Deborah earns a copy of the \$5.99 book *Mommy's Little Angels*.

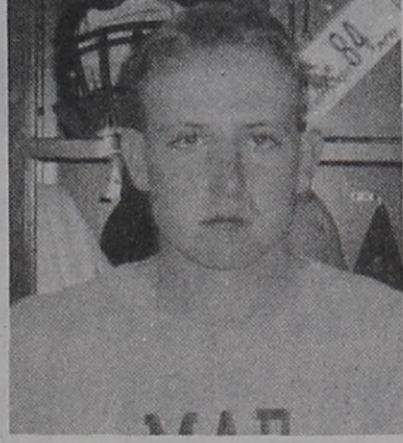

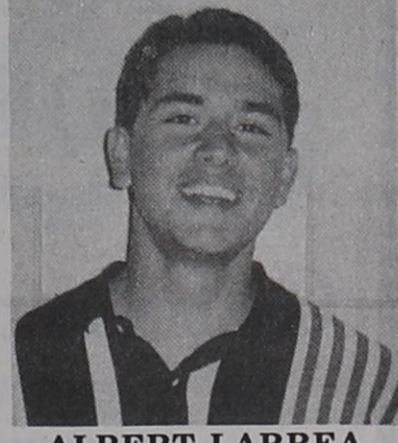
Larrea is a 5-10, 165 pound junior tailback and defensive back for the Mustangs. He is the team's second leading rusher.

**Bovina Elementary Earns Three Stars From TAAS**

At Bovina schools, the November issue of Texas Monthly magazine is "must" reading. The cover story, "Our Best Schools", rates 3,172 elementary schools in Texas. The schools are compared, not only on the percentage of students who passed the TAAS (Texas Assessment of Academic Skills) test but by the percentage of students who qualify for the free or reduced lunch program.

The schools are given a rating ranging from four stars to zero stars, with four being the best and zero being the worst. Bovina Elementary earned three stars.

The article explains why schools with high percentages of economically disadvantaged students have a more difficult task of getting students to pass the TAAS. These children begin school educationally and culturally disadvantaged. They lack language skills and the experience background of students who are not economically disadvantaged. Mr. Mejia was taken by ambulance that night to High Plains Baptist Hospital in Amarillo where he underwent triple bi-pass surgery.

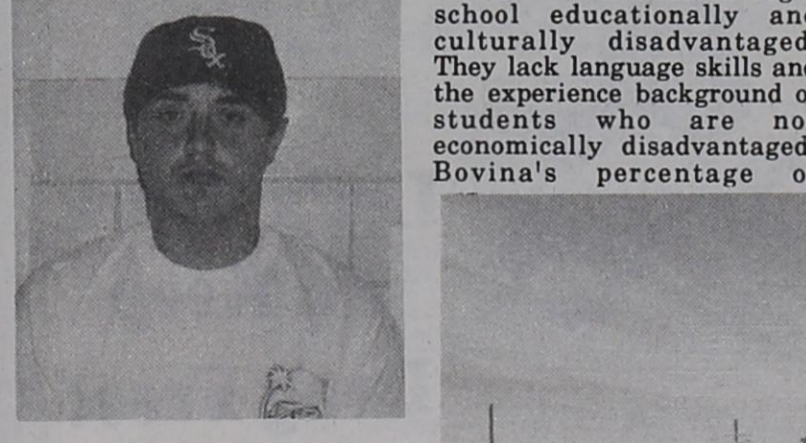
As of Thursday morning, Mr. Mejia was in the process of being moved from the Cardiac Care Unit to a regular hospital room.

economically disadvantaged students is over 75%.

There are other obstacles that our students and teachers face. Most of our Pre-K and Head Start students begin school with no English and we enroll other students who move here from Mexico. Districtwide we average close to 30% Limited English Proficient students.

Limited English Proficient can mean that these students speak no English, very little English, or that they may speak it fairly well, but reading and writing in English is very difficult for them. We also have about 28% migrant students. These are students whose parents are employed in an agricultural related job and who move periodically. These students may miss a lot of school.

