AUSTIN, TEXAS — Car and home owners had encouraging promises of lower insurance rates from high-level sources last week.

+ Gov. Dolph Briscoe threw his weight behind a modified form of competitive auto insurance rating, subject of an unsuccessful special legislative session last year.

+ The State Board of Insurance issued new rules and regulations which it pledged would bring lower rates for fire, homeowners and extended coverage policies.

Basically, what both plans would do is permit companies to deviate from the standard rates issued annually by the Board. A bill introduced in the House and Senate undertook to permit the auto deviations either below or above the standard rate on showing that companies could make the change without endangering their solvency.

Companies would apply to the Board for deviated rates, and reductions (or increases) would be permitted if they meet tests of fairness to customers and financial stability for the companies.

While Briscoe expressed confidence the bill, if enacted, would mean substantial rate cuts, some remained skeptical that the so-called high-risk driver wouldn't pay more under it.

Rate deviations on property insurance are permissible under state law and can be implemented by the Board's regulations.

Meanwhile, the House concurred in Senate amendments and sent to Briscoe HB 143 which would authorize \$2,500 medical payment and loss-of-income coverage for auto passengers. The coverage would be included in all liability policies unless specifically rejected. Whether the new law would help lower or raise rates was a subject of debate.

MEETINGS LAW SIGNED — Governor Briscoe signed into law legislation (HB 3) to strengthen open meetings and predicted it will bring more "responsiveness and openness" to government. Stiffer fines and jail term are provided for violators. The new man's shield bill to protect confidential sources of information went to conference committee, as expected, and an

attorney general's opinion concluded parts of the Senate revision are unconstitutional.

A Senate committee version of a new lobby control act was rapped by House Speaker Price Daniel Jr. as a "step backward" and by "Common Cause," the people's lobby, as "a joke." Changes were predicted after critics said the Senate panel bill is weaker than the 1957 act.

The Senate, meanwhile, passed another of Daniel's so-called reform bills prohibiting "legislative bribery" in exchange for support of a candidate for speaker.

JOB DISCRIMINATION REPORTED — Minority group members who work for the state generally hold lower-paying jobs, even though their employment level has improved somewhat, Texas Legislative Council reported in a new survey on ethnic groups in government.

The Council found the percentage of Negroes working for the state has risen from 9.20 per cent of the total number of employees five years ago to 10.09 per cent, and the percentage of state employees with Spanish surnames from 7.8 per cent in 1968 to 9.02 per cent in 1972. Blacks comprise about 12.5 per cent of the state population and Mexican-Americans more than 18 per cent.

A group of legislators, responding to the report, scheduled a series of meetings with state agencies which they claimed demonstrate "discriminatory employment practices" directed against blacks, Mexican-Americans and women. Department of Public Safety officials told the legislators they may begin recruiting women law enforcement officers and that they are doing their best to hire qualified minority group members.

COURTS SPEAK — A Tyler youth fined after being arrested in a nude swimming incident won a reversal in the Court of Criminal Appeals.

The same Court reversed the conviction of a Dallas underground newspaper editor on charges of interfering with a policeman during a park disturbance.

The Supreme Court held a Silvestro man is entitled to \$3,000 damages for tornado loss of household goods though the insurance policy on the house

he resided in was in the name of his employer.

The Third Court of Civil Appeals directed Temple Independent School District to reinstate a dismissed school teacher as ordered earlier by Education Commissioner J. W. Edgar.

The Court of Criminal Appeals ordered a new trial for a Dallas housewife who shot her husband to death because a confession should not have been admitted as evidence.

A Houston district court ordered ARMOCO Steel Corporation's Houston Works to pay \$125,000 in civil penalties for water pollution, and ordered treatment facility modifications.

APPOINTMENTS — Mrs. Ann Chappell of Fort Worth was named to the new Constitutional Revision Commission which held a two-day meeting here last week. Governor Briscoe announced these recent appointments:

O. T. Moore Jr. of Lockhart, Joseph Patrick Kelly of Victoria and John C. Taylor of Seguin (reappointments) to the Guadalupe-Blanco River Authority Board of Directors.

Frank Douthitt, Henrietta, to the Midwestern University board of directors.

Mrs. Henry (Nancy) Ewald of Seguin as a member of the Commission on Services to Children and Youth.

