No Increase In Base Rate

Goldthwaite electric users will be paying more for their electricity next month, but not as much as originally thought by city officials.

Their large increase just added to the wholesale rate charged the City by LCRA will be wholly absorbed by the City because of a general rate increase that was enacted last

The only extra costs facing citizens will be the addition of costs that the city will directly pass on to customers. This fuel cost adjustment means that the LCRA has had to buy fuel at higher prices this month than before and that this exact figure is passed on to the City and then passed on to customers. The fuel cost has been coming in since last November, but it

city can no longer absorb these costs. Over \$20,000 has been paid for the extra fuel costs to

At a special called City Council meeting last Monday night, the council chose to pass on the fuel costs on a month by month basis. It is difficult to estimate what fuel costs will be; they have ranged from a low of .1 cents per Kilowatt Hour to a recent high of .57 cents per KWH this

past month. On the basis of the minimum and maximum fuel costs added by LCRA in the preceding months, a chart showing the amount of increase in electrical billing has been prepared. This chart, using a scale of 200, 800 and 2000 KWH customers also compares Goldthwaite electrical rates with Brownwood and Hamilton Co-op.





Take the high cost out of cleaning rugs and upholstered furniture by making your own sham-

A quart of cleaning shampoo

at the store costs about \$2.00,

but you can make the same cleaner for less than 10 cents. Use a rotary egg beater to whip one-fourth cup of light-duty

detergent with one pint of warm water into a stiff foam. To prepare the upholstery or rug for cleaning, first thoroughly vacuum any dust and ground-in dirt. Then clean a small area at a time with a soft brush or

using only the dry suds. It's a good idea to try this first on an inconspicuous area of the item to make sure none

of the colors bleed. If the colors don't run, continue rubbing the suds into a ittle area at a time in overlapping circles. Remove the soiled lather with a spatula from clean, slightly damp cloth or

soaking the soil eight to ten inches deep. Maintain a preventive spray program for blackspot and mil-

dew control. Spray every week to 10 days from the time new growth starts in the spring until a killing frost

One in every 20 preschool children in the U.S. has a vision problem. But help is now available for these children, according to one authority.

Dr. Barbara Sears, health education specialist, Texas Agricultural Extension Service, The Texas A&M University System, reported the Home Eye Test Kit which parents can use to do a vision screening of their pre-schoolers at home is now avail-

The kit is free from the Texas Society for the Prevention of Blindness, 3617 Fannin St., Houston, Tex. 77004, and is also available in Spanish.

"Any vision screening only indicates that a child may have a visual defect," Dr. Sears said. "Vision screening is not diagnostic and does not take the place of a professional eye examina-

tion," the specialist said. But the Home Eye Test Kit is the chance to locate children who have never had their vision tested, who show no outward signs of eye or vision abnor-mality, but will show readily in a screening that they are near-sighted, that they are using only one eye effectively, or that they can 'read' the chart with each eye separately but not with both eyes together," the specialist

explained.

The Home Eye Test Kit inludes a scale version of the chart, directions for training the child to take the test, for giving the test, and for in-

terpreting test results. report form, to be returned to the Society, asks the parent whether the child pass-ed the test, and if not, whether appointment has been made for an eye examination, and with

"We hope this will be an inducement for parents to obtain early visual care for their young children," Dr. Sears said.





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

THANKS, MR. SINCLAIR

As an American I'd like to say "Thanks, Mr. Sinclair, for the tribute you paid us and may we never cease to thank God for all His blessings."

You see, "In the name of God" are the opening

words of the Mayflower Compact, composed by a doughty little band of men and women in 1620 as they prepared to set foot on territory as strange them as the moon was to our spacemen. Indeed, America has had a unique background of faith from its beginning.

Many of the great documents and events that formed the foundation stones of our Republic, and testimonies of revered leaders show that ours is, in truth, ONE NATION UNDER GOD, May this serve to remind ALL Americans of our precious heritage and awaken in every man, woman, boy and girl the determination to keep it alive forever. To accomplish this, vigilance is essential. Laxity, on our part, could result in generations of young people growing up unfamiliar with the firm moral foundations upon which our country was founded. The present is full of problems and needs; yet our nation is what it is because of what it has been, together with what WE want to make it. It is important, therefore, not only that our YOUTH, but our OLDER GENERATIONS as well, remain aware of the principles that have made the United States unique. Important in this context are the words of the great Quaker, William Penn, "Unless we are governed by GOD, we will be governed by TYRANTS,"

The men and women who built America have been motivated - and in turn have motivated others - by a spiritual zeal that continues to influence the character and purpose of our life today. God forbid that we shall ever say "The Hell with the rest of the world!" May we try to live up to the French historian's quote "America is great because America is good; and if America ever ceases to be good, America will cease to be great." While we have not always lived up to our standards of morality and justice, Americans work and worship and be-

lieve in the freedom forged by our forefathers. The Declaration of Independence was written by God-fearing people. Believing in freedom of the mind and of the soul they put aside their fears of execution and struck out for justice and human values with these familiar words that are dear to hearts of us all, "We hold these truths to be self evident, that all men are created equal; that they are endowed by their Creator with certain LIBERTY and THE PURSUIT OF HAPPINESS.

