Acting City Manger Named; New Council Takes Oaths

Dale Allen was named acting City Manager Monday night by the Goldthwaite City Council. The action followed the March resignation of Manager Don Petty who had held the position for two years.

Allen, who has been office manager and purchasing agent for the past year, assumed the temporary post as chief city administrator Tuesday morning. The duties of the office were given him by the council, including the handling of all personnel matters and the handling of the work load of the City employees. Recent resignation by three other City employees and the vacancies thereby created are to be considered by Allen.

Councilman Howard Campbell made the motion moving Allen up acting City Manager. It was a unanimous decision. The City is to begin taking applications for a new City Manager immediately, and anyone interested in the position is urged to contact either Allen, City Secretary Glynn Collier or Mayor J. D. Harper for further information.

In other business, the former council, consisting of Ancle Morgan, Donald Padgett, Loy Long, Howard Campbell and

Jimmy Smith, canvassed the election here. J. D. Harper received 122 votes for Mayor and James Carter and Frank Bridges each received 129 votes for Alderman. The three new members of the City governing body replace Ray Duren, Donald Padgett and Ancle Morgan. The new officers were given the oath of office by Mayor Duren after which they were seated and the new council was in session.

The newly formed council reorganized and elected Jimmy Smith Mayor Pro-Tem, to sit in the absence of Mayor Harper.

In other matters the council: ONE - Heard from Mrs. Judy Beavers concerning the proposed Farmers' Market to be staged during the summer at the property adjacent to Mills County Lumber on Highway 84. Mrs. Beavers reminded the council that only Mills County produce, selling Mills County produce, will be allowed to sell wares at the market. It is a project of the Mills County Family Living Committee.

TWO - Received a check for \$2,118.00 for the City's revenue sharing money.

THREE - Opened bids on a

one-ton truck to be used in the electric department. The low bidder was Saylor Chevrolet with a bid of \$4,461.91. After a trade-in allowance of \$600, the truck would cost \$3,861.91. The tool bins will have to be reworked to fit the shorter chassis. No nine-foot chassis could be purchased, only eight-foot models.

FOUR - Heard from Nathan Carothers concerning the house formerly occupied by Sam Watson, City employee who resigned. The house was considered part of Watson's salary. He was also the primary custodian at the Sanitary Landfill operation. The council voted to rent the house at \$90 per month, and agreed that Owen Taylor, who Carothers was appearing in behalf, would have first choice. After a phone call, Taylor consented to the rent and will move in shortly. Taylor now resides in California.

FIVE - Heard from Charles Studer who was appearing before the council to voice his opinion about the way former Manager Petty was treated by the council. Studer said that the matter was not handled fairly and that he just wanted the record to show that was the way he felt about it. Studer's primary objection was that Petty was not given proper instructions and alternatives in his job.

SIX - Heard a budget report from Dale Allen who said the budget that was set up last July was running, through nine months, at 72.23 percent of collections and 74.47 of expenditures. Ideally, the budget would be at a 75 percent level. It was mentioned, however, that the City had not purchased a bulldozer for the landfill operation. This would push the expenditure part of the budget over the desired level.

SEVEN - Approved the quarterly treasurer's report and the monthly operations report. The monthly operations report showed an overall gain of over \$2,000 for the City coffers, however, it was a month that the City received a City sales tax check for over \$6,000.

G'waite School Board Re-Organized

Members of the Goldthwaite School Board met in regular session Monday night. Purpose of the meeting was for general business and re-organization of the board.

Hubert Berry was elected president of the board; James Reese, vice-president; and Elmo Watson, secretary.

Dr. Douglas Dennis and Stanley Bessent, newly elected members of the board, were inducted at the meeting.

Rodeo Ass'n. Elects Officers

The Mills County FFA Rodeo Assoc. met recently and elected officers for the 1975 year. Those elected include: President, Bob Boykin; Vice President, Malcolm Jernigan; Sec. - Treas., Dale Allen and Jim Wells. Directors for the 1975 year will be James Burrus, N. M. Coats, Dale Allen, Jim McCoy, Pat Rudd and Gaylon Jernigan.

