The father was given a citation by the Department of Pollution Control for spilling garbage into the creek.

The police arrested the mother for indecent exposure.

Not a single person answered the classified ad which advertised 13 playful puppies to be given away free.

The daughter and her boyfriend skidded into the police car on its way to the scene.

The baby smelled for a week. The cats ate the parakeets as they flew by.

The neighbor slipped in the Kool Aid and sued the man. The man still didn't get to read the paper which would have been delivered to his home if he had been a subscriber.

All of this just to save 15 cents! Can you afford to take the risk?

Commissioners Court Meets Monday

Mills County Commissioners Court heard a request by Soil Conservation officer Charles Stader of Goldthwaite that the County apply for state matching funds of money for counties as set aside for maintenance of flood preventive structures in the county. The court unanimously approved the proposal. Fred Wittenburg of the Hill Country Community Action Association composed of Mills, San Saba, Mason and Llano counties ask the court to provide a portion of a \$10,000 guarantee for administrative expenses for this next year.

Mills County's part came to \$2200 which represents 22 percent of the amount ask for. The Hill Country Community Action

Nearly \$100,000 Lost To Predators In Mills County

A total of \$99,530 were reported in losses of livestock to predator animals in Mills Co. during 1972.

Six hundred and five survey sheets were issued to local livestock producers and only 212 of them have sent in the reports. Therefore when the total 605 survey sheets have been completed and returned the total amount of livestock losses will be much greater than that of the reported \$99,530.

Only 128 producers have reported no losses of livestock to predators.

The total number of losses to predators are as follows: 2,456 head of sheep or goats lost to coyotes; 13 head of calves lost to coyotes and 755 head of sheep, goats or calves lost to other predators such as red fox, bobcats and buzzards.

If the producers had not quit the business on account of the predator problem they would have raised the following anticipated number of animals: 3,615 head of sheep and 1,940 head of goats.

Predators have been controlled this year by shooting (64), trapping (80), snares (10) and other methods (15).

Total losses of livestock other than that to predators were sheep a total of 279 lost; goats, 150 lost and calves, 3

Council Reviews Voter List, Park Equipment Discussed

The Goldthwaite City Council met in regular session Monday night and heard a request by mayor candidate Kellis Landrum to check the list of voters who voted in the city election Saturday and check for their voter registration certificates.

The list, containing some 80 names was checked against the official poll list from Mills Co. Tax Assessor-Collector's Office and no discrepancies were discovered. Landrum was defeated by incumbent Ray Duren by a margin of only 20 votes in the Saturday election. Following the check the council unanimously accepted the election and verified its results.

In other Council business Carol Graves, Young Homemaker president, asked the council to request that the Goldthwaite Cable Vision Company supply the Goldthwaite customers with an educational television channel. City Secretary, Glynn Collier, was asked to write Mr. Dean Bagley of San Saba, owner of the firm, about the subject. Mrs. Graves also talked to the Council about play ground equipment for Mills County Park and said that the Young Homemakers already had some money to purchase playground equipment and said that a fund drive could be conducted to purchase more equipment.

At the request of the Self Culture Club of Goldthwaite, the Council unanimously voted to provide \$40 per month to supplement the salary of the Librarian at the Jennie Trent Dow Library

in Goldthwaite. Mrs. Mae Featherston was selected as the Librarian. The Mills County Commissioners' Court also provides a like figure for the Librarian.

The quarterly operating report of the city was read by City Manager Don Petty and approved.

The proposal of an addition named Chaparral Estate by James and Tommie Sue Boykin was accepted by the council. The addition is located adjacent to highway 84 in the eastern section of the city.

Mayor Ray Duren, Councilmen, Ancel Morgan, Lester Geeslin, and Donald Padgett were present for the meeting. Councilmen Hollis Wiggins and Jimmy Smith were absent.

Ray Standley, Elmo Watson Victors In Local School Trustee Election Saturday

Several new faces will be appearing at the school board meetings following the school trustee elections held this past Saturday.

