Rate Increase Cited By City Council At Meeting

Water rates are being increased by the City of Goldthwaite. Effective in July, the rate for residential customers of Goldthwaite will increase from a minimum

of \$2.00 for the first 2500 gallons to \$2.50 for the first 2000 gallons. Charges for additional water will go from the present 65¢ per thousand gallons to 90¢ per thousand gallons over the

minimum.

The City Council, meeting in regular session Monday night, cited several reasons for the rising rates to customers.

1. Power costs increase at the pump stations.
2. Two water wells out of commission in the city.
3. The increase in labor costs, primarily due to the new wage and hour regulations.
4. Chemical treatment costs up.
5. Cost of materials increased (repair clamps, pipe, etc.)

All of these factors, plus the general inflationary pricing of everything the City purchases has pushed the rates up. Water production has been maintained by the use of the Colorado River pipeline system, even though two wells here are out at the present time.

The Council also raised the rates charged by the city for the residential and commercial hook-up to the water system. Water taps will now cost \$150 for a 3/4 inch line, \$225 for a 1 inch line, \$350 for a 1 1/2 inch line, and \$575 for a 2 inch connection. Present rates are \$50, \$75, \$150 and \$200 respectively.

In the past, the city would realize some return from water connections by simply selling water, but with the situation the way it is at present, the cost of water installation has to be maintained on its own.

This is the only time in the history of the City of Goldthwaite that water taps have been increased in cost.

An increase in the wholesale electric rate was also approved by the Council. City Manager Don Petty received word that the wholesale rates charged the City by the Lower Colorado River Authority will be raised 47.04 percent immediately.

LCRA is increasing its wholesale rates from a low of 42.48 percent to a high of 49.12 percent to over 30 cities and 11 cooperatives along the Colorado River in Central Texas.

The Council reworked the amount charged by the City for the use of equipment also. Backhoe, bucket truck, motor grader, mower tractor, are all at \$15 per hour now, instead of the previous \$10 per hour charge. Other city equipment charges were raised also.

In other council business, the sale of the old dump grounds was approved and a lease of a land with W. A. Cline was negotiated.

1200 Mills Residents Receive Social Security During 1973

Social security benefits were paid to 1200 residents of Mills County at a rate of \$138,000 a month at the close of 1973. Glen McNatt, social security manager in Brownwood, said today. In the three counties (Mills, Brown, Comanche) served by the Brownwood office, the total annual rate of payments was over 15 1/2 million dollars, to 10,540 people. Since the first of 1974, the benefits have been raised 11 percent, with 7 percent of the raise paid beginning April, and the other 4 percent to be paid beginning early July. The annual payment rate then will be almost 17 1/4 million dollars in the three-county area.

Of the beneficiaries in Mills County, 870 are retired workers and their dependents. Another 220 are receiving benefits as survivors of workers who died, and over 100 are paid as disabled workers or their dependents.

McNatt pointed out that although most social security beneficiaries are older people, about one of every four is under age 60. In Mills County about 50 are under age 18, receiving payments because a working father or mother died or is

getting social security disability or retirement benefits. In the 18-22 age group, some receive payments because they are full-time students, and others receive payments because they became disabled before age 22 and are children of retired, disabled, or deceased workers. The monthly payments to these young people, severely handicapped by physical or mental disabilities, will continue indefinitely.

Mrs. Holcomb will be responsible for the Manpower programs within the county. At present there are 18 participants in the summer youth program and 2 participants in the adult sector. Applications for any of these programs can be obtained from the Mills County office. We hope to provide job refer-

ral services for potential employers and employees through this office. Any comments and suggestions will be welcome and received by the Mills County Council of Governments, P. O. Box 551, Goldthwaite, 648-2622.

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From the County Agent

Low volume aerial application of herbicides can cut costs and still be just as effective as standard dosages in controlling mesquite brush.

That conclusion came out of a Texas Agricultural Experiment Station project in which an estimated 30,000 acres were treated at 20 locations in the Rolling Plains, High Plains, Trans-Pecos and South Texas.

C. H. Meadors of the Texas A&M University Agricultural Research and Extension Center at Chillicothe-Vernon said the goal of the continuing research program is to combine economics with safer, more dependable brush control methods. The result should be better and cheaper forage production along with easier livestock handling.

The study so far has involved herbicide rates varying from 1/8

to 1 pound per acre in volumes of 1/8, 1/2, 1 and 4 gallons an acre. Carriers have been oil-water emulsions, diesel oil, special oils and prepackaged formulations.

Meadors said applications of 1/2 pound 2,4,5-T, combinations of 2,4,5-T and picloram, and dicamba in 1 gallon of a 1 to 6 diesel oil-water emulsion have been as effective for mesquite control as 1/2 pound of the herbicides in 4 gallons of a 1 to 3 oil-water emulsion per acre.

Low volume, low pressure aerial spray equipment was used in 42 foot swaths.

This low volume system is a reduction of 6 pints of diesel oil per acre and 18 pints of water per acre compared to conventional 4-gallon volumes, Meadors pointed out.

"It also means a 200-gallon load would treat 200 acres using 1 gallon an acre, whereas only 50 acres could be treated using 4 gallons per acre. This would appear to influence economics of brush control."

