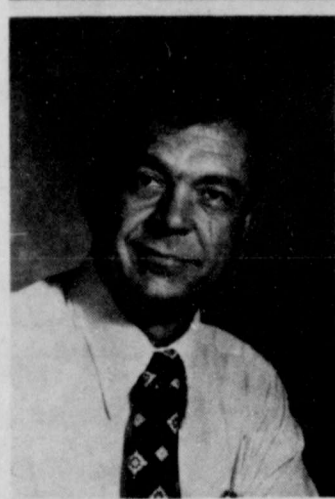
G. W. Michael New Principal At GHS

George W. Michael has been employed by the Goldthwaite School Board to replace Ray Standley as High School Principal.

Mr. Michael was born in May, Texas May 13, 1930, and is 44 years old. He graduated from May High School, May, Texas. He attended Daniel Baker College in Brownwood and received his Bachelor of Science in Education in 1951. He attended Texas Christian University and received his Master of Education in 1953. His major in school has been Administrative Education and Social Sciences with a minor in Physical Education. He has been approved for his Doctoral Degree from East Texas State University.

Mr. Michael began his teaching and coaching at Gorman schools from 1951 to 1954. He taught and coached at Rising Star and served as principal at Crosbyton Jr. High, Rolls High School, Van Vleet School, Hereford, Belton Elementary School and is Asst. Principal at Alamo Elementary in Galveston at present.

Mr. Michael has been a member of various school and civic organizations, once being selected as "Who's Who in Texas". Mr. Michael will be moving to Goldthwaite in the near future.

School Board Sets Evaluation At \$8,438,770 For 1975

The Goldthwaite School Board met Monday night and adopted the taxing schedule for the coming year.

No wholesale changes were made in any of the methods used by the board. Only the valuation of some parcels of property were updated.

In 1973-74 the rendition on the tax roll for the Goldthwaite Independent School District was \$8,181,520 and for the coming 1974-75 school year the rendition was raised to \$8,438,770. This increase in evaluation is the only increase. The actual tax rate remains at its present \$1.65 per \$100 value.

RC&D Meets To Discuss Plans

Last Thursday night a group of interested members of the Resource Conservation and Development Committee of Mills County met in the conference room of the USDA Building in Goldthwaite and heard reports of pending action and progress of the RC & D project for our area.

The project, under the guidance of the Central Texas Council of Governments, can utilize federal funds when they become available for the development of any conceivable project for the betterment of our natural resources.

Charles Obermiller of Belton, planning engineer with the Central Texas Council of Governments, reported to the group about the methods employed in gathering information for the submission of preapplications for grants and financial assistance. Raging Fire Saturday Destroys Local Residence

Two fires of undetermined origin struck the same residence on Hanna Valley Road Saturday, finally resulting in the complete destruction of the dwelling.

The house, belonging to Burns, is located about a half-mile from the City Limits on Hanna Valley Road, just west of Goldthwaite.

Firemen answered a call at 12:30 p. m. to the house and quickly doused a small blaze on the front porch on the southeast corner of the house. Firemen were unable to determine exactly what caused this fire to start.

Then at about 4 p. m. the fire phone rang again and the fire fighters returned to the scene and found the house on fire, this time on the opposite corner from the first combustion. This fire started in the bedroom at that part of the dwelling.

The house had been occupied

just one day by Mr. and Mrs. Lee Cunningham and their three children. No one was at home at the time of the fires.

The official fire department report listed the occurrences as two separate fires, accord-

ing to assistant Fire Chief Buddy Morgan.

This is the first major fire in Goldthwaite since the Jerry Dellis home was completely destroyed by fire in February of 1973.

FREEZING FRUITS VEGETABLES AT HOME

Freezing fruits and vegetables is a year round menu with fresh flavor. But the value and quality of fruits and vegetables depends largely on the treatment given them. Freezing, storage temperature and method of cooking are important.

Most fruit can be frozen satisfactorily. Select sound, ripe fruit which is slightly ripener than you would use for fresh eating. Tree or vine ripened fruit contain more vitamins and flavor than fruits picked before ripening.

General fruit is prepared for freezing as for eating. Keep fruit until it is frozen. Wash fruit in cold water but do not allow to stand in the water. Some fruits, such as peaches, lose food value and flavor when they get water soaked.

Ascorbic acid (vitamin C) is found in tablet, crystalline or powdered form. Use 1/2 teaspoon of this per quart of syrup to prevent this discoloration. If you don't want to pack the fruit in syrup, sprinkle dissolved ascorbic acid over fruit just before freezing. Use 1/2 teaspoon per cup cold water to each quart of fruit.

Special commercial anti-freezing preparations of ascorbic acid are now on the market. These materials can be found in grocery stores or where other freezing supplies are sold.

Most fruits have better texture and flavor if packed in syrup or syrup. Some may be frozen without sweetening for special diets. The way you plan to use the fruit determines the method of freezing it. Fruit packed in a syrup generally is better for use; fruit packed in dry sugar or unsweetened is better for cooking because there is less liquid in the products.

When getting vegetables, select the freshest. The longer the vegetables are in the freezer, the better the quality. During hot weather, freeze vegetables in the early morning before they absorb much moisture. Vegetables at optimum maturity will have best flavor and texture.

You must store vegetables in a freezer. Spread them out in a cool, well-ventilated area or packing loosely in the refrigerator.

Prepare vegetables for freezing similar to cooking them. Wash thoroughly in cold water, drain, peel, trim and cut.

Vegetables in boiling water are frozen. Use one gallon of water to each pound of vegetable. The length of heat-time varies with the vegetable. This kills enzyme action of the plants grow and mature, and if not deactivated the vegetable will develop off flavors when frozen. Scalded vegetables immediately into running cold water. When the product is cool enough to pack, drain the vegetables have been scalded and drained, pack in airtight moisture-vapor-proof containers, leaving 1/2 inch headspace. Seal according to type of container you use.

Cook all vegetables in the frozen state, except corn-on-the-cob which should be partially cooked. Cook them until tender. Add a small amount of water.

Ranchers Warned

590 confirmed screwworm infestations recorded in Texas during May compare to 176 in May and 34 in May of last year. Counties with the highest counts were in south Texas - Brewster, Big Bend, El Paso, and Elberton were confirmed in Webb County during May.

Case counts in the Hill Country area were: Val Verde, 8; Bandera, 11; Llano, 7; Burnet and Burnet, 4 each; Glasscock, 3 each; Concho and Concho, 2 each; and Beagan, Irion, Tom Green, McCulloch, Schleicher, Sutton and Blanco, 1 each.

To help eradicate screwworms, stock owners are urged to:

- 1) carefully watch their animals for infested wounds; 2) submit samples from the center of any infested wound to the screwworm laboratory; 3) treat navel of horn animals and all other wounds with a protective ointment; 4) keep the animals until the wounds are dry and all danger of screwworm infestation is gone; 5) spray or dip animals regularly.
