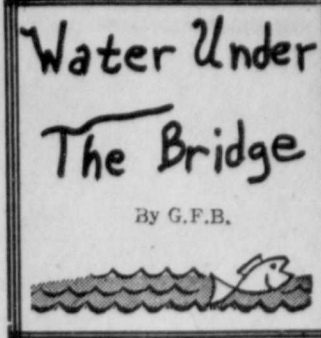

Weed Control, Fish Farming Clinics Coming May 7th

A Clinic on Aquatic Weed Control and Raising Catfish in farm ponds has been scheduled for May 7, 1974. The Clinic is designed to assist farmers and ranchers with weed control problems in their farm ponds and to give a format of general production information on the techniques and procedures of raising Catfish in farm ponds and in cages.

The meeting will begin at 8:00 p. m. in the meeting room of the Mills County State Bank. Mr. James T. Davis, Fisheries Specialist with the Texas Agricultural Extension Service will be on hand to present the program and to answer questions. The public is invited and participants are encouraged to bring farm pond weed samples to the meeting for identification and control recommendations.

siderably slower than in the years before. According to Walter A. (Toby) Bryant, absentee voting closed Tuesday, April 30, with approximately 62 votes cast.

Three men and one woman are on the ballot for governor. They are W. H. (Bill) Posey, Frances

(Sissy) Farenthold, Dolph Briscoe and Steve S. Alexander.

Hugh Edburg and Bob Bullock are the candidates for Comptroller of Public Accounts.

In the election for state treasurer are Jesse James and Donald B. Yarborough.

Candidates for Commissioner of Agriculture are John C. White and Herbert (Peanut) Schroeder.

Railroad Commissioner (unexpired term) candidates are Mack Wallace and C. A. Kelly.

Candidates for member, State Board of Education, 11th District, are Tom Joseph and Glen L. Smith.

Two offices are being contested in Mills County this year. They are county judge, and county commissioner from precinct 2.

Cecil Egger and Herbert Faulkner are candidates for the office of County Judge.

Candidates for County Commissioner, Precinct 2, are Fred Wall and Lewis (Jeff) Watson.

Other state, district, and local offices are not being contested.

A very controversial issue will be voted on Saturday also. Voters will have the opportunity to vote for or against a law permitting pari-mutual horse wagering.

Mills County voters are reminded that this year, as it was two years ago, Co. Commissioners are elected on a County-wide basis and not just on the precinct level.

Every voter in the county will have the responsibility to vote on the commissioners of the county.

This was done by the Commissioners' Court to get fairer representation of the people on the ruling body.

Robert Berry Essay Takes Top Honors In Contest

Robert L. Berry won first place with this paper in which he has explained the meaning of the Preamble to the Constitution. The contest was sponsored by Howard Payne College's Democracy in Action program. Robert is an eighth grade student. He received \$125 for his paper.

The Preamble to the Constitution of the United States

The preamble to the United States Constitution was a preliminary statement introducing the Constitution and stating its purposes. As for introducing the Constitution, the preamble gave people an inside look at the Constitution in its few lines. One of the most important stated purposes of the Constitution is that the government are establishing the government to form a better country and establish the rights of all free men. The preamble further established that the people had supreme power in the formation of the government and the Constitution.

"We, the people of the United States,"

Actually, the United States Constitution and preamble were written by forty-two men. Even so, they represented all the people of the new nation. Really only a small percentage of the people in America had an education. That is one reason that these forty-two men were chosen to represent the people. They were all distinguished men, such as Alexander Hamilton, Benjamin Franklin, James Madison, Charles Pinckney, and John Dickinson. All of these men were well-educated. Most of them were lawyers and they were all connected with the law in some way.

These forty-two men, who represented so many people, merely transformed the ideas of the people into sound statements to be written into the Constitution. " . . . in order to form a more perfect Union, . . ."

At the time the Constitution was being formed the United States had been independent for five years.

Until this time, the form of government was a Confederation between the States. In this confederation all thirteen states agreed to band together in a Union for the betterment of all.

This form of government was designed to give the states most of the power and the Confederation little. A majority vote of the states was needed to get a proposal passed. The officials of the central government had little or no power, for they could only urge the states in certain areas.

Even though the Constitution said "a more perfect Union" it really meant a better Union, for when perfection has been reached it cannot be improved.

" . . . establish justice, . . ."

At this period in the United States history, justice was only maintained on a local level, and there was little at this level.

There was a strong desire and need for a unified form of justice, which most Americans thought they were denied while under British control.

The preamble assured that justice would be provided for in the Constitution. " . . . insure domestic tranquillity, . . ."

After the United States won its independence there were riots and many other forms of public disturbances. There were even

small rebellions such as Shay's rebellion. At one time there was the threat of civil war.

The preamble stated that there would be peacefulness, calm, and quiet, under the Constitution, for the individual, in the three words above.

" . . . provide for the common defense, . . ."

