GISD Board Of Trustees Hear From Students

A group of concerned students and parents met with the Goldthwaite Independent District School Board of Trustees Monday night and discussed the school's policy on the length of boys' hair.

Goldthwaite High School Principal Ray Standley confronted some fifteen boys recently and recommended to them that they receive hair cuts as the hair was not in accordance with the school policy.

Mr. Standley interpreted the rule saying that no hair touching the ears or collar in the back.

The group present asked that the code be relaxed and that boys be allowed to wear their hair in accordance with "the style of today."

Board chairman Hubert Berry commented that it was the Board's opinion that no rule be passed until the dress code is reviewed at its regular time during the summer. Until then the judgement of Mr. Standley was to be backed fully by the school board.

Later, Trustee Milton Schwartz moved that the school board review the dress code in the summer of this year and ask the Student Council to make any desired changes and recommendations then for the coming year. Mike Hoover seconded the motion and it carried unanimously.

In other board action the days

that were missed last month due to the flu epidemic will be made up during the Easter holidays. There will be no extra holidays at Easter time.

The present schedule of school hours was left unchanged following some discussion by the board of trustees.

The regular financial report was given by Supt. Gilbert Davis and the trustees paused for some time to check the delinquent tax roll. At this time some \$3000 is left uncollected on this roll. The

school and district collected over 97 percent of its tax this year.

Mrs. W. L. Sides was appointed by the board as election judge and for the April 6 election. Miss Greta Sue Hines was appointed as a clerk and Mrs. Sides will be asked to find another clerk.

The board unanimously passed a resolution approving the adult education program now being carried on at the high school. The program, conducted by the Central Texas College of Killeen, has a varied curriculum and is open to the public.

Supt. Davis mentioned that the coming school year will see Goldthwaite included in a special education program area. Mills, Hamilton, and Coryell counties will make up the area with twenty-three teachers, ten aides and three supervisors to be engaged to handle the special education recommendations.

The board unanimously approved the text books recommended by the text book committee for the 1974-75 school year.

Gray and Arguio had the car stolen for only thirty minutes when they were apprehended.

Eagles Runner-Up In Hamilton Relays

Goldthwaite High School Track Team took the runner-up trophy in the Hamilton Bulldog Relays last Saturday. Goldthwaite totaled 109 1/2 points during the meet. McGregor took first place with 175 points. Other team standings were Clifton, 92; Hamilton, 55 1/2; De Leon, 32; Hico, 22; Dublin, 4; and Cranfills Gap, 1.

The Eagles took second place in the 440 Relay with a time of 46.2, and third in the mile relay with a time of 3 minutes, 43.5 seconds.

Eagle Mike Simon took second place in the 100 yard dash with a time of 10 flat and Larry Elliott came in sixth with a 10.5.

Simon placed second in the 220 dash with a 23.6. Dale Page took second in the 440 dash with a time of 54.5 and Guenaro Siller came in fourth with a 54.9. Goldthwaite's Hugh Taylor placed sixth in the 880 run with a time of 22.8.

In the mile run Thomas Hall took second place with a time of

5 minutes, 50.7 and Eddie Martinez came in sixth with 5 min., 44.1.

Broad jump winners from Goldthwaite were Siller, placing fifth and Simon coming in sixth.

Byron Landrum won fifth in the high jump. He also placed sixth in the pole vault. David Miller won first in the pole vault with a jump of 10 ft. 6 in. Steve Gist placed fifth in the event.

Larry Elliott took first place in the Disc with a throw of 123 ft. 8 in. Miller placed

fifth in the disc throw. Elliott took second in the shot put with a 42 ft. 11 in.

Goldthwaite Track Team will be entered in the Brownwood Meet scheduled Saturday, March 16, at the new track field in Brownwood. Fifty-two schools will be participating in the meet. The schools will be divided into four divisions according to their districts.

Preliminary events begin at 9:30 Saturday morning and finals will start at 2 p. m.

