## Baptist Church 'Kick-Off' Dinner Scheduled Tuesday, October 16

The First Baptist Church of Goldthwaite will hold a special "Kick-Off" Dinner for the new church year this next Tuesday, October 16, at 7:00 p. m. The event will be highlighted by the appearance of Dan McBride, a noted preacher-comedian who is on tour at the present time. McBride, a musical satirist, composer and humorist is a Baptist minister who often preaches with guitar and song, rather than in the traditional mode. He has composed a Christian folk musical entitled "A New Generation," and is author of a book of Christian poetry, "Reflections on Living." He has written more than 200 Christian hymns and folk songs and is composer of more than 125 humorous song parodies on the "Lighter side of the ministry."

"When I first started doing this, everybody said don't get involved in something like this because it won't work. But what I've lost in dignity I've made up for in ability to communicate. People are unaware that while I'm entertaining I'm also preaching. I've found that church people need to laugh at themselves. If they take themselves too seriously, they don't take God seriously enough," he says.

"And I don't make fun of anything sacred. Instead, I poke fun about the church's organizational structure, denominational hang-ups and promotional gimmicks," McBride adds.

The First Baptist Church of Goldthwaite extends a special invitation to all of its members to be present at the evening covered dish dinner at the Youth Center and be a part of the "kick-off" activities of the new church year.

Mike Simon put Goldthwaite ahead in the first period when he ran 70 yards for a touchdown. The extra point try failed, but the Eagles were on top by 6-0 after one quarter of play. The Eagles were held two times in the Early 10 yard line during the game and exhibited the best

offense of the year, outgaining the Longhorns 278-226. Five lost fumbles kept the Eagles from delivering a touchdown blow. This marks the fifth straight defeat this year for the Eagles while Early is 3-1. Eagle Head Coach Gene Auldridge said that the fumbles were the key to the winning of the game. He also commented that the Eagles exhibited outstanding playing in Friday's game.

You are invited to drive out Sunday afternoon and enjoy the beauty of our county lane. Take the first right off the Priddy highway, drive up the hill watching out for the young rock squirrels for they often play in the lane. Topping the hill, see the panorama of tall trees, ripe grasses and the glorious profusion of blooming marigolds. Cross the little wooden bridge spanning a miniature chasm and see the marigolds at close hand. The dead ones in the ditch and along the fence row are those which did not escape the commissioner's death spraying machine. Now looking to the left by the watering tank see the baby palomino colt. On the right is the "silver" gate. Coming up the chalk hill at the double corners see the old cottonwood tree on the left. It is at least thirty years old, well and healthy and fortunately out of reach of the death spraying machine. To the right see the many varieties of wildflowers, some of them in bloom. Watch out around the corner for there is a rattlesnake den hereabouts! Coming on down the lane (slowly, for a covey of quail lives here) enjoy the cattails on the right and more marigolds on the left. Turn right here at the three tanks, but look carefully in the one on the right and see a great, huge turtle sticking its head up for air. Along the edge lives a very grown-up crane, but last year he was only a baby. Keeping to the right come along past the mobile home and canyon red house to the corner where another covey of quail lives. The dead trees and shrubs in this isolated corner did not escape the death sprayer. See on the left the young elm and walnut trees which struggled for life during the drought, hopefully they will live long and useful lives with no other harm befalling them. Now stop at our house on the left for further directions and a drink of fresh well water.

## From the County Agent

Small grains are suited to many uses, one of the main uses being forage production for livestock. It is estimated that the annual small grain acreage in Texas will exceed 8 million acres of crops, and of this 8 million acres, it is estimated that 2 million acres are planted for livestock forage.

Several groups and varieties of winter annual plants are used

to provide forage. Selection of a type or variety to be grown should be based on soil adaptation, yield potential, time of production, cold tolerance, disease resistance, and the availability of good quality seed.

Small grains, oats, wheat, barley and rye are fairly similar in forage quality when immature and give closely related animal performance. There are differ-

ences in palatability. Palatability of small grains from greatest to least is: Oats, wheat, barley and rye. This difference normally presents no problems unless cattle are given a choice of small grains within the same pasture while there is often little difference in total forage production for the different small grains, they often differ considerably in time of production during the growing season.

Oats are generally the most widely forage producing small grain crop. Many oat varieties produce fast, early growth, but are not as winter hardy as other small grains. Oats are generally classified as spring, winter and intermediate types. The "spring types" referred to here are not the true spring types, such as are grown in the Corn Belt, but are erect growing winter oats of low hardiness which produce early forage when fall seeded. Winter

type oats have a prostrate growth habit in the fall and winter, and are late in forage production but are cold-hardy.

The intermediate types are intermediate between spring and winter types in these characteristics.

Research on early weaning and feeding of lambs for slaughter has led to new trends of thought in some segments of the sheep industry. Research reports show that milk production in most ewes declines rapidly after the second week and is of minor importance after 8 - 10 weeks. Some ewes continue producing a good supply of milk throughout the nursing period; however, this is generally the exception and not the rule. Aside from the decline in milk production, a lamb's digestive tract after 9 weeks of age is

practically the same as that of an adult.

As a guide to early weaning, producers can use a minimum weight of 45 pounds or 9 weeks. Lambs may be weaned earlier, but their feed must be fortified with vitamins and minerals.

