## GISD Board Renews 75 - 76 Administrator's Contracts

### Baptist Birthday Celebration Set Feb. 13

A Baptist birthday celebration will take place at the First Baptist Church, Goldthwaite, Feb. 13.

Church leaders from across Mills Baptist Association will gather to observe the 50th Anniversary of the Baptist way of giving, the Cooperative Program.

The rally offers both a daytime and evening session look at the historical past as well as future inroads of Baptist ministries.

The united effort of Southern Baptists through the Cooperative Program during the past 50 years has afforded the erection of a quality network of missionaries to 83 foreign nations, homes for young children and senior citizens, colleges, hospitals and various assistance to its 35,000 churches across the nation.

In observance of the 50th anniversary, the 4,200 Southern Baptist-affiliated churches and missions in Texas are striving to raise a record \$20.6 million during 1975 to meet physical and spiritual needs in Texas and around the world.

Program personalities for the Goldthwaite rally include James Harrell from the Texas Baptist Stewardship Division, Dallas; Woodson Armes, secretary of the Texas Baptist Christian Education Commission; Floyd Bradley, pastor of the First Baptist Church, Floydada; and Larry Rose, director of missions for Waco Baptist Association.

The contracts of all three administrators in the Goldthwaite Independent School District were renewed at the Board of Trustees meeting Monday night.

Superintendent Gilbert Davis' contract was extended one year to a three-year contract; High School principal George Michael's contract was extended to a two-year proposal; and elementary principal T. J. William's contract was extended one year, making his a two-year contract. All were carried by unanimous vote.

In other contract discussion the board offered another one-year contract to Head Coach Gene Auldridge. This was carried by a four to one vote. Voting for were trustees Milton Schwartz, James Reese, Bill Bishop and Hubert Berry. Voting against the contract was trustee Don Humphries.

To give the district better bargaining power and to allow more time in the procurement of new teachers, the board unanimously voted to amend the policy of the deadline for teachers to sign contracts. The present deadline of June 15th was amended to read June 1st.

The regular election of the trustees will be held on April 5, 1975. Bill Bishop and Dale Allen's terms of office will expire this year. The board selected Myra D. Holland as election judge and designated her to find two acceptable clerks to assist in the running of the election.

Superintendent Davis reported that two persons have been put to work in the elementary grades through the sponsorship of the Central Texas Council of Governments. Mrs. Billie Herring has been employed under the Comprehensive Employee Training Act which is responsible to the Manpower division of COG. Mrs. Patricia Miller has been employed to be used in the elementary school. Mrs. Miller is a qualified teacher. She is employed under the Emergency Job Program recently signed by President Ford. Both women are being used in the schools at no cost to the district.

The Board gave its approval for the signing of a contract with Lone Star Gas Co. giving the school good rates as an industrial user of natural gas. The gas situation was further discussed and Mr. Davis was instructed to look into the possibility of getting another type of heating system in the elementary grades. The present type of system is reportedly not very efficient and another will be cheaper to operate and will use less fuel.

President Dale Allen was given the authority to look into the lighting situation at the Eagle Football Field. The new quartz-iodine lighting system is to be the main item on his list, and he is to find out the cost and the number of such bulbs that need to be installed.

