Mills County Key '73 Evangelistic Crusade Set July 8-13

The most comprehensive evangelistic crusade ever to be held in Mills County is set for July 8-13, with nightly services at 8 p.m. at Eagle Field. Dr. Gaston Foote, evangelist for the Key '73 Crusade, will be Dr. Gaston Foote, pastor, professor and noted author of several books.

Leading the singing at the Key '73 Crusade will be Bill Sky-Eagle, a Paris, Texas native who is a graduate of Baylor University, and Southwestern Baptist Seminary in Fort Worth. He has served five Southern Baptist Churches: First Baptist, Whitney; First Baptist, Calvert; College Avenue Baptist, McGreggor; Alice Avenue Baptist, Waco and Clay Road Baptist, Houston. He is presently Music-Youth and Education director at Clay Road Baptist Church.

He was the Crusade Musician for Overseas Crusades in Spain in 1971 and Germany in 1973, and is also a recording artist on Eagle Records.

The Key '73 Crusade is a cooperative effort of most of the churches of Mills County to reach persons in the county with the message of Jesus Christ and has already begun with surveys and personal contacts with the public. The organization has been working for some weeks on the crusade with the general committees of the Crusade being made up of some sixty people, from several churches in the county.

Dr. Foote and Bill Sky-Eagle, will add much to the Crusade, but more will come from the citizens of Mills County each night of the crusade with participation and prayer.

Marine Seriously Injured In Collision

An eighteen year old marine stationed at Camp Pendleton, California, was seriously injured at 9:40 p.m. last Thursday night when his Suzuki motorcycle collided with a Ford Mustang driven by James Alton Rannels, 16 of Priddy.

The young soldier, David Leslie Culverhouse, returning to his Waco home from California was traveling east on highway when the Rannels youth pulled onto the highway from the old Priddy Road in Goldthwaite.

The motorcycle struck the Mustang's left front fender and Culverhouse was thrown over the car. Both his legs suffered multiple compound fractures and he also suffered numerous lacerations and bruises.

Investigating officer Ronnie Rush of Goldthwaite said the soldier's helmet possible saved his life.

Culverhouse was treated at Childress Hospital and transferred to Darnell Army Hospital, where he was further treated.

He is reported in fair condition, but one leg has severe complications. Rannels was treated at Childress Hospital for slight shock.

LCRA Receives Relief From Electric Shortage

The Lower Colorado River Authority and its 41 customers have received some relief from the shortage of natural gas to produce electricity, due to a change in classification from the Texas Railroad Commission this week.

The power company, previously rated at B2, now assumes an A2 rating, meaning they can get a higher percentage of their previous amount of gas or have no curtailment at all.

This ruling, however, as pointed out by the commission, is strictly temporary and the 30 cities and 11 cooperatives who buy from LCRA have to show that they are earnestly trying to cut back in electric usage, at least 30 per cent or lose the classification.

In a special memorandum from LCRA Monday, managers of the cooperatives and mayors of the cities were again reminded that they should continue, and expand, efforts to have all customers, including residences,

farms, stores, and homes, eliminate all unnecessary use of electricity. The methods to conserve electricity were outlined in previous issues of the Eagle by the City of Goldthwaite. Cities and Co-ops will have to provide LCRA with detailed reports on a weekly basis outlining the steps they have and are taking to obtain results in the conservation effort, so that these reports can be presented to the Railroad Commission at future hearings.

"HUMAN NEEDS"
The "Railroad Commission used as its reason for changing the classification the percentage of electricity sold to "human needs" customers. LCRA wants cities and cooperatives to compile statistics on this matter, hoping to show even more cause why the gas curtailment would be of great damage to the LCRA and eventually to the individual customers.

LCRA pointed out in the memorandum that as of June 7

there has been no gas curtailment and that during this time fuel oil reserves have been restored to maximum levels. LCRA has recently stored 3,185,806 gallons of fuel oil, bringing them to the maximum. The relief from the gas company underlined as strictly temporary, stating that LCRA may have to go on curtailment status at any time.

A final decision on the classifications will be rendered by the Railroad Commission at a July 9 hearing. Reports from this time back will be of great importance to the Commission.

LOCAL APPEAL
Mayor Ray Duren and City Manager Don Petty asked the customers of the City of Goldthwaite to please conserve electricity when ever and where ever possible, in order for the reports to show a 30 per cent decrease in electrical usage to LCRA and therefore to the Railroad Commission.

