## Area cotton gins report good turnout for year

Most area cotton gins have completed or are in the process of completing ginning cotton for the season. Overall, this year seemed to be a better year for area cotton gins with prices reportedly above aver-

age and bale counts exceeding last year's.

While most area farmers had a good turnout inspite of drought conditions though, many cotton farmers in the Lazbuddie area lost some acres due to hail this past summer.

The Maple Co-Op Gin seemed to have the most success this season, doubling their bale count over last year. According to Marvin McCaul, manager of the Maple Gin,

approximately 26,511 bales of cotton were ginned there this year.

McCaul said it was a dry year for cotton farmers and a few places had a little hail, but overall it was good. The Maple Gin completed ginning cotton Prices were a little better this in mid-January.

At Muleshoe Co-Op Gin 26,873 bales of cotton were ginned this year, a little better than last year according to manager Charles Moraw.

## New computers at WJHS replace encyclopedias; bring life to learning

Doing research for a school term paper is not the same dull, drudgery that it may have been in the past. At least not for students at Watson Junior High School.

WJHS recently received a total of 10 new Packard Bell computers to serve as research tools in the school's library. The new lab was set up and running a week ago at WJHS.

WJHS Principal Shelia Joyner said the school purchased four of the new computers with money budgeted for technology by the school board. An additional six computers were purchased with Chapter 2 funds, federal money.

The new computers help students find research information much quicker and even shows students pictures and sounds of the objects they are doing research on.

"I like the new computers because they show us pictures, like what a wolf exactly looks like," said Robert Guerrero, a student at WJHS. "It also lets me hear the sound and gives a whole bunch of descriptions."

Another WJHS student Bryce Thomason said, "It (the computers) are faster. I can look up things a lot faster. They are a lot easier than using a regular encyclopedia."

WJHS reading teacher Diana Harrison said, "This is the current research trend, using technology for research."

Using the new computers as research tools is now a major part of the curriculum for the 6th grade reading classes at

Harrison said, "Advantages of the computers is easy access. They also provide the most current, up-to-date information."

She added, "Not only do they give information, but also show pictures and sounds."

WJHS librarian Mrs. Rudd has also been playing a major role in helping familiarize stu-

DIMMITT — The Dimmitt Bobcats and Bobbies both remained in contention for district 2-3A playoff berths here Friday, sweeping Muleshoe in boys and girls action.

The Bobbies improved to 20-10 overall and 7-1 in the district with a 64-51 victory over the Lady Mules.

The Bobcats followed with an 80-44 win over the Mules that lifted the Dimmitt boys' record to 15-14 overall and 6-2 in the league.

The District 2-3A teams have two games left before post-season playoffs begin. For the Mules and Lady Mules, the season begins to wind down next Tuesday (Feb. 7) when they travel to Littlefield. MHS will host

Friona on Feb. 10 in the final regular-season games for both teams.

In Friday's girls contest, Dimmitt broke out to a 19-12 lead in the opening quarter and extended the margin to 36-18 by the half.

Allyson Field had 15 and Mandy Cleavinger 12 for the Lady Mules, who fell to 5-18 and 2-6.

The second period also proved deadly for the Mules. Dimmitt used a 24-5 advantage in the second period to build a 43-19 halftime lead.

Daniel Garbarino had 19 for the Mules, who are 8-17,

In the JV games, Dimmitt took a 43-41 victory in the girls and rolled to an 87-42 victory in the boys.

## Men use quick action, little reaction, to help save choking baby's life

Adrian Guerra has never had any formal training in CPR, but with two children of his own and having seen the Heimlich Maneuver performed many times on television; he used what he learned by watching, to help save the life of a toddler last Wednesday afternoon.

Adrian, along with Andy Perez, an 18-year-old student at Muleshoe High School, didn't waste any time reacting, they simply took action when a mother accidentally locked her keys and her child in her car in front of the high school. The toddler then picked up a penny inside the car and began to choke on it. The mother became frantic.

Someone went into the MHS office where Andy was' and said there was a baby locked in a car outside. When Andy went outside the baby was choking on the penny. He quickly got a hanger and started trying to unlock the car door. That is when Adrian, a employee with the Muleshoe Schools maintenance department, arrived at the scene.

The mother was becoming more frantic and Andy knew he couldn't waste another minute so he finally kicked in the car window. immediatley got the toddler girl out of the car and handed her to Adrian, who performd

the Heimlich Maneuver as he had seen it done on TV many times. The penny popped right out of the toddler's mouth. Adrian then checked her to make sure she didn't have any cuts from the glass. She was okay.

"I have two kids of my own, one two years old and one five months, so I have gone through this before and done it quite a bit," Adrian said. "I just know what I know by seeing it done on "9-1-1" on TV."

