Payroll during the year totals \$348,961 which is paid to 58 members of the faculty and employees.

Annual budget for the Goldthwaite school system this year is \$376,310. This does not include lunchroom operations.

There are 30 teachers and administrators in the school system.

The school system operates seven buses, driving approximately 102,000 miles per year.

Estimated value of school buildings, land and equipment and all physical facilities of the district would run in the neighborhood of \$750,000. These include Elementary School, High School, Gymnasium, Stadium, Agriculture Building, Storage Building, High School Lunchroom, and approximately 80 acres of land.

Total enrollment for the 1974-75 year has now reached 431 pupils for both high school, junior high and elementary school.

Goldthwaite Schools operate two modern lunchrooms serving an average of 320 meals daily and total expected for the year of 62,000.

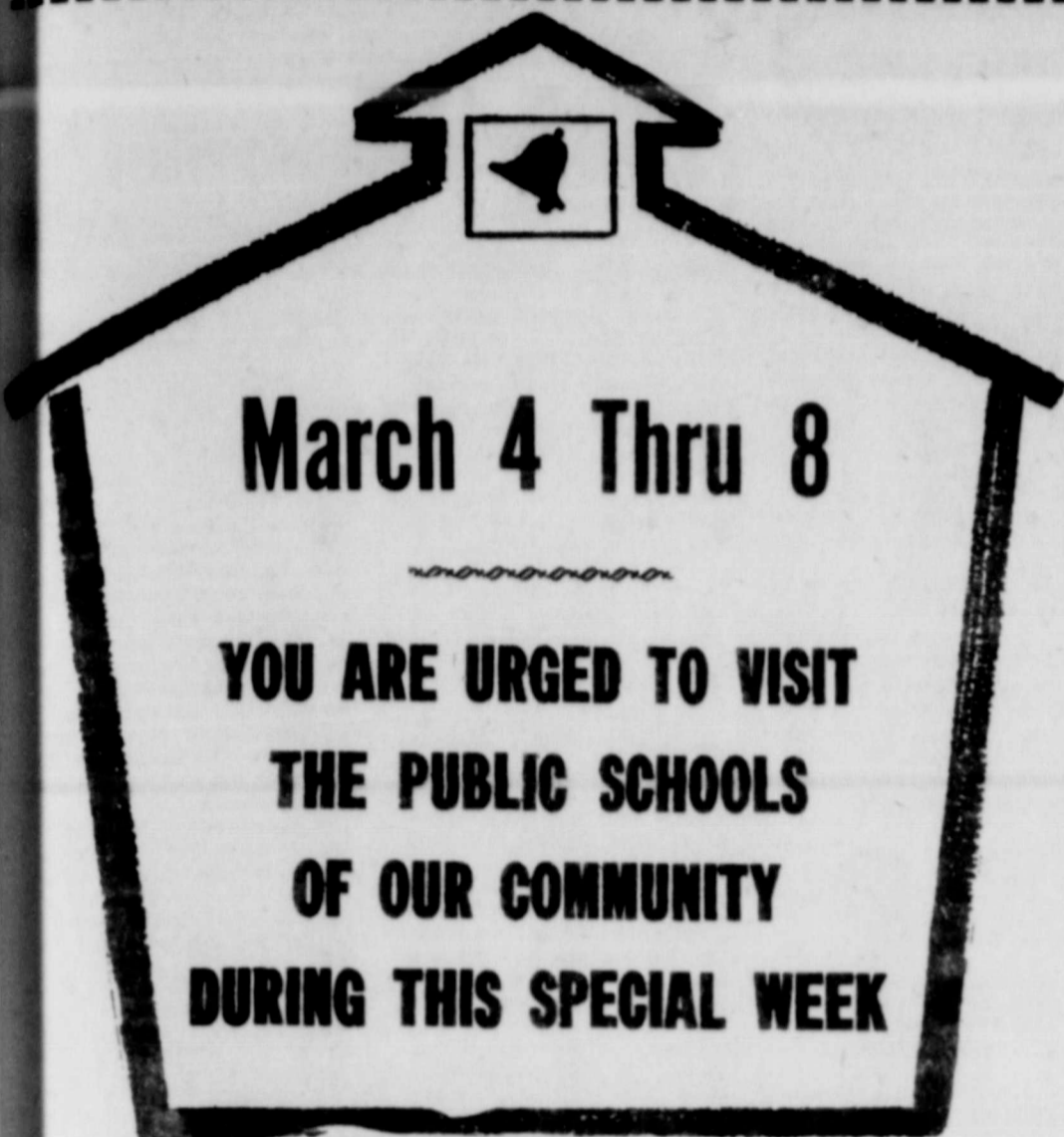

SUMMARY OF PROPOSED CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENTS

SPECIAL ELECTION APRIL 22, 1975

NUMBER ONE ON THE BALLOT (S.J.R. No. 3)

Repealing Sections 48a, 48b, 51e, and 51f of Article III and Sections 62 and 63 of Article XVI of the Texas Constitution, Article XVI of the Texas Constitution is amended to:

Provide for the revision and consolidation of provisions relating to state and local retirement systems and programs and to provide that all general laws that have established retirement systems and optional retirement programs for public employees and officers in effect at the time of the adoption of this constitutional amendment will remain in effect, subject to the general powers of the Legislature.

