back to completely dominate the game in the second half and take a glorious 14 to 0 victory over their class AA opponents.

The game was played in light rain that turned into a hard downpour through most of the third and fourth quarters when the Eagles proved that a bird can adapt to water much better than a canine can. The evidence was a late third quarter safety that put the Eagles in front and two clever fourth quarter TD's that removed any doubt about the matter. After the floods, the avalanche.

When fullback Robin Reid zipped 56 yards into the Bulldog end zone on a fake punt with seven minutes left to go, the rains suddenly stopped. If it had been daytime, the sun would have shown on Eagle land.

Seldom, if ever, has the Goldthwaite defense sparkled more brightly. They had their backs to the wall from the outset as the result of four fumbles to the Bulldogs in the first five Eagle possessions. They clawed through the slime to stop Hamilton drives at the Goldthwaite

ent story as the Goldthwaite defensive stalwarts took charge of the game. In the final two periods they held Hamilton to a total of 25 yards, no first downs, and intercepted two Bulldog desperation aeriels while capitalizing on four Hamilton fumbles. The final turnover count in the sloppy going was 8 to 4 in favor of Goldthwaite.

This opportunism by the eager Eagles, plus a defense that wouldn't give in the clutches, plus a great kicking game by

Reid were the major factors in the outcome of the game.

Reid's great punt in the second quarter—already noted—got Goldthwaite out of trouble for the first time in the game. An even greater punt in the third canto, a 41-yarder that rolled dead on Hamilton's one, led directly to the first break-through on the scoreboard.

After being held to only five yards on three blasts at the line by fullback Clark Bottlinger, the Bulldogs lined up to punt out of danger. The high snapback sailed through Jessie Kirkland's hands and out of the end zone for an automatic safety that put the Eagles out in front, 2 to 0.

This was late in the third quarter. Before the period ended, the fired-up Eagles drove to Hamilton's 22 before losing the ball on downs. On their next possession, early in the fourth, they slammed back to Hamilton's 16 where the Bulldogs stiffened. On a fourth and one situation with the Bulldogs in a goaline defense, sophomore quarterback Terry McLean of the famous Goldthwaite football family, calmly flipped a short pass over the bunched defenders to end Dale Page, another sophomore. All Page had to do was trot into the end zone.

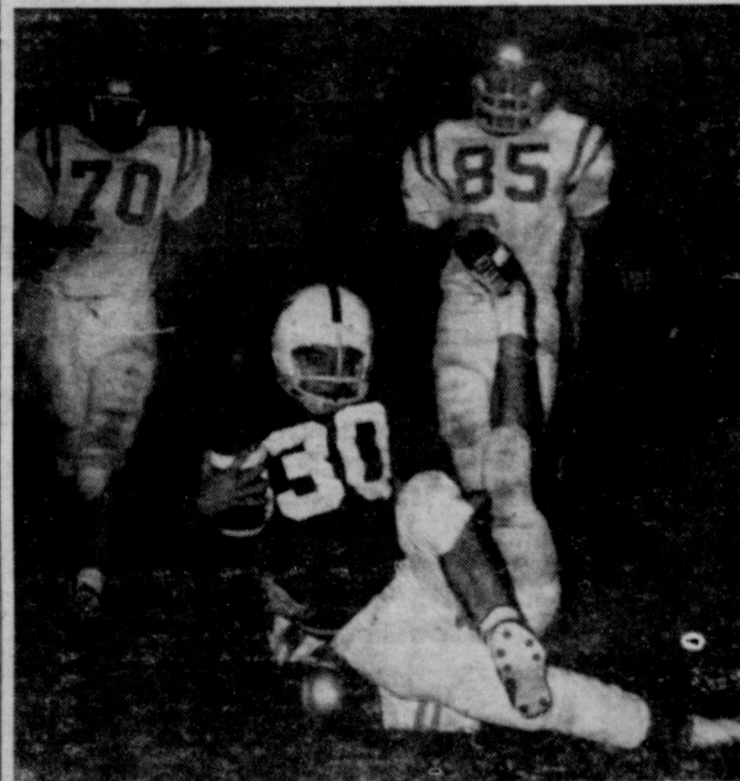
Up from the B team, McLean was playing his first varsity game. He went all the way at quarterback. The touchdown pass to Page in the driving rain was only his second toss in varsity competition.

Goldthwaite outsmarted the home team again the next time the Eagles had the ball. On third down, Reid got off a long punt that was nullified by off-setting penalties. This set the stage for Reid who kicked with the shoe off throughout the night. Keeping the shoe off his kicking foot again after the penalty, he lined up in deep punt formation. Only this time he wasn't kicking. He kept the ball and hobble-footed around the left side of Hamilton's line 56 yards to glory land.

