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# \$273,000 Incentive Checks Mailed

Approximately 460 Mills Co. wool producers are receiving or will be receiving incentive payments for 1972 wool and unshorn lambs totaling \$273,000. The national average price for marketings of 1972 wool sales was announced at .35c per lb. according to ASCS reports. This results in an incentive rate of

105.7 per cent of 1972 sales proceeds, minus marketing charges, promotional fees, etc. This percentage is arrived at by subtracting the national average price, .35c from the support price of 72c and dividing by the national average.

Using this same computation, the national average for 1972 mohair was more than the support

rate of \$9.2c per lb. Consequently, there will be no mohair incentive payments for 1972.

Payments for unshorn lambs will be \$1.48 per hundred weight of liveweight lambs marketed in 1973. To avoid duplicate payments, this same rate is deducted from producer payments for producers who purchased unshorn lambs.

According to Blake English, the Mills County ASCS Office, payments are now being processed and should be hitting the post office by the time you read this issue of the Eagle. It is generally felt that this payment rate was favorable, inasmuch as many Mills County producers sold their wool for more than the national average.

**Texas Traffic  
Accidents  
Up 10%**

AUSTIN — Colonel Wilson E. Speir, director of the Texas Department of Public Safety, announced today that a record of 3,688 persons died last year in 3,099 fatal traffic crashes on the streets and highways of Texas. Another 128,158 persons were injured in 83,607 injury accidents.

Rural areas led in traffic deaths, but city crashes produced the greatest number of reported injuries.

Of the deaths, 1,409 were in cities and 2,279 in rural areas. Some 94,855 of the injuries were in city accidents and 33,303 were in rural crashes.

Overall, a total of 432,998 traffic accidents were reported last year in the state. Reported accidents increased 10 per cent from the 394,166 occurring in 1971.

The total economic loss to Texans from traffic accidents during 1972 was \$1-billion, 35-million. (\$1,035,000,000)

Speir observed that almost 76.7 billion vehicle miles were driven in Texas last year—an eight per cent increase from 1971.

On a positive note, the DPS director pointed out that due to the fact vehicle miles increased faster than fatalities, the traffic death rate per 100-million vehicle miles decreased from 5.1 in 1971 to 4.8 in 1972.

Speir observed that a death rate as low as 4.8 has been achieved in Texas only one other time (in 1961) since the DPS began making such calculations in 1937.

As recently as 1966, the Texas traffic death rate was 6.2. For point of comparison, it was 14.6 in 1937.

Looking at some of the 1972 traffic statistics, there were eight fatal accidents last year in which six or more died for a total of 57 deaths. In one of these accidents 10 were killed and another resulted in nine fatalities.

For the second year in a row, July had the most traffic deaths—404. This is the first time Texas has ever had 400 or more persons killed in one month.

September 20 was the only day of the year on which no traffic deaths were recorded.



AUSTIN, TEXAS — A widely publicized ruling of the U. S. Supreme Court relaxed pressure on the Texas Legislature to overhaul school finance laws and the property tax system this year. Predictions are the major revisions will be undertaken in special session — if they are undertaken at all before the 1975 regular legislative meeting.

The High Court, reversing a San Antonio three-judge federal court ruling of December, 1971, upheld property tax financing of local schools and concluded education is not a right assured by the Constitution. The lower court had invalidated the Texas system of financing schools on grounds of varied quality of education from district to district rather than fixing it on the basis of state wealth.

Gov. Dolph Briscoe and Atty. Gen. John Hill emphasized that inequities must still be abolished in public school finance. House Speaker Price Daniel Jr. and the others agreed the heat on the Legislature to "act now" has turned down several degrees. Bills are pending in both Houses backed by Texas Board of Education and Texas State Teachers Association to revamp finance formulas.

The bills are slated for House Education Committee hearing for April 4 at 6 p.m. Under the Board of Education bill, the state would assume virtually all basic education program cost over a five-year period.

