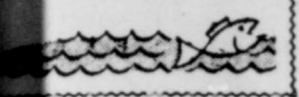

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- Insulation, weather stripping and caulking around doors and windows.

- Block air conditioning vents, or in the case of heating, the hot air vents.
- Cool or heat unused rooms.
- Use higher flame on range than required.
- Pre-heat the oven any longer than necessary.

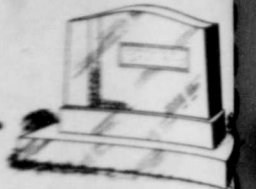

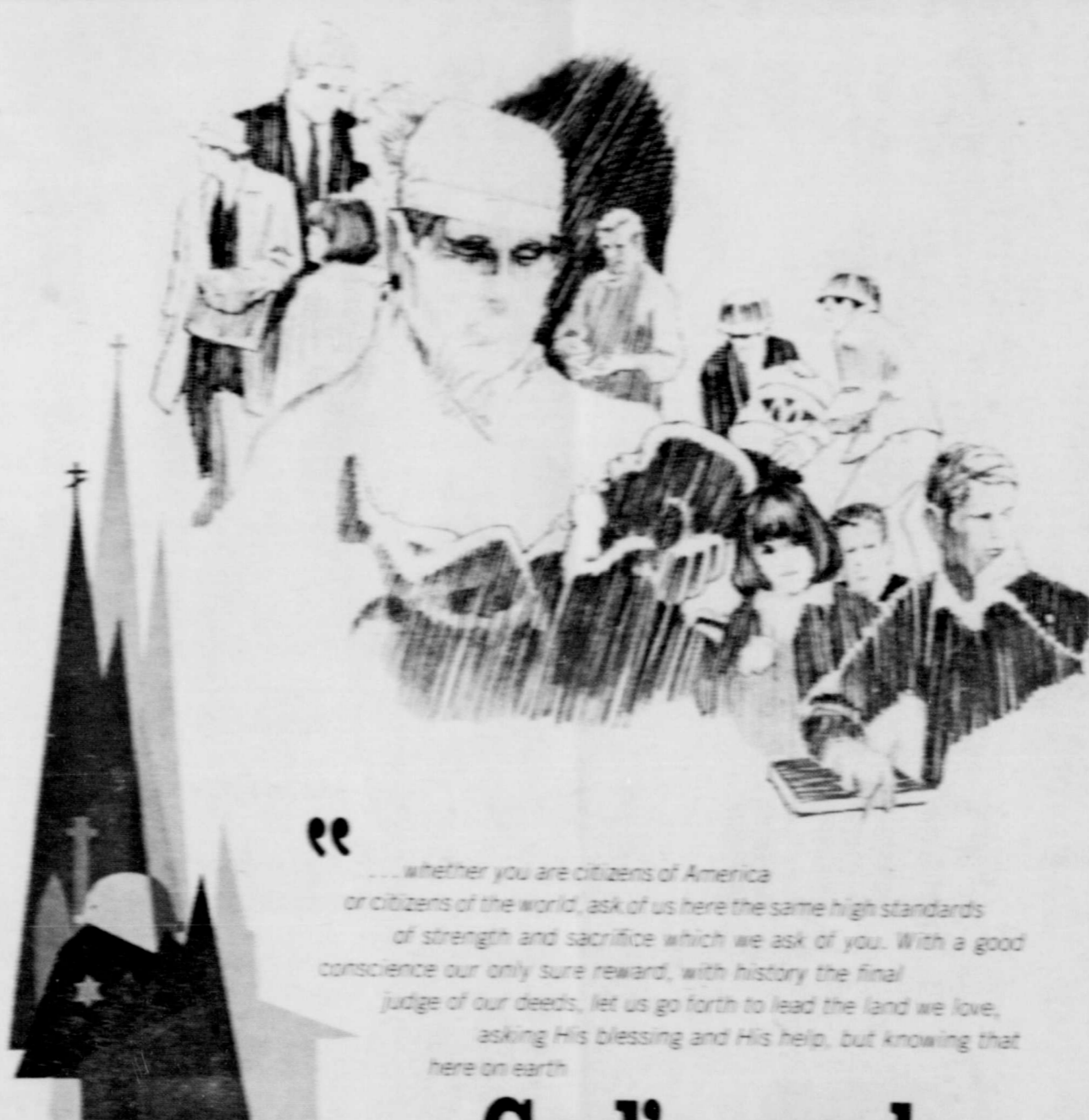

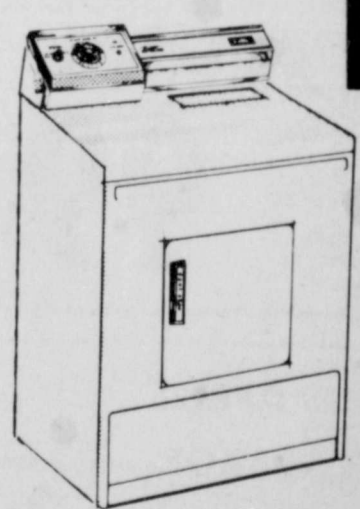