The Texas Education Agency (TEA) has its own way of rating school districts, based upon the TAAS test results and attendance rate. Not only are districts rated, but each separate campus gets a rating. For high

## Local Bull Breeder Is Recognized

Running Water Land & Cattle of Bovina owns four bulls listed in the 1996 Fall Sire Evaluation report published by the American Angus Association headquartered in St. Joseph, Missouri.

Issued in both the spring and fall, the new report features the latest performance information available on more than 4,800 sires.

The information is in the form of Expected Progeny Differences (EPDs). It is compiled from Angus Herd Improvement Records (AHIR) submitted by breeders to the American Angus Association.

EPDs are excellent indicators of the genetic merit animals have for specific traits, says John Crouch, director of performance programs for the American Angus Association. When using EPDs with high accuracy values, cattle producers can depend on EPDs for predicting performance.

Traits in which EPDs are available include birth weight, weaning weight, milk, yearling weight and height, mature daughter weight and height, and scrotal circumference, as well as carcass traits including carcass weight, marbling, rib eye area, external fat thickness and percent retail product.





Pre-registration should be completed by November 1.

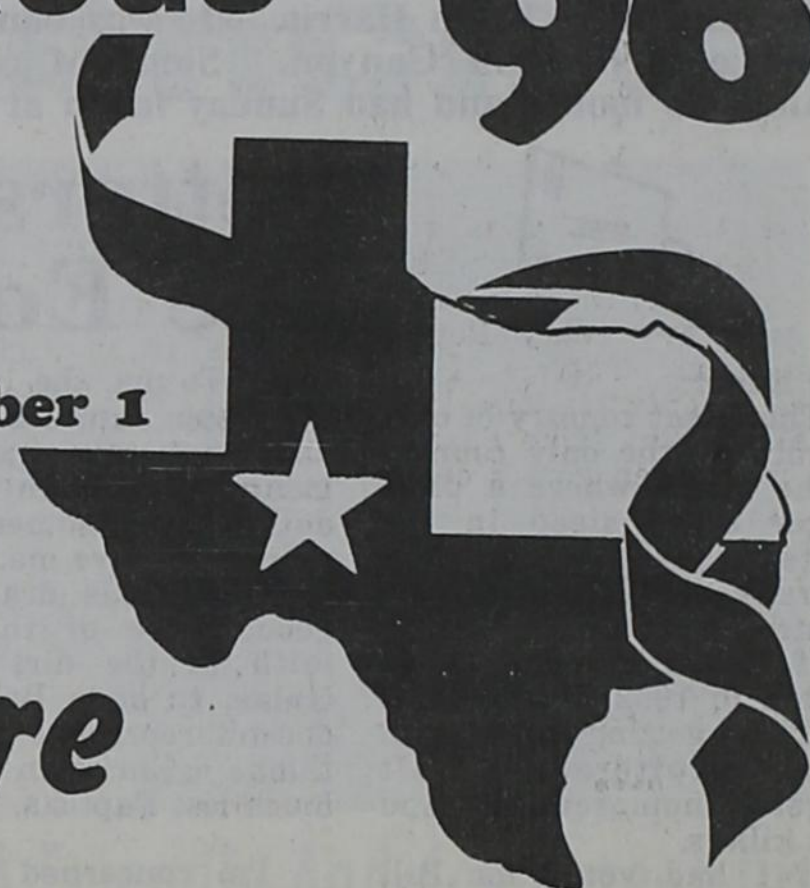

# Out Here

Chances are the residents of Bosnia-Herzegovina are not concerned much about buying fertilizer, especially with another harsh winter coming on.

They are more concerned about whether the truce between the Serbs and Croats will continue.

They are more concerned that no more of their loved one's are slaughtered in the senseless feud in their country and whether they can make it to the market and back without another sniper or mortar attack.

Parmer County resident Guy Warren III, manager of the Wilbur-Ellis fertilizer and chemical facility south of Black can sure help them with fertilizer and soil advice if they need it.

More important to him and other members of the 413th Civil Affairs Battalion of Lubbock, he hopes to also help them keep the fragile truce and rebuild their country.

As a U. S. Army Reserve member for the last four years, Specialist 4th Class Guy Warren, III, will ship out around November 1 to Fort Bragg, North Carolina.

