in recent years to producers in Central Texas.

All aspects of anaplasmosis will be discussed at the Stephenville meeting, including economic significance, means of infection and practical control methods. Speakers and co-sponsoring groups will be Dr. Steve Hammack, Area Beef Cattle Specialist, Texas Agriculture Extension Service, Dr. W. W. Collins, Veterinary Consultant, American Cyanimid Co. and Dr. Tim Mason, Professor of Animal Science, Tarleton State University.

More and more producers are asking about the pros and cons of Klinegrass. Newly established fields of this grass are appearing throughout the county, and deservingly so. Klinegrass is not as new as many people think. Introductions were made as early as 1942 and the grass has been tested extensively since 1968.

Kline is a vigorous growing, fairly drouth resistant, warm season perennial grass. There are several original varieties of Kline, but Klinegrass 75 is the only variety presently recommended. The grass is leafy, fine stemmed and has a minimum of woody fiber. Plant height at maturity is about 3 to 4½ feet. The grass spreads from tillers, short righomers and volunteer seedlings. It begins growth fairly early in the spring and remains green in the fall until a hard freeze.

The grass is adapted to a fairly wide range of soils, but better results seem to be obtained on slightly tighter soils. When camparison is made between Klinegrass and Coastal Bermuda, Coastal generally is superior on sandy soils while Kline is superior on tighter soils.

It is relatively easy to establish from seed; however, emergence. It is generally planted in the spring after the danger of frost is over, about the same time as grain sor-






