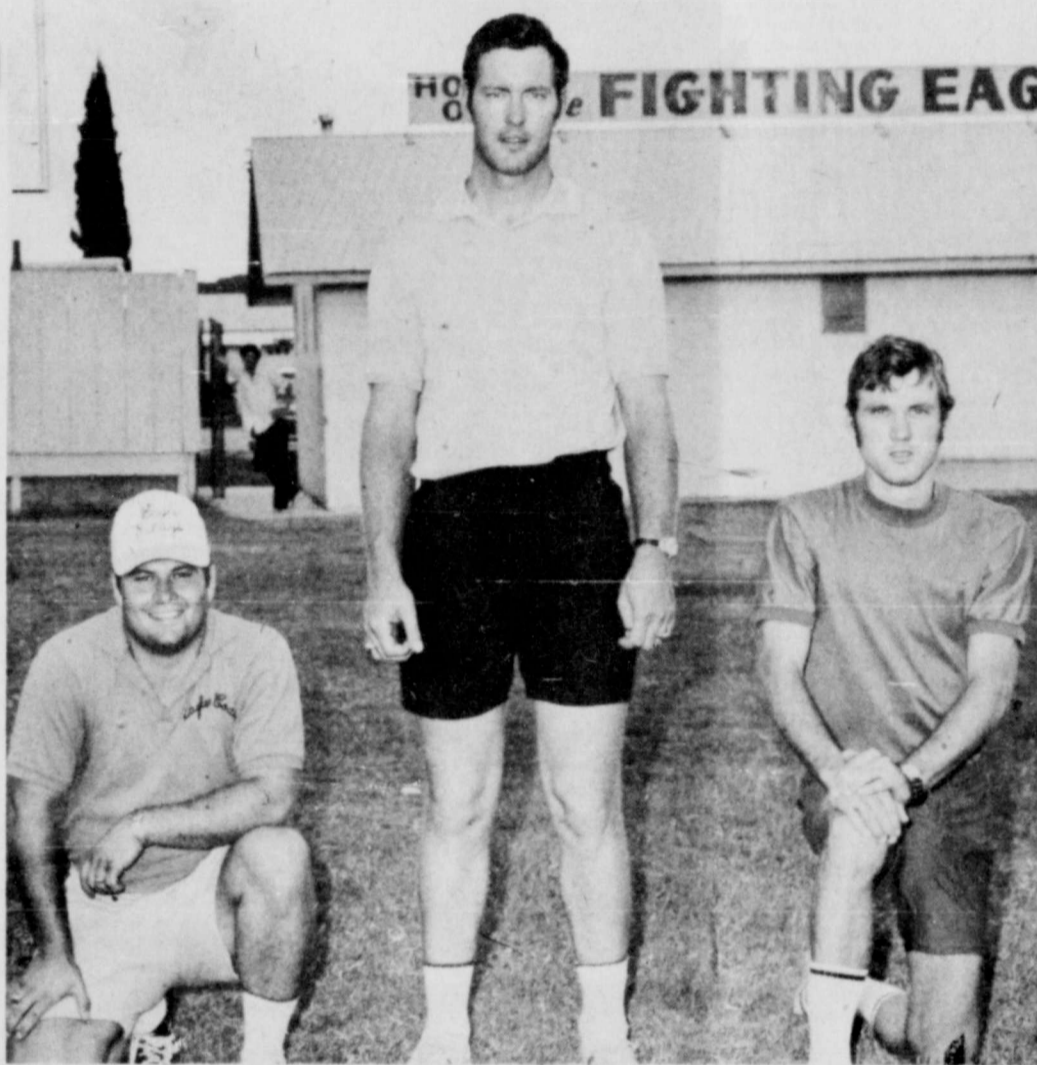

Eagles Begin Workouts; Scrimmage Next Week

Twenty-seven eager Goldthwaite High School footballers reported Monday morning to Eagle Field for the first work-out of the 1973 season, according to an announcement by new head coach Gene Aldridge.

Five starters from last year's team were back, two from the

offensive unit and three from the defensive unit.