TSTA's proposal calls for local districts to pay 30 per cent (instead of the present 20 per cent of program costs) and would require the local school districts to meet state standards for assessing property and setting tax rates. With the heat off, legislators aren't expected to rush into anything so far-reaching and controversial as school finance.

**ALTERED PRESS BILLS ADVANCE** — Weakened versions of open meetings and newsmen's privilege (called the "Free flow of information bill") measures

moved forward last week. HB 3 — the open meetings bill advanced to the Senate calendar with Jurisprudence Committee approval in a form criticized by the Texas Joint Media Committee and Common Cause.

Amendments to the measure are being prepared to tighten the sections on real estate transactions and attorney-public body meetings. These amendments should make the bill more acceptable to the Senate, media groups, House sponsors and other supporters of public access to information.

The "free flow of information" bill, HB 10, to protect sources of information from forced disclosure was due for Jurisprudence Committee consideration after winning sub-committee approval.

Critics noted that an amendment to the open meetings bill permitting closed deliberations on "negotiated contracts" and real estate sales covers a lot of territory never contemplated in the original House bill.

The shield law as it cleared sub-committee on a 4-0 vote would permit the State Supreme Court to order source and information disclosure if it can be obtained by no other means and if withholding it would cause or threaten "substantial cause or injury, endanger public health and welfare or cause substantial injustice."

Spokesmen for the Texas Joint Media Committee said this was a "qualified" privilege, but better than the present common law which gives no privilege at all.

**REFORM BILL KILLED** — Senators crushed one of House Speaker Daniel's top reform measures — to limit powers of spending and taxing conference committees by statute — on a 10-21 vote.

Lt. Gov. Bill Hobby and ranking senate members maintained the conference limitation is best handled by legislative rules, and senators approved joint rules containing the recommended controls.

However, Daniel claimed failure of the bill (HB 5) "dealt pocketbooks of the people a stunning blow." He said millions of dollars are written into appropriations bills at every session not approved in original House and Senate budget measures.

Senators opposing the bill argued it would open the door to a myriad of nuisance lawsuits challenging tax and budget bills.

**COURTS SPEAK** — The U. S. Supreme Court held for Texas in a long-standing lawsuit over boundaries of the Sabine River between Texas and Louisiana. The Court ruling that the boundary is the middle of the river means millions of dollars to the state and the cities of Port Arthur and Orange in oil lease revenues.

Third Court of Civil Appeals found unconstitutional the state law ordering tax payments on stolen cigarettes. That Court also upheld licensing of wholesale dealers under the liquor control act.

In a Texarkana case, the State Supreme Court upheld lower courts that a city is not liable for damages due to sewers backing up even if it is negligent.

The High Court found a murdered woman's survivors' benefits under workmen's compensation insurance should go to her estranged husband.

Reversing a Tyler drunk driving conviction, the Court of Criminal Appeals held a jury couldn't alter a verdict reading "guilty" in one section and "not guilty" in another without consultation with all parties.

Dr. Ervin E. Baden of Austin and Raymondville as acting director of the Office of Comprehensive Health Planning.

A. J. Kemp of Fort Worth and J. Fred Buncy Jr. of Dallas and Judson F. Williams of El Paso (reappointment) to the board of regents of Texas Tech University, Lubbock.

Fred S. Nall of Austin is associate director of the new Texas Center for the Judiciary. Chick Morris, deputy press secretary.

Mary Nell Carlson, special assistant to the press secretary. AG OPINIONS — Attorney General Hill held the new Constitutional Revision Commission is not bound by appropriations bill limitations on employee salaries or members' expenses.

**Report Of Saving Bond Sales In County**

According to Mr. W. P. Duren, Chairman of the Mills County Savings Bonds Committee, February sales of Series E and H United States Savings Bonds totaled \$11,079 while sales for the two-month period were \$19,870 for 33 per cent of the 1973 sales goal.

Texas sales during the month amounted to \$21,221,162 compared to \$19,273,003 during February 1972 — an increase of 10 per cent. Sales for the first two months totaled \$45,148,051 for 21 per cent of the yearly sales goal of \$216.6 million.