Ray Standley polled 270 votes in order to be placed on the Goldthwaite School Board. Elmo Watson was re-elected by a total of 165 votes. Standley will fill the position left open by LeeRoy Stacy's expired term.

Other candidates and number of votes they received were James Reese, 109; Clarence Miller, 66; Johnny Truitt, 62 and LeRoy Miller, 1.

W. V. Horton, Jr. and Dean Kincheloe were both re-elected to their posts on the Star School Board. They both polled 29 votes each. This race was not contested.

HPC Band Schedules Tour

A six day tour of north central Texas has been scheduled by the Howard Payne College Symphony Band beginning April 13.

Twelve performances are scheduled during the tour including concerts in Wichita Falls, Hurst, and Fort Worth.

Other cities on the band's itinerary include Comanche, Sulphur Springs, Wylie, Terrell, Bridgeport, Argyle, Bowie and Seymour. A final concert will be performed in Brownwood on April 19, at the First Christian Church.

This is the fourth tour of the spring season for the band which has appeared recently in several West Texas cities, in New Mexico and at gatherings in the Dallas-Fort Worth area.

The group, which will perform sacred and popular music selections, has 84 student musicians.

Local band members are Miss Barbara Williams and Miss Edith Browning of Goldthwaite.

Barbara is the daughter of Mrs. Vivian Williams and a sophomore major in elementary education at Howard Payne. She is a graduate of Goldthwaite High School in 1971 and plays bass clarinet in the college band.

AUSTIN, TEXAS — The complex job of rewriting the 97-year-old State Constitution began officially last week with initial work sessions of the new Constitutional Revision Commission.

Commissioners outlined plans for a series of public hearings in 18 areas.

The hearings will be held between now and next fall in Houston, Dallas-Fort Worth, San Antonio, Corpus Christi, McAllen, San Angelo, Lubbock, Longview, Wichita Falls, El Paso, Amarillo, Abilene, Midland-Odessa, Laredo, Tyler, Lubbock, Beaumont-Port Arthur-Orange and Austin.

Chairman Robert W. Calvert, former Texas Supreme Court judge, said the hearings may "determine largely whether the people accept the final product."

The 37-member Commission heard advice from a large group of experts, then divided into seven sub-committees to study specific areas of the Constitution which one of the advisors labeled an "appalling" document.

Revision Commissioners received these key bits of advice: + Do the best job they can of streamlining the Constitution, but be prepared for the Legislature to "water down their recommendations."

+ Don't try "to solve the problems but make clear who solves the problems."

+ Sweep out detailed property tax provisions....get rid of the grants and loans prohibition and provide "home rule" for counties.

The Commission will be backed up by a statewide advisory committee.

Revision drafts must be completed by November. The Legislature will convene January 1 as a constitutional convention.

MEETINGS BILL PASSES — An amended version of legislation to strengthen state laws requiring that the business of state government be conducted in public has been finally passed by the Senate.

A much-revised version of the bill to shield newsmen's sources of information, meanwhile, advanced to the Senate calendar with Jurisprudence Committee blessing.

The Texas Joint Media Committee representatives and the "Common Cause," the people's lobby, termed the open meetings bill as passed by the Senate an improvement over both present law and the Jurisprudence Committee bill.

One controversial section of the latter was amended to allow closed sessions on "negotiated contracts" only for gifts or donations to the government. The bill would allow private sessions of governing bodies to discuss purchase, exchange, lease or value of real estate — but not the sale of property. Also stricken from the Committee bill was a provision for closed sessions with attorneys on "possible avoidance of litigation."

Remaining as exemptions from open meetings guarantees are a wide range of discussions of personnel matters including "employment evaluation."

The revised shield bills would allow forced disclosure of information and sources on mandamus by the State Supreme Court which could be sought by any individual to prevent "substantial harm or injury....or substantial injustice."