After a couple of weeks of orientation about the situation in Bosnia and training for his assignment there, he will depart for Bosnia around mid-November.

As far as he knows right now, the assignment will last at least until March of 1997. Perhaps longer.

When I visited with Guy at his Friona home this week, he was willing to tell me everything he knew about his mobilization to Bosnia. Trouble is, he did not know much at this point, except that he was going and not as a volunteer.

He was among some 60 other members of the 413th Civil Affairs Battalion mobilized at a special meeting in Lubbock last weekend.

"Usually we meet the first weekend of each month", he said. "But they called a special meeting and handed out a list of those who would be ordered to Bosnia".

Warren told me that prior to now, his unit had asked for volunteers for duty in Bosnia. They also sent volunteers to the skirmish in Haiti.

As of now, he still has not received his official orders, but all his gear was arranged in a pile in the family living room. There were no civilian clothes on the pile.

Guy Warren, III, was born to an Air Force family in Fort Worth where his dad, Guy, Jr. was in the Air Force during the Viet Nam war.

He grew up in Cowtown, graduated from high school there and met his wife Heidi there also.

He attended college at Tarleton State in Stephenville where he received his degree in Plant and Soil Science.

He and Heidi married, moved to Kansas, and had two children, Guy IV, 8, and Hannah, 5.

They moved from Kansas to Spearman where he was a Co-Op manager.

After his Army Reserve unit in Kansas was disbanded, Warren found a slot in the 413th in Lubbock. He has a keen interest in civil and foreign affairs so the new assignment was a good match.

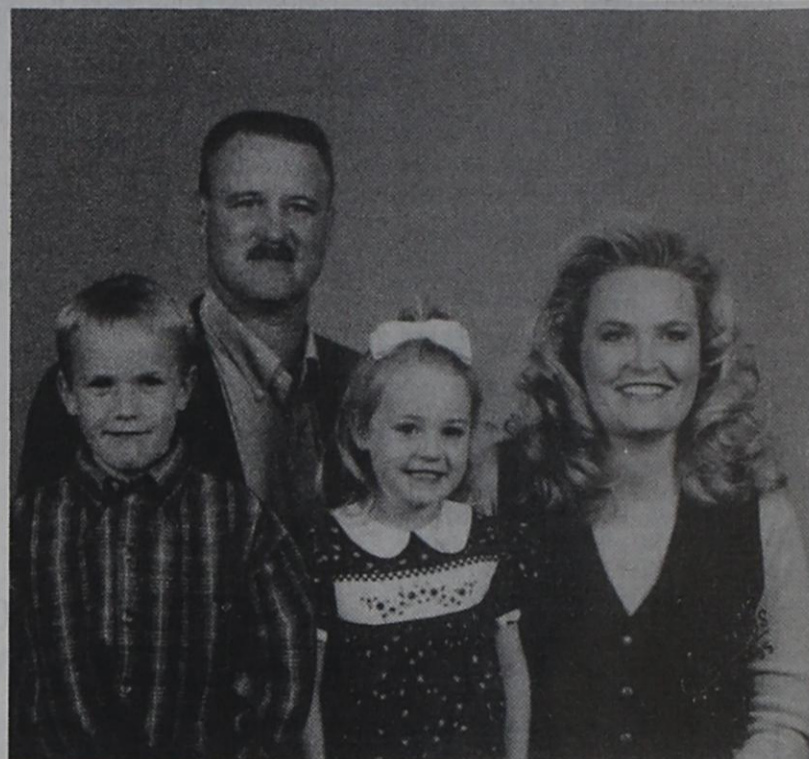
He says one of the reasons he took the job with Wilbur-Ellis here was because it was a lot closer to Lubbock than Spearman.

The family has been here now for two years. Heidi has been attending classes at WT in Canyon aiming for a nurse's degree. Little Hannah is in kindergarten this year. Guy IV is in second grade and cub scouts, where daddy is the pack leader.

Daddy is also a Friona volunteer fireman. The family attends First United Methodist Church and are active in school and community affairs.

As Guy has found out, there are a lot of details involved in putting your life on hold while you serve your country.