The deception was so complete that two Hamilton defenders actually escorted him most of the way to the double stripe, never realizing that he had the pigskin under his rain drenched arm.

With the score 14 to 0, it mattered little that Bill Fisher missed his second extra-point kick of the quarter. Fisher and Reid also missed field goal at-

Hidalgo County in the Lower Rio Grande Valley had the highest returns of all Texas Counties — \$117.3 million. Deaf Smith County in the Panhandle

west of Amarillo was the other to top the \$100 million mark. Its receipts were \$100 million. Farmer, Castro, Swisher, Cameron, Lamb, Hansford and Lamb counties were in the top 10. Live stock accounted for almost two-thirds of the total cash receipts.

Major agriculture production area is the irrigated High Plains with \$668.1 million in receipts. The Blacklands rank second with cash receipts (\$347.8 million).

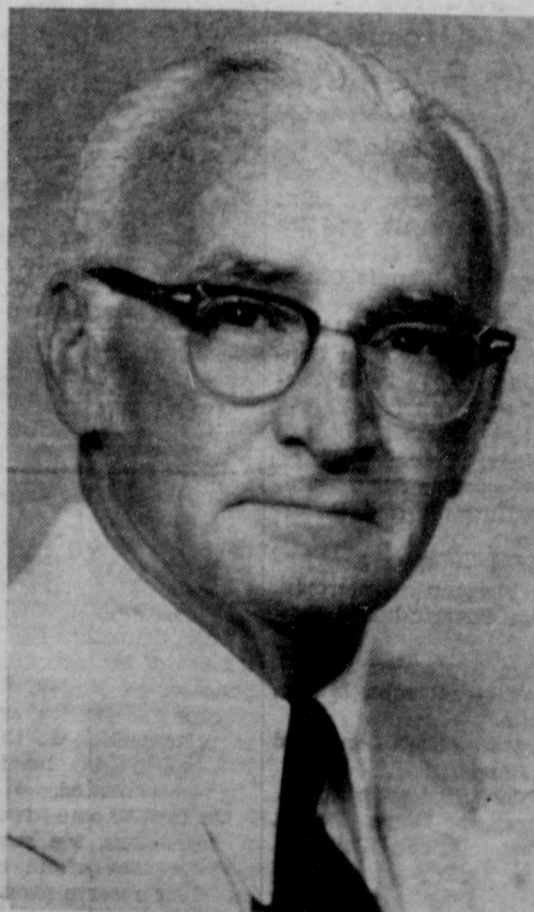

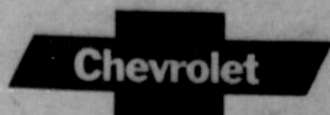

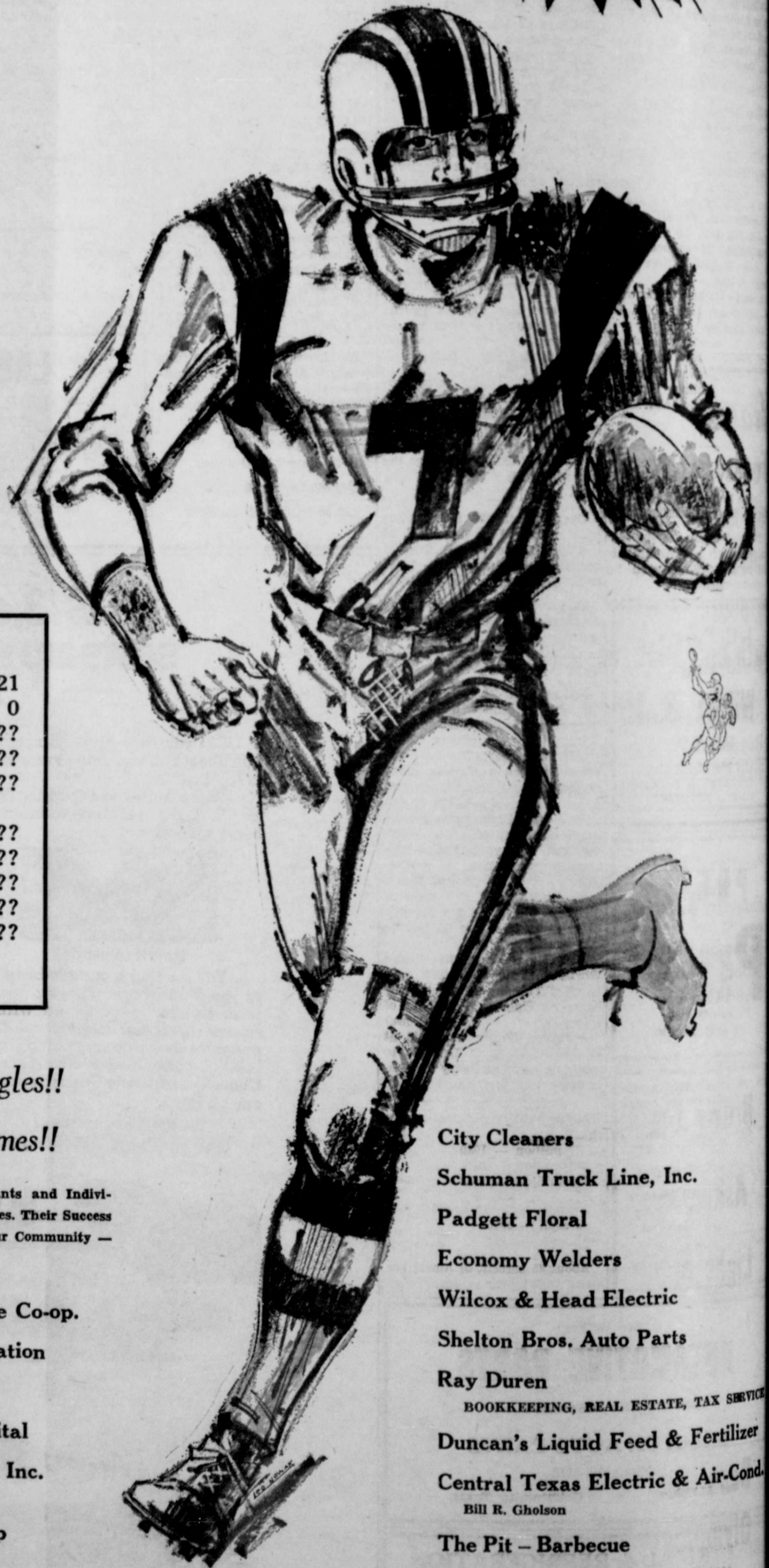

The Mills County 4-H Awards Banquet will be held Saturday, September 23, at the American Legion Hall in Goldthwaite. The banquet will begin at 7:00 p.m. with installation of the 4-H County Council officers for the 1972-73 4-H year opening the ceremonies.

A total of 26 4-H'ers and 25 4-H Adult leaders will be recipients of 4-H awards for the past year's work. The 4-H Gold Star Award recipient will also be announced at the banquet. Guest speaker for the banquet will be Mr. Marsnall Crouch, 4-H and Youth Leader, Texas Agricultural Extension Service. Mr. Crouch is a native of Zephyr.

Cattle fever ticks have been found in several South Texas counties, and livestock producers are cautioned to be on the lookout for the costly livestock pest. Fever ticks were first reported near Alice several weeks ago and have since spread to neighboring counties. Infested counties that are under state quarantine include Jim Wells, Duval, Live Oak, McMullen, Nueces, and Brooks.