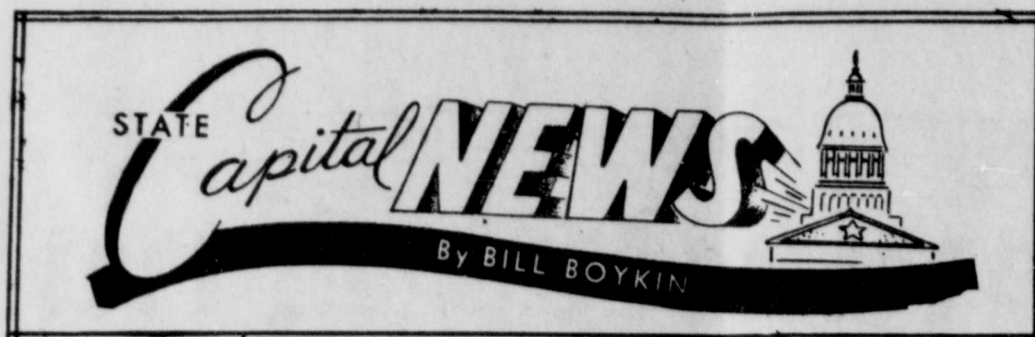

AUSTIN, TEXAS — Experts offer little hope for an early easing of the energy crisis, and Railroad Commission Chairman Jim Langdon warns a lot more oil and gas is being used than is being found.

A House committee studying the crisis heard a national authority's grim opinion that "there is no way out."

Dr. John McKetta, past chairman of the National Energy Policy Committee, said President Nixon should declare a national emergency, since it's too late for problem studies in the area.

Langdon told the same committee legislative efforts to cope with the problem will be frustrating because solutions must be sought at the national level.

Although the state regulatory agency has been permitting 100 per cent production for more than a year, Langdon said Texas producers are still falling short of demand for oil by 400,000 barrels a day, or roughly 10 per cent.

Atty. Gen. John Hill termed the situation "extremely critical," and said no other matter should receive more attention today.

As the commission set the July oil allowable at 100 per cent for the 16th straight month (with buyers seeking a record 3.8 million barrels a day), Langdon issued a new warning that only nine million barrels of oil a month are being added to Texas supplies while 105 million barrels are consumed in the same period.

"Unless this trend is reversed, the Texas oil and gas industry is in the process of self-liquidation," said Langdon.

Texas crude oil stocks as of June 8 were 94.7 million barrels, a decline of 7.2 million from 1972. Langdon asked for reports at the July commission meeting on the amount of oil companies discovered in 1972, and "somewhere along the line," he said, he will want to know "what it will take to find more" — and whether the industry will really be "able to stay in business."

FUTURE HIGHWAY NEEDS — Mass transit needs should be financed from its own funds, not from highway funds, Roy Chapin Jr., Board Chairman of American Motors Corporation, told Texas Good Roads Association members and the Texas Highway Users' Conference here last week.

"Highway construction and maintenance needs during the next 20 years will be \$600,000,000,000 in the United States," he explained. "Mass transit needs will total \$50,000,000,000 for rail construction and development and \$13,000,000,000 for bus transportation."

"Highways are still the basic answer for urban transportation needs. The Department of Transportation says by 1990 that 92 per cent of transportation will be on roads and streets — with only eight per cent on bus and railroad facilities."

Chapin, who is chairman of the board of the National Highway Users Federation, spoke to a partisan audience, but his statistics impressed neutral observers about the need for political unity in the current struggle between eastern states and the rest of the nation for current highway user funds.

"HUD says that population density will continue to drop in urban areas," Chapin concluded. "Travel patterns will be from suburban home to suburban jobs. Buses and car pools can start lowering congestion — but highways are still important to those methods of transportation."

He spoke against "crisis" legislation because of the "current misunderstanding and misinformation on the so-called energy crisis. Some restrictive actions may be taken in the name of crisis, increased tax on gas, excise taxes and personal property taxes on automobiles," Chapin added.

AMENDMENTS PROPOSED — Nine more proposed constitutional amendments will appear on the November 6 general election ballot — just a couple of months before the Legislature sits as a constitutional convention.

The amendments for the November ballot are: SJR 8 — proposing a \$15,000 a year salary for legislators and annual legislative sessions.

SJR 13 — extending the \$3,000 property tax exemption to home-steads of unmarried adults.

SJR 29 — authorizing cities to levy ad valorem taxes sufficient to pay the principle and interest on general obligation bonds.

HJR 6 — providing an additional \$100 million for the Veterans Land Program.