"I have spent the week so far notifying the fire

department and cub scout parents that I will be on leave for a while. This Friday, I have a meeting with my two bosses to figure out what the company can do while I am gone."

Heidi has tried to figure out how to juggle her schedule of kids and college too.

They have talked to the kids and told them as many details as kids can absorb. How do you explain Bosnia to a couple of kids when most grownups don't understand it?

For all the trouble, Warren maintains a sense of duty and in some ways is looking forward to the experience.

He and Heidi checked out some reference material on Bosnia and Eastern Europe from the WT library. "Most people here in the U. S. don't realize how old and how much history that part of the world has", he said with some degree of anticipation.

"A part of the region was once called Macedonia which goes back to biblical times".

The 413th Civil Affairs unit will act as liaison between the Bosnian government and the United Nations military to help Bosnia rebuild their government and civic infrastructure.

There are American, British, and French sectors there. Warren doesn't know which sector they will be assigned to.

They will find out at Fort Bragg along with learning more about U. N. rules.

He already has language tapes of both Serb and Croatian dialects. It is a unit

requirement that they study and learn as much of the language as they can.

They are not allowed to take civilian items other than shaving gear, cameras, and stationery. The Army will issue clothes and rifles at Fort Bragg. Guy will carry an M-16, loaded, and he probably won't need one of those concealed weapons licenses.

Maybe you remember seeing television reports of our troops in Bosnia last year in the middle of a ferocious winter.

Maybe you remember too, hearing Commander-in-Chief Clinton assuring us that our troops would be home by December, 1996.

Maybe you remember that Clinton took a trip over there. So did Hillary and Chelsea.

And so too will Guy Warren, III of Parmer County. Chances are that his accommodations will not be as warm and convenient as that of the First Family. But no doubt Guy will serve his time, do his duty, and return to Parmer County.

We hope real soon. God bless Guy III, Heidi, and the kids. It is because of people like them we can still be proud to say God Bless America!

P.S. As soon as Guy III gets a Bosnia mailing address, we will print it in hopes everyone will write him often to let him know Parmer County awaits his return.

Wouldn't a batch of homemade chocolate chip cookies make a Bosnian winter a little easier to take? Godspeed Guy! We'll be in touch.

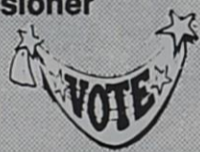

## Georgia Rites Held For Horton Brother

Graveside services for Robert "Bob" Horton, 65, were conducted October 10 at Decatur (Georgia) City Cemetery.

Horton, civic leader and retiree after 38 years with South Central Bell Telephone, and 27 years as Corporate and Community Affairs director at the Decatur office, died Monday, October 7. He had had cancer for the past year.

Horton was known not only for his civic work, but for his infectious smile and the ability to make people laugh.

His co-workers agreed that Alexander Graham Bell would have wanted a man like Bob Horton to smooth the rough spots.

He was born in Rome, Georgia, October 27, 1930. He had said in a newspaper interview that he was raised in a close-knit family with his twin sister Emily, who died in 1976, and his brothers Thomas and Hollis.

He attended Alabama Polytechnic Institute—now known as Auburn University—where he studied business administration and was a member of Kappa Alpha.

He was praised by a close friend, attorney John Key, who called Horton's death a great personal loss as well as a loss to Decatur.

"He loved to fish, hunt,

play golf, tennis, loved his friends and always had a big smile on his face. He was a great family man, to boot," Key said.

Horton was past president of Decatur Rotary Club, was a Paul Harris Fellow, past director and treasurer of the Decatur Chamber of Commerce, past chairman of the United Way of Morgan County, and was instrumental in starting the Miss Point Mallard pageant.

He also was on the board of the Alabama Telco Credit Union, and had organized blood drives at area schools.

Of his club work, Horton once said "I guess I've been in Decatur so dang long I've about run out of clubs. But if I'm going to be involved, I'd rather be in charge."

Survivors include four daughters, Laura H. Fite and Mary B. Horton, both of Decatur, Emily L. Horton of Birmingham and Marhall H. Wise of Chattanooga; one brother, Hollis Horton of Friona, and five grandchildren.

