LCRA Continues Plea For Electricity Conservation

In a letter addressed to LCRA wholesale electric customers, Charles Herring, LCRA general manager, re-emphasized the importance of conserving electricity during the winter months. The letter, received by City officials on November 23, stated that all electric customers should practice "frugality" in the use of electricity.

This frugality should include restricting the use of electricity to the bare essentials and elimi-

nation of all necessary uses. "If everyone will use this approach," Herring continued, "we are hopeful that we can avoid the necessity of brownouts or curtailments of service during the winter."

In the letter, Herring said the executive committee of the 30 mayors group had recently passed a resolution asking all cities and cooperatives served by LCRA not to use electricity for outside Christmas decorations this year.

To show good faith, Herring said he has instructed LCRA district offices and managers of other facilities to completely eliminate Christmas lighting on all LCRA properties. He also said the managers of these facilities have been instructed to follow the guidelines set forth by President Nixon in a televised speech to the nation, Nov. 8. Herring suggested that all cities and cooperatives deriving electrical power from LCRA generators should re-examine the local situation with regard to commercial, public building lighting and street decorations in the light of the request by the 30 mayor executive committee.

Herring reports that the current LCRA fuel situation is relatively good. He said LCRA has had 100 percent of the natural gas it has needed this month. "In addition to quantities of gas Coastal States has indicated it can provide us during the next three months, we have made arrangements to purchase 10 million cubic feet a day from Texas Oil and Gas Corporation.

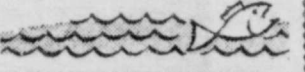
"This supply of gas, plus the oil we have purchased and are

continuing to purchase, plus the generation available from generators at the dams will help us through the winter months."

He continued, "We believe we can make it, but only if everyone makes a special effort to reduce the amount of electricity they use."

Abundant supplies of cranberry products are available now. Be one of the good guys, and add the good berry with bounce to your fall menus.

Cranberry-Apple Relish
Cranberry relish contributes colorful, zesty goodness to any entree - be it chicken, turkey, meat or fish. Make your own Cranberry-Apple Relish using canned cranberry sauce and seasonally available fresh apples.

1 apple, medium tart
1/2 cup diced celery
1/2 teaspoon salt
2 tbsps. bottled horseradish
1 lb. can whole berry cranberry sauce

Core apple. Put through coarse blade of food chopper, or dice finely. Mix other ingredients. Let stand in refrigerator several hours for flavors to blend. Makes 1 pint relish.

The knit explosion brings many new and varied fabric constructions for use in wearing apparel. However, new problems confront consumers concerning knits.

Snagging is one of the biggest problems. Usually, it's due to fabric construction or looseness of the loops. Reweavers - who readily repair damaged woven fabrics - hesitate accepting snagged knits. About the only thing a homemaker can do to mend

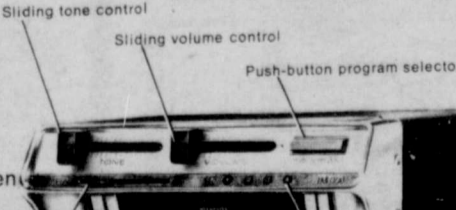

From the County Agent

MILLS COUNTY EXTENSION AGENT

Small grains are suited to the average annual estimate of 20 million acres are sown during the winter and are a considerable portion of the remaining acreage is planted during the winter, and the livestock are removed from a grain crop to mature. The small grains produce high quality forage at a season when green forage is limited. The green forage generally are more available for forage production and produce a larger volume of forage than most other winter growing crops.

The majority of small grain planting has been completed in Mills County and most stands are adequate. The growth of winter growing crops is limited by the main factors: Temperature

and light - growth of small grains essentially stops at 40 degrees F. While less work has been published on light effects, it is known that light energy during the winter months amounts to only a fraction of peak summer light levels. It is to be expected that yield response to applied nutrients would be less than in warm season grasses and that smaller amounts of nutrients would be necessary for maximum production. Fertilizer costs have brought about an increased necessity of good sound fertilizer management practices. Oats respond with increased grain and forage yields to the application of commercial fertilizers and barnyard manure. All fertilizer applications should be based on soil tests to provide optimum applications.

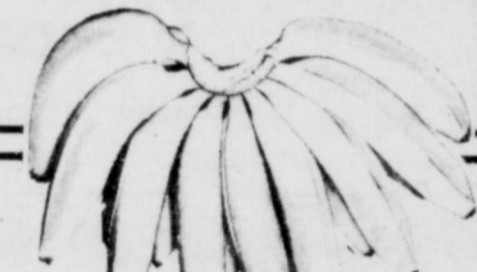