Plans were made concerning the upcoming FFA Rodeo here in Goldthwaite. These rodeos will be April 14th & 15th for the Goldthwaite School Rodeo, June 19, 20, & 21 for the Invitational, and the Gold-Tex. Finals will be on August 7, 8, & 9th.

The Rodeo Assoc. members are conducting a membership drive for all interested persons wanting to join and support the youth in Goldthwaite.

Plans are also underway for a drawing on a youth saddle to be given away on May 31st at the Fiddlers' Contest. Tickets are being printed and donations will be accepted.

Wool Incentive Payments Now Being Computed By ASCS

Payments are being computed for 1974 marketings of shorn wool and unshorn lambs, according to Blake English, Mills County ASCS Executive Director. Incentive level will be 21.8 percent for shorn wool and \$6.52 per hundredweight for lambs sold unshorn. The national average price received for wool during 1974 was determined to be 59.1 cent per pound. This figure was used in determining the incentive level based on the support level of 72 cents per pound.

The County ASCS Office will be issuing drafts as they arrive from the USDA Data Processing Center in Kansas City. The drafts will be computed by multiplying net wool sale price times 21.8 percent less promotion fund deductions. 1.5 cents per pound. Unshorn lamb drafts, combined with wool draft, will be computed by multiplying 52 cents times the net weight of unshorn lambs less a promotion fund deduction of 7.5 cents per hundredweight.

The national average price received for 1974 mohair exceeded the support level 80.5 cents per pound. Therefore, there will be no incentive payment for mohair.

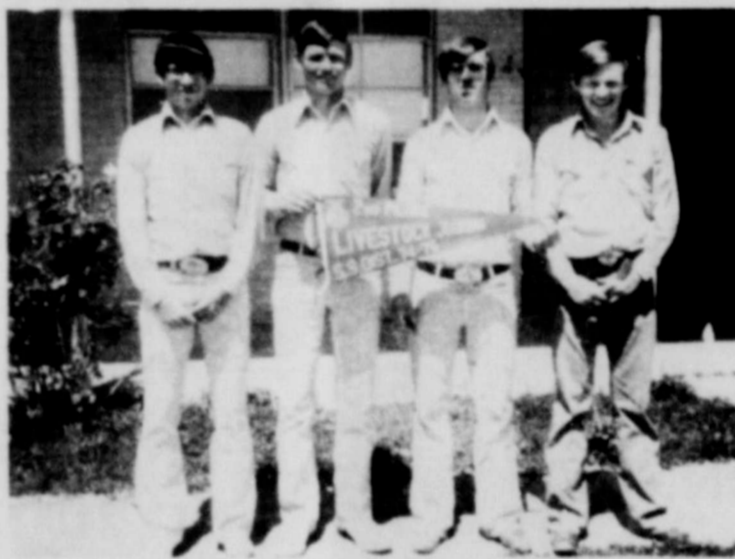

Food Stamps Increase Food Purchasing

Food Stamps will increase the food purchasing power of households by adding to what they presently spend for food. Eligible households pay a set amount for Food Stamps and are then given bonus stamps based on size of household and their total net income. Bonus stamps make up the difference between what a household can pay for food and what is necessary for an adequate diet.

Households are certified eligible for Food Stamps at the local Welfare Office. The certification process consists of completing an application form, having an interview, and verifying income and expenses. If you are not able to come to this office because of age or health, you may authorize someone to apply for you. Certified households will then receive an Authorization to Purchase (ATP) card in the mail which will tell them how many stamps they are eligible for and how much money, if any, they must pay for them.

The ATP card and the necessary cash are redeemable for Food Stamps at local Post Offices.

Participating grocers accept Food Stamps for the purchase of most food and food products.

Participation in the Food Stamp program is voluntary and does not prevent the household from receiving any other benefit for which members might be eligible.