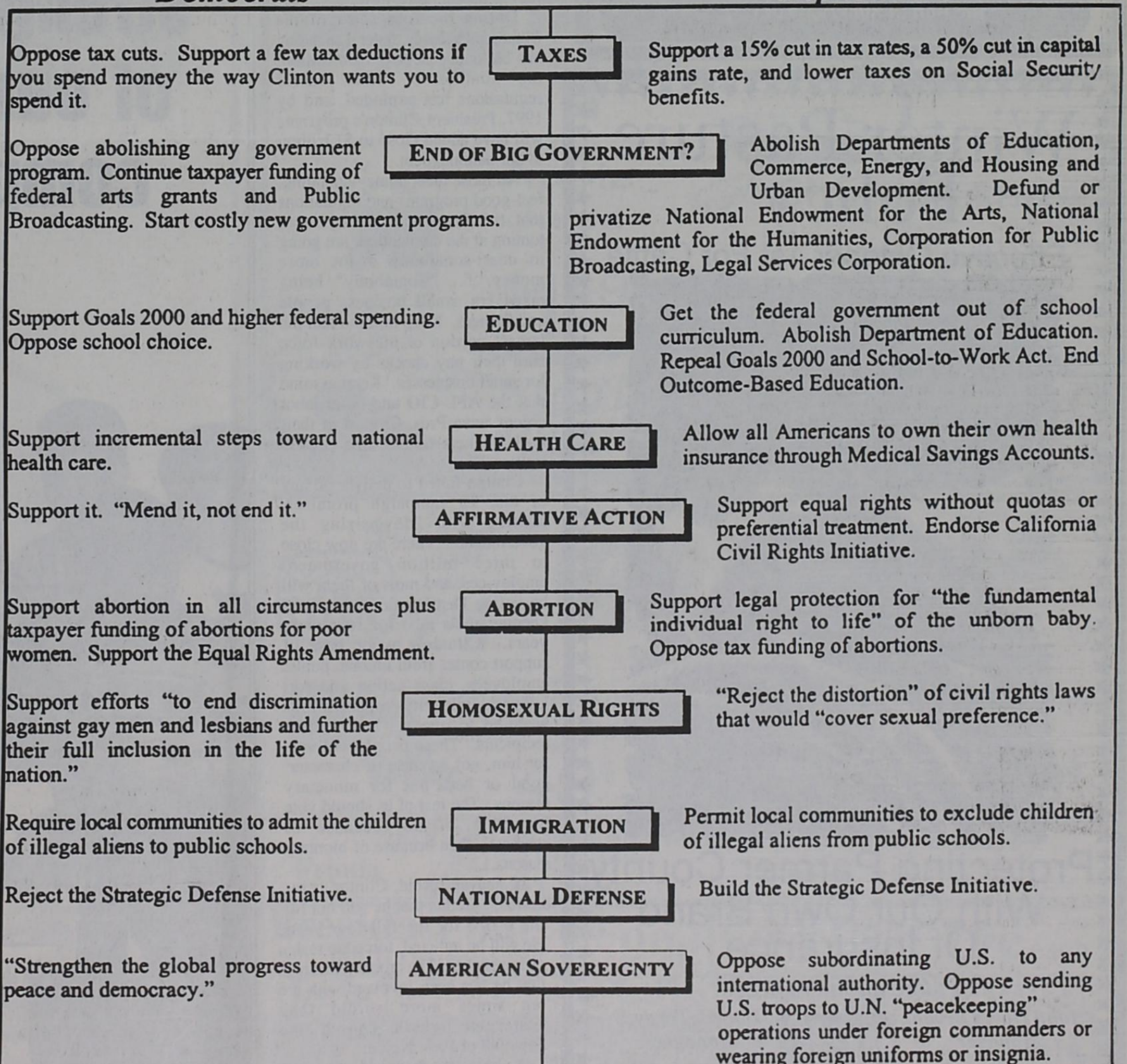

Could you, in your wildest imagination, think of a young teenage girl asking Pres. Carter if he wears boxers or briefs...and, even more ludicrous, can you

imagine Pres. Carter glorifying that question with an answer? I heard one young couple say they didn't particularly like either candidate, but they would vote for Clinton because he seemed nice and friendly. Okay, maybe you don't like Dole, but you DO like MONEY, don't you? With Dole's Republican tax cut, a family of four who makes \$30,000 a year will be able to keep \$1,261 more than what they're taking home now.

