The vote statewide was considered light except in Houston where heavy balloting was brought about by an important mayor's race and other local issues.

Council: Energy Crisis To Continue

The Goldthwaite City Council met in regular session Monday night and spent most of its time discussing the problems related to the energy crisis confronting the City.

The annual Christmas lighting arrangements put up by the City, usually around the first of December, will be reduced to a very minimum, according to guidelines established by the Lower Colorado River Authority in a recent directive.

The power producing company

asked the city to discourage the use of indoor lighting displays. The guidelines called for the displays and arrangements to be left on for only a couple of hours each day and only for about one or two weeks before Christmas.

The Council considered putting the lighting arrangements up around the Mills County Courthouse Square only. This would include about 8 lighting fixtures. The directive comes about as the power crisis continues, and

there seems to be no end in sight, according to Charles Herring, executive director of the LCRA.

Local officials emphasized that they will try to the utmost to comply with all the guidelines as set forth by LCRA.

Gasoline suppliers have recently notified the City that the amount of gasoline purchased can be no more than was used or delivered at the same period last year. The city purchases gasoline from all of the major gasoline outlets in Goldthwaite.

In other council business, the operations report was read. City Manager Don Petty remarked that the report was brighter this month because of the collection of regular and ad valorem taxes and because of the inclusion of a \$6,682.85 check from the State Comptroller for the city's portion of the sales tax monies collected in the same quarter a year ago.

Electrical consumption and water usage were down, CM Petty said, because of the change in the seasons.

The Chaparral Estates addition to the City of Goldthwaite was given approval for the city's responsibility for streets and utilities to be hooked up in the near future.

The addition, located in the north west part of Goldthwaite, was annexed into the city limits several months ago. The addition is owned by James Boykin, and the proposed part surveyed now contains 12.11 acres, divided into 13 lots of varying sizes.

The city unanimously okayed the city's participation in the "Green Thumb" program. The program utilizes the work of persons 55 years and older to do jobs for governmental units, the county, the city and the school systems of Mills County and other areas close by. There is another article in this issue of the Eagle concerning this worthwhile program.

The council unanimously approved the purchase of a new citizens band radio unit for the car of Mills County Sheriff H. G. Brooks. The city furnishes this radio to aid in fire protection and for other uses in cooperation with the City.

In final action, the council okayed the donation of a large wooden table not being used by the city officials to the use of the Mills County Young Homemakers for repair and refinishing for the addition to the Jennie Trent Dew Library.

Councilmen Lester Geeslin, Anle Morgan, Jimmy Smith, and Donald Padgett were present at the meeting. Councilman Hollis Wiggins was absent. Also present were Mayor Ray Duren, CM

Petty, City Secretary Glynn Collier, John Mauney and Frank Bridges.

The Council meets the first Monday of each month at 7:00 p. m. at City Hall.

STATE CAPITAL Highlights AND Sidelights by Bill Hobby TEXAS PRESS ASSOCIATION

AUSTIN, Tex. — Over 200 leaders of industry and representatives of professions met in the capitol last week to review the new state laws governing campaign contributions, expenditures and lobbying.

Secretary of State Mark White and Attorney General John Hill discussed the major legal changes brought about by the "reform" legislation of the last Texas legislature.

"We are living in a period of legal transition," the Attorney General told the business and professional men and women. "My office has produced over 200 opinions so far this year — and over 100 opinions are stacked up to be prepared."

White outlined his recent "campaign contributions and expenditures directives" at the meeting sponsored by the Texas Society of Association Executives.

Other speakers reviewed the details of the new lobby law and the sections of the penal code which affect campaigns and lobbying.

"H.B. 2 — the new lobby law — is unconstitutional," stated Frank Maloney, Austin attorney. "It violates both the first and fifth amendments to the constitution."

He cited federal cases which supported his opinion on the new Texas lobby law, and other speakers pointed out that several AG opinions are needed in this state to clarify sections of the campaign expenditures law and lobby law.

Political action committees for state businesses and associations are being formed as a result of the new laws.

Labor unions must go the PAC route in Texas now also, because they are prohibited under the new law from contributing to political campaigns.

Speakers on the program indicated that the Sharpston scandal and Watergate investigations are going to make office holders, candidates and those who work and contribute to campaigns very wary about future political activities in this state.

"Until we get more information from the Secretary of State's office, and additional Attorney General's opinions, most representatives of business, professionals, labor and industry are going to be very cautious about participating in political campaigns and contributing to campaigns," one spokesman for the group said.

"None of us wants to be the first 'test case' under these new laws," he concluded.

Frank B. Farrell of Dallas and Edwin H. Balschke of Houston were selected for State Board of Registration for Professional Engineers appointments.

Lt. Gov. Bill Hobby picked as his emergency interim successors (in case of disability due to enemy attack) Steven C. Oaks and Dr. June Hyer of Houston and Don Rives of Marshall.

Named to the board of regents of Texas State Technical Institute were Tom Patterson of Amarillo, O. Dale Seastruck of Irving and Lance Sears of Sweetwater.

James R. Arnold of Dallas is director of the governor's traffic safety office.

Marijuana Case Review Ordered — The Board of Pardons and Paroles has been called on by Governor Briscoe to review marijuana possession felony convictions under old state law where less than four ounces of the substance was involved.

Although the Court of Criminal Appeals has struck down a portion of new state law providing for resentencing of prisoners convicted of felony possession, Briscoe said the legislature obviously intended that sentences of minor offenders would be lowered. New law effective last August lowered the penalty for first offense possession of small

"Texas politics." Details of the lobby law were explained by Austin attorney Gaylord Armstrong.

