The Consumer Alert

who is "the Consumer?"

If you are reading this — the first of a series of articles which are being made available through your newspaper, you already know the answer: "The Consumer" is each and every one of us.

There is no way to break ranks, choose sides, and say, "Those are the consumer, and there are the others."

The difference is only that some consumers are more watchful about their position in the marketplace. They know that their dollars are sought, not only by the honest businessman, but by operators who offer sales and services which they do not, or cannot, deliver.

That is the reason I picked, "The Consumer Alert," as the title for this column.

It is my firm belief that every consumer — whether he or she is a service station attendant, or a secretary, or chairman of the board of a bank — can be an "alert" consumer if he receives adequate information about his legal rights, and that every consumer deserves to be protected when his rights are endangered.

Texas' Consumer Credit Code was enacted in an effort to help protect those rights, but in my opinion it is not adequate for the job that needs to be done.

As Attorney General, it is my job and the job of my Consumer Protection Division to stand at the side of the deceived consumer to enforce the Deceptive Trade Practices Act of that Code, the Uniform Commercial Code, and other laws designed to give the consumer an even break — without breaking the honest businessman.

The assistant attorneys general in the Consumer Protection Division receive between 30 and 40 consumer complaints each week — in addition to those which are lodged with district and county attorneys; local consumer protection agencies, and legal aid groups.

Our investigations show that many of the complaints reflect mere misunderstandings between consumer and creditor. The Attorney General's office is in a good position to "clear up" those misunderstandings, sometimes resulting in cancellation of contracts or refunds to the consumers.

Sometimes, however, legal action is necessary. In those cases, the only legal courses open to my office are 1) a court injunction — in which a judge orders the defendant to cease the practice complained of, or 2) obtaining a court-registered assurance of voluntary compliance, which the defendant does not actually admit to any wrong-doing, but says in effect, "I won't do it."

In either case, the action is tantamount to saying, "Go — and sin no more." There is no avenue for restitution of the money lost by the consumer. In short, there is no real remedy for the injured consumer.

That does not offer sufficient protection for the victim of fraud in the marketplace.

And, under present law, even if a consumer takes his individual problem to court, he has to prove injury, and prove that the action to which he objects occurred with intent to defraud, a difficult assignment under present law. And, he still cannot get monetary restitution.

Often, he cannot get legal representation, because most private attorneys are reluctant to add the cost of the legal fees to the financial dilemma, since there is no chance for restitution, unless the client just insists on an expensive exercise in justice.

That is the reason your Attorney General has been testifying before committees of the Legislature for a bill which was proposed in the Texas Senate by Senator Oscar Matzky of Dallas and Senator Bob Gammage of Houston, and in the House by Rep. Carl Parker of Port Arthur and Representative Arthur (Buddy) Temple of Diboll.

**Library Week
Scheduled For
April 8-14**

Library Week in Texas will be observed April 8-14, according to announcement by Mrs. Fred Reynolds, local Librarian.

The local library services supply material resources for information, for life enrichment and for occupational and professional improvement. Twenty three counties with a 1970 total population of 117,474 have no public library service of any kind. Approximately 610,210 Texans in other counties have no public library service of any kind. Many more persons receive only token library service.

Texas ranks 47th in the nation in per capita library support. In October 1971, the Public Library Association of ALA announced that a per capita expenditure of from \$7.66 to \$8.23 is necessary for adequate library service.

Only three Texas public libraries met or surpassed the \$7.66 recommended by the Public Library Association.

Mrs. Reynolds urges everyone to observe Library Week, April 8-14.

OBSCURE PEOPLE AND GREAT TRUTHS

In this status-loving age it is refreshing to note the people to whom Jesus first revealed the great truths of His Kingdom. It was Dr. Luke who gives great place in his portrait of Jesus to the common people who heard him gladly and who gives prominence to women and children also in his writings. Their rights and privileges were stressed at a time when the priests prayed: "I thank Thee Lord that I was not born a woman," and when the learned asked Jesus to send the children away...they were such a bother. Jesus said they were to let the children alone. For of such was the kingdom of Heaven. To a small boy who out of trust and love gave his lunch of small fish and dry loaves to Jesus and saw it multiplied into a feast for the multitude...to him it was revealed what Christ's power can do with whatever is committed to Him in love and trust.

