## General Election Set Tuesday, November 5th

The General Election will take place in Mills County next week Tuesday, November 5. Polls will open at 8 a.m. and will remain open until 7 p.m.

Mills County voters will cast their ballots in the ten (10) voting boxes. This includes the absentee voting box.

The ballot for Mills County this year contains five columns with the first column listing the offices and the others in the following order: Democratic Party, Republican Party, Raza Unida Party; Socialist-Workers Party; American Party; Independent; and Write-In.

Candidates for U.S. Representative, 11th Congressional District, are W. R. (Bob) Poage, Democratic Party; Don Clements, Republican Party; and Laurel N. Dunn, Independent.

In the governor's race, candidates are Dolph Briscoe, Democratic Party; Jim Granberry, Republican Party; Ramsey Muniz, Raza Unida Party; Sherry Smith, Socialist-Workers; and S. W. (Sam) McDonnell, American Party.

Bill Hobby, Democratic; Gaylord Marshall, Republican; and Dan Fein, Socialist-Workers; are the candidates on the ticket for lieutenant governor.

The Attorney General post candidates on the ballot are John Hill, Democratic; Tom Cole, Republican; and Pedro Vasquez, Socialist-Workers.

For Comptroller of Public Accounts Bob Bullock, Democratic; Nick Rowe, Republican; and Sas Scoggins, Socialist-Workers; will be the candidates.

Jesse James, Democratic, and Robert G. Holt, Republican, are on the ticket for the office of

State Treasurer.

In the race for Commissioner of General Land Office, the candidates are Bob Armstrong, Democratic; Mary Lou Grier, Republican; and William Rayson, Socialist-Workers.

Candidates on the ballot for Commissioner of Agriculture are John C. White, Democratic; and Zack Fisher, Republican.

In the race for railroad commissioner the office is being contested by Jim C. Langdon, Democratic; Joe P. Cain, Republican; Fred R. Garza, Raza Unida Party; and Rick Congress, Socialist-Workers.

Democrats and Republicans are the only parties running for the office of railroad commissioner (unexpired term). They are Mack Wallace and Dale W. Steffes, respectively.

Those unopposed on the ticket for offices are Democrats Sears McGee for Associate Justice, Supreme Court, Place 2; Thomas W. Reavley, Associate Justice, Supreme Court, Place 2; and Zillie Seakley, Associate Justice, Supreme Court, Place 3.

Also unopposed on the Democratic Party are W. A. Morrison, Judge, Court of Criminal Appeals, Place 1; Leon Douglas, Judge, Court of Criminal Appeals, Place 2.

On the Democratic ticket Camm Lary, Jr. is unopposed in the race for State Representative, District 43; Glen L. Smith, unopposed for member State Board of Education, Dist. 3; and Trueman E. O'Quinn, unopposed for Associate Justice, Court of Civil Appeals, District 3.

On the local level, Herbert Faulkner is on the ticket for County Judge - Ex-Officio School Superintendent; Walter A. (Toby) Bryant, County-District Clerk; Jewel Yeager, County Treasurer; Hawley B. Jernigan, Commissioner, Precinct 4; Lewis (Jeff) Watson, Commissioner, Precinct 2; Ernest Thorne, Justice of the Peace, Precinct 1; and Troy Williams, Justice of the Peace, Precinct 10.

### Eagles Defeated 21-20, Meet Early Friday

The Goldthwaite Eagles missed a crucial last period PAT attempt and fell to the Ranger Bulldogs 21-20 in a District 10-A contest Friday night.

Goldthwaite took a 14-0 lead in the first quarter on the strength of a 50 yard Ray Frazier to Dale Page scoring aerial and a five yard run by Byron Landrum. Guanaro Siller added a two-point conversion following the second touchdown.

Ranger came back in the second period to narrow the gap to 14-7 when Mark Lucky scored from three yards out and then tackled on the PAT.

The Bulldogs tied the score at 14 all in the third quarter as John Labrado scampered 7 yards to paydirt and Lucky added the PAT.

Both teams traded touchdowns in the final period, with the missed extra point attempt thwarting Goldthwaite's hope for an upset. Ranger's touchdown came on a seven yard run by Manuel Hernandez, with Lucky kicking the PAT, while Guanaro Siller's seven yard run for Goldthwaite proved to be in vain.

"It was a close game. Our performance during the first half

was really outstanding, but seemed to ease up after halftime," commented Head Coach Gene Aldridge.

