Mills Deer Season Heading For Record

"The deer harvest in Mills County is meeting or exceeding harvest from previous years," commented Game Management Officer Bennie R. Schriver of Goldthwaite.

Following one week of hunting

deer receipts at Mills County Locker in Goldthwaite show 258 deer to be processed.

Joe Langford, owner of the locker plant said, "The deer are in good shape and the antlers are larger than last year. He noted

receiving ten and twelve point racks brought in.

Schriver said that the cool weather and abundance of deer hunters accounts for the large harvest of deer.

Turkey kills have at least topped last years mark at this time. This is due to the exceptionally large turkey hatch in the spring.

Schriver commented that the week before the season he and other officers experienced an abnormal amount of violations.

Thirty-two cases, of which twenty-seven were night hunting violations occurred in the week preceding deer season.

Local officers have been assisted by aircraft surveillance. The specially equipped airplane is based at San Angelo.

Schriver pointed out that tagging violations were becoming more frequent and that hunters should exercise extreme care in tagging their deer kill.

He said that tags should be placed on the carcass immediately upon killing the deer and that the information should be carefully filled out on the tag and the date punched.

Hunters processing deer in the camp must maintain evidence of the sex of the deer kill.

Deer season closes at sundown January 1, 1973.

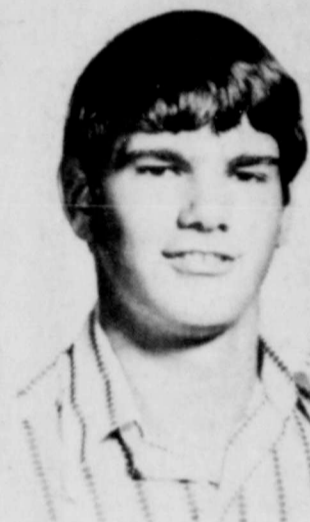

Mullin All District 6-B Football Players Named

Senior Bobby Duren and Junior Danny Whisenhunt were selected to the District 6-B Six Man Football First Team Offense. Duren was also selected to the Second Team as a defensive back. Terry Alldredge was selected as a defensive end and an offensive end on the second units. Junior Gary Harris earned Honorable Mention as an offensive center. Robin Dean was an honorable mention as an offensive back.

Duren, son of Mr. and Mrs. Ralph Duren, was the leading scorer in District 6-B with 164 points for the 1972 season. He is rather small at 145 pounds but makes up for the lack of size by his quickness and has been selected to play in the State Six Man All Star game next summer which is expected to be played in Brownwood.

Bobby was also selected to the Second Team All District Defensive backfield.

Whisenhunt, son of Mr. and Mrs. A. R. Whisenhunt, was selected as the top QB in District 6-B. He has finished three years of high school football and has started all 29 games played during this span. This season as QB he passed for

just over 2,500 yards and 36 TDs. Danny wound up the season with almost 70 per cent pass completion of all his passes thrown. He also intercepted nine passes on defense this year returning three of them for touchdowns.

Allredge, son of Mr. and Mrs. G. I. Allredge, established himself as a solid player both on defense and offense. He was among the tops in tackles for the Mullin Bulldogs this season.

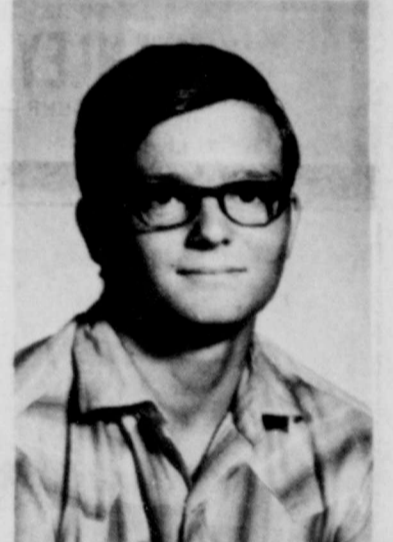
Harris, son of Mrs. Alma Brown, was a big surprise to the Bulldog Team this year. He made as much improvement as anybody during the past season and established himself as one of the best offensive centers in the district. Gary also played well as a nose guard on defense.

Junior Robin Dean, son of Mr. and Mrs. James Dean, played his first year of six man football and was among the leaders in scoring with 135 points.