Briscoe also named a 28-member drug abuse advisory council to assist in drug prevention activities, including development of a state drug abuse plan.

POLLUTION BILL PASSED — A bill to allow local units of government to issue revenue bonds to finance air pollution control facilities for lease to industry have approval of both houses.

Cities, counties, villages, river authorities and other special districts could issue the bonds. Facilities would not be exempt from property taxation.

Texas, meanwhile, was faced with an April 15 deadline set by the federal government for implementation of its clean air plan. No restrictions on autos were found necessary by the Air Control Board.

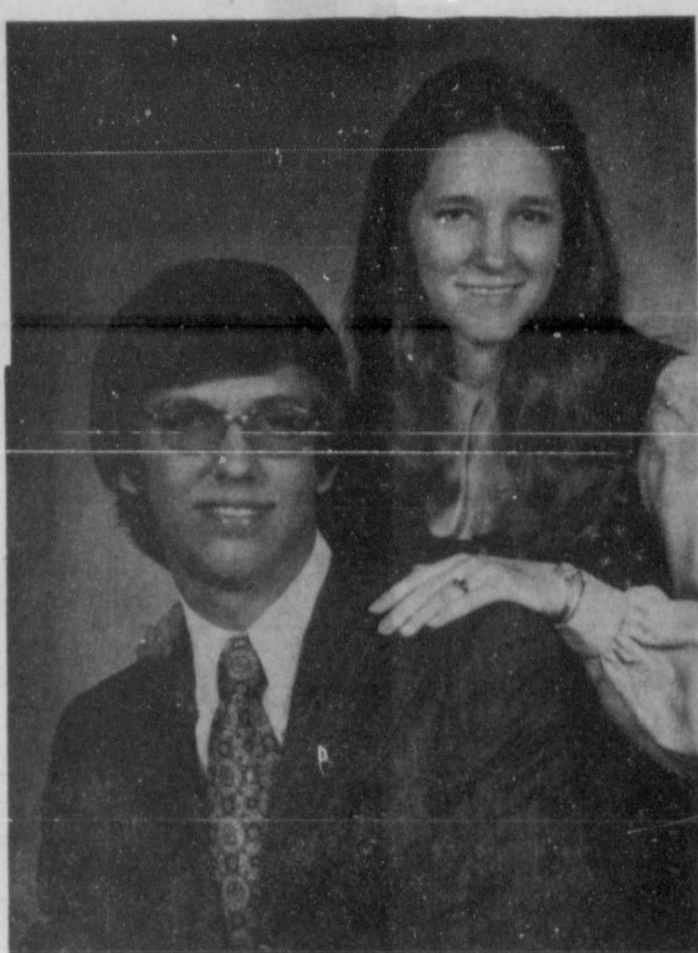

Motorists Required To Stop For School Buses

AUSTIN — A reminder on the State law about motorists stopping for school buses was issued today by Colonel Wilson E. Speir, director of the Texas Department of Public Safety.

Speir said the law, which applies on city streets as well as rural highways requires motorists moving in either direction on the same roadway or street with a school bus to stop and remain stopped as long as the flashing top red lights on the bus are in operation.

He said the problem is becoming more serious in cities due to increased use of school buses in urban school districts.

There are only two exceptions to the law on stopping for loading or unloading a school bus: Those vehicles on another roadway of a divided highway (divided by median or physical barrier) are not required to stop, and stops are not required if the bus has stopped in a loading zone of a controlled access highway where pedestrians are not permitted to cross.

Speir said the problem of school bus accidents is of concern to law enforcement officials and educators throughout Texas. Only a few weeks ago the Travis County Grand Jury urged the news media to publicize the law about stopping and not passing a school bus which is loading or unloading children.

The grand jury noted that serious criminal charges might result if a motorist disregards this law.

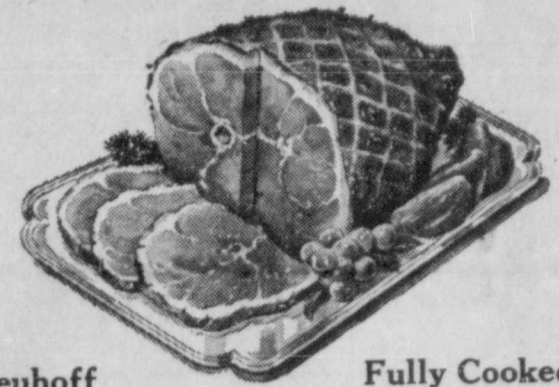

A Miracle Drug-Communication

A wise public health official once made a startling statement about cancer: "If someone invented a drug that would cure half of all cancer cases the excitement would be beyond belief. We have such a drug: it is communication."

