Council Okays Ceiling Increase For LCRA

The Goldthwaite City Council, at a special called meeting Monat a special called meeting work day night, unanimously approved the removal of a ceiling on the price that the Lower Colorado River Authority uses to base its electric rates.

LCRA had notified all its wholesale electricity customers of a possible shortage of natural gas and the necessary conversion to fuel oil. LCRA pointed out that this conversion would be more since oil costs more to handle than gas.

"he city gave LCRA a go-ahead to raise their rates to insure citizens electricity. It as pointed out that the rate in rease would be very much

better than a curtailment of electric power. Mayor Ray Duren and City Manager Don Petty will be pres-ent at meetings in Austin this week with LCRA discussing this critical problem.
