Mullin Bicentennial Fandango Celebration Slated June 28

In Mullin plans for the Bicentennial fandango celebration have sparked new life to the entire community. Lawn mowers are humming, paint brushes are coloring, newly-planted trees are growing and busy people all over are cleaning up, giving the village a new face. Also, beards and bonnets have returned to Mullin along with long dresses and horse-drawn wagons. In fact, all Mullin people who do not dress for the occasion on June 28 will be jailed by the Bicentennial sheriff, Wayne King, and his deputy, Bruce Lethco. Length of time in jail will be determined by the judge, Argie Whisenhunt. A \$70.00 desk-top calculator will be presented by Kirbo's Office Machines to the person with the best costume.

The day will start early with hospitality time beginning at 8:00 at the Mullin Community Center which for that day will be the "Ball Fence Saloon" and will feature honky tonk piano and saloon entertainment. At 10:45 the opening ceremonies will begin and at 11:00 there will be a historical parade depicting the era from the discovery of America to the present time. Right now Mullin people are working on the twenty-seven floats to make them interesting and beautiful. Much work and planning have gone into the parade to make it a gala event. By the time one gets hungry, around noon, a delicious meal will be ready and will be served directly from the old time chuck wagon for only 1.25 and .75.

At 1:00 the pickin' and fiddlin' will start, along with other types of entertainment such as a mob and a hanging, a shoot-out, beard-growing contest, water melon seed spitting contest, armadillo races, a historical museum, an ole time general store, homemade ice cream, water melon stand, flea market, blacksmith shop, leather shop and a good ole time hamburger joint. There will be a style-show at 2:00.

The objective for the centennial year is to restore the original buildings of the town. Attention will especially be focused on the old post office building which was presented as a gift to the city of Mullin by Mr. Ernest Fisher. Tentative plans for the building now are to restore it and use it as a combination museum-library. The building was erected a little before the turn of the century and was used as a post office from 1941 till 1967. Be-

fore that, according to Mullin senior citizen Edgar Burkett, it was the original site of the George Ethridge Hotel. The gift of this building will enable the people of Mullin to preserve and collect memorabilia and will also give others a chance to see the remaining bits of Mullin's historical treasures.

A square dance will be held Saturday night to culminate the day's activities.

American Heart Ass'n. Walkathon Here Saturday

Co-Chairmen Del Barnett and O'Donnell Newton announced that a walkathon will be held June 14 to benefit the American Heart Association. The chairmen said that participants should pick up sponsor sheets at several locations in Goldthwaite and get them filled out before Saturday.

The walkathon will be divided into two sections - 8 a.m. to 12 noon and 4 p.m. to 8 p.m. Participants can work one or both of the times. Contestants should meet at the park to begin the walkathon and then proceed with the walk, cleaning and picking up trash along the way.

Later, after mileage and trash bags have been counted, the contestants will return to the sponsors to collect the contributions. Sponsors will be contacted before hand to settle on the amount that will be paid per mile for the walkathon. Prizes will be awarded in each of three categories - money collected, number of trash bags filled (bags furnished by Heritage Home), and miles walked.

Parents are reminded that each group of ten persons will be supervised and vehicles equipped with flashing lights will accompany the walkers.

Children under ten years of age will walk separately and stay inside the city limits. A permission slip will be needed by participants 18 years of age and under. The slip is printed at the end of the story. Each contestant will be responsible for collecting his own

pledges after his mileage has been verified.

County Judge Reminds Mills

Residents Of Flag Day, June 14

Herbert Faulkner, Mills County Judge and chairman of the Mills County Bicentennial Committee, reminds Mills County residents that Saturday, June 14, is Flag Day. Flag Day is also one of the regular flag flying days for the Goldthwaite Lions Club.

The Second Continental Congress on June 14, 1779, legislated for the first time a flag of the United States, now an independent nation: "Resolved, that the flag of the thirteen United States be thirteen stripes, alternate red and white; that the union be thirteen stars,

white in a blue field, representing a new constellation."

On August 3, 1949, President Truman signed into law a joint Congressional resolution: "That the 14th day of June of each year is hereby designated as Flag Day and the President of the United States is authorized and requested to issue annually a proclamation calling upon officials of the Government to display the flag of the United States on all Government buildings on such day, and urging the people to observe the day as the anniversary of the adoption of June 14, 1777, by the Continental Congress of the Stars and Stripes as the official flag of the United States of America."

With summer in full bloom, there are many young people out of school with lots of free time on their hands. And with the warmer months, there are a lot of jobs and chores around the house and yard that need to be done. This is what DIAL-A-TEEN is for . . . to get those jobs and young persons together.

This is a referral service that can be solicited simply by a phone call. Those adults needing services can call and ask for a list of young persons offering those services. Any youth may call or come by the office and list the types of jobs that he is interested in doing. The wages are strictly between the youth and his employer and are not determined by this office. Last summer, many young persons worked on a temporary or semi-permanent basis through this service. The jobs can vary from anything such as babysitting, lawn mowing, window-washing to the less ordinary occupations of dog-sitting and chimney sweep. The options are limited only to the youth's enterprise - - and the demand for the work.
