August Sales Tax Remittance

Comptroller of Public Accounts John Sharp's August City Sales and Use Tax Comparison showed an increase over 1995 for Bovina and Friona.

Bovina's payment this period was \$3,009.19 compared to \$2,931.27 for the same period last year, an increase of 2.65 per cent. However, for the year-to-date, Bovina's tax receipts are

down 12.51 per cent.
In 1996, Bovina has received \$17,362.69 compared to \$19,846.40 for the same period in 1995. Friona's receipts for the

current period were \$18,504.58, a 43.66 percent increase over 1995 receipts of \$12,880.41.

Total receipts in Friona for 1996 are \$153,414.82, a 78.23 per cent increase over the 1995 receipts of Hughes at Kevin's Auto. \$86.072.77 for the comparable period.

Bovina's city sales tax is one percent, while Friona's is now at two per cent, accounting for Friona's significant increase.



"We are excited about being back at school and look forward to working with your children. We welcome parents to visit the school or





Out Here

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"That smell means we are getting close to Nenaw and Papa's house, sweetheart."

"But what is it, daddy?" "Out here, I think they call it money, honey."

Conversations like this would take place near the end of our 8-hour drive from Dallas to visit grandma and grandpa in Friona.

The kids in the back seat would sit up and sniff as we got nearer and the gentle hint of many cattle drifted up their little nostrils.

In their not-so subtle child-like manner, they would ask why nenaw and papa would want to live in a place that stinks.

These were city kids with a city daddy. Sometimes I wondered the same thing. When you come to Parmer County it doesn't

take long to realize the importance of cattle to the economy.

After over a year as a resident here, I thought it was time to make my first visit to a feedyard and say hello to those beneficial bovines who spend all their time eating delicious cow food and getting fatter so we can eat them.

Since I spend most of my Mondays in Bovina, it seemed convenient to drive out west a ways and take a look at Caprock Industries' operation. What do I know? They all look alike to me.

Caprock manager Scott Nelson was kind enough to address my dumb questions, give me enough information about feedyards to make my eyes glaze over, and take me for a drive around the grounds.

This feedyard was started around 1967-68 as Parmer County Cattle Company by Cap Naegle and a group of investors that included former zillionaire Bunker Hunt, of the Dallas Hunt Oil family.

Caprock Industries, a division of Cargil Industries, who also owns Excel and a lot of other companies, bought the feedyard in 1986. From 1986 to 1992 it operated as a custom yard.

I learned that a custom yard means "open to the public." If you have some cattle out in the pasture and

"Daddy, what's that want to let the feedyard fatten them up and give them their medicine, the feedyard will rent you your

> A custom yard will charge a deposit per head for each cow, sort of like a cow hotel. In a custom yard, you own the cattle until they are sold. In other words, you take the

> For the first 20 days at Caprock, the critters get hay and silage to eat. After that, a nutritionist mixes up delicious formulated rations of fat, salt, nutrients, and proteins. Nelson says the average stay at the cow hotel is 140 days and that Caprock uses 1,000,000 pounds of feed every day. That is a lot of "room service."

> Most cattle are brought in to a custom yarrd when they weigh 600-700 pounds and are sold when they reach a weight of 1100-1200 pounds. The owner of the pen pays the yard for feed and medicine and must figure in any cost due to death loss.

> I figured out a couple of things real quick. The more a cow weighs when you bring him in, the less time it takes to reach a sell weight, which costs less.

> Also, I figured out that when you crunch the numbers at today's cattle prices of around \$67 per hundred pounds, an 1100 pound steer will bring \$737, not much of a per head profit margin by the time you pay your feedyard bill.

> In 1992, Caprock became a "commercial yard." That means they buy the cattle from you and they own them and they take the risks.

> Most of Caprock Bovina's cattle are shipped to Excel, Friona, as are many cattle from other Parmer County yards.

> To fill their six commercial yards, they have buyers in Oklahoma, Kansas, Texas, Georgia, Mississippi, and Florida, to name a few.

Caprock's one-time capacity in their six yards is 275,000 cattle. Caprock yards are located in Gruver cattle in Parmer County.
(2), Dalhart, Boyina, Factor in all the c Lockney, and one in Leoti, Kansas.

Scott Nelson has been employed by Cargil for 8 years, first as a kill floor supervisor at Excel. He has worked for Caprock for the last 4 1/2 years.

He is no stranger to feedyards. His dad was a long time feedyard manager and young Scott had plenty of jobs to do.

He manages an operation that houses an average of 31,000 head, but is rated to hold 35,000. Each year his yard ships 70,000 head of cattle, or an average of 383 head per day.

To ship that many cattle requires 8,200 trucks in and out of the yard each year. The 70,000 cattle sold and shipped is equivalent to 42 million pounds of meat each

Caprock here has 34 employees who work in the mill, yard, feeding, cattle, or the office.

The trucks that are used to feed the cattle are now computerized so the driver can automatically calculate the amount of feed used for each pen. That is important in a custom yard to compute the feeding costs for the cattle

Other employees, appropriately called cowboys, ride horses up and down the pen rows looking for cow problems such as sick critters. Caprock is equipped with four cow hospitals where a "lay vet" treats minor problems. "Real" veterinarians make regular visits and are on call for serious problems.

Another feedyard operation is the silage pits.
Local farmers sell silage to the yards for feed, especially this time of year. Caprock's five pits hold 40,000 tons of silage, or about 1,800 acres

Nelson says the yard uses 1.2 million bushels of corn each year at the mill or 6,670 acres worth.