The truth of that statement lies in the fact that half of all those with cancer could be cured if the disease were found soon enough and received prompt treatment. At present, only one-third are being saved, mainly because people don't go to the doctor in time for early diagnosis.

So we are faced with a massive problem of communication and motivation. What this means in terms of human lives is that more than 108,000 cancer patients died last year who might

have been saved by earlier and better treatment.

During the month of April, the American Cancer Society conducts its annual educational and fund-raising Crusade. Volunteers will be spreading the word that annual health checkups, including cancer tests, can save lives. They will be distributing leaflets which tell about cancer's seven warning signals.

The volunteers will ask you for funds to support the American Cancer Society's threefold program of education, research and service to cancer patients. They will urge you to have a health checkup now - if you have not already had one - and do so every year.

We urge you to do both.

Dr. Ray Skipping Finds Home In State Capital

AUSTIN - His roots are in West Texas, but Dr. Ray Skipping seems to have found his new home in Austin working to pave the way for control of thermonuclear fusion in the future.

"I always think about going back to see the place again," said Dr. Skipping, who was born in Gorman and attended grade school and high school in Iraan.

"But there is not much to do in West Texas as a physicist," said Dr. Skipping, who is one of many scientists from throughout the world who are working with the Texas Tokamak project at the University of Texas at Austin.

Work with aspects of the Texas Tokamak, a project which seeks to convert the nuclear fusion into electric power, was a natural

outgrowth of Dr. Skipping's experience at the University of Texas, where he received his B.S. Masters and PhD in physics.

Dr. Skipping, who is currently working with the theoretical aspects of heating plasma with radio frequency waves, first became involved with the subject when working on his dissertation.

There are two parts to the problem of heating plasma with radio frequency waves, he explained. First, "how do you get the power into the plasma?" and second, "what happens to the plasma when it is in?"

The researchers attempt to heat the plasma to the point where plasma ions fuse and "when that happens, you have more energy

then you put in and you have a power source."

The concept behind the Tokamak experiment began in 1957, with the idea of utilizing the 100-million degree (Centigrade) heat of hydrogen fusion. Working at the first such study at the Imperial College in London were Dr. William E. Drummond, director of the Center for Plasma Physics and Thermonuclear Research and Alan Ware. The two are the only individuals among 40 at the UT Research Center who are over 35 years old.

At that time researchers in Russia, England, France, Germany and the United States made their goal the holding of a plasma at 100 million degrees for one second. That is the temperature at which it will kindle and make more energy than it consumes.

Following years of various theories, in 1967, the Russian scientists tested their Tokamak. They held it for one hundredth of a second and for the first time, managed to predict the length of time.

In Texas, however, the plans were being laid for the formation of a Texas Tokamak. Texas Power companies which had been financing basic research through a private laboratory in California concurred with Dr. Norman Hackerman, the UT president now president of Rice University, that because of the long-range nature of the project they needed to raise a new generation of scientists and engineers.

A campus-based laboratory was needed to do this and the operation with the 10 power companies, contributions got under way on the UT campus in 1966. It tackled the problem of the control of turbulence and, because the young scientists were recruited or trained right here at home, the UT center became a center of the western world's knowledge of turbulence.

Experimentalist joined theoretician in the center to test the concept that if you make the gas turbulent, you can heat it higher and faster. Subsequently, design and construction got underway on the Texas Tokamak, which combines the hot gas in an electromagnetic field with Texas theories on heating.

Currently, the experiments are in miniature, but the next stage will be full-scale firings, once the present Texas Tokamak reaches its goal of one-twentieth of a second.

"El Toro Grande," ten times bigger, would be the next step and could be in operation five or six years from now if it receives proper authorization and financing.

The future will depend on whether the Texas Tokamak reaches its range and whether the Texas Legislature, electric utility companies, the Atomic Energy Commission and the National Science Foundation continue to provide funds for the expensive experiments.

While Dr. Skipping explained that the aspect he is involved in, radio frequency heating, needs "a good deal more study," he said there have been "some interesting experimental results."