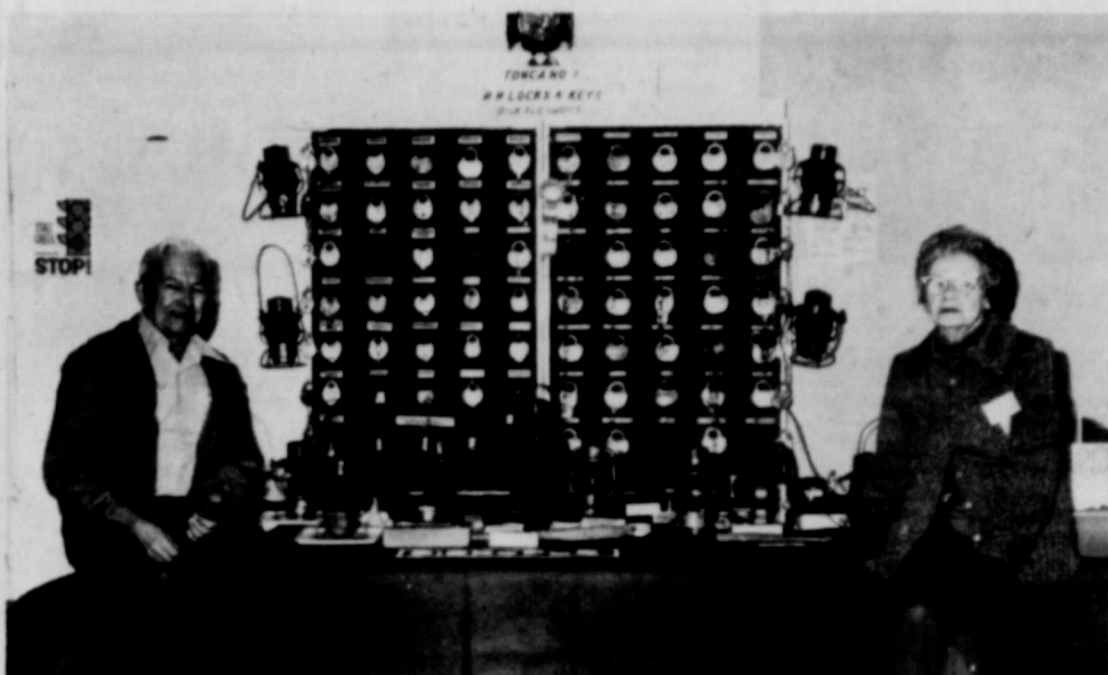

## Historical County Abode Falls Victim To Fire

A house that has been standing in Mills County longer than any other passed away last Saturday night.

Fire of unknown origin gutted the old rock and hand-hewn timber home, and all that is now left are two walls of rock and a couple of chimneys.

The house, located about a half a mile west of Center City, Texas, was built by a Mr. Hughes somewhere around 1870. It had one large sleeping room upstairs and three rooms downstairs. Both stories had fireplaces.

It was called the Welch house for most of its years, being the birthplace for many Welch children - among them Harry Welch, well-known in Mills County. The Welch family purchased the property from Mr. Hughes in 1878 and lived there until 1919 when the Ranger oil boom caused them to lift up stakes and move.

It had been rebuilt and remodeled several times; however, the original box-type two-story had been intact all the time. The rock for the house probably was hand-hewn close by and timber hauled in for the floor-

ing and headers over windows and doors.

The future of the old house had been discussed as recently as last Thursday night by the Mills County Bicentennial Committee as a possible sight for the placement of a Historical Marker for the role this house played in the heritage of the county. It is located behind a large oak tree about 75 feet off of U.S. Highway 84.

The Welch family still inhabits that section of Mills County, or at least a little further west. In addition to Harry, brother Jimmy and sisters Lucille and Mrs. Walter Tubbs live between Goldthwaite and Center City. Jack (A. R.) Welch is another brother. Their father was Charlie Welch, pictured in the old photograph at left. The photo was taken sometime between 1905-10 and is an insight into the life of the day. Notice the rain barrel, the guitar in the window, and the "ten gallon" hats. The addition at the right of the house was the kitchen and washing area.



All that is left of the 100-year-old house are a few rocks and two walls. The fire was out of control when Goldthwaite firefighters arrived on the scene.

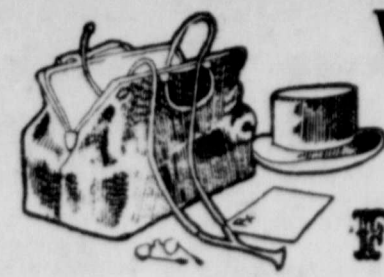

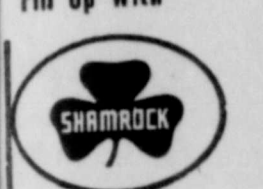

A good health management program is important for your cattle operation because disease problems can mean the difference between a profit or a loss.

Herd health is especially important due to current low cattle prices.

We suggest several ways of improving health management of cattle operations, such as providing adequate nutritional feed, adopting a good vaccination program, and controlling internal and external parasites.

It's important to provide enough forage and feed to sustain a herd for a year.

A good vaccination program is vital to herd health. Every calf over four months of age and every yearling should be vaccinated against Blackleg and other infections. Vaccinating against leptospirosis is also suggested and should be carried out in consultation with a veterinarian.

New animals should be given blood tests to determine whether they have brucellosis (Bang's disease).

External parasites can be controlled by treatment with insecticides while properly timed worming can rid animals of internal parasites.

We advise ranchers to provide a source of magnesium for their cattle during the winter months to prevent grass tetany.