## FROM THE STATE CAPITOL

By CAMM LARY, JR.  
State Representative

The Supreme Court ruling concerning the appeal of the case of Antonio Independent School District vs. Rodriguez holds important ramifications for this session of the Legislature. Actually, the decision maintains the State and Federal governments provide a basic level of education of public schools and local districts are allowed to supplement this level to the extent that they choose. The decision encourages the Legislature of the State of Texas to make needed changes in the education system in order to provide for more equitable educational conditions and at the same time, commends the Legislature for changes already made. It is my hope that the House Committee on Education will make recommendations concerning

this matter before adjournment of this session.

Another bill of Speaker Price Daniel's 9-bill reform package has passed the House. H.B. 7 makes it very difficult for a Speaker of the House to hold the office two consecutive terms, but does not prohibit a genuine draft. The purpose of the bill is to encourage the Speaker, during his term, to devote himself entirely to legislative business rather than to campaigning for another term of office.

The passage of H.B. 397 last week is of interest to deer hunters across the State. This bill provides that a person may be in possession of part of a deer carcass before it reaches a processor or other final destination without having to have a deer tag, if he has a note of authorization from the person who killed the deer. As in the previous statute, a deer tag must be attached to the part of the deer carcass in the possession of the one who killed the deer.

As the half-way mark in this 63rd session of the Texas Legislature was reached last week, House Speaker Price Daniel briefly addressed the House Members Friday. He commended the work of this Legislature, saying, "To my knowledge and according to those who have observed Texas Legislature for longer than I, no legislative body in the history of this State has worked longer hours...none has worked harder...and none has worked more democratically and conscientiously." Though marked progress has been made in the first half of the session, the second half promises to bring the consideration of several extremely difficult matters—issues to which I hope the citizens of my district will make their opinions known. I will continue keeping you informed by means of this weekly news report.

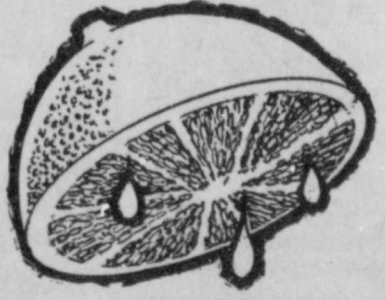

## Quality Of Survival In Cancer Cases

Predator control has become a major concern in Mills County for many reasons. The most important being the fact that

thousands of dollars have been lost to predators. The Mills County Program Building Committee has worked very hard with the trapping program which is progressing as well as expected.

Recently, a survey was mailed from my office to all producers in the county asking for number of predator losses from each producer. A total of 605 surveys were mailed out and to date a total of 196 surveys have been returned. The following was reported:

- + Head of sheep or goats lost to coyotes - 2,166.
- + Head of calves lost to coyotes - 11.
- + Head of sheep, goats, and calves lost to other predators 675.

These figures are very impressive if you put a money sign on these losses. For individuals interested, Congressman W. R. Poage address is:

Many homeowners have become concerned over a fungus disease which is affecting their peach trees. This disease is called leaf curl. It affects leaves, flowers, tender shoots, and fruits of the peach. Young developing leaves are characterized by puckering, thickening and curling. Diseased leaves become pale yellow to light green and shed after a short time.

After the disease is visible on leaves, control is difficult. Prevent the disease with dormant sprays in the dormant season of the year (January - February). It is too late for this year for control, but this coming fall peach trees should be sprayed with Kocide 101 around November 1.

Then in January spray with dormant oil and Ferbam mixture. Fruit trees should also be on the spray schedule which was published three weeks ago.

Pecan trees should be sprayed for scab when leaves are one-third grown and before pollen is shed with Du-Ter, Dodine or Polyram.

Though the conquest of cancer has become a national goal more than 650,000 new cancer cases will be diagnosed this year. Many of these will be saved. Indeed, there are at least 1,500,000 Americans, alive and well, who have been cured of cancer.

Most people know the pioneering role of the American Cancer Society in cancer research. We think most folks have also heard the educational messages of the Society - certainly the dramatic TV spots on the health hazards of cigarette smoking made a tremendous impact on the national scene.

