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Election Results Announced For ASC Community Committeemen

Results of the December 3rd election of ASC community committeemen for 1974 were announced by Blake English of the Mills County Agricultural Stabilization and Conservation Ser-

vice Tuesday afternoon. Farmers elected to the committeemen were:

Community A, 535 eligible voters, 97 ballots counted. Alton Drucehammer, Chairman; James A. Wells, Vice-Chairman and Oscar Spina, Member.

Community B, 465 eligible voters, 115 ballots counted. Howard Ethridge, Chairman; Alvin Spinks, Vice-Chairman; and Roger Sanders, Member.

Community C, 683 eligible voters, 150 ballots counted. Nathan Carothers, Chairman; Johnnie O. Wolff, Vice-Chairman and Wilson Head, Member.

The recently-elected community committee automatically became delegates to the county convention which was held yesterday. The purpose of this meeting was to elect one county committee member for a 3 year term, and elect a committee chairman, vice-chairman, and two alternates. (The results of the county convention came after press time.)

ASC county and community committees are in charge of local administration of such national farm programs as wool, mohair, wheat, feed grain and peanuts English said. Last year he pointed out, over 700 farmers -- about 77 percent of all farmers in the county took part in one or more of the programs administered by the ASC committees.

Girl Scout Meeting

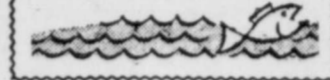
The Heart of Texas Girl Scout Council held its 25th Annual Meeting in Stephenville, Tuesday, December 4 at Tarleton State College.

Sanitary Land Fill Operation Begins Tuesday

The old dump ground that has served Goldthwaite and most of Mills County for a number of years will be officially closed Monday.

The new sanitary land fill will be open on Tuesday. It is located in the center of about 168 acres of land the city purchased earlier this year about 1 1/2 miles out on Hanna Valley Road.

City Manager Don Petty stated Monday that the land fill charges that were listed in last week's Eagle were correct but that the time of being open on Saturday was in error. It will be open from 8 a. m. until 12 noon on Saturdays and from 3 p. m. until dark on Tuesdays and Thursdays for the dumping privilege by the citizens of Goldthwaite.

Each person should bring current utility bill in order that the amount billed for garbage service may be deducted from the fee for dumping at the land fill. Persons not having current bills will have to pay the attendant on duty at the site.

The old dump has been completely fenced and is scheduled to be sold at public auction in the near future. It is made up of 30 acres.

There will be a separate dead animal pit for the disposal of animals at the land fill.

Charges for dumping at the new land fill will be: cars, 50 cents; pickups, \$1.00; pickups with trailers, \$1.50; flat bed

AUSTIN, Tex. — Hearings will be held soon by the State Insurance Board to see if misleading or deceptive "sales pitches" are being used by the insurance industry in Texas. Joe Christie, Chairman of the Texas Insurance Board, says the goal of the board is to protect the consumer and build confidence in the insurance industry.

"People need insurance. The Board wants to make certain they are getting good information about the product," he told the Austin Ad Club last week.

"Some of the troubles of the insurance industry are caused by failure to communicate properly with the buyer. We are not getting life insurance rates, and we will hold hearings to compare rates. The Board will issue comparisons on life insurance policies and rates for the buying public."

Insurance is the largest industry in Texas, he added, and a difficult industry to regulate.

"The board started publishing names of agencies and agents who have been found guilty of abusing the public, and we have seen a decrease of complaints," Christie continued.

Another goal is to clean up deceptive advertising, he told

the ad group.

Christie asked the ad leaders to help the Board make certain the buying public knows about deviating rates in fire and casualty insurance.

"Shop for your insurance as you would groceries or any other product. You can get a 10% reduction on your automobile insurance for example if you take the defensive driving courses. Watch for optional coverage on personal injury insurance. It will be on your bill if you do not specify that you "do not" want it.

"We are going to study "no-fault" insurance and health care in Texas too. We want to know if "no-fault" will lower our insurance rates, and what the buyer might have to give up in rights to get the lower rates.

"The Board plans to set up a Health Maintenance Organization to see how health care is delivered in Texas.

"We do not question the quality of health care in Texas, but we want to know the quantity of health care," he concluded.

DEMOCRATS CRANK UP —

Texas Democrats are looking down the road to 1974 and 1976 national party conventions.

They set for December 15 here a State Democratic Executive Committee rules panel hearing to consider delegate selection procedures for the December 1974 "mini-convention" or policy conference.

State party officials must, by resolution, provide for compliance with rules on delegate selection and "affirmative action" to assure wide open participation in lower-level conventions.

The party must take steps to encourage convention activities by youth, minorities, women and others traditionally under-represented in its conventions. The same requirement carries over to the 1976 national presidential nominating convention process.

Gordon Wynne Jr. of Willis Point described the "mini-convention" full-participation program to be agreed on by SDEC here next month as the "forerunner" of the 1976 concept to be followed in presidential nominating procedures.

SDEC's resolution on delegate selection and affirmative action must be submitted to the Democratic National Committee prior to Feb. 1, 1974.