The Eagles will go through two-a-day workout sessions this week in preparation for the opening of the season. Regular practice sessions are being held at 6:30 p. m. for spectators.

With regular school classes

beginning next Monday, workouts will go to a regular afternoon schedule.

Coach Aldridge urges fans to come up to the field and witness any of the sessions. He reminds local boosters that the first day of actual scrimmage with full pads will be Friday.

Aldridge has two assistant coaches working with him. Danny Spradley, returning from last year, will be working along with newly acquired assistant Fred Fisher to handle coaching duties. Head mentor Aldridge said he is real optimistic about the outcome of the 1973 season for the Eagles.

"If we don't get anybody hurt I feel like we'll have a very good year," Aldridge commented. The Eagles have already set two scrimmage games for the two weeks before the season opens with San Saba, there on September 7.

Burnett will journey to Goldthwaite on August 24 for a 6:30 p. m. scrimmage and the Eagles will travel to Ranger for a bout on August 31. Coach Aldridge urges all local fans to come and get a preview of the 1973 season and see these scrimmages.

Members of the organization cordially invite the public to attend and bring friends and enjoy two afternoons of fun and competition.

Harper Implement Plans Showing Of New Tractors Saturday A.M.

J. D. Harper, owner of Harper Implement Co. Goldthwaite, and Douglas Atchley recently returned from Waterloo, Iowa, where Deere and Company announced that four new 35 - 70 hp tractors would be added to the John Deere line of equipment this fall. Company officials told the dealers that the new tractors — 35-hp 830, 45-hp 1530, 60-hp 2030, and 70-hp 2630, will be offered to buyers at unusually low prices.

Base prices on all four new models include quality features such as hydraulic brakes, planetary final drives, variable-speed diesel engines, 8-speed collar-shifting transmission, and power steering.

Harper says the four new John Deere diesel models have a suggested list price that's hundreds of dollars less than comparably-equipped competitive tractors. Another point he made was the fact that there are now four models in the 35 - 70 hp class in the John Deere line, compared to three previous models, which makes it possible for a John Deere dealer to offer more variety in horsepower sizes as well as price ranges.