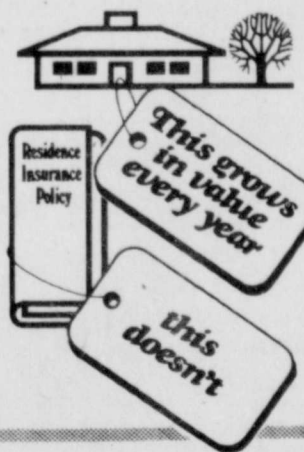

Extension Highlights

Garden Check List For July

1. When was the last time you sharpened the blades on your lawn mower? Have you changed oil or cleaned the air filter on your power garden tools? Regular maintenance pays dividends!
2. Check your plants for pests. Some of the more common mid-summer pests, their hosts, and suggested controls are:
 - a. Lace Bugs - sycamore and pyracantha - Diazinon or Malathion.
 - b. Red spider mites - Juniper, marigold and a host of others - Kelthane is best but alternate with other materials to prevent buildup of resistant strains.
 - c. Chinch bugs - St. Augustine grass - Diazinon or trithion.
 - d. Elm leaf beetle - American and Chinese elm - Sevin, Malathion, or Diazinon.
 - e. Galls - leaves and stems of oaks, hackberry, poplar - no effective controls.
 - f. Webworms - nut tree, mulberry, persimmon and others - Malathion or diazinon with a spreader sticker, or prune out and burn.
3. Low areas in the lawn may be gradually filled with shallow applications of good soil where needed. Avoid temptation to apply a layer of sandy loam over the entire lawn area just because your neighbor does. This is an excellent way to introduce new weeds, smother your grass, and bring unwanted insect and disease problems.
4. Divide spring and early summer perennials including daffodils, day lilies, iris, etc., and replant the best clumps. Discard the diseased or damaged material and share the surplus with friends if you can find a taker.
5. Unless there has been adequate rainfall, provide supplemental irrigation to save your choice plants.
6. To keep hanging baskets looking attractive, soak the baskets in a tub of water every few days in addition to the regular daily watering. This is also a good time to fertilize baskets but never apply fertilizer to dry plants.
7. Pinch mums at least one more time in early or mid-July. Late pinching will reduce flowering.
8. Going on vacation? Here are a few suggestions to keep garden looking nice while you are gone.
 - a. Provide a thorough watering before leaving.
 - b. Apply mulch to bare areas.
 - c. Mow lawn before leaving.
 - d. Arrange to have someone mow while you are away. An unmowed lawn is a dead give away that you have left.
 - e. Cut back annuals and perennials to encourage new growth and flowers for your return.
 - f. Stop newspaper, milk and other deliveries while you are away or arrange for someone to take the material into the house.
 - g. Turn and mix the material in the compost pile. Keep moist to speed up decomposition.
 - h. Plant bare areas with zinnias, marigolds and portulaca

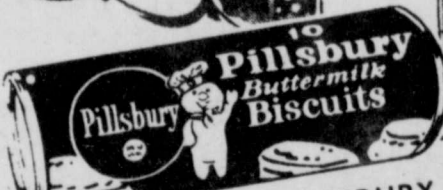

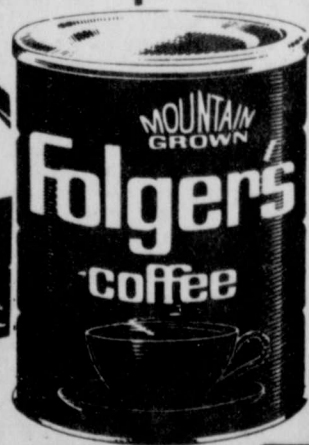

First Baptist Church Group Becomes Missionary To Mexico

Members of the First Baptist Church, Goldthwaite, became missionaries to Mexico last week, Saturday morning, June 22, twenty-five adults, youth and children boarded three cars and two pickups loaded with enough supplies, food and water for a week's stay on the Rio Grande River, and began the 13 hour trip to Porvenir, Mexico. Porvenir, Mexico is located just across the Rio Grande between Marfa and Van Horn. The last twenty miles is over rough ranch road.

The camp site, known as the Porvenir Hilton, is an old abandoned ranch quarters that has been converted by Texas Baptist missionaries along the border. The main building is made of logs and adobe, and serves as the kitchen and sleeping quarters for the women. An old metal building is used for sleeping quarters for the men, and several portable buildings have been built and moved in for families to sleep in. There is a well that is used for bathing, but not for drinking because of its high salt and mineral content. This became home for the group for the following week.

The group began their ministry by holding worship services at Pilares, Mexico on Sunday morning. Pilares is a small village about 12 miles from the camp but requires about forty-five minutes to reach by truck over the very rough roads. Sunday evening the group held services at Porvenir, Mexico, just across the river from the camp site. Moses Padilla served as the preacher for these services and the revival services during the week. Over 30 Christian decisions were made.

Monday through Thursday the group held a Vacation Bible School each morning at Pilares and at noon a preaching service followed. When the church bell was rung the people - men, women and children - would come to the church for the activities. During the Vacation Bible School the women made hats and the medical needs of the people were taken care of by a nurse. The men and boys making the trip worked building a fence around a teacherage that is nearing completion. Each day there were about eighty people in attendance for the morning activities.

At noon the group would return to camp for lunch and their afternoon siesta to escape the heat. At 6:30 p. m. a worship service was held at Porvenir, Mexico.

The group making the trip came back much more appreciative of those things we consider necessities in the United States. The great need of the area is water for their crops, animals and for drinking. At present Texas Baptists are trying various ways to help meet this need for water.