HOSPITAL PROGRAM CHANGED —

The Governor declined to sign an agreement with the Department of Health, Education and Welfare to implement state and local review of health care facility construction in Texas.

His action left hospitals and nursing homes eligible to participate in federal programs without getting a state certificate of need.

Aides to Briscoe said the Department of Health, Education and Welfare in Washington has assured them there is no penalty to the health care industry if a state does not participate in the review program.

Briscoe advised new construction proceed cautiously so as not to build a facility where it is not needed.

COURTS SPEAK — A three-judge federal court here heard arguments over whether state House members should be elected from individual districts in nine metropolitan counties.

The court will rule in January whether Travis, Nueces, Tarrant, McLennan, Lubbock, Jefferson, Galveston, El Paso and Hidalgo counties should have single-member districts. Bexar, Dallas and Harris counties already have such districts.

A divided Court of Criminal appeals held marijuana offenders convicted before April 23 and appealing for lighter sentences cannot be resentenced under the new Texas drug act.

A Deaf Smith County man lost an appeal from a 99-year sentence for rape — for holding his own wife while another man attacked her.

Governor Dolph Briscoe announced Friday approval of a \$152,000 grant in new federal funds for the Goldthwaite Community Action Association, Inc., in San Saba.

The grant is effective from Jan. 1, 1974, through Dec. 31, 1974, and allocates these funds for a part of the Head Start program plus \$1 in carryover funds.

Governor Briscoe said the grant will enable the agency to provide part day Head Start classes for 80 children. The Goldthwaite Independent School District (ISD) will conduct one class in one center for 20 children, and San Saba will conduct two classes in one center for 40 children. The classes will be conducted five days a week, five days a week. 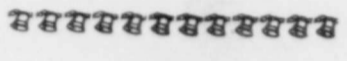

Extension Highlights

With hunting season here and meat costs still high, canning big game meat could be a money-saver for many families.

Canning meat and wild game is as easy as canning preserves. This method offers several advantages - some of which most homemakers haven't considered.

For one, it's economical. Not only does canning save freezer space and electricity, but also it can eliminate the need for purchasing an expensive appliance or renting a good locker.

Canned meats also are convenient. Since they're already precooked, they take very little time to prepare and can be used in stews, soups and other main dishes.

Or, combine meat with other ingredients before canning to make spaghetti sauces, chili sauces and sloppy-joe mixtures.

In addition, canned goods don't require thawing - which takes

time and is easily forgotten. Processing meats requires a pressure cooker. It's the only kitchen utensil that supplies enough heat (240 degrees F.) to destroy bacteria that causes botulism, flat-sour and other types of spoilage.

When canning big game, follow the same procedures recommended for beef, pork, veal or lamb found in most cookbooks.

Meat should be well-bleed and chilled thoroughly before canning. Wash game meat, but don't soak it in salt water.

If desired, sear or roast the meat before packing it in containers for processing - or pack it without preliminary cooking.

However, processing procedures for cooked meats differ from uncooked ones. So, check the recipe.

Remove as much gristle, bone and fat from the meat as possible. This cuts down on the wild flavor.

With the cold pack method - using uncooked meat, fill jars to within one inch of the top, loosely packing pieces to insure thorough heat penetration during processing. Don't add any liquid.

When packing precooked meat, add enough liquid to cover the meat - plus one-half teaspoon salt per pint for flavor.

Wipe jar tops with a clean, wet cloth and adjust the cap. Then partially seal the lid. Follow recommended canning times for your area and altitude.

Before tasting or using a jar of processed meats or non-acid fruits and vegetables, boil the contents for 10-15 minutes in an open vessel.

A little work and preparation

are the main ingredients for making the fireplace the center of interest during the Christmas season and on any cold evening.

By log treating or paper log making, red, green, blue, orange or purple flames can be produced. Flame color depends on the chemicals used to treat the material burned in the fireplace.

Calcium chloride can be used to produce orange colored flames copper chloride, blue; potassium chloride; purple; stantium nitrate red; lithium chloride, carmine; and copper sulfate, emerald green.

Potassium chloride and copper sulfate can be purchased from a local drugstore and the other chemicals can be ordered by the drugstore.

Dry pine cones or small blocks or chips of wood soaked in these solutions will produce multi-colored flames when placed on a hot bed of coals.

To treat the cones or wood, a pail and an open mesh sack are needed. Place the cones or chips in the sack and immerse them in a solution containing one pound of chemical dissolved thoroughly in one gallon of water. Weight the bag down so the material is completely covered by the solution. Allow the cones or wood to soak at least 10 minutes.

The drier the material before soaking, the better the results.

After soaking, allow the treated material to dry thoroughly. Use old newspapers to protect the floor or surface of the drying area. The treated material will be ready for use in the fireplace after drying overnight.

"Logs" can be made of loosely rolled newspapers tied with a heavy twine and soaked in a solution of four pounds of copper sulfate and three pounds of rock salt in a gallon of water. Allow several days for the logs to dry thoroughly. Once dry, a paper log will burn a long time, producing a rainbow of colors.