As we were driving around the well engineered system of pens, alleys, and gates, I observed that Caprock must be one of the largest yards in Parmer County.

Scott Nelson was quick to point out that it was actually one of the smallest of the seven major yards. For example, he said, West Plains Feedyard's capacity is about 60,000 and Paco Feedyards handles 45,000. At any one time there are 265,000 head of cattle in Parmer County feedyards.

At, say, \$1000 per head, that is \$265 million worth of

Factor in all the cattle industry related employees' salaries, money paid to cattlemen, to farmers for the grain, to truckers for the hauling, etc. and include how many times the money "turns over" at the grocery store, gas stations, and other area businesses. Not to mention

The amount of direct and indirect revenue produced for the county seems to be incalculable.

I forgot to mention that there is one steer at Caprock's cattle hotel that has been there for five years. They call him Precious and he now weighs 3,100 pounds, but he ain't going anywhere soon. When Precious was a calf,

he was very sick. One of the cowboys sat up all night with him to keep him from dying. Precious got well and to show his appreciation, he followed the cowboys around wherever they went.

Seems that when it came time to ship his roommates out to the packing house, Precious must have hid or something, because the cowboys insisted they couldn't

Today he serves as a mascot and pet, with a pen of his own where he receives a few fellow cattle as visitors and the Caprock employees

stop by to play.
Somehow I wish the cowboys and cattlemen of 1900, who herded their cows to the XIT railroad operation in Bovina, and shipped them to stockyards in Fort Worth or Chicago, could take just one ride around one of today's Parmer County feedyards.

Cattle operations are pretty scientific now but one custom remains from the old

Today, when a seller sells and a buyer buys there is not always time for paperwork.

Even with the bigness of

the business, most deals still seem to be done with a handshake.





Changes Are Made In U.S.P.S. Collections

announced today changes in mail collection procedures that receptacles, even rural will increase security of customer mailboxes.

Commercial airlines carrying Customers will have to

changes are "The designed to enhance security contractors who transport U.S. Mail," said Postmaster General Marvin Runyon.

Runyon added that the changes exceed FAA requirements and are one of several important steps the Postal Service is "prepared and willing to take to improve the level of safety and security of the airlines and the mail." Officials declined to discuss all of the security measures planned or already in place.

The typical consumer or business will notice very few changes, nor will there be any impact on service. Express Mail is not affected.

The changes, effective August 16, affect packages mailed to international or domestic addresses deposited in mail collection boxes, such

The U.S. Postal Service as street mail boxes, lobby and apartment drop boxes/

bring packages to post offices for entry with retail clerks, domestic mail bearing stamps measures and to protect the traveling public, postal over, and all international employees and postal mail or military APO/FPO mail weighing 16 ounces and over and which in some cases may also require a customs declaration form.

The Postal Service will retain a record of the international and military APO/FPO mailing and the customer will be advised of this when the item is mailed.

Packages found collection boxes will be returned to the sender if the addressee is outside the local area identified for overnight First-Class Mail.

Packages returned to senders will have an accompanying explanation advising them in the future to deposit this mail at the post office. Previously applied postage may be used when the item is re-mailed at the post office.

Mr. Schmidt Of Germany Bicycles Thru Parmer Co.

BY RON CARR On Friday, August 16, another adventurer passed through Parmer County on Highway 60.

This time, it was 58-year-old Walter Schmidt of Frieburg, Germany. I talked to him at the Friona Post Office where he had stopped off to send some mail home.

We were alerted by Connie Dodson, who happened to be at the post office, that another stranger

was passing through.
Mr. Schmidt bought his \$2000 Cannondale bicycle in San Francisco and headed east, bound for Jonesboro, Arkansas.

Why Jonesboro? His son is a helicopter pilot there. He said that he was taking the bicycle back to Germany with him. The same model would sell there for more than twice

the price he paid in the U.S. He said that he left San Francisco four weeks earlier and that it would take another two weeks to reach Jonesboro.

After many years operating a gas station in Freiburg, Schmidt has been a school superintendent there for the past 18 years.

He planned to fly home from Memphis, Tennessee, after a visit with his son. He said he would arrive in Freiburg on September 5 and school starts on September 6.

Schmidt, who is divorced, said this is the sixth time he has bicycled across or around the United States. On a seventh occasion, he and his son toured the U. S., including Alaska, motorcycle.

His compact, and well-packed bicycle included bedrolls, first aid kit, tools, clothes, and camera.

In one saddlebag was his "road food" which consisted of



tomatoes, cantalopes, oranges, bananas, bottled water and V8 vegetable juice.

Schmidt said that he eats fruits, vegetables, and water mostly because meats and starches are "too heavy" for the strain and muscle power needed for pedaling the bike.

Weather permitting, he usually camps along the road, opting for a motel as needed for a shower and shave and a good night's sleep on a real mattress.

The night before we talked to him was when Parmer Co. had the heavy lightning and thunderstorms. He had pitched his bedroll near an abandoned house on Highway 86. When the rain started, he moved inside the dusty old building to wait out

Such is the life and times of a road adventurer.

We asked for permission to take his picture. Then he opened a lock box on the back of his bicycle, took out a camera, and asked for

permission to take ours. He had an old New Mexico license plate he had found along the road that he was taking back to Germany as a souvenir, along with our

Then, helmet in place and feet locked onto the pedals, Mr. Schmidt headed east again on Highway 60, bound for Germany.
