YH's To Sponsor Presidential Debate At Auditorium Oct. 5

A "one of a kind" program is coming to Goldthwaite Thursday, October 5th at 7:30 p.m. The Mills County Young Homemakers are proud to present an informative debate between state campaign representatives of both the Nixon and McGovern campaigns.

The speaker from the State Campaign Headquarters of Nixon is Mr. J. Fields, student body president of Baylor University. And opposing him is Mr. David Samuelson, a Travis County commissioner who works for the McGovern statewide campaign.

The program is designed to be informative and concise, with each speaker limited to no more than twenty minutes each. The speakers will talk about the issues which are of particular interest to the voters in our area, without the emotionalism that characterizes so much campaigning.

The Young Homemakers urge

all voters to attend this special presentation whether or not decisions have been reached as to which candidate to support. First, if you have not decided which candidate deserves your vote, the Young Homemakers feel your responsibility as a citizen demands your careful consideration of the issues to be presented. And second, if you

have decided on a particular candidate, you will be better able to advance his chances of winning by utilizing the information from the program.

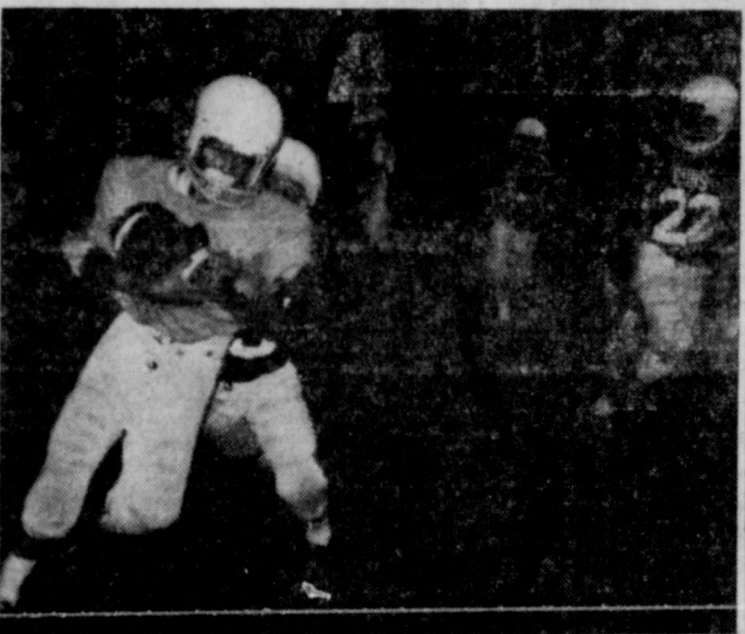

Eagles Fall To Marble Falls 23-6; Tackle Early Longhorns Friday

In a non-district grid tilt against Marble Falls last Friday night on Mustang Field, the Warbirds lost 23 to 6. Season record for Goldthwaite now is one win and three losses.

Mustang Elvin Randall led the charge with two touchdowns and a field goal.

Goldthwaite outgained the Mustangs 113 yards to 83 in the bout which proved to be more of a defensive struggle than the score indicates.

Lee Susery scored another TD during the second period of play from inside the one yard line for the Mustangs.

At halftime the Eagles were trailing by 23 to 0.

During the last quarter Bill Bishop and Dale Page connected on a ten yard pass for the Eagles only TD of the game.

Three members of the "B" squad have been drafted to the varsity team. They are Tommy

Standley, Chuck Shaw and Martin Poraz.

"The boys are not playing the game as it was meant to be played. They are going to have to make up their minds to play as a team if they expect to turn out a good game and be on top," stated Les Johnson, head coach of the squad.

Bond Sale Approved By Council; City Manager Position Still Open

The Goldthwaite City Council meeting, in regular session Monday night, signed and approved a recommendation that the State of Texas purchase seventy thousand dollars of sewer bonds for the city.

This is a requirement of the state, part of the step by step government aid program. The sewer project will cost \$250 thousand. Work is expected to begin next spring.

The City mailed tax bills totaling over \$35 thousand to Goldthwaite property holders this week. This is a slight increase over previous years.