VEE REVACCINATION — Tex. Veterinary Medical Association called for immediate revaccination of all horses for Venezuelan Equine Encephalomyelitis (VEE).

The Association said 100 per cent immunity can be established and reservoirs of the disease eliminated. It urged revaccination of all horses vaccinated in 1971, vaccination of all newborns, those six months of age and older and those coming into the state. Length of immunity is uncertain.

COURTS SPEAK — Persons who have sexual relations with wives or husbands of others can be sued for damages, the State Supreme Court held.

The High Court turned down an appeal of a Dallas lawyer who lost his license after a jury found he asked a client for \$500 more than his legal fee, allegedly to prosecute an assistant district attorney.

The Supreme Court set a hearing April 25 over whether Austin could sell 32 acres of park land to a school district without an approving vote of local residents.

The Court of Criminal Appeals overturned convictions for sale of heroin (an 1,800 year sentence from Ector County) and possession of marijuana (25 year sentence from Tarrant County) due to judicial error.

A Lipscomb County youth

ordered fined and jailed for aggravated assault on a deputy sheriff he called a "pig" won a new trial on appeal to the Court of Criminal Appeals, which held the boy's contention that he was resisting what he considered unlawful arrest should have been presented to the trial jury.

AG OPINIONS — A bill (HB 168) proposing to give the governor budgetary authority over state agencies and require submission of quarterly expenditure plans is unconstitutional, Atty. Gen. John Hill held.

Hill said, however, the legislature might confer on the governor's discretion to approve or disapprove expenditures of funds appropriated to restructured agencies discharging only duties which could be constitutionally discharged by the governor.

In other recent opinions, Hill held:

+ A district judge has discretion to grant a prisoner credit for pretrial time spent in jail between trial and final conviction and must give credit for time spent in jail awaiting determination of appeal. However, he cannot reduce a sentence due to good behavior and prisoner reform.

+ Hunting club employees can carry firearms but unless they are law enforcement officers have no more right to enforce the law or to protect the club property than any other individual.

+ An individual convicted of a felony three years ago, and is now on probation, is not qualified to be appointed a deputy sheriff.

FIRMS TO BE HONORED — Five industrial firms will receive the governor's industrial expansion award for 1972 at a conference here May 10.

Selected to receive the 1972 awards at the Governor's Conference on Industrial Expansion are Stemo Manufacturing Co. of Longview, Redman Mobile Homes Inc. of Burleson, Lanchart Homes of Childress, Can-Tex Industries of Mineral Wells and Weber Aircraft of Gainesville.

All were named by local chambers of commerce and selected by Texas Industrial Commission based on economic and civic contributions to their communities during last year.

APPOINTMENTS — James F.

Ray was named executive director of the Constitutional Revision Commission, taking a leave of absence as staff director of the Texas Advisory Commission on Intergovernmental Relations.

Mrs. Donald E. Redmond of Austin was selected as Texas Mother of the Year for 1973.

SHORT SNORTS

Texas bank deposits are at a new high, but the index of business activity declined four per cent in February according to a University of Texas bureau of business research analysis.

The governor endorsed the right of citizens to sue environmental polluters.

Briscoe, in his first big test of muscle with the Legislature, threatened to veto police-fire collective bargaining legislation unless a clear local option feature was attached.

A House sub-committee has endorsed a bill to allow minors to obtain contraceptives and treatment for pregnancy without parental consent.

Eighteen-year-olds can serve on juries under a bill cleared by the Legislature.

A federal task force attempted to brief state officials on a new presidential budget ceilings and revenue sharing proposals but didn't provide many specifics.

Parks and Wildlife officials will consider new hunting and fishing regulations for 1973-74 at a meeting here April 26.

A bill to set up a "Little Hoover Commission" on reorganization of the executive branch of state approval and now goes to the House for consideration.

New state bank charters are being sought in Houston, Austin and Comanche.

Of 7,572 roadside park facilities in the nation, 1,059 are located in Texas, according to a U. S. Department of Transportation survey.