All infestations have been traced to cattle shipped from the infested area near Alice. Therefore, cattlemen who have purchased cattle from that area are especially urged to check these animals for fever ticks. The cattle fever ticks can cause a fever or disease called

Babesiosis or Piroplasmosis. The symptoms of the disease are similar to Anaplasmosis. All livestock producers should keep in mind when shipping cattle into our area, especially from locations surrounding infested areas. Good sprays include Sevin, Cor-Ral, Lindane, Malathion, and Toxaphene.

The 12th Annual Horse Short Course will be held at Texas A & M University on Oct. 6 and 7. The program will feature two outstanding Texas horsemen, John Trimmer Jr., of Hale Center and Speedy Cochrell of Aubrey. There will be discussions on veterinary practices of horses such as colic, lameness, reproduction, surgical techniques, etc. A clinic on western pleasure, reining, showmanship, etc., will also be discussed.

The South Texas Brush Control Field Day will be held on October 5 at the Chaparrosa Ranch in La Pryor, Texas. Many new chemical control methods of brush will be shown as well as mechanical methods which all could be applied to our prairie in Mills County. More information can be obtained from my office.

## October Social Security Checks To Show Twenty Per Cent Increase

When the 20% increase in social security benefit payments goes into effect with the checks due October 3, this means that during the last 2½ years the checks have increased by 45%. The least retirement payment at age 65 will be \$84.50. As a result, there is increased interest among workers in qualifying for social security, reports Glen McNatt, manager of the Social Security Office in Brownwood.

