



## Experimental Deer Management Technique To Be Tested In Mills Co.

AUSTIN — An experimental deer management technique has involved a number of counties in the past two seasons and will be tried in Mills County this year, according to officials of the Texas Parks and Wildlife Department. Landowners are allowed to determine the number of antlerless deer that will be removed from their property. The only restriction is that a special tag issued to the landowner must be attached to each harvested antlerless deer.

Results from post-season surveys show that this method of "either-sex" hunting has considerable merit. Little difference in harvest was indicated from past seasons when "doe permits" were issued to landowners on an acreage basis. The new method is less complicated than the old permit system and places more responsibility for deer herd management on the landowner.

In the past, biologists say, landowners rarely used more than 50 per cent of the permits issued, being conservative in the harvest of does. This conservatism could be attributed to the economic value of deer, since the deer herd is a source of income to many ranchers. Where deer have reached the carrying capacity of the range, both sexes should be harvested to prevent the production of surplus fawns and increased pressure on the food supply. The results of an overpopulation are a high browse line or "hedging" of brush, deer which show backbone and ribs, and losses from disease or malnutrition. An advantage to the hunter is that

deer respond readily to artificial feeding and are not as wild as normal deer, since they are pre-occupied with finding a meal.

Increased knowledge of the habits and requirements of deer has led to the experimental use of the either-sex season in many Texas counties this year. Data will be collected in each county to determine the results of the season in every situation. Biologists are aware that factors such as habitat destruction, drought, or disease coupled with legal and illegal hunting can cause a severe decline in deer populations. Such declines will be monitored and wildlife officials will be prepared to enforce regulations to remove hunting pressure from the herd. The upward trend in areas or the state is reflected by the 1971 harvest of an estimated 280,000 deer from a herd over 3 million. The either-sex season may not prove to be workable in all areas of Texas, but will be a foundation for improved deer management techniques.

This time of the year is good to fertilize and improve the condition of your lawn before winter. Yards should be fertilized good now and kept watered during periods of slack rainfall. Common Bermuda should be kept mowed at a height of 1 1/2 to 2 inches and St. Augustine from 2 to 3 inches.

Lawn care is essential to a pretty and healthy lawn. Lawns should be watered in the winter when rainfall is not adequate. By doing so, this will insure a more healthy lawn in the spring.

One of the test questions of a man's character is this: Will that man lie? And yet how easy it is to lie - even for religious people: the willingness to twist a meaning to gain a point; to misquote if the misquotation gains an end; exaggerations to make an impression; a lack of complete truth in making appeals for funds; misrepresentations in presenting goods for sale! What is at the basis of this looseness with the truth? Is it not often in the fact that we think a lie is sometimes justifiable?

I once asked some students whether a lie is ever justifiable and got the answers (1) Yes, in business, (2) Yes, in politics, (3) Yes, to save a life, (4) Yes, in war. One argued that it is right to tell a small lie in behalf of a great cause. She wasn't sure of a big one! They thought the ability to lie, well was an asset. They did not see that the ability to lie is a liability and not an asset.

Get hold of the two principles which Doctor Speer lays down: First, God can not lie. Second, He can not delegate to you the privilege of lying for Him. Truth is inviolable. The early Christians standing before tribunals, their lives in the balance, could tell the slightest lie and their lives would be spared. They refused. They could die but could not lie. A Hindu doctor asked his accountant why he did not give the two women before him their refund. He said he had. The women said he hadn't. The doctor turned and said: "Go get their refund. Don't you know who these women are? They are Christians. And Christians never lie." He

was right: Christians never lie. When we lie, we are not Christian. The Scripture is vocal at this point. "Lies are put off the old man with sayings." (Colossians 3:9) How religious we might be, are still in the old man. Christ is not in us.