"The implication is perhaps we have an effective means of heating plasma and that is very important as far as fusion is concerned."

The study is an ongoing process, Dr. Skipping explained. "You find out one thing and it leads to another question."

So, for the meantime at least, Dr. Skipping will be working in Austin but the contacts with West Texas Country are still there. His parents, Mr. and Mrs. Charles Allan Skipping, who taught school in Iraan for 15 years and also taught in the Goldthwaite Public Schools are now retired in Goldthwaite.

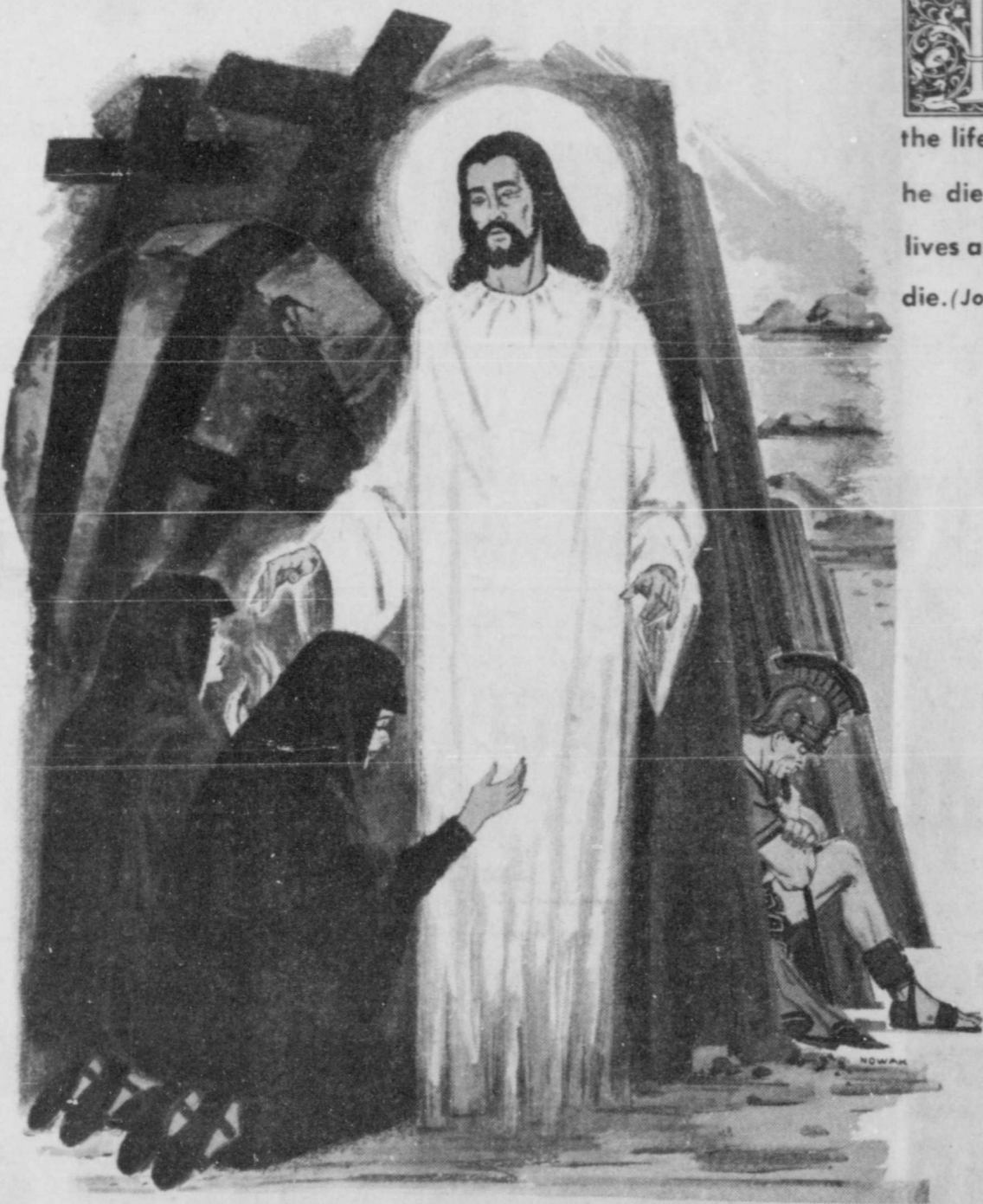
