### Council Okays Ceiling Increase For LCRA

The Goldthwaite City Council, at a special called meeting Monday night, unanimously approved the removal of a ceiling on the price that the Lower Colorado River Authority uses to base its electric rates.

LCRA had notified all its wholesale electricity customers of a possible shortage of natural gas and the necessary conversion to fuel oil. LCRA pointed out that this conversion would be more costly than the present practice, since oil costs more to handle than gas.

The city gave LCRA a go-ahead to raise their rates to insure citizens electricity.

It was pointed out that the rate increase would be very much better than a curtailment of electric power.

Mayor Ray Duren and City Manager Don Petty will be present at meetings in Austin this week with LCRA discussing this critical problem.

### Students Report Cards Available Friday, May 25

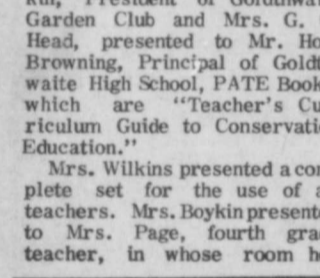

## 8,000 Mile Bicycle Trip

James G. Gordon of Tucson, Arizona is visiting a few days in Goldthwaite with his mother, Mrs. Carolyn Laughlin, after completing the first 1,000 miles of his planned 8,000 mile bicycle trip across the Southern United States to Florida up through Pennsylvania and New York, on into Canada back down through Iowa,

then back up into Canada, down through Wyoming and Utah, across Nevada to California and back to Tucson.

Gordon recently completed two years in Pennsylvania as a Missionary of The Church of Jesus Christ of Latter Day Saints. He plans to visit friends he made there.

James attended the University of Arizona. While at the Church of Jesus Christ of Latter Day Saints Institute of Religion at the University, he met and became engaged to Joan Curtis of St. David, Ariz. She has helped him considerably in planning this trip which has been his dream since he was 15. Also on his trip, he plans to visit 13 Mormon Temples located in Washington D. C., Kirtland, Ohio, Alberta, Canada, Idaho, Utah, California and Arizona.

Traveling on his special built English 10-speed bike he carries equipment that includes a tent, sleeping bag, tools, packs of food, cooking gear, vitamins, salt pills and a bottle of honey for energy. He averages from 15 to 20 miles an hour and has a top speed of about 30 miles per hour, which is really traveling considering himself, bicycle and equipment weighs a total of 260 pounds.

He visits Church members in various towns camping in their back yards. Besides working his way on this trip he will rely on the friendship of people on his stops along his route. Gordon has found that all people are basically good and will help you if you need it.

He said he "really enjoys" the trip so far. "It gives you a sense of satisfaction to meet your goal each day and to be able to live with yourself."

He already has had some excitement on the trip, such as nearly running out of water on the white sands desert in New Mexico, enduring 34 degree cold, rain and wind in the Sacramento Mountains also in N. M. with only a light rain suit for protection and nearly being blown off the road by the draft from big trucks.

"I will probably have a lot of exciting things happen before the trip is over" assures Gordon, who will be 22 years old in June. Gordon also has helped persons in trouble while on the highways along his route. A woman had a flat and discovered that her spare tire also lost much of its air while unused in the trunk. So Gordon pumped up the spare tire with his bike pump. He also took several hours of his time to help a man when the wheel came off the house trailer he was pulling. In Hobbs, N. M., he helped in the bicycle licensing program at the schools. He also gave talks of his bike trip at Lions Club and Rotary Clubs. 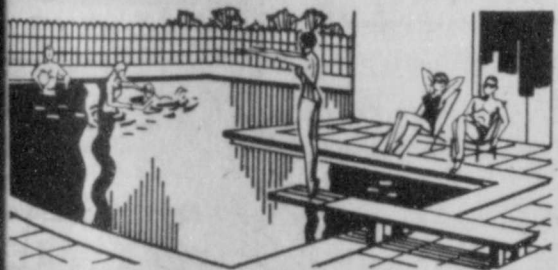