The Sabinal Canyon area (1,280 acres) in Bandera and Real Counties has been purchased by the Parks and Wildlife Department for \$512,000.

August and September primary election dates received Senate approval.

City officials are urging Gov. Briscoe to recall a bill granting collective bargaining rights to policemen and firemen for amendment.

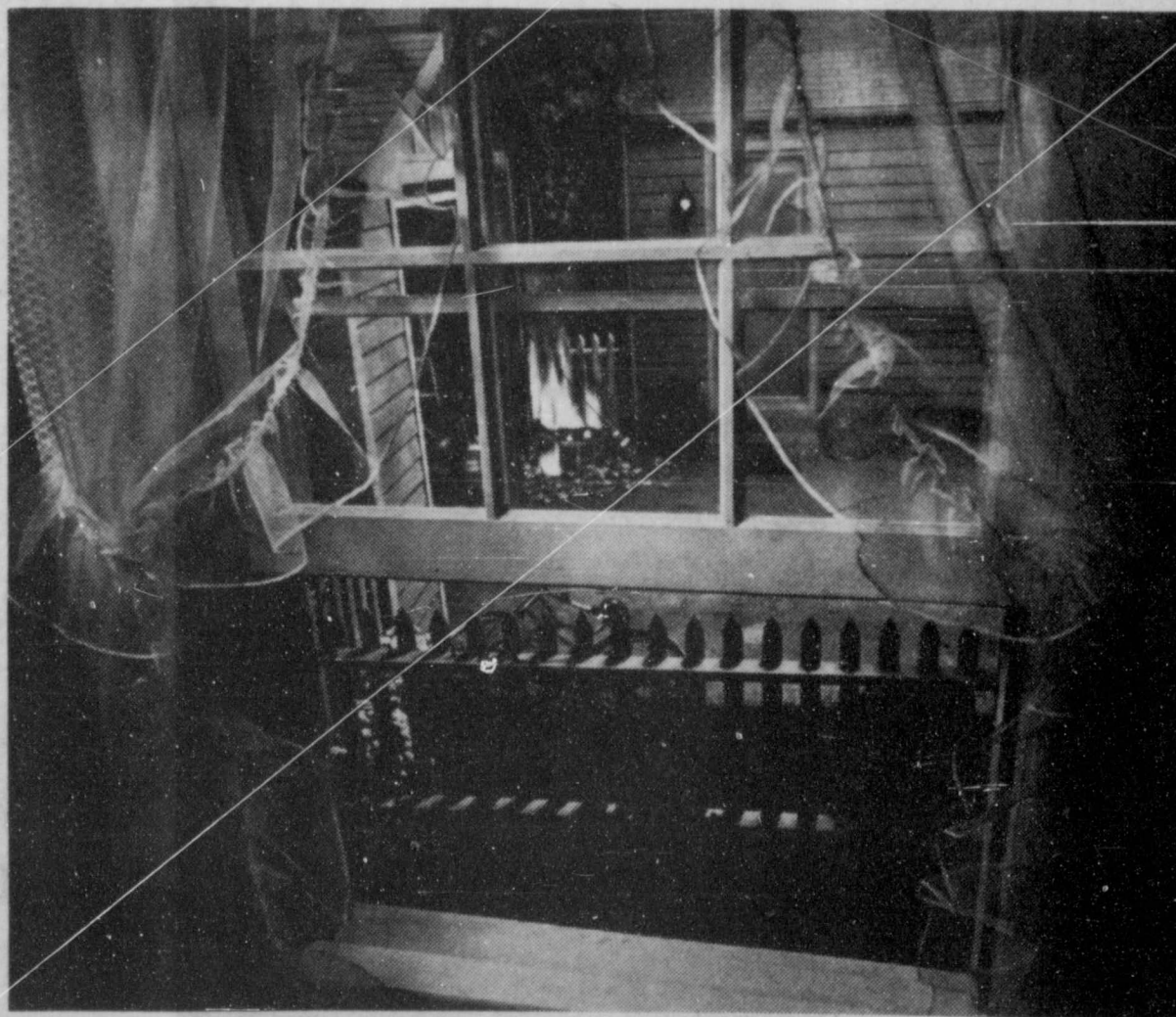

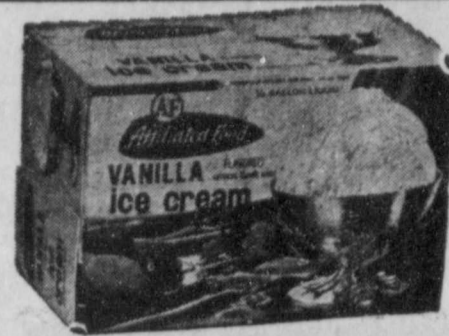

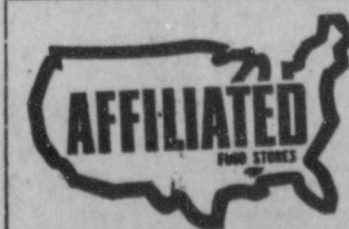

Doings by DANIEL

Control of sucking and chewing insects in home gardens means healthier, more productive gardens. Sucking insects damage plants by inserting their mouthparts into plant tissue and removing plant juices. Heavily infested plants become yellowed, wilted, deformed or stunted and may die. Some examples of sucking insects are aphids, leafhoppers, stinkbugs, squash bugs, thrips, and spider mites.

Chewing insects cause more damage to the home garden than either soil insects or sucking insects. They feed on all parts of plants. Some chewing insects include grasshoppers, leafminers, potato beetles, flea beetles, cucumber beetles, blister beetles, pepper weavils, vegetable weevils, corn earworms, cabbage loopers, tomato hornworms, webworms, and others.

Chemical dusts are very effective in controlling both types of insects. Apply dusts when wind is calm and force dust through the foliage so to reach both sides of leaves. Sprays are also effective.

Among recommended insecticides are diazinon and malathion. For spider mites, Kelthane, ethion, and sulfur are recommended. Sevin will control chewing insects but only some sucking insects.

Special attention should be given to restrictions on the length of time from last application of any insecticide to harvesting.

Cattle grubs causes millions of dollars of loss to the livestock industry each year. Livestock owners need to practice