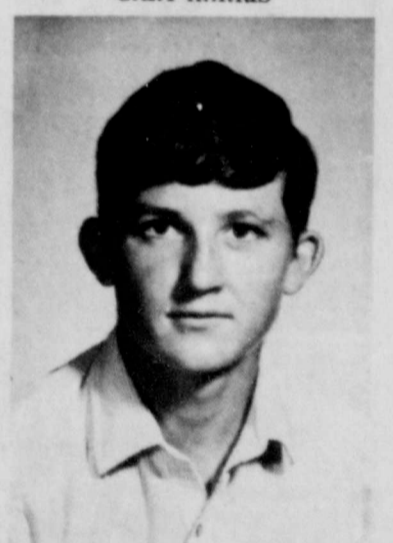

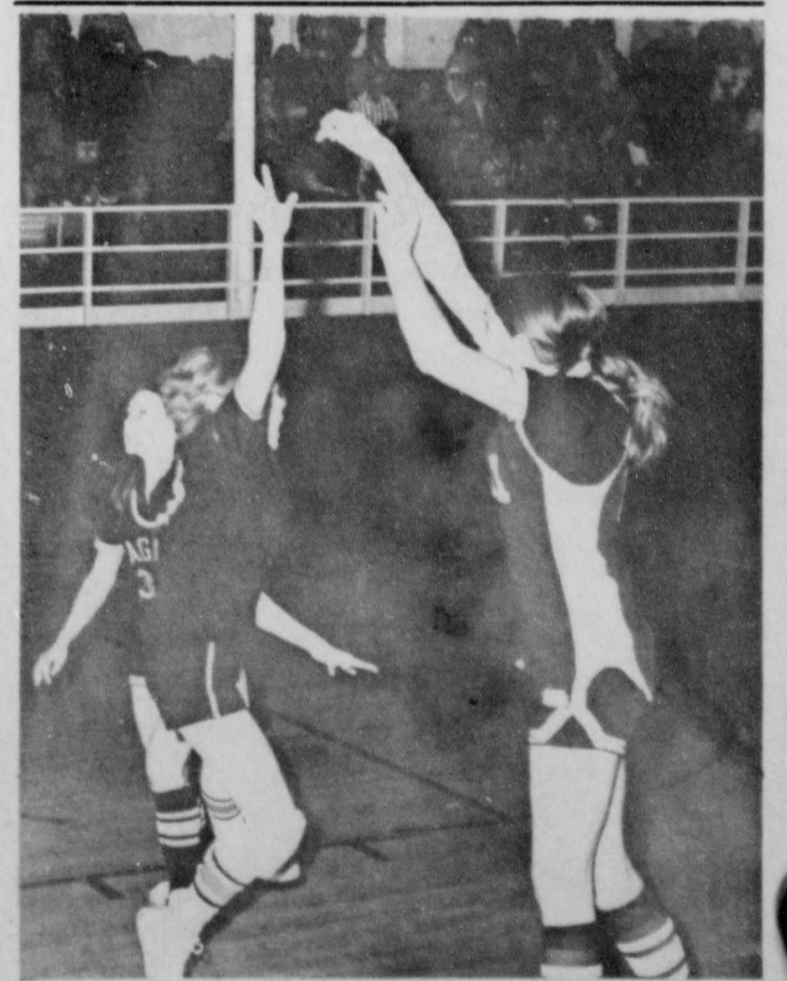

The sheep and goat industry accounted for a \$5,974,000 in cash receipts during the year of 1972 in Mills County out of a total agriculture cash receipt figure of \$13,798,000. This figure, however, could have been much greater had it not been for the enormous number of predators in Mills County. The predator situation is of extremely bad nature. A visit with one of many producers can verify this situation.

The Mills County Program Building Committee has since last March attempted to relieve this situation by keeping a government trapper hired. These funds have come from donations of producers throughout Mills County. The committee is presently asking producers in Mills County to donate again so the trapper can be hired for another year. The committee is asking for a donation of 2 cents per acre of land which a producer operates.

The trapper is available to producers in Mills County. If predators are a problem, the producers may contact the county agents of office, 648-2650, or the trapper at 938-5547.

Distemper or (strangles) is a disease which horse owners constantly try to keep their horses from contacting. The disease, caused by bacteria, is diagnosed by symptoms of loss of appetite, high fever, and a discharge of pus from the nose. By the third or fourth day of the disease, the glands under the jaw enlarge, become sore, and eventually break open and discharge pus. A cough usually is present.

Sick animals should be isolated and contaminated areas should be cleaned and disinfected. Healthy animals should not be allowed to come in contact with sick animals contaminated feeds, premises, or equipment.

Distemper can be prevented by vaccination.