SJR 1 — establishing new requirements for conservation and

reclamation districts. SJR 25 — exempting water supply cooperative property from taxes.

SJR 26 — giving district courts concurrently with county courts general jurisdiction of probate courts.

SJR 12 — providing for financing of seawalls by bonds. HJR 7 — similar to SJR 13, plus exemption of property from forced sale.

DISASTER AID SOUGHT — Extensive property damage due to floods in eight Southeast Texas counties led Governor Briscoe to ask that they be designated as disaster areas.

Counties were Harris, Galveston, Brazoria, Jasper, Hardin, Liberty, Montgomery and San Jacinto.

Briscoe's request to President Nixon was backed by U. S. Sen. John Tower. Designation would make the flood victims eligible for long-term loans from the Small Business Administration.

APPOINTMENTS — House Speaker Price Daniel Jr., leaving on a Caribbean vacation, named Rep. Carl Parker of Port Arthur as speaker pro tempore to preside over the House during his absence.

Lt. Gov. Bill Hobby appointed Sen. Nelson W. Wolff of San Antonio chairman of the Senate planning committee for the 1974 constitutional convention.

Governor Briscoe selected Sam Callan of El Paso a judge of the new 210th district court effective September 1.

Briscoe picked as judges of new Dallas courts Oswin Chrisman, Thomas B. Thorpe and Richard D. Mays. Chrisman, named to a domestic relations court, took office immediately.

Mays and Thorpe's appointments to district benches are effective September 1.

Roy Mays Jr. of Port Arthur is new special assistant to the executive director for public affairs of the Texas Criminal Justice Council.

AG OPINIONS — University authorities and courts must determine if student service fees are used properly to benefit students, Attorney General Hill held.

In other recent opinions, Hill concluded: + A new law designed to prevent conflicts of interest among water control district directors is probably unconstitutional, but part of it is valid and will stand court test.

+ The legislature may add as a condition to tax exemption that a corporation have a current exemption from the federal income tax.

+ A proposal to grant the 43rd district court of Parker County overall supervision of the dockets of the Parker County court and allow it to assign to the county bench a suit filed in district court would be unconstitutional.

COURTS SPEAK — The State Supreme Court upheld lower courts that owners of 73.7 acres in Wylie school district should have their land annexed to the Abilene district.

High court also agreed a Lubbock metal shop owner should get a jury trial to determine the amount of insurance he was entitled to collect for repairs of tornado damage.

The Court of Criminal Appeals reversed a Dallas County conviction for flag desecration due to improper prosecution arguments and use of inflammatory words.

The Supreme Court upheld lower court findings that a Carrizo Springs store clerk was entitled to no punitive damages due to being slapped by retired Texas Ranger Capt. A. Y. Allee. The clerk got \$500 actual damages.

RIGHTS BILL SIGNED — Young Texans 18 to 20 will get full majority rights under new legislation which takes effect August 27.

Governor Briscoe signed the bill, in spite of speculation he would veto it.

It permits the 18-20-year-olds to "enjoy all the privileges and responsibilities of adult citizenship," according to Briscoe's statement.

Among adult privileges which the new youth group will be able to indulge in is purchase, consumption and sale of alcoholic beverages.

Other bills signed near the deadline for approval or veto included family code revision, free kindergarten for all five-year-olds, primary election proceedings and financing for 1974 and ball bond reform.

Altogether, Briscoe signed or allowed to become law without signature 659 bills passed by the Legislature this year and vetoed 29.

SHORT SNORTS

U. S. Department of Labor has awarded Texas a \$1.4 million grant for an 18-month manpower program under the Criminal Justice Council.

Outcries for a special legislative session on public school finance increased during a House education committee hearing.

Texas will receive \$3,562,143 in additional grants for 16 Texas school districts participating in an emergency aid program to prevent minority group isolation.

Former Lubbock Mayor Jim Granberry, a Republican, is the early-bird candidate for governor, although former Houston Sen. Hank Grover has made clear he will run too.

Former Secretary of State Bob Bullock jumped into the 1974 Democratic primary races first as a candidate for state comptroller.

Rep. Joe Allen of Baytown asked for an attorney general's opinion on whether the House has an obligation to provide free space in the capitol for news reporters.

Atty. Gen. John Hill spoke for "openness" in government at the Texas Press Association convention in Houston last week.

"It's not an easy policy for public officials and sometimes it's not the most efficient, but the legislature says that's the law and I plan to support it," he told 250 weekly and daily newspaper publishers.