During the four years of the Clinton presidency, federal spending has ballooned nearly \$200 billion; the number of new federal regulations has exploded, and by 1997, President Clinton's programs will have added close to \$1 trillion to our national debt.

All those nice, homey-sounding, feel-good programs and regulations that the Pres. and Hillary were touting at the convention, are going to cost somebody a lot more money. . . "somebody" being taxpayers, small business people and farmers. Keep in mind that the largest portion of the work force earn their pay checks by working for small businesses. Chop scallions. Simmer with milk for 15 to 20 minutes. Cook potatoes in boiling water until soft.

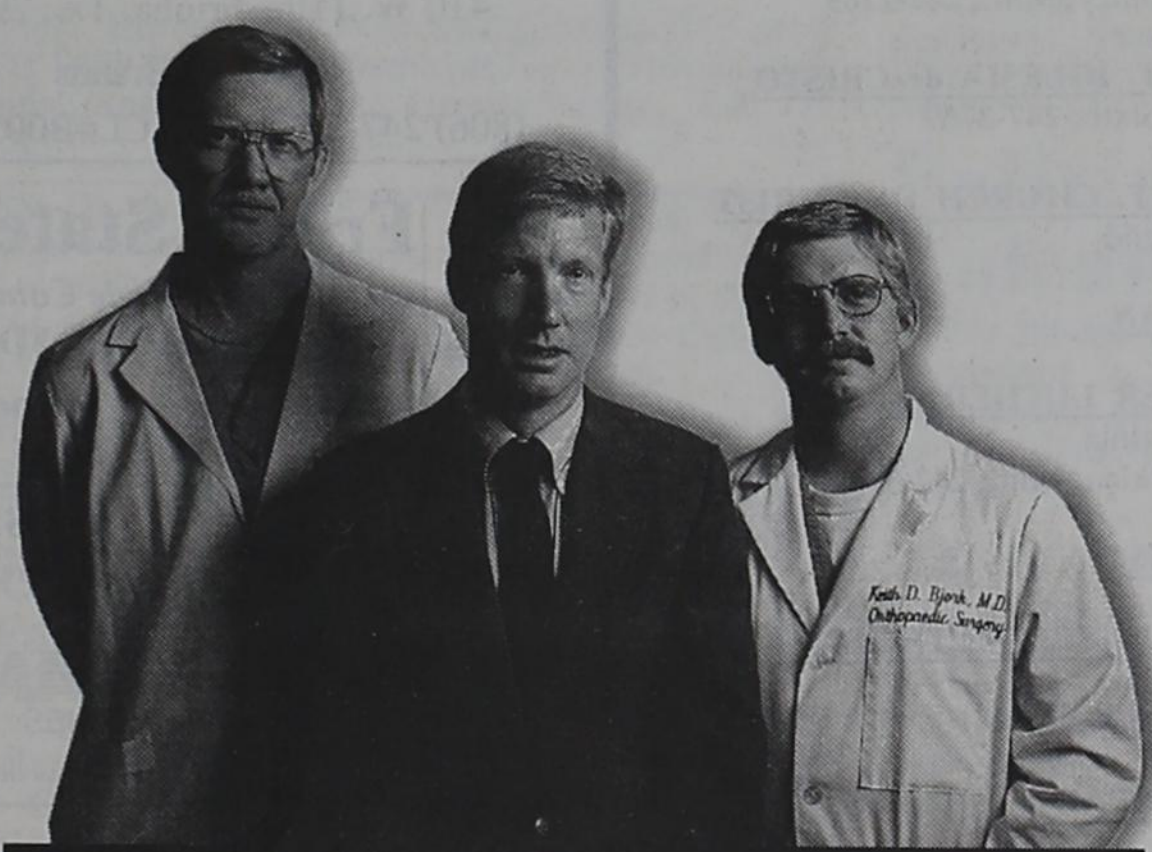
Drain and mash potatoes. Mix in milk and scallions. Add seasonings.