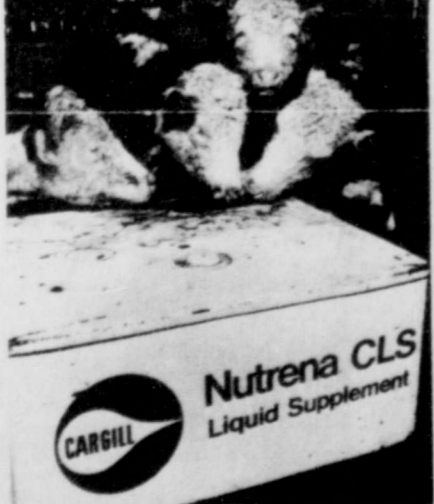

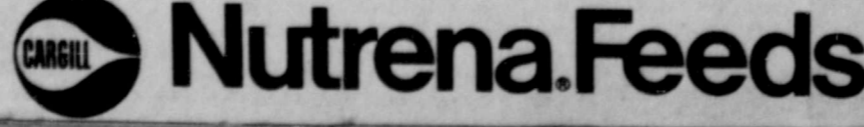

Gift shopping by mail can mean many advantages to you as Christmas draws nearer.

Holiday buyers may save time and money shopping by mail—but first certain precautions are in order.

Wise shoppers will compare prices and goods at other kinds of stores—discount or wholesale stores and department stores—before buying by mail. A catalogue price is not necessarily the lowest price available.

Also, the customer must order well in advance. Goods may suffer damages, be the wrong merchandise (not what was ordered), or not arrive at all. They even could be unsuitable due to misleading advertisements.

A checklist for the consumer buying by mail is as follows:

(1) Use a familiar company or ask the Better Business Bureau about it.

(2) Follow mailing instructions carefully; write your return address clearly.

(3) Know shipping charges and handling fees in advance (ask at the post office or United Parcel Service).

(4) Use checks or money orders; do not mail cash.

(5) Know company policy on returns and substitutes.

(6) Keep records of order date, date check was mailed, and exact goods ordered.

To report problems or complaints, write the company and explain in detail. If this does not bring satisfactory results, write to Direct Mail Advertising Association's Mail Order Actionline, 230 Park Avenue, New York 10017.

Food and Drug Administration's Bureau of Product Safety is taking new steps to protect consumers from unsafe Christmas decorations and toys. These steps include (1) a nationwide publicity campaign to educate consumers on toy safety, (2) distribution of 2 new pamphlets on Christmas decorations and children's toys, (3) enforcement actions against highly flammable artificial Christmas trees and (4) development of new and improved safety standards applicable to electric toys and artificial plastic trees.

The pamphlets mentioned above are being made available to the public on both toy safety and gen-

eral Christmas time safety. The first booklet, SAFE TOY TIPS, includes information on how to choose and use toys. The second pamphlet, MERRY CHRISTMAS WITH SAFETY, explains tips on trees, fake snow, lights, candles, trimmings, fire and paper products. For your free copy of each write to Director, Office of Technical Information & Publications, Bureau of Product Safety, 5401 Westbard Avenue, Bethesda, Maryland 20016.

The bureau is also advising consumers to consider the make up of artificial trees before buying. There are 2 kinds of plastic trees; those made of polyvinylchloride (PVC) and those made of polyethylene. The PVC tree—consisting of long needles locked into wire branches—will not burn. On the other hand the polyethylene tree, which usually appears more natural than the PVC tree, will burn. In comparison with natural tree, however, the polyethylene tree will burn more slowly. Of all trees, the natural tree is the most flammable, capable of bursting into flames in seconds once the tree is dry.

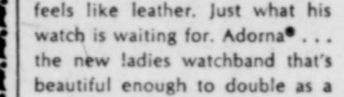

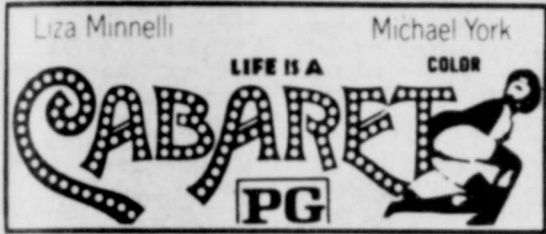

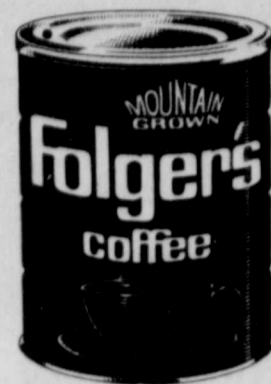