Provide that the amount a participating officer or employee contributes to the employee retirement system or the teacher retirement system shall be established by the Legislature but may not be less than 6% of current compensation and providing further that the amount contributed by the state may not be less than 6 nor more than 10% of the aggregate compensation paid to participating persons, except that in an emergency, as determined by the Governor, the Legislature may contribute more than 10% of the aggregate compensation paid to persons participating in state retirement systems.

Provide that the Legislature shall provide for local retirement systems created by any city or county for its officers and employees and shall further provide for a state-wide system of benefits for officers and employees of counties or other political subdivisions of the State which may voluntarily participate, and

to further provide that a state-wide system of benefits shall be provided for officers and employees of cities which may voluntarily participate.

The wording of the proposed amendment as it will appear on the ballot is as follows:

"The constitutional amendment revising and consolidating provisions relating to state and local retirement systems and programs and providing for a maximum state contribution to state systems of .10 percent of the aggregate compensation paid to individuals."

NUMBER TWO ON THE BALLOT (H.J.R. No. 6)

Amending Article III, Section 24 of the Texas Constitution to:

Provide an increase in salary for members of the Legislature from \$400 per month to \$600 per month.

Provide an increase in the per diem rate for members of the Legislature from \$12 to \$30 for each day during each Regular and Special Session of the Legislature.

Provide an increase in the transportation allowance for members from \$10 per mile to the rate prescribed by law for employees of the State of Texas.

The wording of the proposed amendment as it will appear on the ballot is as follows:

"The constitutional amendment setting the salaries of members of the legislature at \$600 per month and setting a per diem of \$30 per day during legislative sessions and a mileage allowance at the same rate provided by law for state employees."



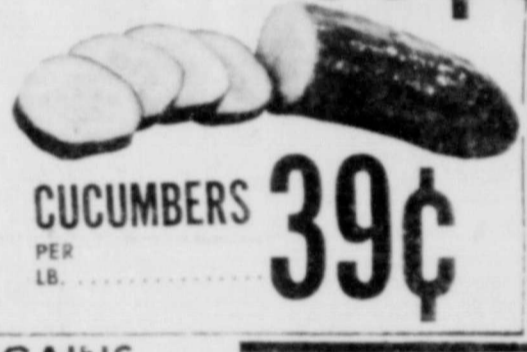

From The County Agent- Plans For Girl Scout Council's Camp Now Underway

by Danny Long

With the present moisture, good stands, and well under way, the Girl Scout Council's camp will begin in a few days. The camp will be held at the camp site near the town of Goldthwaite.

Both the amount of nitrogen and time of application are important in obtaining satisfactory results. The rate of nitrogen to use must take into account (1) fertilization to date, (2) yield potential as affected by stand, soil moisture, grazing, and any other condition that can be expected to limit grain production. Generally, 30 to 60 lbs. of actual nitrogen per acre should be considered for grain, using the low rate where nitrogen was applied last fall and no grazing, and the high rate where fall and winter grazing has been practiced. If the grain looks pale green and shows evidence of low nitrogen and the prospects look good, a higher rate may be preferable.

For maximum benefits from topdressing, nitrogen should be applied before tillering. Research data show that one way nitrogen increases grain yields is through increased tillering, hence seed heads.

Most nitrogen fertilizers are suitable for topdressing, but it is especially important that the application is evenly applied. Under today's nitrogen cost and grain value, streaking is costly.

Where solutions are used, it is preferable to dribble or use methods that put the fertilizer in contact with the soil, rather than on the leaves.

Extension Highlights

A little extra care of these rose bushes in your home landscape can bring a season of beautiful blooms. Prune roses now and also plant new varieties.

Plant bare-root rose bushes about four weeks before the average last frost date in your area. However, potted bushes can be set out at any time.

Prune roses in early spring before active growth starts. Cut off any insect damaged or diseased canes.

When pruning, leave about five vigorous canes 15-24 inches tall. For an abundance of small blooms on Hybrid Tea varieties, cut back about one-fourth of the plant. For medium-sized flowers, prune back about one-half of the growth and for exhibition-size roses, prune about three-fourths of the plant.

Prune rambling and climbing roses after they bloom. However, some long stems must be left to produce flowers.

After pruning, cover the cut end of the cane with asphalt wound dressing or caulking compound. This will prevent larvae of carpenter bees from burrowing into the canes.

To keep roses healthy, weed and fertilize the garden area regularly. Apply one-half cup of 8-8-8 or a similar fertilizer at least a foot from the trunk of the rose bush and reapply every three or four weeks if the soil is sandy or infertile.

Apply a two-inch mulch of sawdust, wood chips or peat moss to the soil to retain moisture and retard weed growth.

Spray roses with a fungicide-Benlate or Manzate - every week during the summer - to control blackspot.

Try growing a few miniature roses this spring. They are hardy and are good for low border plantings, rock gardens, window boxes and as house plants.
