


E. L. Pass Celebrates 97th Birthday Recently

experiencing high unemployment, easy credit and good educations it is hard to believe that a man who will be 97 years old Feb. 13, 1974, has not owed any money for eighty years, only got through the fifth reader and finds plenty to do each hour of the day.

Born Feb. 13, 1877, Ephriam Laffayette Pass, the son of Robert Pass of Arkansas, he is known by many as Uncle Eaf or Born in Bell County near Bartlett, Tex., his parents moved to Copperas Cove, Tex., when he was three years old. He can remember when he was about five or six years old that the grade base was up for the Santa Fe railroad into Copperas Cove but it was some time before the steel rails were laid.

Starting to a country school at Crossville at six years of age he can recall a man by the name of Tom Poke riding his horse down the road by the school on way to his farm. About a year later this man was hung from a tree for stealing horses by vigilantes.

He is a God fearing man who regrets he is unable to attend church services as he used to but reads his Bible each day He exercises each day with his many activities, but never lays down for a daytime nap. The Energy Shortage will never affect him very much as he can cook and heat by wood, gas, elec. or kerosene. He still lives alone, cooking all his meals. Breakfast is his main meal with 5 bisquits, syrup and coffee each on his wood cook stove instead

L. is one of the very few who have owned a Hudson Terra-plane pickup, about a 1935 model purchased new for \$600.

His advice to having a good and long life is to work and exercise each day, be careful of what you eat (he gave up tobacco after several years after deciding it wasn't good for him), stay at home and miding his own business, love everybody and look for a better day tomorrow.







As part of a discussion on fire control and the classes of fire (A - B - C - D), Bullard demonstrated taking away air by smoth-ering the flame of a candle; smothering the flame of a kitchen fire (pot of burning grease class B) and taking away the air or oxygen of another class B fire - a burning gasoline rag.

The audience also witnessed the burning of steel (steel wool); the loud shotgun-like explosion of one drop of gasoline and they saw the wiring burn inside the wall and in the attic of Bullard's model house - (Class C)

With each sequence of animated and actual fire hazard of the various classes both inside and outside the house and around the farm, Bullard gave applicable prevention and control suggestions. For fire control, Bullard pointed out that many fires in home, vehicles, equipment and other buildings can be extinguished while in the inclpient

This very educational fire pro gram was brought to the high schools under the sponsorship of the Mills County Farm Bureau.