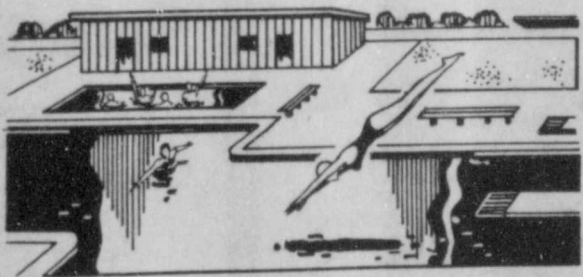

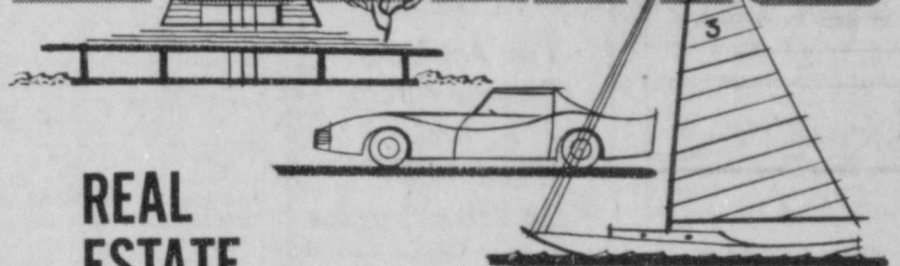

### Dateline — Washington

On yesterday, our Committee asked a number of representatives of Departments and of private industry to come up and explain the fuel shortage. I am convinced that there is a real shortage, at least in refining capacity and in distribution, but I fear there is a very human tendency on the part of some of the companies to take advantage of the situation and squeeze out some of their competitors. The Agriculture Committee has no authority in this respect but we are trying to get commitments that both the companies and the government will take every possible step to see that our farm machinery has the fuel needed to operate. Should there be any widespread shortage of tractor fuel, it could, and undoubtedly would, result in substantially less production and therefore still higher food prices. We therefore believe that everyone who eats, not simply farmers, have a stake in enabling our farmers to get the fuel they need on the days they need it.

Earlier this week the House passed a bill which seems to me to clearly point up the contention that our real argument with the President is not one of how much we should spend but on what we should spend. In this case, though I felt they were wrong, the majority of the House decided to go with the President.

The President asked, and a majority of six agreed with him, that the United States finance 40 percent of the cost of a United Nations study of ecological problems over the world. To me this is totally unjustifiable in view of the President's action the first of this year in impounding \$210 million which Congress had appropriated to carry out this work at home. Nor do I think that we are ever justified in paying 40 percent of the costs of a United Nations program when we account for only about 10 percent of the population of nations in the UN, and particularly when those very nations are driving down the value of our dollars charging that we are overspending. If we have enough money to finance the removal of thorn brush in Tanzania, it would seem to me that we could afford to help Texas farmers remove mesquite and thereby improve production of needed beef at home.

If the other nations of the world don't think our dollars are worth

as much as their currencies are, then I can't believe we can afford to pay 40 percent of these costs. The basic law has long limited U. S. contributions to the UN to 25 percent, and in my opinion this is high. I, therefore, voted against this expenditure of U. S. money in foreign lands.

I am convinced that we can best serve the United States and the world by maintaining the solvency of this country and, as I see it, there is no possibility of strengthening the buying power of our dollars unless we are willing to bring the flow of dollars out of this country back into balance with what comes into this country.

Yesterday we completed five months' work of rebuilding the REA. This program has probably meant more to rural people than any other single governmental effort. It brought lights, power, telephones, and other conveniences to rural homes which could never have otherwise enjoyed these services. It did so by making credit available and on reasonable terms, but the cost of supplying this electricity is still much greater than in our cities.