Advantages of early weaning include:

(a) Ewes mend faster and are in better condition for rebreeding  
(b) Grazing pressure on pastures is reduced by removing the lambs

(c) Older ewes can be sold earlier

(d) High quality forage such as small grain pastures can be used more advantageously by separating ewes and lambs.

(e) Early weaning helps reduce the internal parasite problems

## THE MILLS MINISTER

### DISCIPLINE

The dictionary gives the following definition for discipline, "Training which corrects, molds, strengthens, or perfects". It is this type of discipline that I wish to discuss briefly with you today.

1. The need for discipline. The Bible tells us that discipline may seem cruel, harsh, and grievous at the time it is administered, but afterward it yields the peaceable fruits of righteousness. An undisciplined person is hard to deal with; it matters not if he be eight or eighty. Let us think a moment about self-discipline.

2. Christ taught self-discipline. "Take up thy cross and follow me" means discipline thyself. Control your appetites, discipline your body. Self-control is pleasing to God. It is taught throughout the Scriptures. We are urged by our Lord to learn the discipline of prayer, of fellowship,

of love, of giving, of moderation, of witnessing, of surrender, of study, of humility. Yes, all these good things, and many more, can only be exercised by self-discipline. Bringing your body to be subject to the laws of God may seem old-fashioned in this undisciplined age, but it is necessary to Christian growth and has rewards of great merit.

3. Christ taught child-discipline. All of us have at one time or another been disgusted with the behavior of an undisciplined child. A small child is not capable of self-discipline. God teaches that parents are obligated to discipline their children. The school, the church, the community, or the law-enforcement officers cannot administer the discipline for the home. Parent, if you would only administer some discipline at home, you would be pleasantly surprised at the visible results you would see in your children.

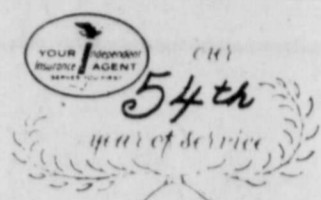

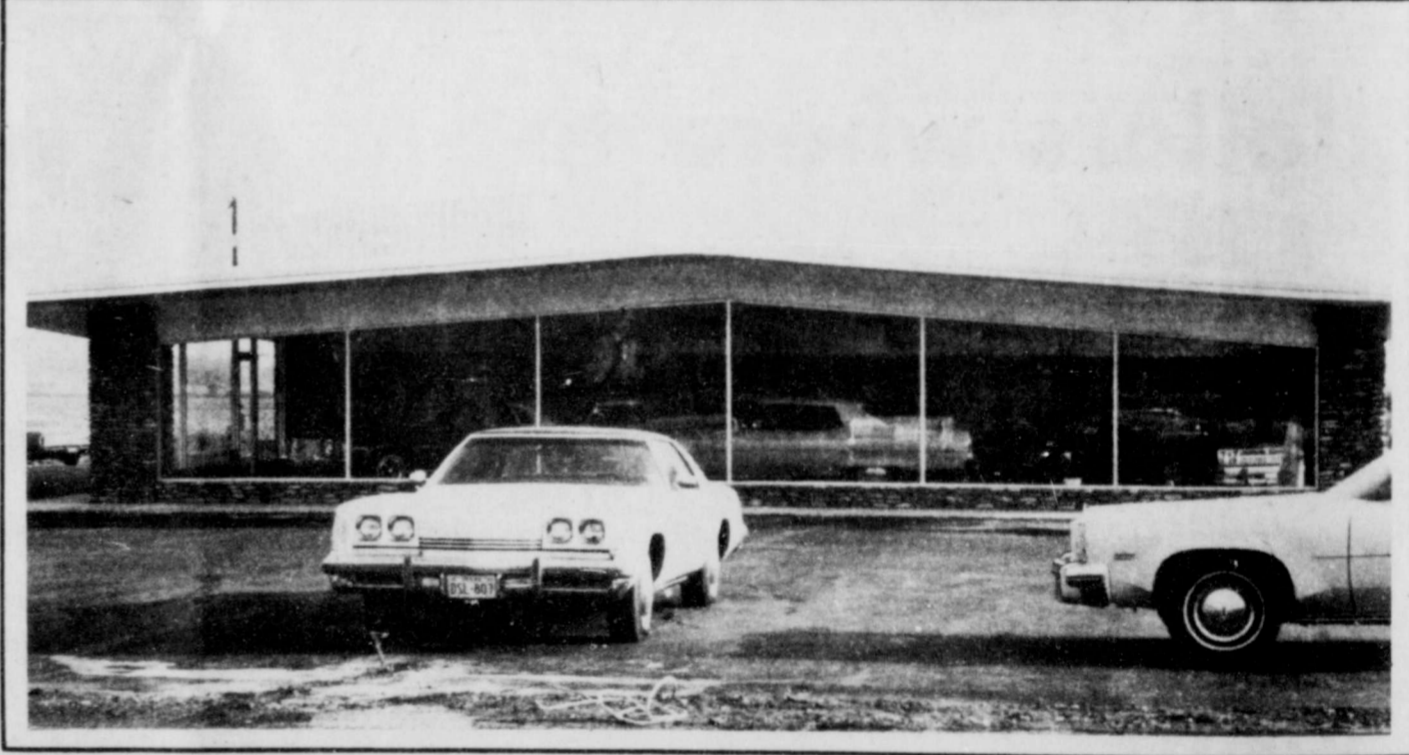
