

The Second Continental Congress on June 14, 1779, legislated for the first time a flag of the United States, now an independent nation: "Resolved, that the flag of the thirteen United States be thirteen stripes, alternate red and white; that the union be thirteen stars,

This is a referral service that can be solicited simply by a phone call. Those adults needing services can call and ask for a list of young persons offering those services. Any youth may call or come by the office and list the types of jobs that he is interested in doing. The wages are strictly between the youth and his employer and are not determined by this office. Last summer, many young persons worked on a temporary or semi-permanent basis through this service. The jobs can vary from anything such as babysitting, lawnmowing, window-washing to the less ordinary occupations of dog-sitting and chimney sweep. The options are limited only to the youth's enter-- and the demand for the work.

If you know of any students that would be interested in applying for odd and part-time work, have them contact the C.T.C.O.G. office in the Courthouse or call 648-2622.