Adrian said it only took about a second to get the penny out of the toddler's mouth once they got to her.

He said, "We didn't waste any time. We just did what we had to do. It happened so fast."

Andy, who has had CPR training, said, "I was scared when the baby started choking, and when the mom started screaming I knew I had to do something."

Andy said a policeman was dispatched to the scene, but the baby was alright when the police arrived.

Adrian and Andy said the toddler's mother was grateful and thankful to them for helping save her daughter. The mother and daughter were from out of town and were passing from Muleshoe. The men said they did not know their names.

its last bales. They have so far ginned 8,900 bales according to manager Eugene Hawkins. Last year they ginned 6,300.

The Needmore Co-Op Gin ginned 947 bales this year, not quite as much as last year. The manager reported that dryland

acres were short.

Clay's Corner Gin ginned its last bale of cotton for the season in early January, gin-

ning 7,900 bales. Manager Don McDonald said it was less than last year. He attributed the shortage to a lot of hail that

hurt some acres. But inspite of the hail, the gin did better than they expected.

"We thought we would only gin 5,000," McDonald said."Also, farmers this year got good prices."

Pleasant Valley Gin ginned a reported 8,500 bales this sea-

"We lost some to hail dur-

ing a hail storm that came in May," said Willard Tivis, manager. "But all in all we had a pretty good year. Prices were

good."

Pleasant Valley ginned its last bale on Dec. 8.

According to Claud Gregory

at North Lazbuddie Gin, 9,497 bales were ginned this year. "It is not quite as much as

last year. We had a lot of trouble with hail. Several acres were

lost at the end of the season." Gregory said. North Lazbuddie Gin ginned its last bale of cotton on Dec. 5.

Calvin Meissner, manager

of Lariat Gin, said the gin had a good year, with 4,157 bales ginned.

"It was a little less than last

year but we had some hail come through here this year," he said. "Prices were good, they sold anywhere from .68 cents .80

cents a pound. Lariat Gin finished ginning on Jan. 6.

West Camp Gin ginned close to 7,700 bales this sea-

"We did better than last year," said James Sheppard, manager. "The grades and leaf trash was the lowest. It is the

best grade and lowest leaf trash we have seen in years."

Last year West Camp ginned 7,200 bales. They were expected to finish ginning the last of their bales on Friday.

### Pharmacists stress communication to improve medication compliance

Each year more than 240,000 Americans require hospitalization simply because they do not take their prescription medication correctly.

In fact, approximately onehalf of the two billion prescriptions taken annually in the United States are used improperly by patients, with the cost of hospital admissions alone for these individuals estimated at more than \$8.5 million.

Texas pharmacists have declared war against this needless suffering and avoidable loss of time and money. Their weapon of choice is increased communication between and patient slides at south

"Most people who do not take their medications correctly are not intentionally gambling with their health," said Pharmacy Week spokesperson Jeanne Toewe. "They simply are unaware of the high risk associated with taking it improperly."

Ms. Toewerepresents Texas Pharmacists United in Patient Care, a grassroots pharmacy organization which annually sponsors Texas Pharmacy Week. She pointed out that 96 percent of patients ask no questions about their prescriptions when they pick them up from their local pharmacist.

"With more than one-half of the U.S. population receiving at least one prescription drug each year the problem of non-compliance touches virtually every household in America. Taking medications properly can improve their effectiveness and reduce risks.

Consumers can have a positive impact on their health by becoming better informed concerning health products, particularly prescription medications," she said.

The most effective way to learn about medications is to ask a pharmacist. These highlyeducated professionals are the

most available members of the health care team. During Texas Pharmacy Week, October 23-29, Texas pharmacists are increasing their efforts to help patients to take charge of their own health by becoming better informed about their medications.

"Understanding medication therapy is as easy as spending a few moments asking your pharmacist five simple questions," Ms. Toewe said.

She said no one should leave a prescription counter without first determining:

- What is the name of the medicine and what is it supposed to do?

- How and when do I take it, and for how long?

-What foods, drinks, and other medicines or activities should I avoid while taking this medicine?

- Are there any side effects, and what should I do if they occur?

-Will this new prescription work safely with the other medicine (prescription and non-prescription) I am taking?

For more information concerning prescription and nonprescription medications, develop a habit of speaking with your local pharmacist.



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
## Lazbuddie students of month named

President Buster Kittrell called the meeting to order. Minutes were read by secretary Mable Wolf. They were approved as read.


Leon Lewis was elected to serve as vice-president.