The Evangelist John's Gospel, which is perhaps the most profound gives us the most striking examples of how Jesus clearly and persuasively taught great truths to the most unlikely persons. Outstanding among these is the story of the sin-stained Samaritan to whom He discloses himself as Messiah. The beautiful story unfolds in the fourth chapter. Step by step Jesus led her in her thinking concerning Living water and spiritual worship to the declaration of His own Messiahship. "If you knew you need never thirst again...until she says: 'Give me this water' to which Jesus replies: 'I who am talking to you am He.' And she runs to tell her town people that she had found the Messiah...the Christ.

Perhaps the best known and loved scripture is in John the third chapter. It is the story of the learned, cautious and investigative Nicodemus who came to Jesus by night to inquire of eternal life...how he might come into the Kingdom. In the profound discourse which follows Jesus tells Nicodemus there must be a new life in which there is no tinkering...no whitewashing. But a total and continuous commitment to God. Such commitment is dependent upon repentance and is the work of the Spirit of God. The Son of Man must be lifted up so that everyone who has faith in Him may in Him possess eternal life.

Again it is John who tells us in the eleventh chapter how Jesus declared the resurrection truth to Martha. She was His friend, capable, calm and believing. Burdened with cares and grieved by the death of her brother she says in despair: "If you had been here." Building upon her faltering faith Jesus said your brother will rise again. "I am the resurrection and I am life. Whosoever lives and believes in me, though he die yet shall he live." "I am resurrection and life."

That Jesus is the Savior of mankind, that man can and must become a new creature by the Grace of God through Christ, and that death for the Christian is swallowed up in victory...all these are great truths revealed to obscure persons but today well known to all who read and believe

the great truths of the New Testament. "Thanks be to God who continually leads us about. Captives in Christ's triumphal procession and everywhere uses us to reveal and spread abroad the fragrance of the knowledge of Himself.

Hardware disease is a condition that can develop when livestock eat foreign material such as wire, nails and staples. Sickness and death may be the result.

Problems result when animals ingest foreign objects and these penetrate the stomach or other tissue and cause inflammation. Veterinarians sometimes call the condition "traumatic gastritis or pericarditis," depending on the site of penetration.

Many slaughtered animals may have metal objects lodged after they are swallowed. This condition occurs more in cattle than other animals because they seldom chew their food thoroughly the first time and thus are more likely to swallow metal objects without knowing it.

An animal with hardware disease may show no symptoms until it gets pregnant. Then the weight of the fetus may force a sharp object like a nail or wire to pierce the stomach wall and enter the heart. This is called "traumatic pericarditis" and generally will kill the animal in a short time.

How can hardware disease be detected in animals? Some symptoms include arching of the back, tucking up the belly and trembling of muscles in the back of the front legs. Animals may also have pain in the heart area when the ribs over the heart are pushed with the fist.

If the heart is affected there may be a noticeable pulsation of the jugular vein. Splashing sounds in the heart area may be heard if the animal is restrained and checked closely.

If any of these symptoms are present, contact your veterinarian at once. Operative surgery to remove the metal objects is much more successful when done early.

One preventive measure against hardware disease is to give animals a magnet shaped like a bolus for worming. The magnet is given to the animal with a balking gun. It should attract any metal objects before they cause damage to the stomach tissue.

Also, you should keep feed troughs, fence rows and pastures clear of wire, nails and staples to help prevent this costly problem.

There's still time to remove mistletoe from trees so that they will be free of the parasitic plant for the coming season.

In most instances mistletoe causes an unsightly condition and disfigurement. However, occasionally it can cause dieback and weakening of terminal limbs.

Mistletoe is frequently seen on live oak, post oak, hackberry and elm trees. It obtains water and nutrients from the tree's conductive systems that would normally nourish the tree. Just simply breaking the mistletoe off the limbs is not a satisfactory means of control as it will sprout at the point of removal and produce another clump of growth.

To satisfactorily control mistletoe, remove a chip from the host limb at the point of attachment. Treat the wounded area with a tree paint to keep out wood rotting organisms.

If mistletoe is on small limbs, remove the entire limb about one foot below the area of infection. Here again, the wounded area should be painted with the tree paint.

Mistletoe can be spread by birds as well as by other means. Presently there are no chemicals cleared for use that will effectively control mistletoe.