"For instance, we get more applications now from women who have worked for wages in private homes doing such things as house-cleaning, ironing, baby sitting, practical nursing, or just sitting with the sick. Too often the home owner has neglected to report the wages and send the required social security tax," said McNatt. "The subsequent investigation causes delay in approving the application,"

he added, "and almost certainly will cost him more, since he must pay not only his part of the tax as employer but also the employee's share of the tax, besides a penalty amount for late reporting." If a home-owner pays a worker wages of \$50 or more during the calendar quarter (3-month period), the wages are covered by social security and must be reported, according to McNatt.

Some people think the wages have to be as much as \$50 a month or week, but this is incorrect. For instance, \$25 a week for two weeks of the calendar quarter would be \$50 and thus would be under social security.

More information about the law concerning work in private homes and about other non-business work is available from the Social Security Office or from Internal Revenue Service.

## STATE CAPITAL Highlights AND Sidelights

AUSTIN, Tex. — Gov. Preston Smith, as had been long reported, summoned legislators back to Austin Monday to consider competitive insurance rates and strengthened budget controls for the governor.

He spelled out his recommendations in a joint session of the House and Senate.

While he has indicated he will battle to put his recommendations across, Smith said he has no plans to call more than one 30-day special session.

On the other hand, he is reluctant to open the session agenda to permit consideration of other matters until the competitive rating bill has been disposed

of. Smith said he considers as the most important step toward insurance reform and consumer protection replacement of the system of rate-setting by the State Board of Insurance with a competitive rate system.

Recent attorney general's opinions, complained Smith, have virtually stripped the governor of authority to insure adequate funding of state services. The opinions held he could not order transfer of funds from one state agency to another and that appropriations bill riders giving him effective power to pass on itemized spending are invalid. Smith acknowledged that in

calling a fourth special session of the 62nd Legislature (the 62nd is the first legislature since 1934 to have to meet so often) he had taken no easy course.

Insurance companies reportedly are pretty well divided on the competitive rate issue. They defeated a similar proposal last year.

### MONEY NEWS GOOD & BAD

Legislative budget writers received some good news and some bad news just before they headed into the new special session:

- Next year's tax bill may not be nearly as large as many had feared, due in part to federal revenue sharing.

- The federal government may force the legislature to make a \$50 million emergency appropriation early next year due to sharp limits proposed on new "social services" aid to welfare recipients.

- Legislative Budget Board Director Tom Keel told board members lawmakers likely won't face "a severe tax problem" in 1973 unless spending runs "inordinately high."

Keel and Lt. Gov. Ben Barnes at the same time pointed out that Congress is expected to cut back on the welfare assistance which was relied on to balance the current state budget. The loss of federal money may run 40 per cent of the anticipated \$124 million over the next five fiscal quarters.

Both Barnes and Keel anticipated passage of a \$90 million (for Texas) revenue sharing bill by Congress. Predictions of a small new tax need do not take into account possibility of the state's having to assume the entire cost of public school education.

### AG OPINIONS

The public has a right to fish in newly-created canals and waterways dredged from state bays into and over private property providing there is access and subject to state regulation, Attorney General Martin held.

In other recent opinions, Martin concluded:

- A National Guard sergeant injured in a crowd demonstration by another Guardsman is entitled to medical expenses.

- When a county tax assessor collector dies or vacates his office, duties fall on the chief deputy when bond is posted and approved.

- The Fleet Admiral Chester W. Nimitz Memorial Naval Museum Commission can contract with a federal agency to finance property purchases for historic renovation and preservation.

- The coordinating Board, Texas College and University System has no authority to hold an official meeting without posting the agenda 30 days earlier.

- Parks and Wildlife Department may purchase liability insurance for its officers and its employees.

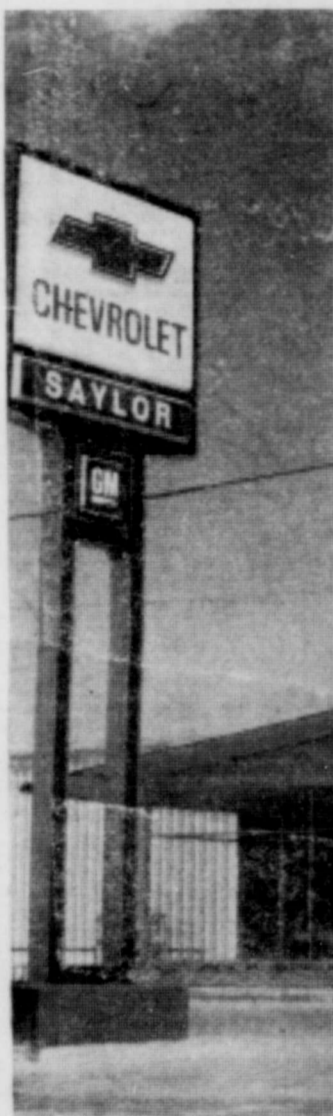

## Selective Service Announces Lottery-Five Is Lottery Cut-Off

Colonel Glantz, the State Director of Selective Service for Texas, today announced that the Number Cut-Off for induction of non-volunteers for the remainder of the year is 95. The Department of Defense is to be inducted during the three months of 1972. All require raising the Number for induction in September to 95 for the remainder of the year. This said projections indicate approximately 1,100 will be inducted in Texas

