
Rudd Long





Fruits and vegetables can be frozen at home in glass containers. They can be reused, but be sure to examine the jars for nicks and cracks. Wash the jars in hot, soapy water, rinse and scald to be sure that they are sanitary. Invert the jars on a clean cloth to drain and

not tightly. Place the lid on the jar with sealing composition next to the glass and screw the ring tightly, Canning jar lids may be used. Clear glass makes labeling innecessary except for the date of freezing.