Guanaro Siller had an excellent game as usual. He racked up 109 yards rushing during the Ranger game, making his season total over 700 yards.

Byron Landrum had a good night on the defensive unit and the entire offensive line turned out a fine job.

Tim Spardley also made a good showing on the defensive unit during the game Friday night.

## Cattlemen's Ass'n. Meeting Set Wed.

About 50 Mills County cattlemen gathered last Wednesday night and laid the foundation for what is believed to be a very important organization for the Texas cattle industry.

The Independent Cattlemen's Association of Texas was explained to the group by a panel of three of the first to join the Association headquartered at

Goliad in South Texas. Prime immediate objectives of the organization are the reduction of cattle imports into the U.S., and to educate the consumer so the rancher will get a more even break in the marketing of beef.

Elected as temporary chairman was Charley McLean of Goldthwaite. Vice-chairman is Jim McCoy, and secretary is Charles Conrad. Treasurer of the group is Gary Holcomb.

Cunningham and his associates were dissatisfied with other cattlemen's associations and organizations for not taking any decisive action on any of the problems, and the group decided to do something about it.

The ultimate plan calls for each county to have an organization. The counties will be grouped into districts, then formed into a state organization, and finally a national organization.

### Water Under The Bridge

A rash of burglaries and thefts befallen this sleepy burg as late as 8 a.m., indicating that some people may be feeling the pinch more than thought.

### Exciting Program Planned For March Of Dimes Campaign

"March of Dimes volunteers are looking forward to the most exciting program year in history," reports Anice Browning. "The excellent response to last year's drive has enabled us to expand research and medical service programs around the country."

Anice Browning has just returned from a regional meeting of the voluntary health organization in Dallas. There she met with delegates from neighboring states to go over the new dimensions of March of Dimes programs aimed at prevention of birth defects.

"The medical advances we heard about were particularly impressive," she said. "Improved methods of treatment, diagnosis, and consultation for high-risk pregnant women and newborns were explained by specialists. At one session, Dr. Edwin Lee Gresham and Dr. Loren P. Petersen, discussed how their specialties are rapidly developing combined techniques to reduce many risks of pregnancy."

"Another important aspect," she continued, "is the progress on plans for a strategic network of perinatal services throughout the country. These guidelines have been drawn up by leaders in obstetrics, pediatrics, family practice, the nursing profession, and health agencies. The goal is to allocate highly trained staff and equipment to treat mothers and infants at different levels of risk to avoid duplicating costly services."

Anice also noted that there was emphasis on new March of Dimes programs to train nurses in recognition, evaluation, and team performance for treatment of sick mothers and infants. This course of action, she says, is intended to meet the alarming shortage of nurse clinicians as quickly as possible.

It's that time again...

...time to start getting your home ready for the winter months ahead. By starting now and checking your home for those energy leaks, you'll stay warmer this winter and conserve energy.

Take a few minutes and check the following items to make sure your home will be winterized:

- 1 Insulation is most important... and can pay for itself in energy consumption savings. The usual recommendation is 6 inches of insulation for the attic and 4 inches for outside walls. Check FHA requirements for further information.
- 2 Weatherstrip doors and windows, and caulk cracks and crevices to prevent drafts and the loss of heated air.
- 3 Maintain heating equipment for maximum efficiency by having it checked by a competent serviceman.
- 4 Dirty filters cause heating equipment to work harder and use more fuel. Check your filters every 30 days. If they're the permanent type, clean them according to the manufacturer's directions. If they're the disposable type, replace them at least every 90 days.
- 5 Don't be a "thermostat jiggler". Turning the thermostat up or down doesn't cause the equipment to heat or cool faster. It simply works longer to satisfy the setting. The national conservation program calls for settings of no more than 68°F. In heating weather. If you are going to be away for several days, lower the temperature to 60°F.
- 6 Don't place curtains, furniture or other objects in front of heating registers or return air openings. This blocks the flow of warm air.
- 7 Open blinds and draperies on sunny days to help heat your home during the day but close them at night to help reduce heat loss.
- 8 Keep the fireplace damper closed when the fireplace is not in use.
- 9 Storm doors and windows are not customarily used in this part of the country, but they do reduce heat loss. As a temporary substitute, a sheet of clear plastic stapled or tacked over screen doors or windows works well.
- 10 Keep the opening and closing of doors to a minimum to reduce the loss of warm air.