"I'll interpret and enforce the open records law also. It is liberal in nature toward openness," he said.

The AG's office is getting into more law enforcement areas, Hill added. "We have to be vigilant about organized crime problems in Texas."

Hill spoke at the 94th Annual Convention of the Texas Press Association at the new \$42 million Hyatt Regency Hotel.

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Lindsey, Studer, & Petty Attend CTC&D

The Executive Council of the Central Texas Resource Conservation and Development Project Area met Tuesday, June 12, at a luncheon meeting at the Cowhorse Motor Hotel in Killeen. W. R. Lindsey and Charles Studer, representatives of the RC&D sponsors of the Executive Council discussed with the other sponsors about the future of the RC&D Area. Gilbert Kretzschmar, Chairman of the Central Texas Resource Conservation and Development Area, told the Executive Council that the group's application has been approved at the state level and given the support of Governor Dolph Briscoe. He said the application is now in Washington, D. C. for further study and consideration.

Mr. Bob Gordon, Project Coordinator of the Eastern Hill Country RC&D Project was the main speaker at this luncheon. He warned the Central Texas group that it might take longer than anticipated before approval of the application.

"I think the critical thing for you at this time is maintaining interest in resources conservation and development," Gordon said. He explained some 52 applications are now being considered at the federal level and it might be as long as three years before approval.

"I believe the key is to go ahead and set up your organization as though you were an approved project," he added. Other recommendations of Gordon, whose project has been in operation nearly five years, were to set up regular meetings of county RC&D groups, begin developing materials and inventory of resources and problems, and develop plans on a broad framework basis.

The group also agreed to write a letter to the governor asking him to grant favorable consideration to an application from CTC&D planning region a pilot project for rural development funds.

Kretzschmar announced appointment of David Myers as coordinator for the Central Texas RC&D six-county area and Don Decker, Bell County agricultural agent, as the CTC&D representative to the Central Texas RC&D Executive Council. Primary concern of the group is to accelerate conservation, development and proper use of natural and related resources

FROM THE STATE CAPITOL

By CAMM LARY, JR.
State Representative

This 63rd Session of the Texas Legislature has been a unique one in which all Texans should be proud of, for it has been a working session of, for of the democratic reflection. Never before in the history of Texas has there been such a diversity of political philosophy within the House—from "liberal" to very "conservative" with all gradations in between. Throughout the session, the House has been run with openness and fairness, allowing full expression of the diverse views which have existed. This openness has led to a slowing down of the legislative process, but I think the time problems created are far preferable to previous problems. Hopefully, the process can be improved in the future to allow for a more speedy, yet fully democratic system of law-making. Thus, on a whole, I am extremely pleased with this session of the Legislature, though various measures have passed which I had hoped would not.

MAJOR ACCOMPLISHMENTS
63RD LEGISLATURE
1. For the first time since 1949, the Texas Legislature has passed a comprehensive 2-year appropriation Bill requiring NO NEW TAXES.
2. The Legislature has taken steps to reduce automobile insurance rates by the passage of a bill creating a limited competition rate system.
3. The House and Senate have worked diligently to pass legislation to solve the problems in the legislative system leading to the past scandals in Texas politics.

REFORM IN TEXAS GOVERNMENT
Seven of the nine bills known generally as the Reform Bills (including under category 3 above) have survived the obstacle course of the legislative system. I have been particularly interested in these bills designed to prevent abuses which have previously occurred in Texas politics. The bills signed into law by the Governor are House Bills 6, 3, 4, and 9. H. B. 6, which I co-authored, provides for free access of public records. H. B. 3 is an attempt to improve the present Texas Open Meetings Law. H. B. 8 and 9 are geared directly at the Speaker of the House. H. B. 8 requires candidates for Speaker to report contributions, loans, and expenditures. H. B. 9 was passed to prevent bribery with intent to influence votes for Speaker. Also, House Bills 1, 2, and 4 have been passed and sent to the Governor. H. B. 1 deals with the ethics of state officers and employees. H. B. 2 calls for the registration and control of those persons engaged in lobbying. H. B. 4 regulates certain campaign contributions and expenditures as well as political advertising.

LEGISLATION I HAVE SPONSORED
None of the ten bills which I have sponsored or co-sponsored in the House have been signed into law by Governor Dolph Briscoe. The tenth, H.B. 1522, though I did not make it through the Legislature independently, has been incorporated into H.B. 1.