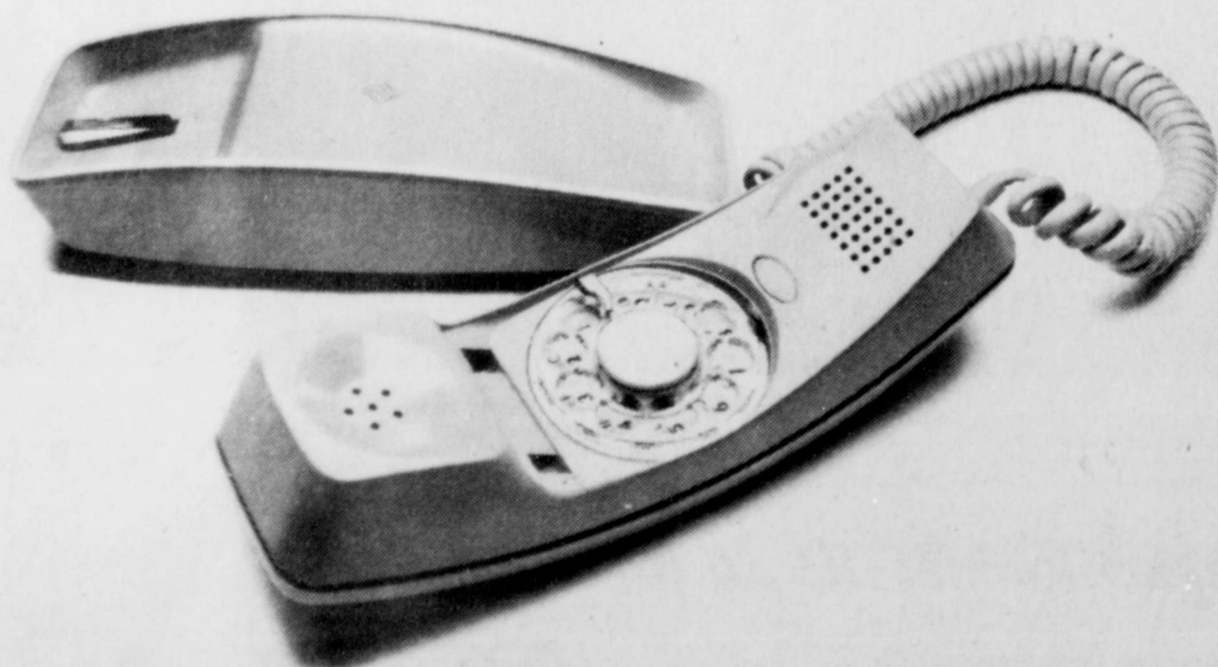

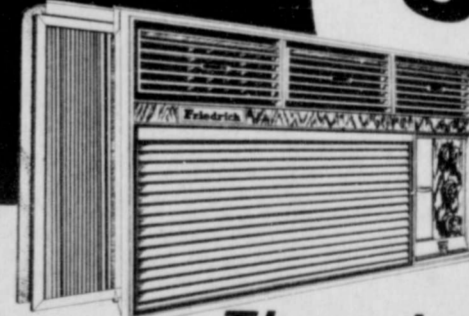

Extension Highlights

Two seniors and two juniors will be picked to represent Mills County at the District Contest April 6 at Glen Rose.

