stock show gave Mills County 4-H and FFA boys and girls a chance to sell their animals. Stock show boosters were present for the auction from all around Goldthwaite -- Lampasas, Priddy, Mullin, Lometa, San Saba Hamilton and Brownwood.

The 1973 sales total was \$14,049.40.

According to Layton Black chairman of the committee, it was a very good sale with overwhelming response from the buyers.

The auction sale was held at Mills County Commission Barn facilities. This afforded many boosters an opportunity to attend who in previous years were un-able to take part in the bidding on stock in person.

Other members of the sales committee were Sig Jernigan, Don Geeslin, Joe S. Langford, Y. B Johnson, John Smith, Thurman Johnson, Glen Love, June Clifton and Thomas Earl Winters. According to announcement, turkeys originally belonging to Pat Wells were bought and redonated for sell again and again until the total amount donated to Mills County 4-H and FFA Association totaled \$780 on just those animals.

A total of \$618.00 in prize money was received by exhibitors during the Mills County Livestock Show.



modern weight-lifting machine with fifteen built-in stations. A selector button is pushed for the ber of pounds desired to lift,




Hosts for the occassion were her three daughters and the staff of the nursing home.