during the last three months of this year. Induction orders will go to men who are available and fully qualified for military service and who are in the 1972 First Priority Selection Group, which is made up of men born in 1952 and men who lost a deferment in 1972. Orders for pre-induction Armed Forces Examination will continue for men in the 1973 First Priority Selection Group with Lottery Number 75 or below during the rest of this year. This group is made up of men born in 1953 who are not currently in a deferred status.

## U. S. Treasury Cautions Use Of Bonds In Chain-Letter Schemes

WASHINGTON — Jesse L. Adams, Acting National Director, U. S. Savings Bonds Division, Department of the Treasury, today cautioned residents of Texas about becoming involved in chain-letter or similar schemes "to get rich" with Savings Bonds.

Many years' experience with chain schemes indicate that most participants lost their entire investment, according to Mr. Adams. This outcome is inevitable because the supply of interested persons is soon exhausted. The larger the amount to be invested, the sooner the saturation point is reached.

Banks and other issuing agencies are therefore authorized by the Treasury to refuse applications for Bonds where there is reason to believe they will be used in a chain-letter scheme.

Chain-letter schemes which use the mails to facilitate their purpose are considered by the Postal Service as a violation of the postal lottery and fraud laws — 18 USC 1302, 1341.

Further, postal officials have warned that, even though the lists of participants are not circulated in the mails, this does not alter the illegality of the operation since, usually, the Bonds or other evidence of participation in the schemes are mailed. There is also the possibility that the scheme may violate local anti-lottery laws, even if the mails are not used in any way.

In addition to the fact that chain-letter schemes violate Federal Law, the Treasury believes that the public should be made

aware that such schemes — which are essentially get-rich-quick endeavors — do a distinct disservice to the Savings Bonds Program. Rather than encouraging persons to make genuine investments, they create the illusion that participants are both aiding their Government and themselves. Even in the rare case where an individual receives a large return, it is very likely that he would quickly redeem the Bonds, thereby placing a further burden on the Treasury.

Individuals who purchase Savings Bonds for such chain-letter schemes, and who discover that participation may violate certain laws and regulations, may request a refund, using Treasury Form PD-1266 — provided they have the Bonds in their possession. This form is available at many banks; it may also be requested from Bureau of the Public Debt, Division of Loans and Currency, 536 South Clark Street, Chicago, Illinois 60605.

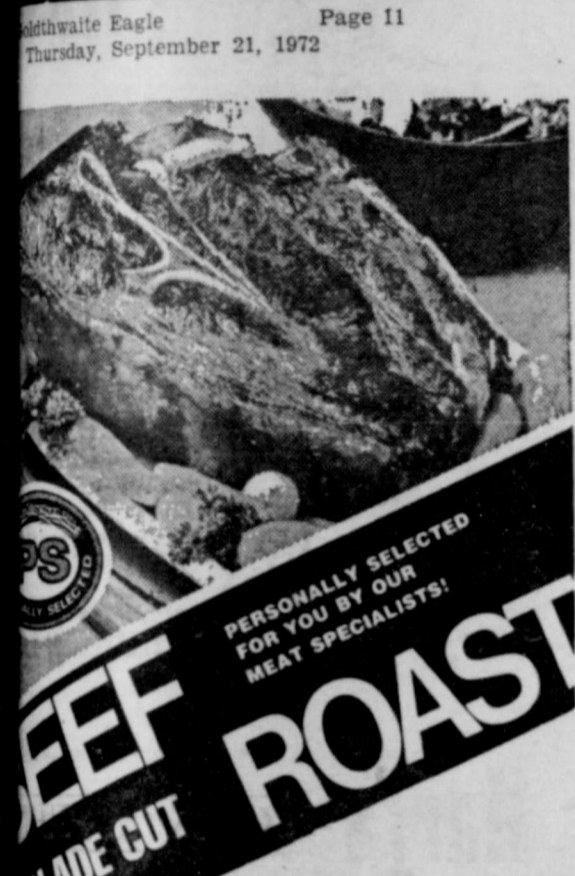