The utility companies in our cities serve an average of more than 40 customers per mile. The rural electric cooperatives, who own almost one-half the total miles of line in the United States, serve only about three customers per mile. This is the basic reason why rural systems have needed help. It simply takes more miles of line to serve each customer. Neither has the public ever realized that even though most rural homes are now served that there are just as great demands on rural as on city systems for modernization and improvement. Several years ago the private power companies testified before our Committee that they expected to have to spend more than \$15 billion per year on plant and line improvements. The rural systems have got to spend comparable sums on improving their lines and plants. This means that the need for a source of credit still exists and growing daily.

The first of this year, the Administration announced that it would make no more loans under existing REA legislation. It did propose to loan some money at 5 percent from the Rural Development fund. It did not get around to actually advancing any money until last week. This has endangered many rural systems. The Administration was also anxious to shift these loans from direct Treasury funds to private funds insured or guaranteed by the government. This itself saves no money but it makes the budget look better. The Administration also wanted the Coops to pay a higher rate of interest. This will save the government some money and I felt that there was justification for higher interest rates in many cases. Many Coops can pay more but clearly some Coops cannot exist with higher rates.

Senator Humphrey and Congressman Denholm had introduced legislation simply trying to force the Administration to continue the 2 percent loans. I sought and was finally able to work out an arrangement whereby the Administration commits itself to continue to make as much as \$105 million a year available at 2 percent and to provide adequate funds for all cooperatives at higher rates — 5 percent in most cases. This gives the Administration the big things it wanted and it gives the REA financed cooperatives the assurance of adequate money at rates they can pay.

On yesterday, the House finally approved the conference report by a vote of 363 to 25. The President has just this afternoon signed the bill. I feel that this assures the continuation of this great program which had been brought so close to destruction.

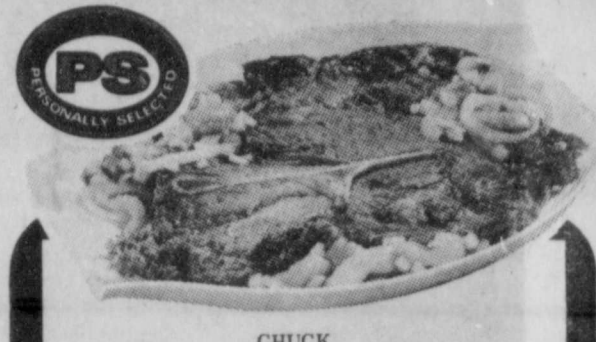

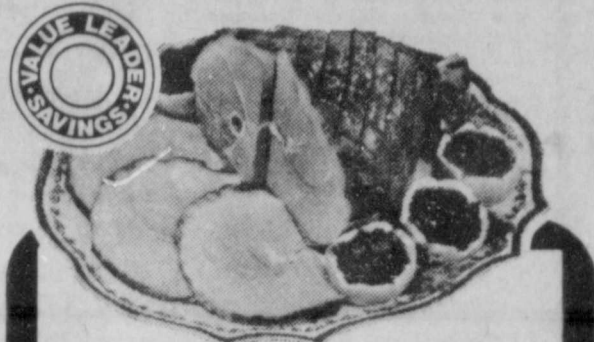

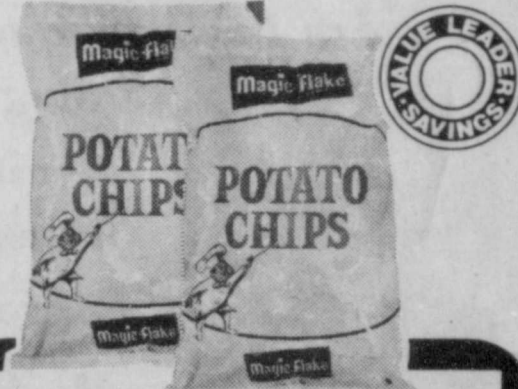