## Internet to link public, legislature

AUSTIN – Lt. Governor Bob Bullock and House Speaker Pete Laney has announced that public access to the Texas Legislature will soon enter a new era as plans are finalized to link legislative information systems to the Internet.

Bullock said he was elated.
"I have long been a staunch advocate of open government and the public's right to know," Bullock said. "I am delighted that we now have the technology to bring the work of the Legislature to the fingertips of the Texans it serves."

Laney called the Internet link a major step in opening the legislative process to the public.

Legislative information that' will be available on the Internet and updated daily includes:

\* The full text, legislative history, authors and co-authors of every bill and resolution filed in the current session.

\* Daily House and Senate calendars.

\* Names and capitol and district office addresses and phone numbers for House and Senate members.

\* House and Senate committee memberships and dayto-day committee schedules.

\* U.S. Census Bureau information on Texas House and Senate districts. 1994 general election analysis.

\* Information on how a bill becomes law.

\*Full text of the Texas Constitution.

\*General information about the Capitol, including tours, visitor parking and the Capitol Restoration Project.

The U.S. Department of Defense created the Internet to link major academic, government and industrial computer sites in the United States to promote information sharing.

A personal computer, modem and connection are needed to access the Texas Legislative System on the Internet.

Internet users will be able to access Texas Legislative information at the following address: capitol.tlc.texas.gov

## Organization helps reunite veterans

The recent 50-year celebration of D-Day was a somber reminder for many World War II veterans that those war-time buddies who did survive the war are fast succumbing to old age. Many veterans lost touchwith their friends upon the war's end and a return to civilian life. Now with most WWII vets in retirement, many have time to reflect on their war-time friendships.

Several search organizations assist vets in finding old comrades. One relatively new and unique one is the Registry of American Veterans (ROAV). It was begun to alleviate the problems veterans encounter in searching for one another and putting them back in touch with each other.


ROAV gathers information from veterans and computerizes their name, current residence, military units they served in and the time periods served in each outfit. Persons who join ROAV will receive an initial and annual printout of the database information of all veterans who served in the same unit during the same time frame as the joining member.

The printout will show the current address and phone number of surviving unit members.

Jack Knight, Executive Director of ROAV, remarked, "The Registry has received thousands of requests from veterans since it was started in May 1993. The majority of letters come from WWII veterans who are searching for old war buddies. The 11th hour plight of these veterans was summed up in a letter from LeRoy Good from Frankfort, Indiana.

Veterans are encouraged to write to ROAV for information on how to get themselves registered. ROAV will then send them the proper form to complete and become part of the database.





litigation, followed by appropriate action.







## **Legal Matters**

#### Resolving Home Owner Association Disputes

Buying a home in a nice neighborhood means more than realizing the American dream. For most Texans, it is a major investment. To protect that investment, many home owners join associations. While most home owner associations serve the needs of their neighborhoods, the activities of some can lead to disputes between members.

The Office of the Attorney General occasionally receives complaints about the way some board members use association funds. Texas law forbids our office from representing private individuals in actions of this nature, but perhaps the basic facts outlined in this column will be useful.

### What Are Homeowner Associations?

Homeowner associations are usually non-profit organizations funded by home owners' dues and managed by a board of directors elected by the residents. The associations set standards for their members to follow. Typical requirements call for keeping your lawn neatly groomed and adhering to a standard painting or fencing scheme.

Home owner associations are also responsible for maintaining common areas and services. These services may include cleaning the local pool, maintaining a clubhouse, or trimming trees in the neighborhood. The organizations might also represent the community's interests in local government meetings.

As non-profit organizations,

home owner associations are subject to the Non-Profit Corporation Act. Under this act, board members have certain responsibilities to keep or provide records. The by-laws of a non-profit corporation should provide a mechanism for removing directors or board members whose actions are illegal, wasteful, oppressive, or fraudulent. Some violations of the act may give rise to criminal penalties.

#### Suspicious Activities

Conflicts may arise when board members fail to effectively communicate their activities to the rest of the members of the organization or engage in suspicious activities.

We have received complaints from residents alleging that board members hired relatives to mow neighborhood lawns or perform other services. While it may be legal for a board to hire a relative or a board member to do contract work, the member must disclose his or her relationship or interest. Also, the contract or transaction must be fair to the association, and a majority of the disinterested director must approve the contract or transaction.

We also have received complaints about board members awarding large contracts to

their friends. The same rules for relatives apply to friends. In either case, board members may not profit by virtue of their position on a board of directors

## of a non-profit association. What To Do?


If you have a dispute with your home owner association, we strongly advise that you to try to work out your differences by reviewing the


associations's by-laws and attempting to enforce them. If you feel that board members are not fulfilling their duties properly, you can ask them to resign or vote them out of office.