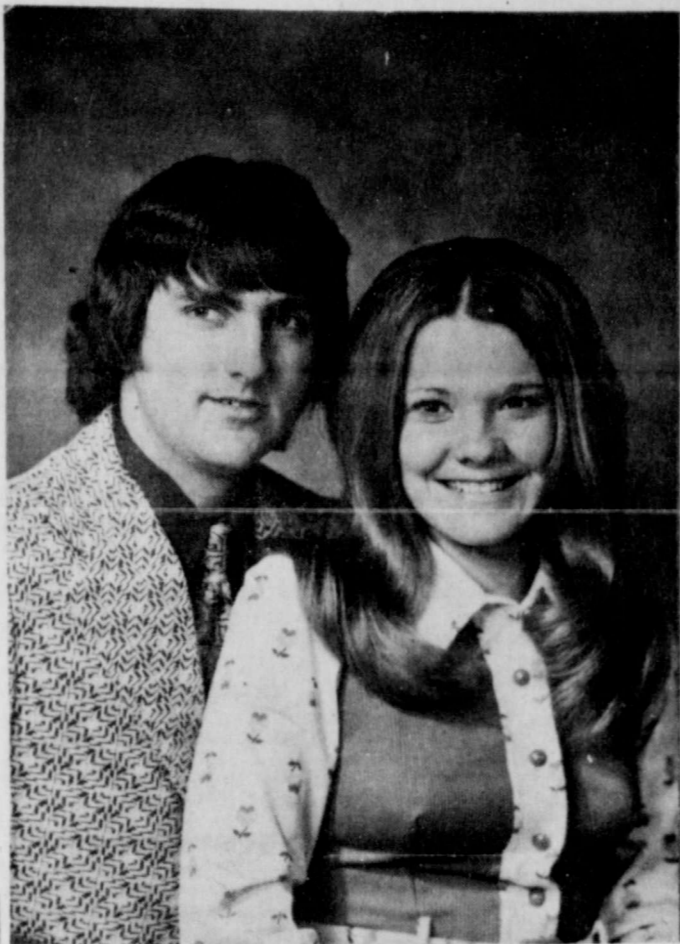

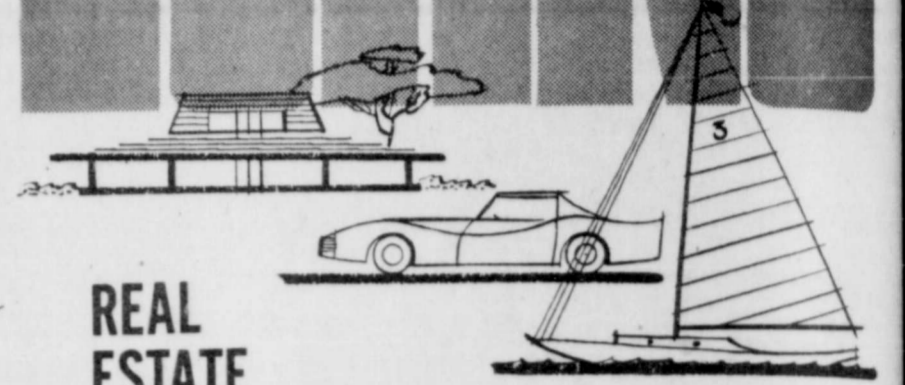
I want to thank you for running the story and picture of my father. I had thought of such a thing for his 100th anniversary, but wasn't thinking about it at this time!

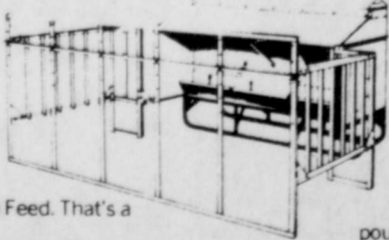

"Despite medical scientific advances," Collier explained, "the ranks of the crippled are growing. This is because of population growth, increased number of accidents and medical treatment which saves victims of crippling diseases who might not have lived in past years."

Quoting the annual report of the Easter Seal Society for Crippled Children and Adults of Texas, he said that 18 affiliated treatment centers are in operation in Texas. They include treatment and rehabilitation centers, recreation and educational programs, and many others.

"Through these programs, persons with a wide variety of handicaps receive the help they need to live normal lives," Collier said.

The largest group served includes those with major deformities of bones and joints, severe speech defects, cerebral palsy, arthritis, muscular dystrophy and multiple sclerosis and stroke.

LEGAL NOTICE

Pork Referendum and Producer Board Election

Being certified by the Commissioner of Agriculture of the State of Texas for this purpose, the Texas Pork Producers Association, 2422 Tabor, Sherman, Texas 75090, proposes a referendum election on May 14, 1974 under provision of Article 55c, Vernon's Civil Statutes, on the proposition of whether or not the pork producers in the State of Texas shall assess themselves a maximum amount of 10 cents per head on all slaughter animals to be collected at the point of first processing or sale and to elect members of a 15 member commodity producers board to administer proceeds of such assessment to be used for research, predator control, disease and insect control, education, and promotion designed to encourage the production, marketing, and use of pork.

The referendum and election will be held by mail ballot which will be provided to all eligible voters not later than 15 days prior to the election. Ballots

must be mailed to the polling place at Sherman, Texas before midnight on the date of the election.

Any person within this state engaged in the business of producing, or causing to be produced slaughter hogs for commercial purposes is eligible to vote, including owners of farms and their tenants and sharecroppers, if such person would be required to pay the assessment proposed.

Any person qualified to vote at the referendum may place his name in nomination for membership on the proposed commodity producers board by application to the above organization signed by himself and at least ten other persons eligible to vote in the referendum. Such applications must be filed at least 30 days prior to the election date.

Any person qualified to vote who does not receive a ballot prior to April 30, 1974 may obtain one at his local County Agent's Office.