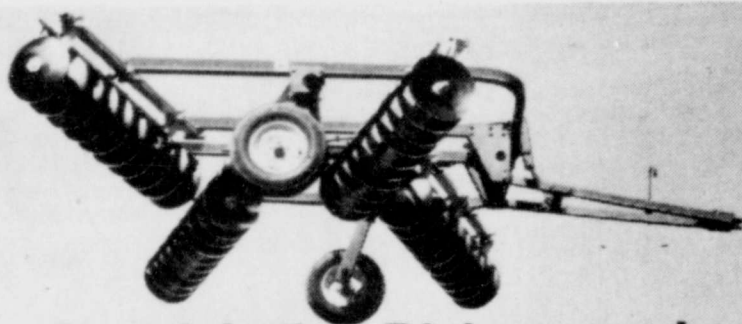

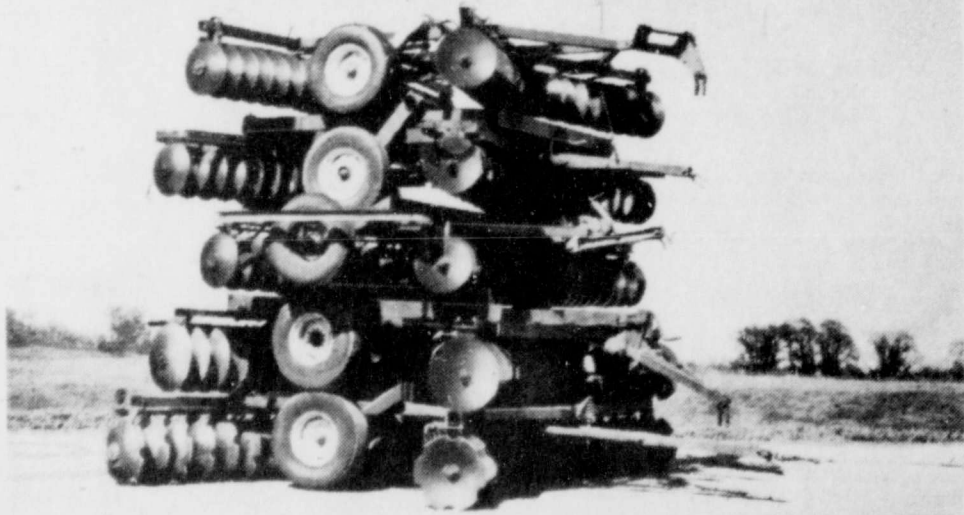

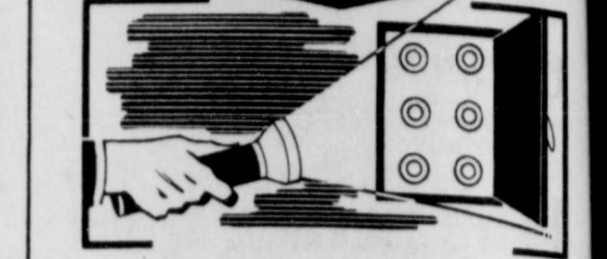

MILLS COUNTY EXTENSION AGENT

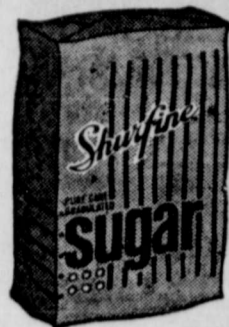

When soybeans and raw oil products hit a record price, it affects the cost of shortening, margarine, salad dressings, and all oil base products.

Why is there no beef in stores when pastures are full of cattle? - Simply this - all retail stores, processing plants, and distributors' prices were frozen on March 28. Our store had been using 700-800 lb. fed calves that cost 43¢ to 44¢ on foot at that time, and processing them at the local locker plant. Since that time, these same cattle have gone to 57¢ to 59¢ on foot. Since our retail meat price is frozen we cannot stand to lose \$125.00 per head on beef.

This letter is not written to scare anyone but to inform you why we do not always have the items you want. We ask for your patience, your understanding, and your co-operation when we limit amounts so more people get a small share of items that are short. When people buy extra or "hoard" items that are short, it means someone goes without. Food has been a bargain in our county for many years due to surpluses but we must realize this is over and the people who produce beef, wheat, vegetables and all food items must make a profit or they cannot produce, which causes shortages and even higher prices.

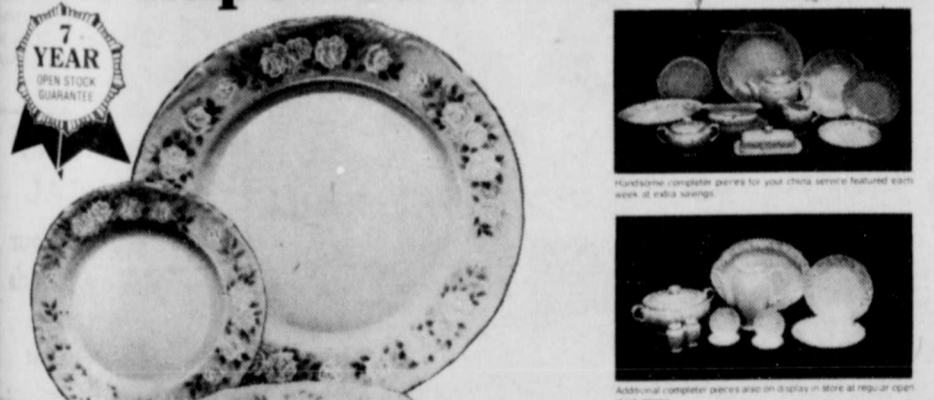

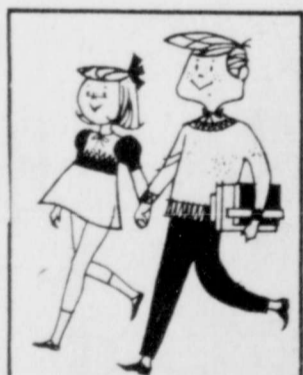