Acting City Manager, Velma Barnett, did some research and compared the number of new residences and utility hook-ups completed in the last four years.

The report showed a marked increase for 1972 in all phases of City utility usage with twelve new homes being connected, six new commercial businesses, and eight mobile homes added to the

Arnold Head, Route 3, Goldthwaite Policy Development Chairman of Mills County Farm Bureau, met with Directors October 2 and scheduled Policy Development meetings in the county.

In Precinct II, there will be a P. D. Meeting Saturday, October 14 at the Fellowship Hall at Center City at 8:00 p.m.

The ideas advanced at these meetings will be presented for consideration at the county annual convention which will be held at the High School lunchroom October 21. Following this will be the state and national conventions in November and December.

"Farm Bureau policies on the county, state and national issues are formed at the conventions on these levels, and they all originate in grass-root meetings such as these" the chairman said.

Game was almost a replay of the Varsity-Bangs game except the Eagles just lost

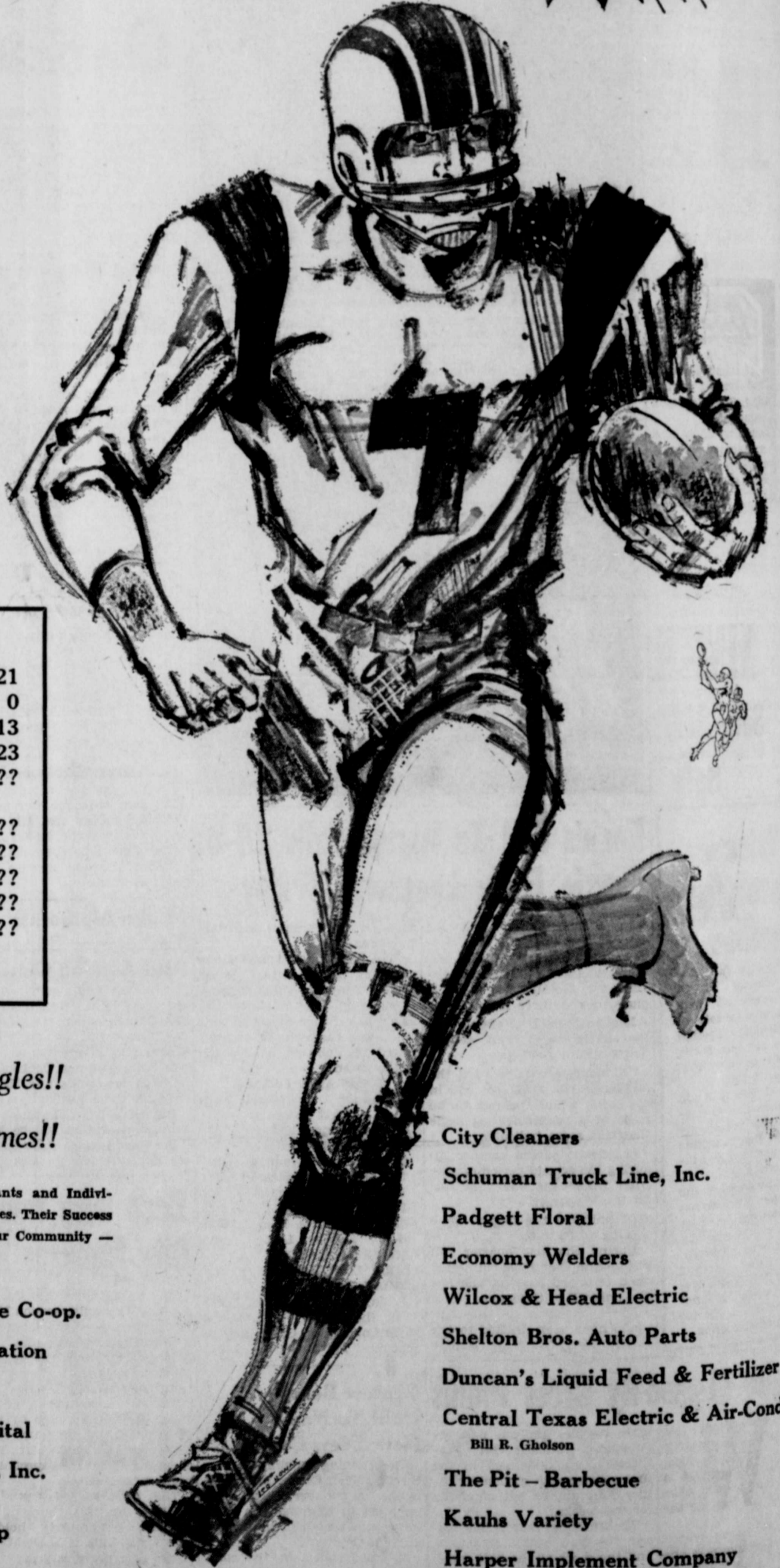

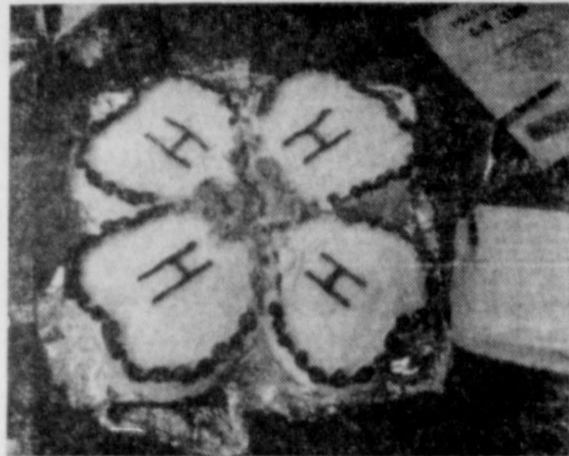

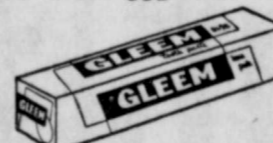

United States Savings Bond sales in Mills County during the month of August totaled \$2,426, according to County Bond Chairman W. P. Duren. Texas sales during the month amounted to \$17,819,733, while the January-August sales totaled \$142,833,527 for 72 per cent of the 1972 goal of \$197.5 Mil. Over the nation, Series E and H Bond sales amounting to \$562 Mil. were purchased during August - a 8.8 per cent increase over August 1971 sales of \$516

Mil. Year-to-date sales totaled \$4,302 Mil. - 14.4 per cent above a year earlier. Exchanges of Series E for Series H Bonds amounting to \$228 Mil. were reported for the first eight months of 1972, 30 per cent above the \$174 Mil. exchanged in 1971.

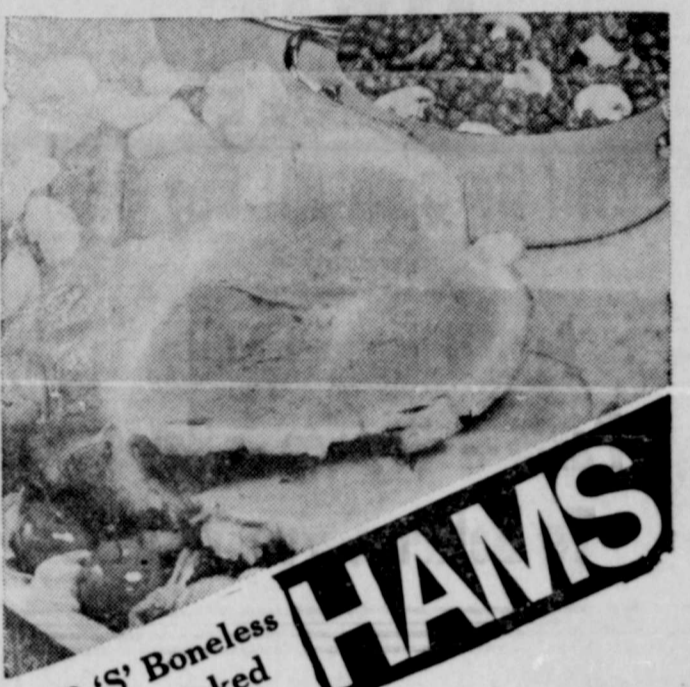