I would like to briefly review the content and ramifications of some of the bills which I have sponsored.
H.B. 6 — This bill, known as the Freedom of Information Act, is considered part of Speaker Price Daniel Jr.'s 9-bill reform package. Its purpose is to simplify access to public information in the custody of certain governmental agencies and bodies. The bill attempts to clearly define that information which is to be considered public and that which is not to be considered public.
S.B. 332 — This bill is aimed at saving several thousand dollars in clerical expenses every legislative session. This bill proposes that if any provision or part of a statute is held invalid, the invalidity does not affect other provisions or applications of the same statute. This will eliminate the need of including, as is now necessary, a severability clause at the end of every bill which is drafted.
H.B. 115 — This bill establishes the regulation and licensing of youth camps by that State Department of Health, to insure the safety of minors attending these camps. It has had the full support of Girl Scout, Boy Scout, and private camps in the State.
S.B. 891 and H. B. 1024 — Interest within my district prompted the writing of these two bills. S.B. 891 will allow Copperas Cove and Lampasas to hold an election to create the Upper Lampasas River Municipal Water District, to deal with the now inadequate water supply in Lampasas.
The impetus for the passage of H.B. 1024 came from the City of Killeen Fire Department. Present law prohibits fire department pension funds from paying more than \$25 a month to retired volunteer firemen. This bill allows departments with adequate funds to pay more to these firemen, and also increases retirement benefits payable to firemen already retired if the departments want to.

IN CONCLUSION — The Legislature has adjourned, barring a special session, the next major event will be the Constitutional Convention in January, 1974. I will try to send out questionnaires in reference to this event, prior to the convention, to seek your opinions on various matters. It has been a great pleasure representing the people of District 43. I am looking forward to serving you during the rest of my term. The Consumer Alert

AUSTIN — Both the consumer and the door-to-door salesman will have reason to think twice about an at-home sale now that there is a new State law which gives the buyer the right to change his mind.

The "Home Solicitation Act" by Dallas Senator Bill Braecklein and Representative Chris Semos of Dallas became law when the governor signed it June 13. Basically, this law provides that if a consumer is solicited at this home for a sale or merchandise or services costing \$25 or more, and subsequently decides that the goods weren't what they'd been cracked up to be, he can back out of the deal within a three-day period.

But it also imposes some strict responsibilities on the consumer, as well as the seller.

For instance, the Home Solicitation Act does not cover sales of farm equipment; insurance regulated by the State; realty sales in which the transactions are being negotiated by a licensed real estate broker or attorney; or sales made pursuant to a pre-existing retail charge account, or based upon prior negotiations at a business establishment where the goods were displayed.

The original offer must have been made and agreed upon at your doorstep. And that seems fair enough, since the whole idea was to put the consumer on equal footing with the itinerant salesman whose sales pitch may be better than his product.

The salesman is required to give the consumer a "fully completed" receipt of contract — written in English, or Spanish, or in whatever language the sales presentation was made at the time of the transaction.

Also, he must tell the signer about his cancellation rights, and furnish him with a copy of this printed statement:

"You, the buyer, may cancel this transaction at any time prior to midnight of the third business day after the date of this transaction. See the attached notice of cancellation form for an explanation of this right."

The form recites a detailed description of the duties of both parties.

The buyer has the duty to meet the three-day deadline by letter or telegram, and he must be prepared to take "reasonable care of the goods or property in his possession until the cancellation procedure has been completed."

If unacceptable home improvements are involved, the merchant has to restore the property to its prior condition unless the consumer says otherwise.

Violation of the act by a door-to-door seller not only would make him liable for actual damages to the consumer, reasonable attorneys' fees and court costs, but he risks having the contract voided.

And if the merchant doesn't refund the consumer's payment and recover the goods which have been rejected within 20 days after receipt of the cancellation notice, the buyer does not have any more duty to return the goods.

Hopefully, merchants specializing in home solicitations will accept the challenge of this new law by making certain that the goods and services they offer are worth keeping.

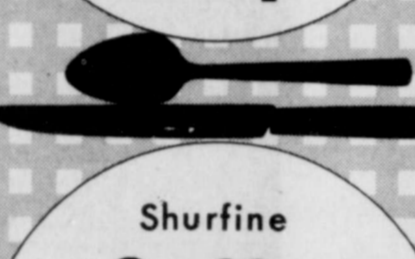

He took an active part in such service clubs as the Rotary and the Kiwanis and was active in various Masonic matters.

