SUMMER SEEMS shorter than it used to. . . or is it just me? If the children are heading back to school, then it must be autumn. Calendar tells me fall is September 23 which is five and one-half weeks away. Temps are ranging in the 90s to 100s everywhere, the tomatoes

haven't turned red yet, and summer flowers are still in bloom. It can't be fall until I get the first Christmas catalogue in the mail, but they seem to come earlier every year, too.

It doesn't matter if you have youngsters in school or not, once school starts, it yanks us all out of those lazy, hazy days of summer and plops us smack into the middle of all those things we said we'd think about later, "in the fall." Our lives and our activities revolve around when school is in session and/or when the kids are out for vacation. How on earth will we all arrange our lives once the "powers that be" get their way and have schools in session all year round?

Okay, I can get past the fact that the largest facilities in all our towns and cities (which are the schools) sit idle for about 10 weeks every summer. Big Whoop! Nobody complains about all those churches that are used only 52 days out of

every 365. I always hated to send my little munchkins back to school every fall. They grow up so fast and have so little time to be children, playing hide-and-seek with the neighbor kids, climbing trees, riding bikes, swimming, jumping on the trampoline. Our lives are so complicated that we now have even less opportunity these days for family activities together with the little people we have brought into this world.

I am not alone. A group known as "Texans for a Traditional School Year" has made their presence known by lobbying for a return to schools starting around Labor Day and ending the last of May. Their poll showed that 60% of Texans preferred the traditional school terms. They noted that the earlier starting date for schools prohibits teachers from taking advantage of enrolling in the full two semesters of summer college and university classes. The shortened summer allows them only one semester of higher education.

Summer jobs for youngsters are in short supply, since few firms want to hire anyone who can work only a few weeks. Three full months of summer would allow for more work experience and help young people earn more toward their future life after high school. After all, training our children to be ready for the world out there is what school is all about. Once they are in the work force, they certainly don't get one or two-week-long vacations every couple of months.

Speaking of the work force. . . the population of this country is about 237 million. We have 104 million retired folks, which leaves 133 million to do the work. There are 85 million in schools, which leaves 48 million to do the work. Approximately 29 million are employed by the federal government, leaving 19 million to do the work.

Then take off the 2.8 million who are in the Armed Forces,

which leaves 16.2 million to do the work. Take from that total the 14,800,000 people who work for state and city governments, and that leaves 1.4 million to do the work. At any given time there are 188,000 people in hospitals, which leaves 1,212,000 to do the work. And now there are 1,211,998 people in prisons.

So that leaves just two people left to do the work. . .you and me, and you're sitting there reading this newspaper!!!



> The United States is losing its wetlands (some of nature's most productive ecosystems) at a rate of more than 170,000 acres a year. Grasslands, forests and other important habitats are disappearing at similarly alarming rates.

At the same time, global economic problems are forcing many farmers out of business. Last fall, Congress approved nearly \$6 billion in emergency farm aid. Federally subsidized crop insurance may cost another \$4 billion.

The Conservation Reserve Program (CRP) and Wetlands Reserve Program (WRP) are restoring wildlife habitat and, at the same time, helping save many family farms. By paying farmers to set aside land for wildlife, these programs have restored millions of acres across the country at a cost of about \$2 billion annually.

The Conservation Reserve Program was initiated in 1985 to help stem erosion on agricultural lands. The pro-



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Across the country, two gram pays farmers to retire their croplands from production for ten years, slowing erosion and providing prime cover for breeding birds and other wildlife. Today, more

> enrolled in CRP. The Wetlands Reserve Program places conservation easements on marginally productive agricultural lands and restores them to wetlands. More than 800,000 acres are enrolled in this program. Many WRP lands are in the environmentally important Mississippi Delta.


Today, both CRP and WRP are becoming victims of their own success. The number of acres allowed in both programs is limited by Congress, and both are due "fill up" soon. However, many landowners are still interested in enrolling their lands, both for economic and conservation purposes. Bills recently introduced in Congress would raise the caps on acreage for both of these programs.

Officials from Ducks Unlimited the continent's largest wetlands and waterfowl conservation group, and other groups are recommending that the cap on CRP be raised from 36.4 million to 45 million acres. Likewise, they would like to see the WRP cap raised from 975,000 to 2 million acres.

"We are encouraging our members to contact their congressmen and urge them to support the expansion of CRP and WRP," says Matt Connolly. Executive Vice President of Ducks Unlimited. "These programs are examples of government programs that work for wildlife and work for people,




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

#### NOTICE OF PROPOSED GAS RATE CHANGE

On August 4, 1999, Energas Company filed Statements of Intent to change its gas rates with each incorporated city listed below. The proposed changes will take effect no sooner than 35 days after filing. Each city may suspend the proposed effective date for an additional 90 days.

The Company proposes to increase rates to General Service (residential and commercial), Small Industrial Service, Large Gas Air Conditioning and/or Electric Generating Gas Service, and the Air Conditioning Rate Rider. The company may implement a different rate design than proposed provided the increased revenue does not exceed that specified herein.

The proposed changes are expected to increase the company's annual revenues by approximately 8.8 percent or \$9.8 million. The proposed changes to the rates are unrelated to gas cost which the company will continue to charge only cost paid to its supplier. The proposed changes could affect approximately 200,000 gas consumers in the following communities:

## Clinic Set Sept. 8, 29 In Friona

The Women's Center of the Don and Sybil Harrington Cancer Center and Baptist/St. Anthony's Health System will conduct Breast Cancer Screening Clinics at Parmer County Hospital, 1307 Cleveland Avenue in Friona on September 8 and September 29.

Breast cancer affects one in eight women. The key to winning the battle against cancer is early detection by having an annual breast exam, mammogram and performing breast self-exam each month.

Participants will receive a low-cost screening that includes a mammogram and instruction in self-examination by a Registered Nurse. The total cost is \$75. A minimum of fifteen women need to register in order for the mobile mammography clinic to come to area towns.

Funding is available through the Texas Department of Health for Texas residents who qualify for assistance. All exams are done by appointments only. Call (806) 356-1905 or 1-800-377-4673 for more information.

They also enjoyed "Wet and Wild" and she filled in for catcher on one of Lori's Fontana, Montana. softball games.


Her aunt Lori is an optometrist and her uncle Gary is in the Air Force.