But we don't think enough people know about the work of the American Cancer Society in helping to rehabilitate cancer patients. Tens of thousands of American women get breast cancer and most of them are saved by surgery.

Of inestimable value is the Reach to Recovery Program of the American Cancer Society. This helps women who have had such surgery overcome the difficult psychological problems that follow surgery as well as advising the patient on the use and availability of prostheses and of exercises which can help the woman to return more rapidly to normal family and community life.

Equally dramatic is the way the ACS helps those who have lost their voice boxes to cancer surgery - laryngectomies, they are called - learn to talk again. Now the Society is making a special effort to help overcome the psychological and physical hurdles of those who have had surgery for cancer of the colon and rectum. With compassion and proper rehabilitation these people also are enabled to return to normal lives.

So, when a volunteer comes to your home during this year's Cancer Crusade remember that the Society's threefold program - research, education and service - not only seeks to wipe out cancer in your lifetime but helps improve the quality of survival. Your contribution is vital.

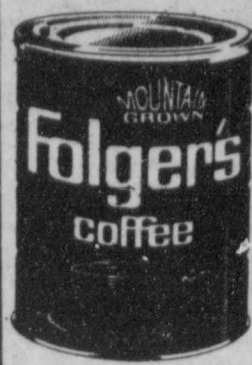

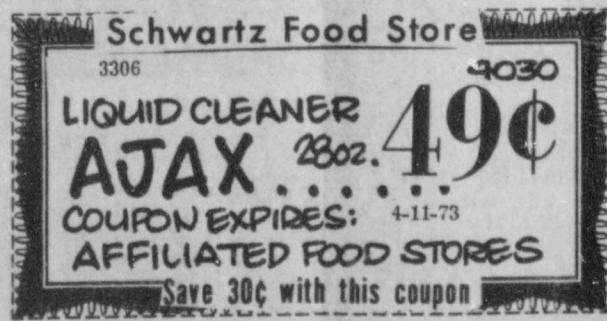

## Selective Service System Reducing Texas Board Offices

The reorganization of the Selective Service System announced by Colonel Melvin N. Glantz, the State Director of the Selective Service for Texas, will have an effect on the local draft boards in Central Texas.

The number of local board offices in Texas will be reduced from 107 to 63 by the end of 1973. In Central Texas there

will be five area offices where there were previously 12. The location of draft boards in Central Texas will move files, records and employees from: Groesbeck and Gatesville to Waco; Marlin and Cameron to Temple; Calvert to Bryan; Georgetown to Austin; and Lampasas to Brownwood. In Central Texas, Selective Service System Area Offices will be located in Waco, Temple, Austin, Bryan, and Brownwood. All of these moves will be completed by the end of 1973.

The local boards in Central Texas will continue to function as they have previously with each serving the same counties. Under the standby draft situation, local boards will probably meet quarterly rather than monthly. Board meetings will continue to be conducted in the same town where the board has previously met. On occasion, the board members may be called to special meetings at office sites.

Announcing the reorganization throughout Texas, Colonel Glantz stressed that the local boards themselves will not move, only the employees and records.

There will be a reduction in force of Selective Service employees in Texas from the present 342 employees to 193 full time and 27 part time employees. In the five Central Texas offices there will be a total of 11 full time and two part time employees; Waco will have three, Temple two, Bryan one full time and one part time, Brownwood one full time and Austin four full time employees.

Colonel Glantz reminded the young men of Texas of their obligation under Federal law to register with Selective Service within 30 days before or 30 days after their eighteenth birthday and any young man who is late in registering is urged to do so immediately to avoid the penalty of Federal law for failure to register. Selective Service maintains registrars in each county in Central Texas allowing young men to register without having to go to the local board offices.

Any questions about Selective Service requirements should be directed to one of the employees at a local board office.

Colonel Glantz told newsmen that there are no plans to draft any young men this year. Glantz noted that the Selective Service would continue to function in a standby basis with fewer people working in fewer offices through-