## Mustangs Lose 41-14 At Lockney

The Bovina Mustangs, riding high with a dominant 5-1 record and a 30+ point per game scoring average, ran headlong into the rough part of their new 2-A schedule Friday, October 18.

The Mustangs traveled to Lockney to face the favored Lockney Longhorns. They showed up with too little too late, falling behind 28-0 at halftime, with 21 of Lockney's points coming in the first quarter.

Coach Ortiz said the team did not give up even though they were down quickly and never recovered. The Mustangs 14 points came in the fourth quarter, but by then the Longhorns had a commanding lead.

Team and individual statistics were very even in the game in spite of the 41-14 score. Fumbles and interceptions by the Mustangs proved to be a deciding factor against the favored Longhorns.

However, Bovina continues to lead Class 2A in team offense with a 408.7 average through seven games. They have 1930 yards rushing and 522 passing.

On defense they have allowed 1,193 yards of offense, an average of 198.8 per game.

According to Coach Ortiz, the game against Hart is the "super bowl" of this season. In spite of Lockney's power, Ortiz says Hart is favored in district play. He says Hart has some big players with strength and speed.

In any event, the Mustangs record of 5-2 in a 2A District is a credit to coaches and players and the best start for a Bovina Mustang team in longer than some can remember.

school campuses, the state adds SAT or ACT test results, the percent of students taking advanced courses, and dropout rate.

TEA does not take into account whether or not the student population of a district or campus is economically disadvantaged, migrant, or Limited English Proficient. The reason is that they want all children to succeed, and all students to graduate, no matter what the obstacles are. No excuses are accepted and rightly so. The state did not tell us how to accomplish this nor did they say it would be easy to do.

The article rated only elementary schools in the state. If the same standard is applied to Bovina Middle School, we find that our students are doing well there also.

For example in reading, a comparison of the two campuses show 78% of all middle school students passing and 75% of all elementary students passing.

For Hispanic students, it was 72% in middle school and 73% in elementary. For Economically Disadvantaged

students, it was 76% passing in middle school and 71% in elementary.

TAAS math scores for all students and subgroups in elementary school were above 80% passing and middle school was above 70% passing.

The primary problem our school is addressing is the dropout rate. Bovina High School had 12 students on our dropout list. Of these 12, six students were migrant. We know that three of them moved to other states, but we have no way of knowing whether or not they enrolled in school because those districts did not request records.

We did find one of our dropouts attending a high school in Fort Worth. Although this student was never a dropout, the state would not remove the student from our dropout list.

It was very disheartening for our school to be labeled "academically unacceptable" when we know that we are not. We are very proud of our students and our faculty and staff.

We know that these children are our nation's future and whether they are rich or poor, they deserve the best education we can deliver. Next year, we are aiming for four stars!

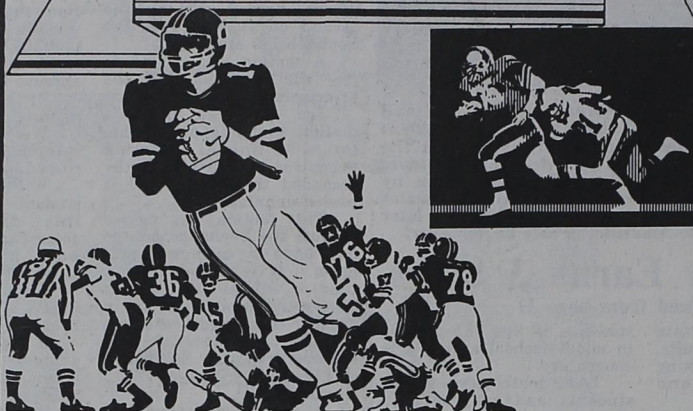

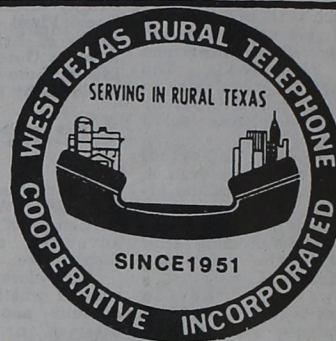