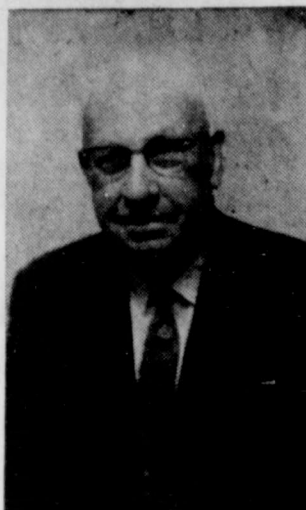

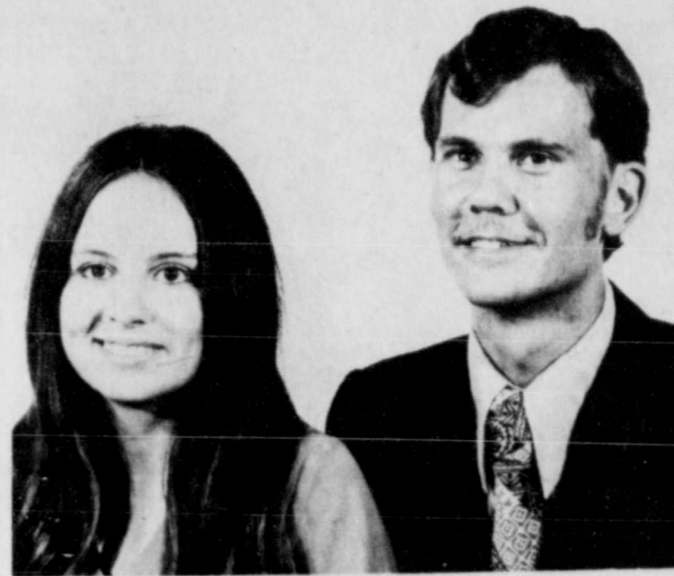
Long and his wife, Becky, are the parents of three young daughters. They are active in the Baptist Church.

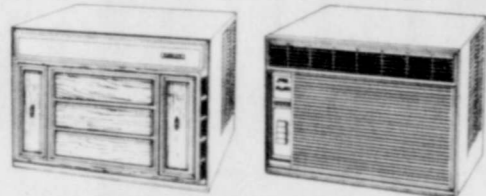

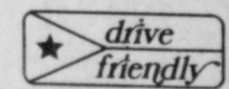

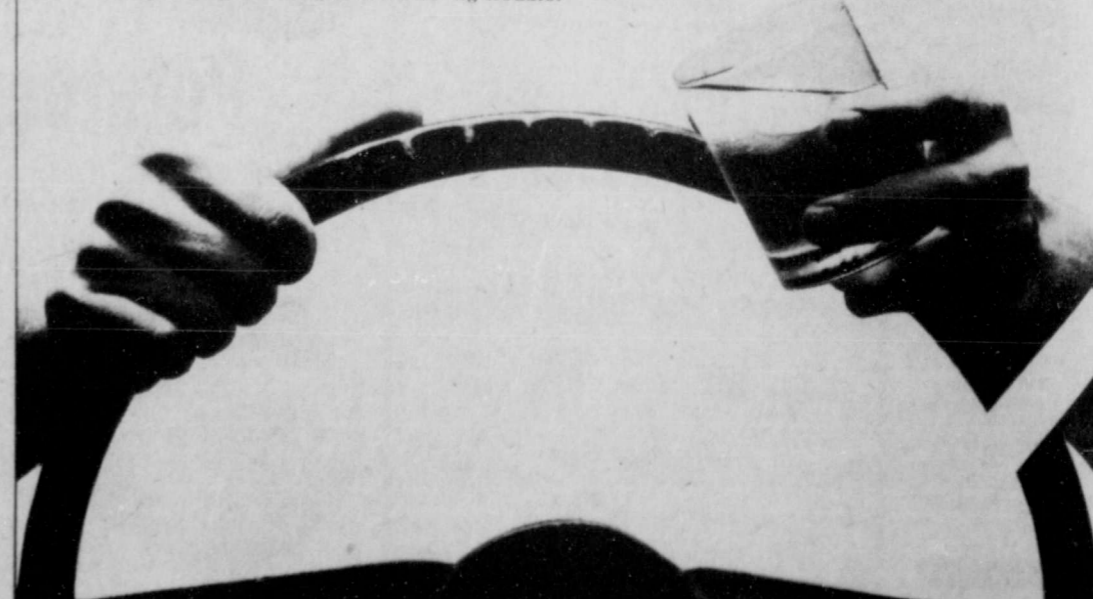