From the County Agent

Governor Dolph Briscoe has issued a challenge to Texas Agricultural leaders to become No. 1 in total agricultural income in the nation. Texas currently ranks third. However, officials of the Texas Agricultural Extension Service estimate that with the continued growth in Texas' agricultural industry, the state could be on top of the heap by 1980. A look at a few factors shows that the No. 1 spot is within reach.

In the past five years Texas' total agricultural income has increased 48 percent, one of the highest in the nation. By comparison, Texas' total agricultural income increased only 18 percent during the period 1964-68. So, the state's agricultural industry has tremendous momentum.

The state's agricultural income totaled \$4,057 billion in 1972 and is projected at \$6.519 billion by 1976, far surpassing the goal of \$3.76 billion by 1976 set by the Extension Service in 1969. By 1980 the total agricultural income of Texas from the sale of crops and livestock can be \$9.1 billion if the trend established during the period of 1968-1973 can be maintained.

"The potential for Texas to be No. 1 in the nation in agricultural income is there," said Extension Director Dr. John E. Hutchison, in announcing the new goal. "The key to reaching the goal depends on the profitability of agricultural production - whether or not farmers and ranchers will be able to get a reasonable return on their investments."

Hutchison noted that Texas has available land resources plus emerging technology from agricultural research by the Texas Agricultural Experiment Station and U. S. Department of Agriculture to expand crop and livestock production and processing industries. Increasing domestic

and foreign markets for food and fiber products should make it profitable to further increase production.

Total cooperation and mutual support of all agencies and groups - public and private - will be required to help make Texas the top agricultural state in the nation, industry representatives agree.

Among the leading agricultural commodities as far as growth potential through 1980 is concerned are meat animals, forage and hay, poultry and eggs, food grains, feed crops, cotton, oil crops (especially soybeans) and vegetables.

Income from meat animals should increase from \$2.1 billion last year to \$3.5 billion. Income from poultry and eggs should total \$473 million, up from \$211 million in 1972. Foodgrains such as wheat and rice are expected to make dramatic increases, from \$196 million in 1972 to \$538 million by 1980.

Growth in feed crops, mainly grain sorghum and corn, is expected to more than double in the next eight years to \$984 million. Increased demands are expected to cause exceptional increases in cotton income, from \$417 million to \$1.591 billion, and income from oil crops, from \$79 million to \$271 million. Vegetables should generate an income of about \$231 million by 1980, up from \$156 million in 1972.

In addition to these, other agricultural related commodities are also expected to make significant contributions in the state's goal.

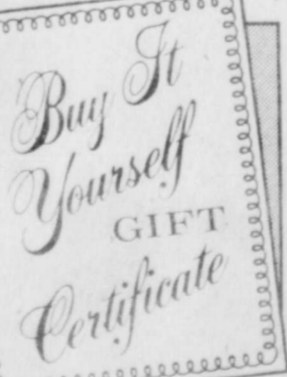

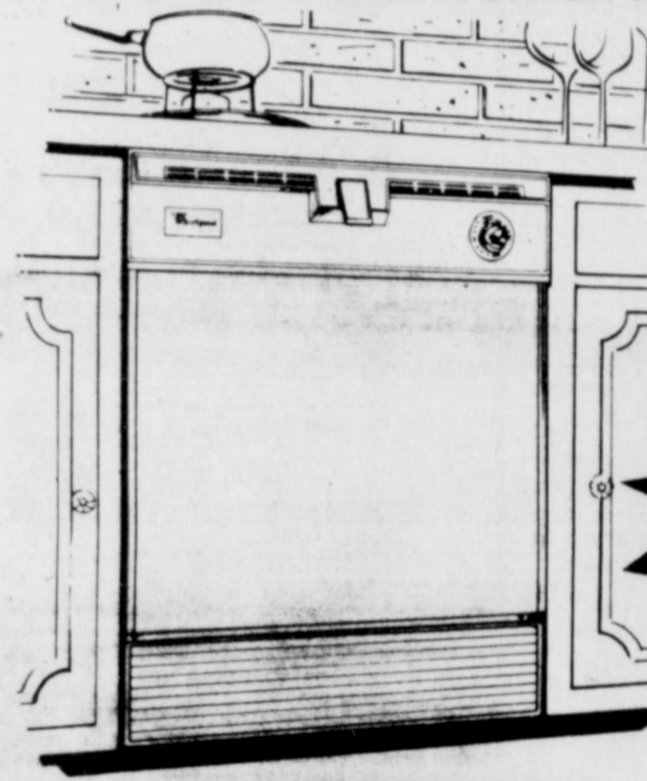

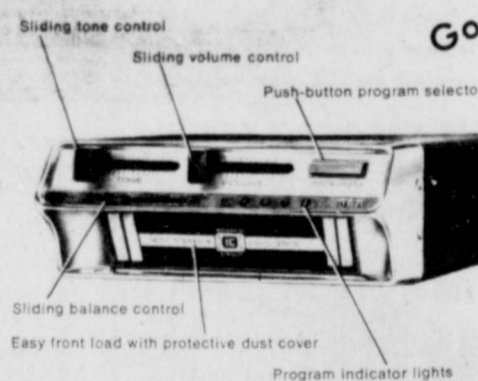
