Deadline Nears For Purchasing '75 License Plates

Mills County residents have two more days left in which to purchase their 1975 license plates, according to announcement by H. G. Brooks, county tax assessor-collector. Deadline for purchasing of the new tags is Tuesday, April 1st.

With only two more days left in which to purchase the tags, the annual last minute rush has hit the county tax office.

Persons wishing to purchase license plates should bring the proper forms with them to the tax office. All that is needed to purchase the plates is the special three-part license form which all vehicle owners should have received through the mail from the Texas Highway Department.

All vehicle owners who did not receive the proper licensing forms from the highway department are advised to bring the auto title papers and current registration receipts with them when they purchase their plates.

The county tax assessor-collector's office is open each weekday from 8 a.m. until 5 p.m.

Over 4,000 sets of new vehicle plates are expected to be purchased by residents of Mills County this year.

School Tax Assignments Draws Comments From Davis

In response to numerous recent inquiries, Superintendent of the Goldthwaite schools, Gilbert Davis, has issued a statement regarding the local fund assignment situation. The assignment was recently changed by the Texas Board of Education in Austin.

Local Fund Assignment (LFA) in all schools is based on Mills County values, sent in each year from county tax rolls. This year the figures sent in must be on real values and this must be sent in by the County Tax Assessor and not by the schools.

There is a big difference in what the 254 individual counties' assessors feel that the actual value of their county is, because some of these made their evaluations at a level that was not market value.

Our county was penalized for this. After these evaluations have been sent in on county values, the school personnel were advised the local fund assignment increase for the entire county was more than doubled.

The County Tax Assessor - Collector, the county school superintendent and all the superintendents of schools have been working with the Texas Education Agency and the State Board of Education to try to get this changed, because other counties in their evaluations are lower than most school district evaluations.

"We have been told by the State Board that our county Local Fund Assignment (all four schools) has been reduced from the \$176,364 to approximately \$104,000. This will be a reduction of \$72,000," Davis said. "We are still meeting with the State Board to try to get this lowered further," Davis commented. The present level is about \$80,000.

If the \$104,000 is allowed to stand, it will be an increase to GISD of about \$11,000 this year, which is only an 8 percent increase in taxes.

The next step is to meet with the State Board again and bring Municipal Bonding ratings into evidence. The Goldthwaite rating is set on 40 percent evaluation. Mills County's evaluation was sent in recently at only a 3 percent level.

"We feel that the county office has done nothing wrong. It's just that there is no definition of 'real value,'" Davis explained.

"The local school administrators are doing everything they possible can to assure no increase in taxes to local citizens," Davis concluded.

Two Priddy Residents Injured In Recent Accident

Wednesday, March 12th, a two-vehicle accident occurred on a county road 3.4 miles west of Priddy. Involved in the collision was a 1965 Chevrolet pickup driven by Douglas Fiest of Priddy and a 1970 Chevrolet driven by Katherine Hohertz, also of Priddy.

The left front of the pickup was in collision with the left front of the Hohertz vehicle. The drivers of both vehicles were transported to Childress Clinic and Hospital where they were treated for their injuries. The vehicles sustained moderate damage.

Sunday, March 23rd, U.S. 84 in Star was the scene of a two-vehicle accident. Troy Alexander of Star, driver of a 1972 Chevrolet, was in collision with a 1974 Ford truck tractor-trailer. Driver of the truck was Claud Coats of Novice, Texas.

Both vehicles were traveling east on 84 at the time of the accident. The truck struck the right side of the Alexander vehicle upon attempting to pass.

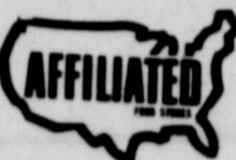

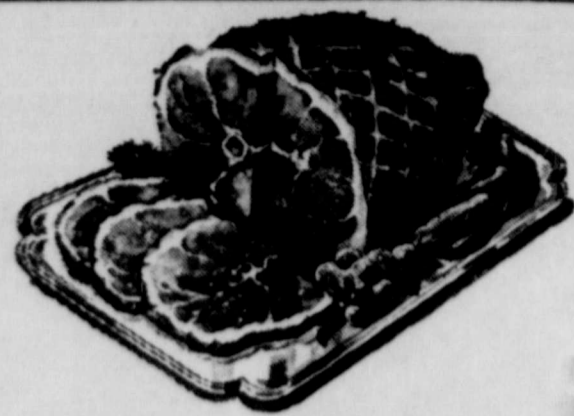

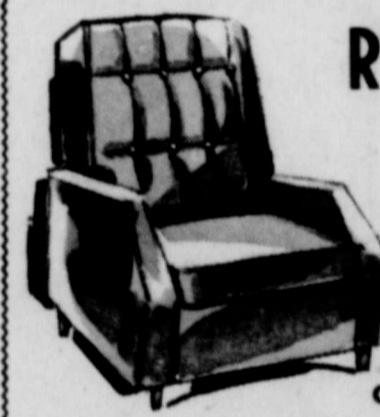

Candlelighters were Roy Sutherland and Charles Slaughter, brothers of the groom.

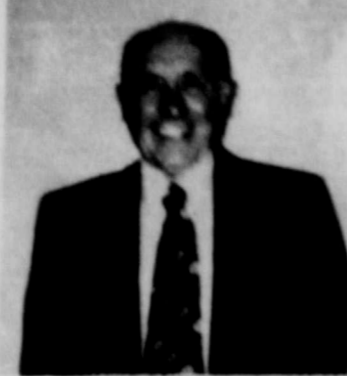