In this part of the preamble the right of defense was assured to the people. They were told, by the preamble; that the Constitution would apply the people with international, national, and local defense. One of the reasons the Americans broke bonds with England and revolted was because they were deprived of this right.

" . . . promote the general welfare, . . ."

In this section of the preamble the people state they will stand behind the government and country which they have formed, always striving to improve it for the best interests of all.

The preamble stated that the old, disabled, handicapped, and sick would be taken care of. " . . . and secure the blessings of liberty to ourselves and our posterity . . ."

In this section of the preamble, the people are assured that liberty, which they hold so dear, will be guaranteed in the Constitution, both for themselves and for future generations. All Americans were eager for liberty of the individual since that was one of their main reasons for going to war against England.

One tree will produce enough pulp in 18-20 years to make 112 pounds of paper. This paper will make 200 bags that will carry 100 pounds each, which totals ten tons.

The posterity of a person or persons are their descendants of future generations, thus when the preamble said, "and our posterity", it meant their future descendants to come.

" . . . do ordain and establish this Constitution for the United States of America."

The preamble closed with words stating that the people ordered and formed the Constitution for their country.

Actually the preamble brought out all things which are and cherished by free men.

Extension Highlights

BY JUDY BEAVERS

Mills County Extension Agent

Jelly from some of spring's earliest fruits - dewberries and blackberries - is an all-time Texas favorite.

"If you can buy these berries at a reasonably low price - or have them growing in a garden,

turn them into homemade jelly."

It's a treat for your family - and friends love it as a gift.

To successfully prepare jelly at home, use the following instructions:

After sorting three quarts of

dewberries or blackberries, wash them and remove any stems or caps. Expect about four cups of juice from three quarts of berries.

Ripe berries can be crushed and juice pressed out without heating. Otherwise, add a small amount of water and bring to a boil on high heat.

Place prepared fruit in a clean, white cloth bag - then twist and press to remove juice. Pour four cups of juice in a large pan.

Add seven and one-half cups sugar and place on high heat. Stirring constantly, bring quickly to a full, rolling boil that cannot be stirred down.

Add one bottle liquid pectin and return to a full, rolling boil. Boil hard for one minute. Remove from heat and skim off foam quickly.

Pour jelly immediately into hot, dry, sterilized jars or glasses. Sterilize jars and glasses by boiling them in water for 15 minutes. Fill containers to within one-eighth inch of top.

Seal immediately with a lid,

according to manufacture's directions. Or, fill glasses to within one-half inch of top and cover with melted paraffin. Add enough paraffin to make a layer one-eighth inch thick. Prick air bubbles.

This recipe makes 11 or 12 six-ounce jars of jelly.

The recipe for dewberry and blackberry jam is available in the extension office. Come by and see us. We are in the basement of the courthouse.

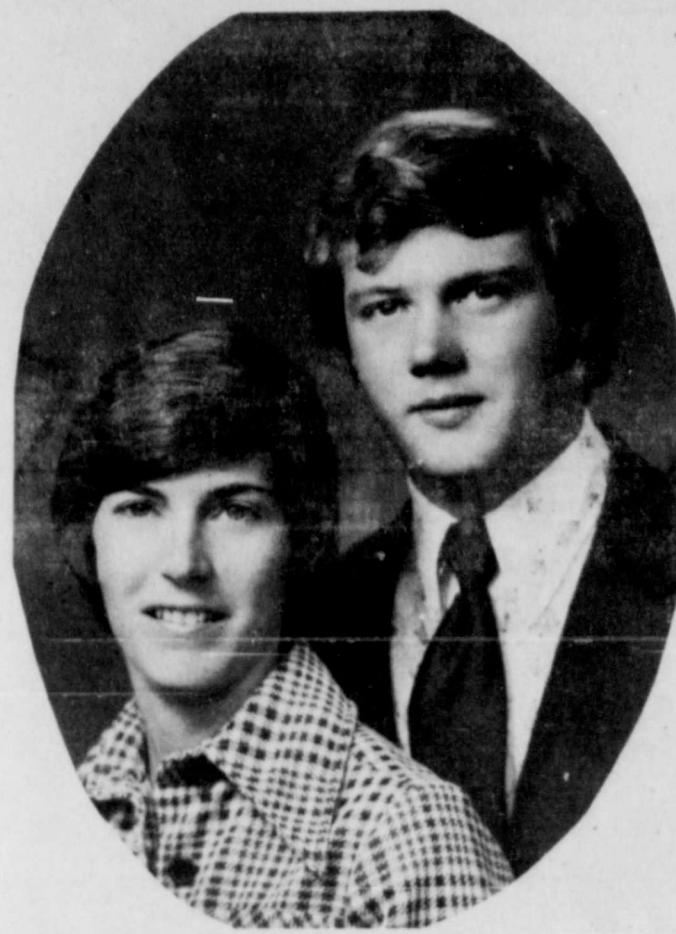