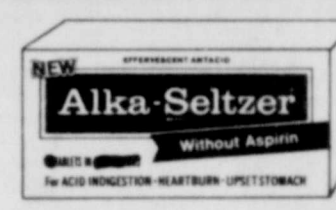

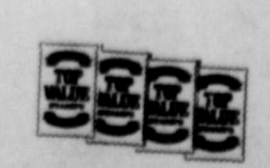

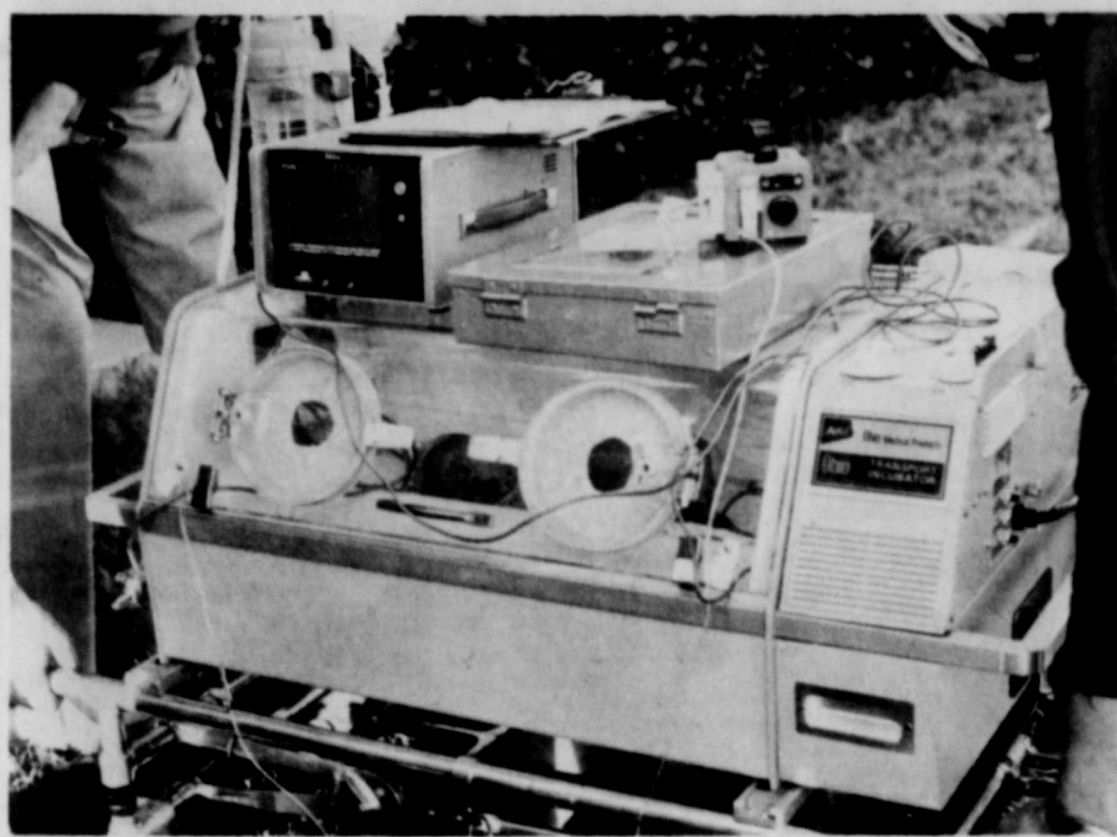
The association recently changed its name to the present from the Lone Star Water Well Drillers Association, of which Mr. Cook has been a member for many years.

### CATTLEMAN'S PCA PREDICTS LOWER INTEREST RATES IN '75

Qualified farmers and ranchers should be able to borrow the production money they need for 1975 and at gradually declining interest costs, Charles E. Conrad, Cattleman's Production Credit Association vice president, said recently. Conrad said projections are that the gradual decline in money costs will continue. "By June PCA farmers and ranchers should be paying from 1 1/2 percent less for their borrowed money."

The PCA officer said that his organization's method of obtaining money ensures an adequate supply for his stockholders in 1975. Funds for the Association are obtained through the public sale of bonds.

Cattleman's PCA loaned \$93.7 million in 1974. This figure represents an average loan size of \$89,500 to approximately 1,050 members.

Cattleman's PCA provides loan funds to farmers and ranchers in Burnet, Gillespie, Lampasas, Llano, Mason, McCulloch, Mills and San Saba counties.