The first Thanksgiving proclamation issued in 1777 contained humble, dedicated reference to ALMIGHTY GOD. Benjamin Franklin's exhortation to PRAYER broke deadlock over congressional representation at the Constitutional Convention in Philadelphia in 1787 when he rose and addressed the group, "Gentlemen, (he declared) I have lived a long time and am convinced that God governs the affairs of men. If a sparrow cannot fall to the ground without his notice, is it probable that an empire can rise without His aid? I, therefore, move that prayers emploring the assistance of Heaven be held every morning before we proceed to business." A compromise was reached and the UNITED STATES CONSTITUTION was born on the wings of prayer.

Possessing faith, courage, wisdom, justice and compassion, Abraham Lincoln, as he prepared to take up the Presidency, said, "Without the assistance of that Divine Being . . .I cannot succeed; WITH that assistance, I CANNOT fail. Trusting in Him who can go with me and remain with you and be everywhere for good let us confidently hope that ALL will yet be well." We as a NATION have progressed much since that year 1961 and on Christmas Eve 1968 three AMERICAN astronauts made man's first trip around the moon. As fifty million people watched TV and listened to radio, a voice from outer space went on through the stillness of the night to read the first verse of Genesis: "In the beginning God created the Heaven and the Earth." Then another voice and another, rang through the air as EACH of the three took his turn in reading the first ten verses of the Bible.

Again, Mr. Sinclair, we do appreciate your tribute and thanks be to God, WITH HIS HELP, we will come out of these problems you mentioned AND WATER-GATE. MAY WE NEVER thumb our nose at other lands, but think "There but for the grace of God go

In closing let me quote the last part of John F. Kennedy's inaugural address, "Let us go forth to lead the land we love, asking His blessing and His help; knowing that here on EARTH, God's work must

## Dress Code For Coming Year **Adopted By School Board**

The proposed Dress Code adopted by the Goldthwaite School Board at its regular meeting Monday night is as follows

With regard to the length and style of hair, girls shall wear no pin curls or rollers in their hair, with the exceptions for special occassions announced from the office. Hair should be neatly combed and not designed to attract undue attention to the individual. Boys' hair shall be neatly cut and groomed and shall be no longer than the bottom of the shirt collar in back or longer than the bottom of the ear in front. Boys will not wear hair bands. Both boys and girls shall keep their hair clean.

If a boy wears side burns, they should be no lower on the face then the lower part of the ear lobe. Side burns should be normal in shape. (No bell bottoms,

etc.) No mustaches or beards. SHIRTS & BLOUSES — Boys will be required to wear long-tail shirts tucked in, All buttons on shirts must be buttoned except the top one. Sport shirts that are straight around the bottom may be worn out if worn neatly. Sport shirts cut long must be tucked in. No seethrough blouses without proper under attire will be allowed. Girls will wear no blouses low

enough to attract undue attention. Clothing must cover the mid-section. No patters in material such as peace signs, or any advertising that is considered distasteful by the administration will be permitted. PANTS -

Walking shorts will be prohibited. No shorts will be allowed except in P. E. class. Pant suits and combination of pants and blouse may be worn any day of the week.


SKIRTS & DRESSES The hemline should be 58 of the length from the top of the thigh to the top of the knee (or I inch below finger tips). SHOES -

AUSTIN-Agriculture Commissioner John C. White recently reminded farmers that \$19,330,000 in soil conservation funds has been restored by the U.S. Department of Agriculture to Texas for water and land preserva-

White said the West Texas drought and dry conditions in other parts of the state make the tunds especially necessary to improve soil practices that will decrease erosion and maintain fer-

The Rural Environmental Assistance Program (RFAP) is administered by Agricultural Stabilization and Conservation offices throughout the state. Those farmers and ranchers who are seeking assistance in soil saving measures should contact their local offices. White

"Land previously set aside for conservation has been added to this year's farming acreage because of the increased demand for ex-

ports," White said, "We'll have to develop even more acreage in years to come we are to keep up with the world's need for food," Pointing to diminishing