good management in controlling the losses due to the cattle grub. Spraying cattle now (if not already) and then again in May with the systemic insecticide Co-Ral will do an adequate job of controlling the grub. Mixture of 8 lbs. of 25 per cent Co-Ral wettable powder per 100 gallons of water and thoroughly wet each animal to the skin is effective.

A Pecan Budding and Grafting Workshop open to the public will be held in Goldthwaite by the Extension Service on April 24. This workshop will be very informative and beneficial to anyone interested in pecan production. Additional information will be in next week's issue.

FROM THE STATE CAPITOL

House Bill 9 passed the House unanimously Wednesday. The purpose of the bill is to prevent bribery with intent to influence votes for Speaker of the House of Representatives. Generally, the existing statutes punish bribery transactions involving any legislative, judicial, or executive official of the State. This bill is an addition to the existing statutes. It defines legislative bribery and makes it a felony punishable by confinement in the penitentiary for 2-5 years. It is my hope that this Act will promote more openness in the election of the Speaker of the House and will relieve some of the pressures on individual members.

H. B. 260 passed the House Tuesday. This bill is concerned with the conservation and management of nongame fish and wildlife and defines the provisions for classification of endangered species. At present there is no general law of the State of Texas for the protection of the animals mentioned above, though various Federal laws do exist.

Although I am in favor of the main points of the bill, I felt it necessary to vote against it because of certain sections whose ramifications are unclear at this time. The major problem of the bill, as I see it, is the uncertainty of its effect on predator control—a matter of grave concern to Texas ranchers.