Legislature Gets Revision — A proposed 13,500-word rewrite of the 97-year-old Texas constitution has now been handed the legislature for its consideration.

A blue ribbon, 37-member revision commission presented the document to legislative leaders last week with an urgent request that it serve as a starting point in the 1974 constitutional convention starting January 8.

Lt. Gov. Bill Hobby, House Speaker Price Daniel Jr. and Gov. Dolph Briscoe accepted the commission's redraft — which streamlined the much-amended 55,000-word 1976 constitution — in historic ceremonies.

Hobby noted that delegates to the 1875 convention faced a "crisis of confidence" similar to that confronting lawmakers who will be 1974 revision delegates.

"The people no longer trust government because so much corruption and villainy has been uncovered," said Hobby. "We must act to end this crisis, at least in so far as state government is concerned."

Daniel said a vast majority of the 181 lawmakers already have agreed that the commission document should be used as a guide at the convention. He again predicted delegates can complete their work in 90 days. The convention, said Daniel, is "the best prepared ever to assemble in the history of our nation."

Nobody claimed the new document is perfect. "It is not a purely 'pure' constitution of fundamental principles, but neither is it a purely 'political' constitution," Commission Chairman Robert W. Calvert said. "But we assert with the utmost confidence that, if the convention will use this document as a basis from which to work it will find far more areas of agreement than of disagreement; and it will find also that our work has minimized its labors."

The convention's final work will go to voters for their approval or rejection.

Appointments — Gov. Dolph Briscoe appointed Ben F. McDonald, former mayor of Corpus Christi, executive director of the Texas Department of Community Affairs.

Briscoe appointed Judge Paul G. Peurifoy of Dallas as presiding judge of the first administrative judicial district, Dallas. He named O. V. Mullins of Henderson to the board of managers of the Texas State Railroad, succeeding E. M. Decker Jr. of Jacksonville.

Galveston Wharves proposed a 60-mile, 100-foot-deep channel to accommodate deep draft vessels. TOTC agreed to delay until Nov. 27 action on two phases of its seven-part report to the legislature on feasibility and site location of a future offshore terminal.

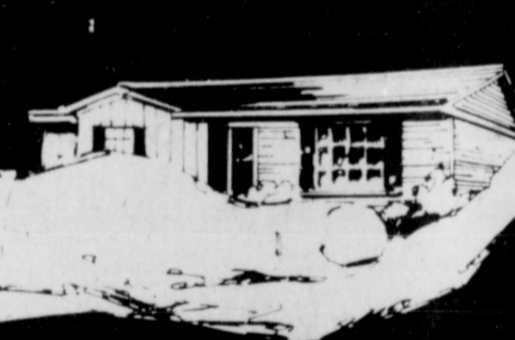

When purchasing wooden furniture, read the label — and understand what it says. Knowing label language helps consumers find what they want in furniture woods. For instance, a label reading "walnut finish" means the wood has been finished to look like walnut — it isn't actually walnut.

The term "genuine" indicates that only the exposed structural parts and flat surfaces of an item must be made of the wood named on the label. Furniture items with veneers fit this category. On the other hand, "solid" denotes both frames and panels are constructed from wood stated on the label. When labeled "solid" veneer and plywood aren't allowed. Another label often used is wood grain imitation — such as "imitation oak grain on hardboard." Imitations include wood grain patterns painted or printed on hardwood, metal, plastic and lumber. Also, photographic wood grain on paper which is glued to another surface. The Federal Trade Commission requires furniture manufacturers to meet these standards.

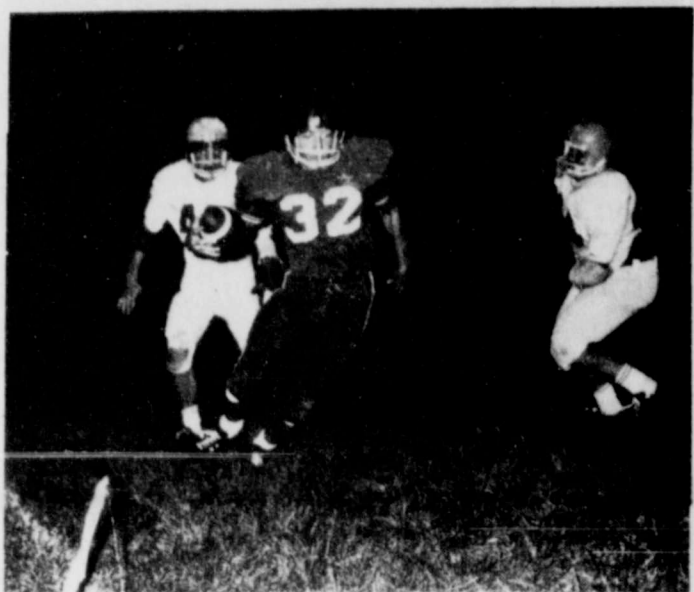

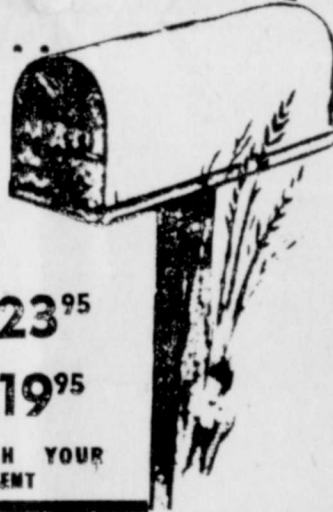
